COMMITTEE MANDATE

The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs is established under the National Assembly Standing Orders No. 216 (1). The functions and mandate of the Committee are also contained under the National Assembly Standing Orders, No. 216(5) as:-

1. Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments;
2. Study the program and policy objectives of the Ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;
3. Study and review all legislation referred to it;
4. Study, access and analyze the relative success of the Ministries and Departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with its stated objectives;
5. Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
6. Vet and report on all appointments where the constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204; and
7. Make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation.

- (a) Constitutional affairs;
- (b) The administration of law and Justice, including the Judiciary, public prosecutions, elections, ethics, integrity and anti-corruption; and

The Committee, having considered the Contempt of Court Bill, 2016, will be proposing amendments in clauses **5, 6, 8, 13, 19, 27, 28, 30, 35** and **38** of the Bill during the Committee of the Whole stage.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Contempt of Court Bill, 2016 was read for the first time on 9th August 2016 and subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for consideration pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 127 (1), and report to the House.

2.0 CONSIDERATION OF THE CONTEMPT OF COURT BILL, 2016

The Committee considered the Contempt of Court Bill, 2016 in its sitting held on Thursday, 17th November, 2016. Pursuant to Standing Order 127(3), the Committee invited the public through the Daily Nation and Standard newspapers of 17th August, 2016 to make representations on the Bill. The Committee did not receive any memoranda.

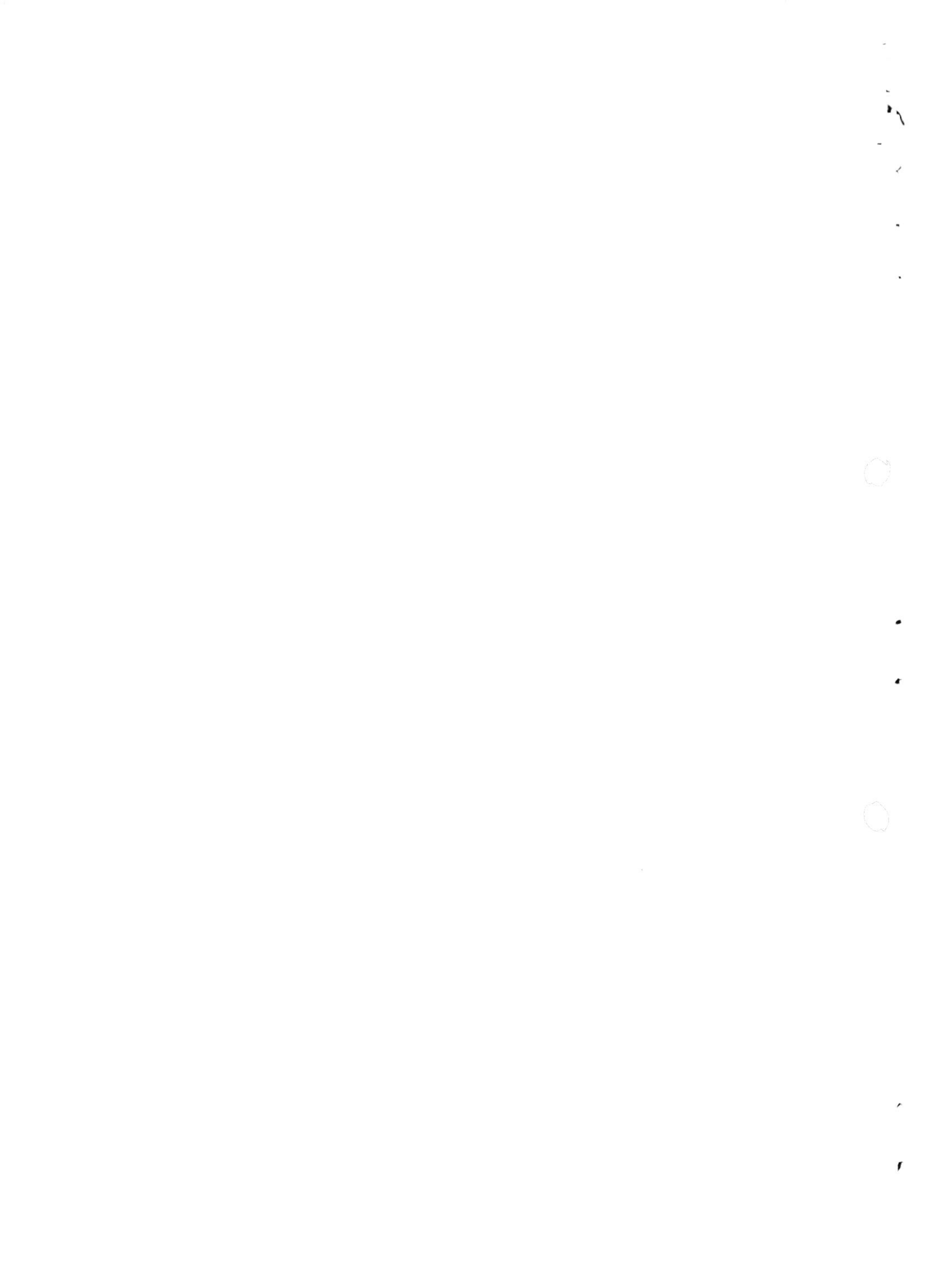
The Committee noted that the Bill was generally well drafted and that it broadly covered the issue of contempt of Court. The Committee proposed amendments with the aim of fine-tuning the Bill to the best possible outcome. Having considered all the clauses, the Committee therefore proposed the following amendments:

CLAUSE 5

THAT clause 5 of the Bill be amended—

- (a) in paragraph (a) by deleting the word “and”; and
- (b) by deleting sub clause (2).

Rationale: The word “and” was repetitive and therefore unnecessary.



