The Health (Amendment) Bill, 2019, National Assembly Bill No. 64 of 2019 was published on 13th September, 2019. Pursuant to Standing Order 127(1) the Bill was committed for consideration to the Departmental Committee on Health having been read a First Time on 2nd October, 2019.

The principal object of the Bill is to amend the Health Act, 2017 to make provision for the development of policy guidelines to regulate the referral of patients to health institutions both within and outside the country.

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3) of the National Assembly, the Committee through local daily newspapers of Monday, October 7, 2019 published an advertisement inviting the public to submit memoranda. Further, in a letter dated 5th March, 2020 the Committee invited individuals and institutions to make presentations on the Bill. The meeting was held on Thursday 12^h March, 2020 in the Mini Chamber, County Hall, Parliament Buildings.

The report is in two volumes. Volume 1 of the Bill the analysis of the public submissions on the Bill, written submission received from the public noting general comments in support or against the amendments and the list of the individuals and institutions that submitted their memoranda and participated in the public hearing meeting.

Volume 2 of the Bill contains adoption schedule, a copy of the newspaper advertisements of Monday, October 7, 2019 inviting the public to submit memoranda on the Bill and a letter inviting other stakeholders for public hearing meeting that was conducted on Thursday 12th March, 2020 and the minutes of the committee sittings during the consideration of the Bill.

1.0 PREFACE

1.1 ESTABLISHMENT AND MANDATE OF THE COMMITTEE

 - e) Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
 - f) Vet and report on all appointments where the constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204;
 - fa) Examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
 - g) Make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
 - h) Consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
 - i) Examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate
- 02. In accordance with the Second Schedule of the Standing Orders, the Committee is mandated to consider, matters related to health, medical care and health insurance.

2.0 OVERVIEW OF THE HEALTH (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2019, NATIONAL ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 64 OF 2019

2.1 ANALYSIS OF THE BILL

08. The principal object of the Bill is to amend the Health Act, 2017 to make provision for the development of policy guidelines to regulate the referral of patients to health institutions both within and outside the country.

09. The new section will ensure the relevant stakeholders are involved in the process of developing such policy guidelines so as to ensure the referral to hospitals outside the country is not subjected to abuse.

2.2 CONSIDERATION OF THE BILL (PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN THE REVIEW OF THE BILL)

2.2.1 LEGAL PROVISION ON PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

10. Article 118 (1) (b) of the Constitution of Kenya provides as follows -

"Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees"

11. Standing Order 127(3) provides as follows -

"The Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and shall take into account the views and recommendations of the public when the Committee makes it recommendation to the House"

2.2.2 METHODOLOGY USED BY THE COMMITTEE IN PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- The Health (Amendment) Bill, 2019, National Assembly Bill No. 64 of 2019 was published on 17th September, 2019. Pursuant to Standing Order 127(1) the Bill was committed for consideration to the Departmental Committee on Health having been read a First Time on 2nd October, 2019.
- 13. Pursuant to the said provisions of the Constitution and Standing Orders, the Committee through local daily newspapers of Monday, October 7, 2019 published an advertisement inviting the public to submit memoranda. Further, in a letter dated 5th March, 2020 the Committee invited individuals and institutions to make presentations on the Bill. The meeting was held on Thursday 12th March, 2020 in the Mini Chamber, County Hall, Parliament Buildings.
- 14. Volume 1 of the Bill as the contains the analysis of the public submissions on the Bill, written submission received from the public noting general comments in support or against the amendments and the list of the individuals and institutions that submitted their memoranda and participated in the public hearing meeting.

15. Volume 2 of the Bill contains adoption schedule, a copy of the newspaper advertisements of Monday, October 7, 2019 inviting the public to submit memoranda on the Bill and a letter inviting other stakeholders for public hearing meeting that was conducted on Thursday 12th March, 2020 and the minutes of the committee sittings during the consideration of the Bill.

