FOREWORD BY THE CHAIRPERSON

Honourable Speaker,

The Public Holidays (Amendment) Bill, (Senate Bills No. 31 of 2023), spc nsored by Sen. Karungo Thang'wa MP was published vide Kenya Gazette Supplement No. 116 and was introduced in the Senate by way of First Reading on Tuesday, 17th October, 2023 and was committed to the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations for consideration.

Pursuant to Article 118 of the Constitution and standing order 145 (5) of the Senate Standing Orders, the Committee proceeded to undertake public participation on the Bill. In this regard, the Committee published an advertisement in the Daily Nation and Standard Newspapers on Friday, 20th October, 2023 inviting members of the public to submit written memoranda to the Committee on the Bill. The Committee only received written memoranda from one (1) stakeholder, namely the Council of County Governors.

Honourable Speaker,

In considering the Bill, the Committee made a number of observations, key of these being that—

- a) some businesses have specific output targets and therefore, recucing the business working days as a result of the extension of public holidays may mean that employers would be compelled to meet the cost of salary payments for the days not worked for or incur hefty overtime compensation as a result of employees working on a public holiday;
- b) further, the majority of employees in Kenya are casual laborers who rely on daily wages to meet their daily needs. A reduction in their business working days as a result of the extension of public holidays on weekdays may therefore hinder their ability to meet the basic needs for themselves and their families;
- c) public holidays also disrupt businesses by reducing working days and consequently reducing business output. For example, the public transport, manufacturing, and industrial sectors may register low proceeds luring the holidays; and
- d) the Bill has the potential to cause adverse effects on the country, its conomy and the rights of employers. It is worth noting that employees are entitled to leave days, which may be taken in the instances proposed in the Bill. Whereas it is important to consider the well-being of employees and work-life balance, this must be approached in a cautious manner to ensure that economic growth of the country is not affected.

Consequently, the Committee recommends that the Bill does not proceed to the next stage in the legislative process.

CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Introduction

1. The Public Holidays (Amendment) Bill, (Senate Bills No. 31 of 2023) sponsored by Sen. Karungo Thang'wa MP was published vide Kenya Gazette Supplement No. 116 and was introduced in the Senate by way of First Reading on Tuesday, 17th October, 2023 and was committed to the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations for consideration. A copy of the Bill referred to the Senate is attached to this Report as *Appendix 2*.

1.2 Objects of the Bill

2. The Bill seeks to provide for the extension of public holidays to either the preceeding day, where the holiday falls on a Tuesday, or the succeeding day, where the holiday falls on a Thursday. Public holidays are designed to provide workers with time off from their jobs to rest and recharge, spend time with family and friends, and celebrate important events or traditions, and are often associated with travel and tourism. Extending public holidays can help ensure that workers have enough time to fully enjoy their time off and take care of their physical and mental health. Public holidays also seek to support economic growth, as they are often associated with travel and tourism, and extending public holidays may encourage Kenyans to take longer trips or visit destinations farther away from their homes.

1.3 Consequences of the Bill

3. The Bill, if enacted, will promote the hospitality and tourism industries.

1.5 Overview of the Bill

- 4. The Bill introduces a new section 3A to the Public Holidays Act immediately after section 3-
 - "3A. Where in any year, a public holiday under Part 1 of the scheduled
 - a) falls on a Tuesday, then the preceeding day, not being a public holiday, shall also be a public holiday; or
 - b) falls on a Thursday, the succeeding day, not being a public holiday, shall also be a public holiday."

CHAPTER TWO: PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON THE BILL

2.1 Introduction

- 5. The Committee, pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution and standing order 145(5) of the Senate Standing Orders, proceeded to undertake public participation on the Bill. In this regard, the Committee published an advertisement in the Daily Nation and Standard newspapers on Friday, 20th October, 2023 inviting members of the public to submit written memora ida on the Bill. A copy of the advertisement is attached as *Appendix 3*.
- 6. Additionally, the Committee sent invitations to key stakeholders inviting them to submit their comments on the Bill.
- 7. In response to the advertisement and invitations, the Committee received one (1) written submission from the Council of County Governors. A copy of the said submission is attached as *Appendix 3*.

2.2 Overview of Stakeholder Submissions on the Bill

Council of County Governors

- 8. The Council of County Governors in their submissions expressed their opposition to the Bill and submitted as follows
 - a) whereas the Council recognized the progressive nature of the Fill, it was important to critically examine the potential adverse effects and unintended consequences that such legislation could have on the country, the economy and the rights of employers. The proposal had the potential to eopardize economic stability at both the national and county levels of government;
 - b) while it was important to consider the well-being and work-life balance of Kenyan employees, the proposed extension of public holidays should be approached with caution. Striking a balance between the rights of employees and the need for economic growth is essential to ensure that any egislation in this regard does not hurt the country's economy and the livelih ods of its citizens;
 - c) Kenyan employees are already entitled to leave days in accordance with the Employment Act. As such, there is need to strike a balance between the rights of employees and the needs of employers to ensure business continuity and productivity.