CLAUSE 6

THAT clause 6 of the Bill be amended by deleting the words “in the course of the hearing of a proceeding” appearing in paragraph (c).

Rationale: Because the clause as it was, limits subordinate courts.

CLAUSE 8

THAT clause 8 of the Bill be amended by inserting the words “with the leave of the court” immediately after the words "the Director of Public Prosecutions".

Rationale: To make it possible for a third party to apply to institute a proceeding for contempt of Court.

CLAUSE 13

THAT clause 13 of the Bill be amended by—

- (a) in sub clause (1) deleting the words “reasonable grounds” and substituting therefor the word “reason”; and
- (b) in sub clause (3) deleting the words “reasonable grounds” and substituting therefor the word “reason.”

Rationale: The term “reasonable grounds” was in the opinion of the Committee too limiting, hence the amendment.

CLAUSE 19

THAT clause 19 of the Bill be amended in sub clause (2) by—

- (a) deleting the words “at the discretion of”; and
- (b) inserting the word “reasonable” immediately after the words “it may be subject to”.



Rationale: The amendment was aimed at ensuring that the Court does not unreasonably withhold leave to use recording devices.

CLAUSE 27

THAT clause 27 of the Bill be amended in paragraph (j) —

- (a) by deleting the word “wrongfully” and substituting therefor with the word “forcibly”; and
- (b) by deleting the expression “a” and substituting therefor with the expression “and.”

Rationale: To clarify the offence.

CLAUSE 28

THAT clause 28 of the Bill be amended in sub paragraph (1) by inserting the expression “to” immediately after the words “is liable”.

Rationale: To correct the typographical mistake.

CLAUSE 30

THAT clause 30 of the Bill be amended by deleting the word “ninety” wherever it appears and substituting therefor with the word “thirty.”

Rationale: The proposed time of ninety days was too long. Thirty days was more appropriate.

CLAUSE 35

THAT clause 35 of the Bill be amended by deleting the words “be in addition to and not in derogation of the provision of” and substituting therefor the word “supersede.”

Rationale: This was with the aim of making the Act the primary law on all matters contempt.

CLAUSE 38

THAT the Bill be amended by deleting clause 38 by inserting the following new clauses—

Repeal of section 36 of No. 27 of 2015.	38A. The High Court (Organization and Administration) Act is amended by deleting section 36.
Repeal of section 35 of No. 28 of 2015.	38B. The Court of Appeal (Organization and Administration) Act is amended by deleting section 35.

Rationale: The deleted provisions will become redundant upon the passage and enactment of the Contempt of Court Bill, 2016.

3.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

Having considered the Contempt of Court Bill, 2016, the Committee will be proposing amendments in clauses **5, 6, 8, 13, 19, 27, 28, 30, 35** and **38** of the Bill during the Committee of the Whole stage.

Performance > Focus on SMEs grows loan book

Family Bank profit down 40 per cent

Half year earnings hit by higher operating costs that reached Sh5.81 billion

Mid-tier lender Family Bank's net profit for the six months to June has dropped 39.8 per cent to Sh71.5 million as higher operating expenses dampened the positive earnings from interest income.

The lender closed the period with operating expenses of Sh5.81 billion, an increase from last year's Sh2.9 billion, as staff costs increased 10 per cent to Sh1.404 billion.

The firm has also booked a loan loss provision expense of Sh299.3 million, a significant increase from the Sh36.97 million registered during a similar period last year.

Family Bank's total interest income during the period increased 33.7 per cent to Sh6.0 billion, on the back of income from loans and advances which grew by Sh1.7 billion to close the half-year at Sh5.36 billion.

Dipped marginally

Non-interest income dipped marginally to Sh1.1 billion as fees and commissions from loans and advances as well as foreign exchange trading income slowed down.

The company's total assets as at June was Sh80.2 billion as

its focus on small and medium enterprise lending and personal loans resulted in a significant jump in its loan book by 24.7 per cent to Sh57.7 billion.

The bank in December received a Sh1 billion loan from Netherlands-based Okicredit for onward lending to small and medium-sized businesses, a pointer that its loan book was set to grow further this year.

Family Bank's half-year total liabilities stood at Sh68.05 billion (representing a seven per cent year-on-year increase) as borrowed funds increased by Sh8.6 billion to Sh11.13 billion.

The lender's ongoing branch expansion programme was one of the factors that resulted in a jump in property value by Sh1.35 billion to Sh3.8 billion.

Insurer obeys the law with name change

Pan Africa Insurance Holdings has re-branded to Sanlam Kenya Plc to comply with the new Companies Act and identify with its South Africa-based parent Sanlam Group.

The Nairobi Securities Exchange-listed insurer says it has introduced the acronym "Plc" denoting public limited company to obey the new law.

The company says it also chose to adopt the Sanlam name to reflect its decade-old relationship with the parent company. Sanlam has acquired a cumulative 56.3 per cent stake Pan African, which recently added general insurance to its mainstay life insurance products.

Raise stake
The multinational intends to raise its controlling stake in the subsidiary to 60 per cent. Sanlam Kenya becomes the latest subsidiary to adopt the parent company's name following those in Tanzania, Mozambique and Uganda.

The rebrand is expected to benefit the subsidiaries by closely associating the units with the parent, which is one of the largest financial services firms in Africa.

Sanlam Kenya says the name change will not affect its current operations or legal obligations. The company will today inform the public of the details of the name change, having secured approvals from shareholders and the regulators.

SUBMISSION OF MEMORANDA

Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution provides that "Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees." Standing Order 127(3) states that "the Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and shall take into account views and recommendations of the public when the Committee makes its report to the House."

The Contempt of Court Bill, 2016 seeks to define contempt of Court and to limit the power of courts in punishing for contempt of court.
