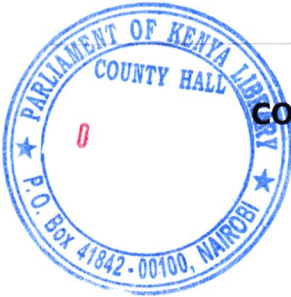

1.0 PREFACE

1.1 Establishment of Committee

1. The power of each House of Parliament to establish committees and to make Standing Orders for the orderly conduct of its proceedings, including the proceedings of its Committees is provided under Art. 124 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.
2. The National Assembly Standing Orders has established various Committees of the House with distinct mandates. These Committees under the Directorate of Audit, Appropriations and Other Select Committees play a pivotal role in facilitating the National Assembly fulfill its constitutional mandate of allocation of national revenue, appropriation of funds and oversight over national revenue, expenditure and State organs.
3. Section 4 of the Sixth Schedule to the Constitution (Article 262 - Transitional and Consequential Provisions) provides for a Parliamentary Select Committee to be known as the Constitutional Implementation Oversight Committee (CIOC) responsible for overseeing the implementation of the Constitution

1.2 Mandate of the Committee

4. The Committee is mandated to oversee the implementation of the Constitution and among other things-
 - i. Shall receive regular reports from the Commission on the Implementation of the Constitution (CIC) on the implementation of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 including reports concerning: -
 - (a) the preparation of the legislation required by the Constitution and any challenges in that regard;
 - (b) the process of establishing the new commissions;

- (c) The process of establishing the infrastructure necessary for the proper operation of each county including progress on locating offices and assemblies and establishment and transfers of staff.
 - (d) The devolution of powers and functions to the counties under the legislation contemplated in section 15 of the Sixth Schedule;
 - (e) Any impediments to the process of implementing this Constitution.
-
- ii. Coordinate with the Attorney-General, the Commission on the Implementation of the Constitution and relevant Parliamentary committees to ensure the timely introduction and passage of the legislation required by the Constitution; and
 - iii. Take appropriate action on the reports including addressing any problems in the implementation of the Constitution.

2.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2.1 Legal framework

8. Art. 93 (1) of the Constitution of Kenya establishes the Parliament of Kenya which consists of the National Assembly and the Senate. Further, Art 95 provides for the role of the National Assembly amongst others to:
 - (i) Deliberate on and resolve issues of concern to the people;
 - (ii) Enact legislations
 - (iii) Determine allocation of national revenue between the two levels of government the National government and County governments;
 - (iv) Appropriate funds for expenditure by the national government and national State organs;
 - (v) Exercise oversight over national revenue and its expenditure;
 - (vi) Exercise oversight over State organs; and
 - (vii) Review the conduct in the office of the President, Deputy President and other State officers and initiate the process of removal from office.
9. In addition, Art 124 of the Constitution empowers Parliament to establish Committees and to make Standing Orders for the orderly conduct of its proceedings including the proceedings of its Committee.
10. The National Assembly Standing Orders has established various Committees of the House with distinct mandates. These Committees under the Directorate of Audit, Appropriations and Other Select Committees play a pivotal role in facilitating the National Assembly fulfill its constitutional mandate of allocation of national revenue, appropriation of funds and oversight over national revenue, expenditure and State organs.
11. Section 4 of the Sixth Schedule to the Constitution (Article 262 - Transitional and Consequential Provisions) provides for a Parliamentary Select Committee to be known as the Constitutional Implementation Oversight Committee (CIOOC) responsible for overseeing the implementation of the Constitution

3.2 OVERSIGHT

15. The oversight of State organs is amongst the roles assigned to the National Assembly under Art 95 of the Constitution. In fulfillment of this role, the Committee considered the following business.
16. During the 12th Parliament, the Committee considered the following matters related to the mandates of the various Constitutional Commissions and Independent Offices.

3.2.1 Oversight Milestones (Policy, Structural and Administrative)


Assets and liabilities of defunct local authorities

17. The Constitutional Implementation Oversight Committee in the execution of its mandate is undertaking an inquiry on the status of assets and liabilities of the defunct local authorities that were handed over or taken over by the County governments after the 2013 General Elections.
18. Following this inquiry, the Intergovernmental Relations Technical Committee went ahead and undertook identification, verification and validation of all assets and liabilities belonging to the defunct local authorities and how they had been dealt with.
19. The IGRTC has prepared a report on the said assets and liabilities including an inventory of all the assets. This has gone a long way in securing the assets of the County governments and ensuring that liabilities that are ascertained are settled.

4.0 CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

20. During the 12th Parliament, the Committee noted the following challenges and bottlenecks to the efficient discharge of its mandate
- a. Most often, the Committee was forced to deal with the consequences of non-compliance with the Constitution rather than scrutinizing Legislation to establish those not aligned with the Constitution of Kenya, 2010; an example is a delay in transfer of functions to counties, delay in the passage of the Division of Revenue Bill to allow Counties to develop their budgets.
 - b. Inadequate Committee meeting rooms occasionally led to delays in the conduct of sittings.
 - c. Lack of reliable database and tracking system of legislation and inability to monitor legislative proposals due to lack of a one-stop reference point.
 - d. Challenges in conducting public participation on Bills within the counties; there were instances where members of the public demanded monetary facilitation, threatened Members of the Committee and also declined to give views.
 - e. Often, the Committee is forced to deal with the consequences of non-compliance with the Constitution rather than scrutinizing Legislation to establish those not aligned to the CoK 2010; an example is Article 60 on succession laws and also Article 217.