CHAPTER THREE: COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 Committee Observations

- 9. Having considered the Bill and the submission received, the Committee made the following observations
 - a) some businesses have specific output targets and therefore, reducing the business working days as a result of the extension of public holidays may mean that employers would be compelled to meet the cost of salary payments for the days not worked for or incur hefty overtime compensation as a result of employees working on a public holiday;
 - b) further, the majority of employees in Kenya are casual laborers who rely on daily wages to meet their daily needs. A reduction in their business working days as a result of the extension of public holidays on weekdays may therefore hinder their ability to meet the basic needs for themselves and their families;
 - public holidays also disrupt businesses by reducing working days and consequently reducing business output. For example, the public transport, manufacturing, and industrial sectors may register low proceeds during the holidays; and
 - d) the Bill has the potential to cause adverse effects on the country, its economy and the rights of employers. It is worth noting that employees are entitled to leave days, which may be taken in the instances proposed in the Bill. Whereas it is important to consider the well-being of employees and work-life balance, this must be approached in a cautious manner to ensure that economic growth of the country is not affected.

3.2 Committee Recommendations

10. Having considered the Public Holidays, (Amendment) Bill 2023 and the submissions received thereon, the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations therefore recommends that the Bill does not proceed to the next stage of the legislative process.

to advise the public that there are people out there conning mem-bers of the public to buy land us-ing share certificates. Share certif-icates are not legal documents to confirm ownership," Ms Wahome

The CS, who was accompanied by the ministry's principal sec-retary Nixon Korir, asked Kenyans to carry out due diligence by checking the status of the parcels they want to purchase from the Lands ministry, where they will be given maps from the survey department. In relation to Mavoko land

The closest the family got in honouring their patriarch was with National Musuem of Kenya, which was at some point willing to assist but on condition that Karumba's descendants forked out Sh14 million as con-sultancy and administrative fees.

In return, NMK was to provide expertise and conduct research and curate the exhibition, procure con-tractors for showcases and mounts, interactive, lights, audio-visuals, artworks, printing of texts and graphics for the exhibition and pay for them

Since the family does not have the money, it will have to contend with Karumba's name being con-fined to a dusty town, Gwakung'u, near Ndaragwa, owing to the land he never had an opportunity to farm as they hope that one day, the government will deem it fit to honour all genuine heroes.

Former British armoury and holding cell in ruins

Nestled within a eucalyptus tree plantation in Ndundu-ini village, Kirinyaga County lies remnants of a tworoom house that once stood as a silent witness to the loud struggle for independence.

The structure, now in ruins, carries legacy that echoes Kenyans' resilience and determination. Built during the dark era of colonialism, one room served as an armoury, clandestinely storing weapons and supplies used by colonialists and home guards

during the struggle for independence.

The other room, however, held a much sinister purpose - it served as a makeshift prison where those who dared challenge colonial oppression were confined and subjected to harsh conditions.

To Josiah Ndongo, a survivor of the oppressive regime, the house of exile Ithamirio ria Ndundu-ini' remains his worst nightmare.

In his twilight years, he bravely recounts the shocking experiences he endured during his incarceration in the two-room prison house

He suffered physical and psychological hardships. He recalls the daily struggles for survival, constant fear of retribution, and deprivation of fundamental human rights. Yet, even within these walls of despair, his spirit persisted, fueled by a resilient



determination to see justice and liberation of the country from colonial

Built in 1954 by the British colo nial regime, this house served a dual purpose during that time. It functioned as a secure storage facility for weapons, tightly guarded by the home guards. The house also operated as a prison where individuals who resisted colonial rule were detained, often enduring harsh torture, in their quest to extract information about the whereabouts of Mau Mau fighters and their plans," he

He faced brutal beatings that left him with a broken limb, a painful reminder of the inhumanity. "I and other inmates refused to surrender the information they sought from us. The home guards fueled by anger and frustration, unleashed a torrent of violence upon us. Each blow inflicted pain, but we remained resolute. It was during that horrific incident that my limb was forcefully shattered," he

He said the weapons stored in the house were those collected from Mau Mau fighters captured by the colonialists. These weapons were part of those utilised by the home guards to suppress any attempts at escape from the colonial villages

"When a Mau Mau soldier was arrested by either the colonialists or home guards, any weapon, be it a gun, machete, or rungu, was brought to this house to prevent the freedom fighters from accessing them again,"

Tod y, he urges the government to iber the sacrifices made by Mau Fau veterans and honour the heroe who fought against colonial

oppre sion.
"W are hopeful that President Willian Ruto will expedite the compensa ion process for the immense suffer ag and torture inflicted upon us du ing the colonial period. We urge t egovernment to prioritise this matte and provide restitution for the pain and trauma we endured," he

Mu nira Ruraga, an ex-freedom fighte in Kirinyaga, said his unwa-verini determination and quick thinki ghelped him narrowly escape clutch s of imprisonment after being appre ended by home guards.

I was a dedicated fighter against coloni I rule and became a target for the oppressive forces. As the night grew larker, I found myself sur-round d. With every passing second, the ri k of being imprisoned grew strong or. I made a daring move, running t rough the dense vegetation surrounding the village, I escaped,"

He : ided that he couldn't allow himse to be arrested, having heard stories of the atrocities that awaited those captivity.
