

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This report contains the proceedings of the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs during the approval hearings of Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki, nominee for appointment as the Principal Secretary, State Department for Correctional Services as forwarded by H.E. the President and communicated to the House by the Speaker on Thursday, 10th November 2022.

Pursuant to Article 155(3)(b) of the Constitution, Section 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (PAPAA) and Standing Order 45(1), H.E. the President notified the National Assembly of the nomination of Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki as Principal Secretaryy to the State Department of Correctional Services vide a letter dated 8th November 2022. The Rt. Hon Speaker vide a communication made on Thursday, 10th November 2022 conveyed to the House the Message from H.E. the President and subsequently referred the name of the nominee, her curriculumum vitae, and the report of the Public Service Commission on her recruitment to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal affairs for approval hearings. While referring the matter to the Committee, the Speaker directed that the Committees undertake the vetting exercise within twenty-eight (28) days pursuant to Section 8 of the Public Appointments Parliamentary Approval Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Rt. Hon. Speaker further directed the Clerk of the National Assembly to notify the nominee and the general public by placing adverts in two newspapers of nationwide circulation and the Parliamentary Website of the time and place of holding the approval hearings.

In compliance with Article 118 (b) of the Constitution and section 6 (4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Saturday, 12th November 2022 informing the public of the nomination, date, time and place of the approval hearing. He also invited the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath *(affidavit)* on the suitability of the nominee in conformity with section 6 (9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The memoranda were to be received on or before Saturday, 19th November 2022 at 5.00 p.m. (East African Time). At the close of the submission deadline, the Committee had not received any memorandum against the nominee's suitability.

The Clerk of the National Assembly also wrote to the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) seeking references and background checks relating to the suitability of the nominee.

The nominee appeared before the Committee on Wednesday, 30th November 2022 for the approval hearings. The Committee examined her suitability based on the criteria set out in Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). In addition, the Committee examined her academic credentials, relevant experience, knowledge of sector issues and on leadership and integrity. The Committee paid due regard to the procedure used to arrive at the nominee's; any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question and suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominees' abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the State Department.

Committee Recommendation

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The Committee having held approval hearings of the nominee regarding their suitability, observed that due process was followed on the recruitment process as provided for under Article 155(3) (b) of the Constitution and Section 8(2) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval Act) (No. 33 of 2011). The Committee therefore recommends that the National Assembly **APPROVES** the nomination of Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Correctional Services.

Acknowledgements

The Committee registers its appreciation to the Offices of the Speaker, Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly, Office of the Director, Departmental Committees and the Committee Secretariat for the logistical support extended during the approval hearing process.

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1 PREFACE

1.1 Establishment and Mandate of the Committee

- 1. The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs is one of the twenty Departmental Committees of the National Assembly established under **Standing Order 216** whose mandates pursuant to the **Standing Order 216 (5)** are as follows:
 - *i.* To investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
 - *ii.* To study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;
 - *iii.* on a quarterly basis, monitor and report on the implementation of the national budget in respect of its mandate;
 - iv. To study and review all legislation referred to it;
 - v. To study, assess and analyse the relative success of the ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
 - vi. To investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
 - vii. To vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments);
 - viii. To examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
 - *ix.* To make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
 - x. To consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
 - xi. To examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.

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CHAPTER TWO

2 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2.1 Legal Framework

- 6. Article 155 of the Constitution provides that:
 - 155. (1) There is established the office of Principal Secretary, which is an office in the public service.
 - (2) Each State department shall be under the administration of a Principal Secretary.
 - (3) The President shall—
 - (a) nominate a person for appointment as Principal Secretary from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission; and
 - (b) with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries.
 - (4) The President may re-assign a Principal Secretary.
 - (5) A Principal Secretary may resign from office by giving notice, in writing, to the President.
- 7. In light of this, H.E. the President nominated Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki for appointment as Principal Secretary to the State Department of Correctional Services in the Ministry of Interior and Internal Affairs.
- 8. The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs has been assigned the role of conducting the approval hearing of the aforesaid nominee.
- 9. The following Articles of the Constitution and statutes/provisions will be paramount to the Committee as it executes this mandate:
 - i. The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011);
 - ii. The Public Service Act (No. 10 of 2017) on recommendation for appointment of Principal Secretaries;
 - iii. Article 10 of the Constitution on the national values and principles of governance;
 - iv. Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
 - v. Article 77 of the Constitution on restriction on activities of State Officers;
 - vi. Article 78 of the Constitution on dual citizenship;
 - vii. Article 118 of the Constitution on public participation;

- ix. The Leadership and Integrity Act (Cap. 182);
- x. The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act (No. 1A of 2015); and
- xi. The Public Officer Ethics Act (Cap. 183).

