

#### CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

The Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill, 2018 (National Assembly Bills No. 5), on the change of election date, underwent First Reading on 14<sup>th</sup> March 2018. Thereafter, the Bill was committed to the Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs to review and report to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 216(5)(c).

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3) of the National Assembly Standing Orders, the Committee through local daily newspapers of 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> March, 2018 published an advertisement inviting the public to submit memoranda on the Bill and received memoranda. The Committee pursuant to local daily newspapers of 9<sup>th</sup> May, 2018 conducted public hearings on the Bill in selected counties.

The public hearings took place in Nairobi, Machakos, Mombasa, Kisumu, Kakamega, Uasin Gishu, Nakuru, Nyeri, Isiolo, Wajir and Turkana during which members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations made oral presentations and/or submitted memoranda. The Committee took into account all written memoranda and oral submissions received while considering the Bill.

The report of the Committee on the Bill is in two Volumes, Volume I is the main report on the consideration of the Bill and contains analysis of the Bill, public participation process, observations and recommendation among others. Volume II contains memoranda on the Bill as submitted by the public as well as list of members of the public who attended public hearings.

May I take this opportunity to commend the following for their efforts which made consideration of the Bill and reporting to the House successful-

- (i) Committee Members for their devotion and commitment to duty;

#### 1. PREFACE

#### 1.1. Mandate of the Committee

- 1. The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs derives its mandate from Standing Order No. 216(5) which provides for the functions of Departmental Committees as follows-
  - (a) investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
  - (b) study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of their implementation;
  - (c) study and review all legislation referred to it;
  - (d) study, assess and analyse the relative success of the ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
  - (e) investigate and enquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
  - (f) vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments)

  - (h) make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
  - *(i) consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and*
  - (j) examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.

# 2. ANALYSIS OF THE BILL

#### 2.1 Memorandum of objects and reasons of the Bill

# <u>The Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill 2018 (National Assembly Bill</u> No. 5)

- 5. Prior to the promulgation of the Constitution in 2010, elections were traditionally held in December. Thereafter, the Constitution was enacted in 2010 with Articles 101(1) (election of members of the National Assembly), Article 136 (2) (election of the President), Article 177(1) (election of Members of County Assemblies) and Article 180(1) (election of Governors) stipulating the date of the general election of the aforementioned representatives as the second Tuesday of August of every fifth year after the previous general election.
- 6. An attempt to change the election date to December was made through a Bill sponsored by Hon. David Ochieng then Member of Parliament for Ugenya in the Eleventh Parliament. Though the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs recommended to the House to pass the Bill as provided for by the Member, the House failed to realize the two-thirds majority support required to pass it under Article 256(1) (d) of the Constitution of Kenya.
- 7. The principal objective of the Bill is to amend Articles 101 (1), 136 (2) (a), 177 (1) (a) and 180 (1) of the Constitution by changing the existing date of general elections for Members of Parliament, the President, Members of County Assemblies and the county governors and deputy county governors from second Tuesday of August in every fifth year to third Monday in December in every fifth year.
- 8. The Bill seeks to introduce a new date for conducting a general election that would be more favourable to Kenya's circumstances.
- 9. The amendment is to ensure that the date of elections reflects the unique circumstances and tradition of Kenya. The current date for the general elections unduly disrupts the education calendar and most importantly the conduct of national examinations in case of either a fresh election or a "run-off" or an invalidation of a Presidential election.
- 10. The amendment further seeks to restore the tourism high season and the aspirations of a section of Kenyans who are not able to get time out of their busy schedules to take part in the general elections at their places of preference. The amendment will also clarify and put to rest all doubts regarding the exact date of the next general elections and the term of the current Parliament.
- 11. The Bill concerns county governments within the meaning of Article 110 of the Constitution. The enactment of this Bill will occasion additional expenditure of public funds.

12. The Bill was read a first time on 14<sup>th</sup> March, 2018 and immediately committed to the Committee for review and report to the House in line with the provisions of Standing Order 216(5)(c) of the National Assembly Standing Orders. While reviewing the Bill, the Committee was required by Article 118 (1) (a) and (b) as well as Standing Order 127(3) to facilitate public participation in the review of the Bill.

Article 118(1)(a) and (b) of the Constitution provides as follows-

"118(1) Parliament shall-

- (a) conduct its business in an open manner, and its sittings and those of committees shall be open to the public; and
- (b) facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees''

Standing Order 127(3) provides as follows-

"The Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation on the Bill through appropriate mechanisms including-

- (a) inviting submission of memoranda;
- (b) holding public hearings;
- (c) consulting relevant stakeholders in a sector; and
- (d) consulting experts on technical subjects''
- 13. The Clerk of the National Assembly accordingly put up advertisements in the local dailies on 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> March 2018 (see annex 3) calling for submission of memoranda and received memoranda. The Committee pursuant to local daily newspapers of 9<sup>th</sup> May, 2018 (see annex 4) conducted public hearings on the Bill in selected counties countrywide. The public hearings took place in Nairobi, Machakos, Mombasa, Kisumu, Kakamega, Uasin Gishu, Nakuru, Nyeri, Isiolo, Wajir and Turkana during which members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations made oral presentations and/or submitted. The Committee took into account all public views while considering the Bill.

