



REPORT 1: CORRUPTION AND ABUSE OF OFFICE ON THE PART OF THE COMMISIONER OF POLICE, MAJ. GEN. HUSSEIN ALI

It was in the course of my duty as part of the investigating commission at the Kilindini Harbour and its environs in Mombasa that I intercepted 18 (eighteen) containers of sugar that had been 'stolen' from the Port of Mombasa. I concluded that they were stolen because fictitious 'Customs Entry documents' had been used to secure their release from the Port of Mombasa into the local market, yet they were on their 'valid paper' goods on transit to the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Upon the receipt of some 'information', I intercepted these goods at a warehouse/ godown situated in Ganjoni Estate within Mombasa, and further investigations established that the containers, their contents (which happened to be sugar) and the warehouse/ godown all belonged to the prominent Mombasa politician, Mr. Taib Ali Taib, and his brother, Mr. Mohammed Taib, as the beneficial owners.

The sequence of investigations also revealed that three KRA officials manning gate number 1 of the Port of Mombasa were involved in the 'clearance and movement' of these containers, and I therefore placed them under arrest on the 5th of January 2006, them being:

- Mr. Albert Wamimitire;
- 2. Mr. Patrick Mugoro; and
- 3. Mr. Sara Kibera.

The investigation commission used to have routine morning ad evening 'call-ups', during which we would receive instructions and or get feed-back from the Commissioner of Police on the conduct of these investigations as he personally supervised the same, and no major decisions in the handling and dealing with the impounded sugar and the arrested suspects was to be made without his direct authority and approval.

It should also be noted that being a 'Gazetted Officer', even a Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP), I could only be moved, transferred, deployed or recalled from any posting or station by the Commissioner of Police alone, and not even his immediate deputizing officer.

It is what transpired hereafter that made me believe that the Commissioner of Police, Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali, was involved in this high-level corruption.

The Involvement of Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali

Come the evening same day of my arresting of the 3 KRA officers, 5th January, 2006, Mr. Kavila (ACP) in his routine evening 'call-up' to the investigating commission spoke to the Commissioner of Police via 'Radio Telephone' in our presence, and in the course of their conversation I heard him (Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali) state that he had discussed the impounding of the 'transit sugar' and the arrest of the 3 KRA officials with the Commissioner-General of KRA, Mr. Michael Waweru, and Mr. Waweru had promised to send his deputy and other senior

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KRA officers to Mombasa to assess duty due to the Government on account of this impounded sugar, which duty and levies was to be paid first, before any criminal charges could be instituted. The Commissioner of Police, Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali, then instructed Mr. Kavila (ACP) to release the three arrested KRA officers on Police Bonds until the following day, when they would report to the Provincial Headquarters of the CID situated in Mombasa. I am aware and also know for a fact that that the following took place thereafter:

- 1. The 3 KRA officers released on Police Bond never reported to the Provincial Headquarters of the CID, on the 6th January 2006, and have never been charged with any offence since (they were let to go);
- 2. No single KRA official came to assess any duties and levies payable to the Government on the impounded sugar as supposedly promised by the Commissioner General of KRA, and no duties or levies were ever paid;
- 3. Under mysterious circumstances, the Police Officers attached to the Central Police Station in Mombasa guarding the impounded sugar were withdrawn without my knowledge as the investigating officer thereof:
- 4. Upon receiving 'an information' I personally rushed to the warehouse/ godown wherein was the sugar I had impounded and saw it being sold off by agents to the owners and being loaded into trucks and carried away, in total disregard of the investigations I was carrying on therewith:
- 5. When I confronted Mr. Kavila (ACP) on why and how all the above could be done under his authority without him having the courtesy of informing me as the investigating officer, he replied that he was acting on the express authority of the Commissioner of Police, Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali;
- 6. That in a bid to preserve some evidence of what was going on, I instructed the 'Scenes of Crime Police Officers' to photograph the impounded sugar being loaded away, which they did (and which photos are part of the documents that I submitted to KACC with the earlier report); that upon Mr. Kavila (ACP) knowing of this, he informed the Commissioner of police about it, and I had the impression that they felt that I was 'investigating them';
- 7. That Mr. Kavial (ACP) put me on notice (presumably under the instructions of the Commissioner of Police) that all my movements in Mombasa were being monitored by 'them';
- 8. I was withdrawn from the investigating commission, my firearm withdrawn by the Director of CID, Mr. John Kamau, and allowances due to me on account of my involvement in the investigating commission withheld;

I thereafter proceeded to complete my outstanding leave period, which ran till the 11th of April 2006, when I reported back on duty at my station in Kisumu, only to be given a letter of transfer by the Provincial Police Officer, Nyanza Province, Mr. Bakari Jambene, and was denied access into my office thereafter.