The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011)

- 10. Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), provides for issues which the relevant House of Parliament (in this case, the National Assembly) is supposed to consider in relation to any nomination. These issues include:
 - *i.* the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
 - ii. any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
 - *iii.* the suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which nomination is being made.
- 11. During the approval hearing, section 6 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) provides important points, viz:
 - i. An approval hearing shall focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and background (section 6(7), PAPAA);
 - ii. The criteria specified in the Schedule shall be used by a Committee during an approval hearing for the purposes of vetting a candidate (section 6(8), PAPAA);
 - iii. Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated (section 6(9), PAPAA); and
 - iv. A candidate may, at any time, by notice in writing addressed to the Clerk, withdraw from the approval process and the candidate's nomination shall end (section 6(10), PAPAA).

The Public Service Act (No. 10 of 2017)

- 12. Section 47 (2) of the Public Service Act (No. 10 of 2017) provides qualifications that one must have so as to be eligible for appointment as a Principal Secretary. These are:
 - i. be a citizen of Kenya;
 - ii. hold a degree from a university recognised in Kenya;

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- iii. has at least ten (10) years relevant professional experience, five (5) years of which should have been in a leadership position or at a top management level in the public service or private sector;
- iv. possess general knowledge of the organisation and functions of Government;
- v. demonstrates an understanding of the goals, policies and developmental objectives of the nation;
- vi. has demonstrable leadership and management capacity including knowledge of financial management and strategic people management; and
- vii. meets requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution.

Article 10(2) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance

13. Article 10(2) of the Constitution provides for the national values and principles of governance which include patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people; human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalised; good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and sustainable development.

Chapter 6 of the Constitution (Leadership and Integrity)

- 14. There are important provisions in Chapter 6 of the Constitution worth pointing out. Article 73 of the Constitution provides that the authority assigned to a State officer (a Principal Secretary being a state officer under Article 260 of the Constitution) is a public trust to be exercised in accordance to the Constitution, demonstrate respect for the people, bring honour to the nation and dignity to the office and promote public confidence in the integrity of the office. Also, the State officer shall have the responsibility to serve the people, rather than the power to rule them.
- 15. The guiding principles of leadership and integrity are listed as selection based on personal integrity, competence and suitability, objectivity and impartiality in decision making, selfless service based solely on the public interest, accountability and discipline and commitment in service to the people.

Article 77 of the Constitution (Restriction on activities of State officers)

16. Article 77 of the Constitution provides that a full-time State officer shall not participate in any other gainful employment and that any appointed State officer shall not hold office in a political party.

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17. Article 78 of the Constitution states that a person is not eligible for election or appointment to a State office unless the person is a citizen of Kenya. It also provides that a State officer or a member of the defence forces shall not hold sual citizenship.

Article 118 of the Constitution on public access and participation

- 18. Article 118 of the Constitution provides that:
 - 1. Parliament shall:
 - a) conduct its business in an open manner, and its sittings and those of its committees shall be in public; and
 - b) facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its committees.
 - 2. Parliament may not exclude the public, or any media, from any sitting unless in exceptional circumstances the relevant Speaker has determined that there are justifiable reasons for the exclusion.

Article 232 of the Constitution on Values and Principles of Public Service

19. Article 232 of the Constitution provides for the values and principles of public service which include high standards of professional ethics; efficient, effective and economic use of resources; responsive, prompt, effective, impartial and equitable provision of services; involvement of the people in the process of policy making; accountability for administrative acts; transparency and provision to the public of timely, accurate information; fair competition and merit as the basis of appointments and promotions; representation of Kenya's diverse communities; and affording adequate and equal opportunities for appointment, training and advancement, at all levels of the public service of men and women; the members of all ethnic groups; and persons with disabilities.

The Leadership and Integrity Act (Cap. 182)

20. The Leadership and Integrity Act provides a number of obligations to a State officer. These are, among others: to respect and abide by the Constitution and the law, public trust, performance of duties in an honest and accountable manner, professionalism, financial integrity, not to engage in activities that amount to abuse of office, not misuse public resources, accepting gifts that may compromise the officer's duties, wrongful or unlawful acquisition of property, conflict of interest e.t.c.