# 2.2. Clauses in the Bill

# 2.2.1 Proposed amendment to Article 101 of the Constitution

Clause 2 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 101 of the Constitution of Kenya by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" appearing in clause (1) and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# 2.2.2 Proposed amendment to Article 136 of the Constitution

Clause 3 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 136 of the Constitution of Kenya in clause (2) by deleting the word "second Tuesday in August" appearing in paragraph (a) and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# 2.2.3 Proposed amendment to Article 177 of the Constitution

Clause 4 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 177 of the Constitution of Kenya in clause (1) by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" appearing in paragraph (a) and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# 2.2.4 Proposed amendment to Article 180 of the Constitution

Clause 5 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 180 of the Constitution in clause (1) by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# **3** PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN THE REVIEW OF THE BILL

## 3.1 Legislative provisions on public participation

14. Article 118 (1) (b) of the Constitution of Kenya provides as follows-

"Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees"

15. Standing Order 127(3) provides as follows-

"The Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and shall take into account the views and recommendations of the public when the Committee makes its recommendations to the House"

# 3.2 Methodology used by the Committee in public participation

- 16. In line with the provisions of Article 118(1)(b) of Constitution and Standing Order 127(3), the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs, in the local daily newspapers of 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> March, 2018 invited the public to submit written memoranda on the Bill and received memoranda. Further and pursuant to an advertisement in the local daily newspapers of 9<sup>th</sup> May, 2018, the Committee conducted public hearings on the Bill in selected counties.
- 17. In addition to receiving memoranda from the public and in order to facilitate comprehensive public participation, the Committee undertook public hearings in eleven strategically located counties to obtain views from different regions of the Country as follows-
  - (i) Nairobi County to seek views from the capital city and its environs;
  - (ii) Machakos County to seek views from the lower Eastern region and environs;
  - (iii) Mombasa County to seek views from the Coastal region;
  - (iv) Kisumu County to seek views from the Nyanza region;

(v) Kakamega County to seek views from the Western region;

- (vi) Turkana County to seek views from the North Rift valley region;
- (vii) Uasin Gishu County to seek views from the Central Rift Valley region;
- (viii) Nakuru County to seek views from the central Rift Valley region;
- (ix) Nyeri County to seek views from the Central Kenya region;
- (x) Isiolo County to seek views from the Upper Eastern region; and
- (xi) Wajir County to seek views from the North Eastern Region.
- 18. In order to conveniently cover as many counties as possible in public participation taking into account, the Committees' tight work schedule, timelines and logistical challenges, the Committee constituted five (5) sub-committees which conducted hearings concurrently in various counties.

# a) Nairobi, Machakos and Mombasa Counties

24. The public hearings were held at Old Town Hall (Nakuru County), IFAD Hall (Nyeri County) and Catholic Church Hall (Isiolo County) on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> May 2018 respectively.

#### 3.3 Sources of views

- 29. Several members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations submitted their views to the Committee by way of written and oral submissions.
- 30. Indeed, the turnout at the public hearings was overwhelming as during the four (4) days when the Committee visited the various counties, one thousand eight hundred and forty-five (1845) persons and fifty-nine (59) institutions and or groups turned up.

- 32. A comprehensive list of members of the public who attended the public hearings in the various counties is in Volume II of the report.
- 33. The written submissions received are in Volume II of the report. Additionally, a matrix noting the general comments in support of or against the amendment is attached to this Volume of the report as annexure 6. The matrix also documents various proposed amendments to the Bills by members of the public and institutions.
- 34. As illustrated in the matrix (Volume II), in analysing the views received from the public, the Committee members categorised views raised by the public as follows:
  - (i) Views in support of the amendments;
  - (ii) Views opposed to the amendments;
  - (iii) Proposed amendments to the Bill; and
  - (iv) General views from the public not relating to the amendments.

# 3.4 Views from the public

35. A total of one hundred and forty-seven (147) persons or institutions/ groups submitted either oral or written submissions in support of the amendments while fifty-nine (59) persons or institutions/ groups rejected the proposals in the Bill. Analysis of these submissions shows that there is an overwhelming support for change of the election date to the third Monday in December.

36. In summary, the	e Committee received	views as t	follows:

- 37. The Committee observed that a large number (about 60%) of the persons who presented their views did not give substantive reasons for their support or opposition to the amendments. However, those who supported the amendments averred as follows
  - a) The December election date would be less disruptive to the academic calendar for secondary and primary schools. Students ordinarily sit the national examinations in the third term of an academic year which normally comes after the August vacation. The public was of the view that the date of the general elections would be best suited to be scheduled in December as students had long finished their examinations. The August date had also proven inconvenient to students because most public schools are used as polling stations;
  - b) A date in December would be convenient and would increase voter turnout because most Kenyans are ordinarily on holiday or have travelled upcountry to vote;
  - c) The December date was historically sound as it had been successfully tried and tested many times before; and
  - d) The December date was ideal due to favourable weather conditions unlike August when it is rainy and farmers are engaged in agricultural activities.
- 38. The Committee observed that while some members of the public did not give reasons for objecting to the amendments, those who gave reasons cited the following-

- a) The August election date was ideal as it was in tandem with the commencement of the Government financial year which commences in July;
- b) Those who may have registered as voters in areas of their ordinary residence normally travel for holidays or to the rural areas and are unable to vote in their areas of residence;
- c) The proposed amendment was for selfish political reasons as it would effectively increase the term of the current Parliament;
- d) In the past, some of the elections held in December had resulted in postelection violence;
- e) The academic calendar could be modified if need be to accommodate an August general election date.
- f) The month in which general elections are held did not matter as long as the elections were free and fair.