On that very 11th of April 2006, I appealed to the Commissioner of Police against the transfer on grounds that I did not deserve or warrant it as per his (the Commissioner's) press briefing of the 6th of April 2006, when while addressing all provincial heads and formation commanders, the Commissioner of Police said that as part of his reform process, he had decided to transfer all senior officers who had over-stayed, being for a period of more than 3 years, at one station, in order to improve productivity. I was only 4 months into my posting in Kisumu, and obviously I did not qualify for or warrant such a transfer.

I have not received any reply to my appeal from the Commissioner of Police till date – not that I expected it, as I already knew that it was a well calculated move to get mew out of the way (away from more developed towns, where my knowledge of his corrupt dealings could easily be put to use – as I already had done in reporting to KACC).

My predicament on this abuse of office by Maj.-Gen. Hussein Ali

I have not received any official communication from the Police Commissioner regarding my appeal against my transfer to Lokitang, and I decided not to take up the transfer until this issue is resolved. I have thus been dealt with as follows:

1. I have neither been officially interdicted nor sacked as required by law, yet my salary was stopped effective July 2006;

2. I am still having the Kenya Police uniforms that were assigned to me together with my Certificate of Appointment, yet it is not clear to me whether I am still a Police Officer or not.

My Plea to the Government:

I am asking the Government to take away the Kenya Police uniforms from me until this matter is resolved, so that I may officially know of my status with the Police Force.

REPORT 2: NON-ACTION BY KENYA ANTI-CORRUPTION COMMISSION'S (KACC) SENIOR OFFICERS, DR. MUTONY AND MR. WAIGURU ON MY REPORT MADE TO THEM ON THE 13TH OF JANUARY 2006

On the 13th of January 2006, I came to the KACC offices at Intergrity Centre with a view of seeing you in person (Dr. Aaron Ringera) as the Director and reporting this ordeal. However, given that you were not in the office, I was attended to by your Personal Assistant, Mr. Kenneth Mwige (Senior Counsel), who listened to me for two hours and upon realizing the sensitivity of this matter, spoke to Dr. Mutony (one of your deputies) and personally took me to his office, so that he may handle me in your absence.



Dr. Mutony summoned Mr. Waiguru (also of KACC), and in the presence of Mr. Mwige too, hew requested me to narrate my report/complaint, which I did. Dr. Mutony they advised me to put my report in writing and attach thereto all the relevant documentary evidence, and hand over the same to Mr. Waiguru, which I did on the 18th of January 2006. Mr. Waiguru promised to revert to me within 1 (one) week after first of all sending KACC analysis officers to Mombasa to confirm and verify my reports.

Ever since that 18th of January 2006, neither Mr. Waiguru nor any other officer of the KACC has ever communicated or made contact with me.

I have traveled on eight different occasions from both Kisumu and Isiolo to KACC's offices at Integrity Centre in Nairobi to follow-up on my report, but I have never been able to see either Dr. Mutony or Mr. Waiguru, as I am always being told that they are busy or that they are not in, and at times that I call later or I leave my contacts and they will call me back – which they have never done.

The last visit I made was on Monday the 7th of August 2006, when I was attended to be Ms Grace Namachage of the Reports Department, who advised me to take this issue up with your office in the event that I am not satisfied with the manner in which any officer of KACC has handled my matter – and I have now done so. I am hoping to hear from your office soon, even as I ask the following questions:

- 1. How be it that I have never been asked by KACC to record any statements 7 months after I made my report on the 18th January 2006?
- 2. How come not a single officer of KACC has gotten back to me 'as promised' on the fate of the report that I made and documents I gave?

I have personally made and signed this report/ complaint from facts well within my knowledge except as otherwise stated. I have taken the liberty of copying the same to other relevant officers of Government, considering the circumstances surrounding it.

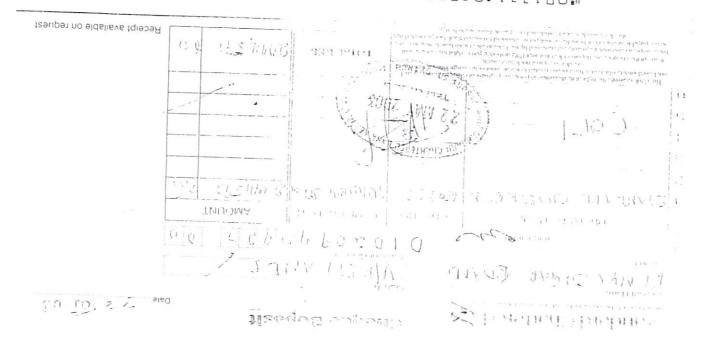