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The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act

21. Section 5 of the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act provides that a public officer shall maintain high standards of professional ethics, including, being honest; displaying high standards of integrity, transparency, accountability, respect to others, objectivity, patriotism, observance of rule. of law. (Applies in future upon appointment)

The Public Officer Ethics Act (Cap. 183)

22. The Public Officer Ethics Act provides for obligations to be carried out by a public officer. These include professionalism, carrying out duties in accordance with the law, prohibition from unjust enrichment, avoiding conflict of interest, not using office as a venue for soliciting or collecting harambees; not acting for foreigners; care of property; political neutrality, not practicing nepotism or favouritism, giving impartial advice, conducting private affairs in a way that maintains public confidence, bar from sexual harassment, submission of declaration of income, assets and liabilities once every two years (section 26). (Applies in future after appointment)

2.2 Qualifications for appointment as Principal Secretary

23. In conducting the approval hearings, the Committee was guided by Article 155 (3) (b) of the Constitution, section 47 (2) of the Public Service Act and the provisions of Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011).

2.3 Message from H.E. the President

24. H.E. the President on 8th November 2022 communicated the name of the nominee for appointment to the position of Principal Secretary Correctional Services to the Speaker for approval by the National Assembly pursuant to Article 155 (3). The Speaker in his communication from the Chair issued on Thursday, 10th November 2022 and pursuant to Standing Order No. 42 referred the name to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs to conduct approval hearings and report within twenty-eight (28) days.

2.4 Speaker's Communication and Committal to the Committee

Report of the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs on the Approval Hearing of the nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Correctional Services Thursday, 10th November 2022 communicated to the House the message from H.E. the President regarding the nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary for the State Department. The Speaker informed the House that H.E. the President was seeking approval of the National Assembly on the said nominations before the nominees' appointment.

- 26. In accordance with Standing Order 45(1), the Speaker read the Message from H.E. the President and referred the name of the nominee, her curricula vitae and report of the Public Service Commission on the recruitment process to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal and Legal Affairs to conduct approval hearings.
- 27. While referring the matter to the Committee, the Speaker directed that the Committee undertakes the vetting exercise within twenty-eight (28) days pursuant to Section 8 of the Public Appointments Parliamentary Approval Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Speaker further directed the Clerk of the National Assembly to notify the nominee and the general public by placing adverts in the daily newspapers of national circulation and the Parliamentary Website of the time and place of holding the approval hearings.
- 28. In addition, the Speaker directed that approval hearings should commence on Monday, 14th November 2022 and end on Friday, 18th November 2022. Thereafter, the reports should be tabled in the House not later than Tuesday, 29th November 2022 so as to enable the House to consider the reports within the statutory timelines.

2.5 Notification to the Public

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- 29. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), provides that "any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated".
- 30. The Clerk of the National Assembly on Saturday, 19th November 2022 placed a notification in the print media informing the general public of the intention of the Committee to conduct approval hearings, as provided for by Article 118 (1) (a) (b) and (2) of the Constitution and Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), which allows public participation in committee proceedings. The notification gave provision for the submission of

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memoranda, by way of written statements on oath *(affidavit)* on the suitability or otherwise of the nominee, by **Saturday**, 19th **November 2022** at 5.00 pm (East African Time). At the close of the submission deadline, the Committee had not received any memorandum for or against the suitability of the nominee.

2.6 Notification to the Nominee

31. The Clerk of the National Assembly vide an advert placed in the print media on Saturday, 19th November 2022 and letters Ref. NA/DDC/GEN/2022/003 informed the nominee of the nomination by H.E. the President and requested them to appear for vetting by the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs on Monday, 21st November 2022 in Committee Room 9, Main Parliament Building. The Clerk of the National Assembly further requested the nominee to bring with them their clearance certificates from the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP).

2.7 Clearance Requirements

32. The Clerk of the National Assembly wrote to the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) requesting for tax, education loans, integrity, affiliation to political parties and criminal record status of the nominee. The following institutions wrote back to the National Assembly clearing the nominee, KRA (letter Ref. KRA/5/1002/5(8199) dated 17th November 2022); DCI (letter Ref. DCI/CRO/SEC/6/7/2/A/VOL.XI/211 dated 16th November 2022); EACC (letter Ref. EACC.7/10/5 VOL XXI (91) dated 17th November 2022); HELB (letter Ref. HELB/RR/112009/190 dated 10th November 2022); and ORPP (letter Ref. RPP/ORG/34 VOL.' VI (146) dated 15th November 2022.

2.8 Report of the Public Service Commission on the Nomination of Principal Secretaries

33. Pursuant to Article 155 (3) (a) of the Constitution, the Public Service Commission invited applications from suitably qualified persons for the position of Principal Secretary. The

Website on 7th September 2022 with a closing date of 20th October 2022.