3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION/STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION

- 16. Following the call for memoranda from the public through the placement of adverts in the print media on Monday, October 7, 2019. The Committee also undertook stakeholder mapping where a number of stakeholders were requested through letters Ref: NA/DCS/HEALTH /2020/011 dated 5th March, 2020 to submit their views on the Bill. The Committee received memoranda from the following stakeholders:-
 - 1. Attorney General
 - 2. Kenya National Chamber Of Commerce And Industry

3.1 THE OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

17. In their submissions the Office of Attorney General proposed the following amendments:-.

Clause 2 – New Section 79A

(a) Amend the marginal note by deleting the expression "referral outside the country" and substituting therefor with the expression "referrals within and outside the country."

Justification

The Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentist Council only deals with referral outside the country and the proposed amendment ropes in referrals within and outside the country

(b) By deleting paragraph (a) in subsection (2) and substituting therefore he following-

"the bodies responsible for the registration and licensing of health workers".

Justification

In the memorandum of objects and reasons of the proposed Bill, the new section 79A aims at the development of policy guidelines to regulate the referral of patients to health institutions both within and outside the country and to ensure that the relevant stakeholders are involved.

3.2 KENYA NATIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY

18. In their submissions the Kenya Chamber of Commerce and Industry noted the following :-.

- (a) Kenya leads as a destination for medical Tourism in the region. KNCCI as the voice of the private sector seeks to guard the population against exploitation and unethical exposure to international facilities that don't give all information to patients.
- (b) Referral is an integral part of daily patient management. The private health sector should be involved in the referral of patients to ensure timely care is accorded to the patients. The

amendment should put in place policies to ensure reimbursements of services offered for referred clients.

- (c) Referrals outside the country should only be made from accredited health facilities and professionals.
- (d) KNCCI recommended that-
 - (i) The Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentist Council (KMPDC) to clearly state what procedures and treatment modalities are specialists ones.
 - (ii) KMPDC to register health centers and professionals that perform specialist procedures and establish a transparent criterion for such registration.
 - (iii)These registered health centers to keep a registry of referrals received, procedures performed and outcomes for appraisal.
 - (iv)No referrals outside the country unless by a registered health center, professional and only through the KMPDC final approval.
 - (v) KMPDC to pre-qualify foreign facilities receiving referrals from Kenya establish a criteria for appraisal.
 - (vi)KMPDC to limit any foreign medical camp/excursions especially those that aim to fish for referral patients.
 - (vii) Establish a very strict code of conduct and standards for centers receiving referrals and their professional personnel.

4.0 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

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- 19. The Committee having considered the Health (Amendment) Bill, 2019, National Assembly Bill No. 64 of 2019 and the submissions from the stakeholders makes the following observations.
 - i) The Health (Amendment) Bill, 2019 is noble as it seeks to regulate the increasingly popular mass exodus of patients from Kenya to countries abroad. This exodus strains private as well as public resources.
 - ii) Further, the country has seen a tremendous improvement in health provision with hitherto complex procedures now available locally. This has therefore limited the need for foreign intervention;
 - iii) Patients seeking treatment abroad have in some instances been referred to unknown hospitals and specialists, putting the lives of Kenyans at risk;
 - iv) Moreover, on return there have not been mechanisms for post-treatment management of the patients, rendering already costly treatment unhelpful;
 - v) The country's healthcare system is generally in need of concrete policies for referrals, both within the country and abroad. This would need the improvement of services at county-level hospitals and firm referral guidelines for those treated within, and proper guidelines to refer patients abroad.
 - vi) Section 79 of the Heath Act, 2017 provides for guideline on referrals of patients within the country therefore the proposal in Bill should be limited to referral of patients outside the country.

5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

20. Upon considering the The Health (Amendment) Bill, 2019, National Assembly Bill No. 64 of 2019 and the submissions from the stakeholders the Committee recommends the following amendments-

CLAUSE 2

3

- THAT Clause 2 of the Bill be amended in the proposed new section 79(A) ---
 - (a) by deleting subsection (1) and substituting therefor the following new subsection—
 - (1) The Cabinet Secretary shall develop policy guidelines on the mechanisms for referral of patients to health institutions outside the country.
 - (b) in subsection (3) by deleting the words "within or".


Justification

- vi. KMPDC to limit any foreign medical camp/excursions especially those that aim to fish for referral patients.

vii. Establish a very strict code of conduct and standards for centers receiving referrals and their professional personnel.