# 4 <u>CONSIDERATION OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS BY THE</u> COMMITTEE

# 4.1.1 Proposed amendment to Article 101 of the Constitution

Clause 2 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 101 of the Constitution of Kenya by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" appearing in clause (1) and substituting therefor the word "third Monday in December".

# Observation

The Committee observed that the effect of the amendment if passed would be a change of election date for Members of Parliament to the third Monday of December of every fifth year after previous general elections.

# 4.1.2 Proposed amendment to Article 136 of the Constitution

Clause 3 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 136 of the Constitution of Kenya in clause (2) by deleting the word "second Tuesday in August" appearing in paragraph (a) and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# Observation

The Committee observed that the effect of the amendment if passed would be a change of the election date for Members of County Assemblies to the third Monday of December of every fifth year after the previous general elections.

# 4.1.3 Proposed amendment to Article 177 of the Constitution

Clause 4 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 177 of the Constitution of Kenya in clause (1) by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" appearing in paragraph (a) and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

# Observation

The Committee observed that the effect of the amendment if passed would be a change of the election date for the President to the third Monday of December of every fifth year after the previous general elections.

# 4.1.4 Proposed amendment to Article 180 of the Constitution

Clause 5 of the Bill seeks to amend Article 180 of the Constitution is amended in clause (1) by deleting the words "second Tuesday in August" and substituting therefor the words "third Monday in December".

#### Observation

The Committee observed that the effect of the amendment if passed would be a change of the election date for County Governors and Deputy Governors to the third Monday of December of every fifth year after the previous general elections.

# 4.2 Public submissions and proposed amendments

- (a) Mr. Douglas Kwalelo of Kakamega proposed that general elections should be staggered to different dates for the respective elective positions. He submitted that having elections of Presidential, parliamentary and other elective positions on the same day was cumbersome and that it may be one of the factors fuelling tension in the country.
- (b) Mr. Yabbesh Onyancha proposed that the electioneering period should be shortened to one week and that the voting day should be increased to six days with each day for the elections for each seat.

# 5 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

# 5.1 Committee Observations

The Committee observed as follows-

(a) The Hon. Speaker in his communication of 20<sup>th</sup> August 2015 guided that no amendments could be proposed to a Bill seeking to amend the Constitution unless there was something extraordinary in the Bill that would require application of extraordinary measures;

- (b) In view of the Hon Speaker's ruling of 20<sup>th</sup> August, 2015, the Committee did not adopt further amendments based on the public views;
- (c) The members of the public who appeared before the Committee to present their views overwhelmingly supported change of election date to December;
- (d) The Committee considered the various reports prepared during the Constitution of Kenya review process, including the report by the Committee of Experts on constitutional reforms, the report of the Commission for Constitution Reform of Kenya, the final report of the Constitution of Kenya Review Commission and noted that the reports did not elaborate on the rationale for the change of the date of general elections from December to August.

# 6. **<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**

The Committee recommends that the proposed amendments in the Bill be agreed to by the House without amendments.

## 6.0. **DISSENTING OPINION**

Hon. Peter Opondo Kaluma M.P. registered a dissenting opinion to the report on the following grounds-

- (a) The date of the general elections was changed from December to August following extensive public participation and consultation leading up to the promulgation of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010;
- (b) The memorandum of objects and reasons in the Bill evinces no good reasons to revert the date of general elections to December;
- (c) The amendments have the effect of altering the term of office of the President and as such, pursuant to Article 255, the Bill therefore ought to be first subjected to a popular referendum prior to adoption by the House;
- (d) People should vote for leaders in areas they reside full time as opposed to voting for leaders in areas where they are on holiday in December;
- (e) The Presidential election process including petition should be concluded in a year general elections are held to avoid a situation where two years are affected by elections.





In conclusion, Standing Order 154 requires the National Assembly to consider the President's reservations within 21 days. In this regard, the National Employment Authority Bill, 2015 stands committed to the Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare, while the Small Claims Court Bill, 2015 is committed to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for further consideration. The Committees should table their reports by February 22, 2016. In considering the Memoranda, regard will be given to the guidance given by the Speaker in a Communication delivered on July 28, 2015 concerning consideration of Presidential Memorandum and amendments thereto, particularly my guidance, that amendments by a Committee or an individual Member that have the effect of fully accommodating the Presidential reservations will not attract two thirds requirement for passage.