- 34. On 20th September 2022, the Commission extended the advertisement period by seven (7) days. The advertisement period lapsed on 27th September 2022 with a total of nine thousand one hundred and fifty-four (9,154) persons submitting applications for consideration.
- 35. Four hundred and seventy-seven (477) candidates were shortlisted from 3rd to 6th October 2022 and a further review done on 7th October 2022 to bring the shortlist to five hundred and eighty-five (585) candidates so as to cater for gender, marginalised/minority groups and PWDs pursuant to Article 232 (1) (h) of the Constitution. Interviews for the shortlisted persons were conducted from 12th to 22nd October 2022.
- 36. Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki was number three hundred and sixty-six (366) on the published list of shortlisted candidates and she was interviewed by the Public Service Commission on 22nd October, 2022.
- 37. The Public Service Commission adhered to all provisions of the Constitution in the process of advertising, shortlisting and interviewing the candidates including, merit, gender, ethnic and regional balance.

2.9 Committee proceedings

- 38. The Committee having received the name of the nominee was obligated to conduct approval hearings and make determination of the nominees' suitability or otherwise within twenty-eight (28) days as provided for in section 8 (1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011).
- 39. The Committee held three (3) sittings during which it examined and reviewed the nominees' certificates, testimonials as well as conducted approval hearings.
- 40. The Committee proceedings on approval hearing was temporarily stopped via a communication from the Speaker dated 6th November 2022 following a Constitutional Petition No. E186 OF 2022 (Dr. Magare Gikenyi Verses the President of the Republic of Kenya and 55 others) and in

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Constitutional petition No. E 192 of 2022 (Law Society of Kenya verses the National Assembly and 4 others where conservatory orders temporarily staying the vetting process pending inter-parte hearings were granted.

- 41. The court on 29th November, 2022 dismissed the consolidated petitions for being prematurely before the Court. The court upheld the argument by the respondent in their preliminary objection that there was need for the petitioners to exhaust all statutory mechanisms and that the doctrine of separation of powers should have been considered.
- 42. The Speaker in a communication directed the Committees to revert to the vetting process from Wednesday 30th November 2022, and conclude the process as soon as possible.

3 APPROVAL HEARINGS

- 43. The Committee conducted approval hearings for the nominee on Wednesday 30th November, 2022
- 44. In conducting the vetting exercise, the Committee was guided by, among other documents, the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Public Service Act and the Standing Orders.
- 45. The Committee examined the nominee using the guidelines in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Committee also considered the following in vetting the nominee:
 - a. Academic qualifications
 - b. Employment record and work experience
 - c. Professional association
 - d. Public office, political activities and affiliations
 - e. Potential conflict of interest
 - f. Suitability to the position
 - g. Tax compliance
 - h. Vision and leadership
 - i. Integrity
 - j. Expectations and Key priorities

3.1 MS. MARY MUTHONI MURIUKI

Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki appeared before the Committee and was orally interviewed by the Committee and responded to questions during vetting as follows:

Transitioning from teaching, to business and finally public sector:

46. The nominee noted that she is a dynamic person and noted that running a school is like running a government that requires structures and systems and the same way in a prison you have to follow systems and have a structure.

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47. The nominee further added that she has negotiation skills to handle clients and she is innovative and has developed institutions from scratch.

Pending Bills

48. The nominee noted that an audit ought to be done and that she would consider previous reports on the issue of pending bills. The nominee further noted that there would be need to verify the pending bills in order to deal with the matter comprehensively.

Low morale among prison staff

- 49. The nominee noted that promotions were not done on merit. Factors such as nepotism and favoritism were rampant in promotion of prison officers while noting that some officers have stayed on the same grade for many years.
- 50. She further noted there was need to recognize and commend prison officers as this would go a long way in improving staff morale

Congestion in correctional facilities

- 51. The nominee noted that congestion is one of the biggest challenges facing the prisons department. She further noted that those remanded without proper procedure are an expense to the government and further increase the bill.
- 52. The nominee stated that both state and non-state actors should come together and look at this issue.

Her understanding of Correctional Services Department

- 53. The nominee took the panel through the different types of prions in the country (9) Maximum prisons, 77 medium prisons and 47 Mini-prisons. She noted the country has 57,000 prisoners today against a capacity of 30,000 prisoners.
- 54. She further noted, it would be important to strengthen the probation department as this would be one of the avenues of decongesting the prisons. Encourage Committee on the Power of Mercy to release more inmates who have reformed, work with Chaplains and religious leaders in the prisons.

Potential of conflict between her and Commissioner of Prisons

55. The nominee noted that everyone has their mandate and everyone should stick to their lane. She also noted that there must be consultations between all actors to avoid duplications and conflicts

3.1.1 Personal Background

56. Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 21781981 and was born in Kirinyaga County in 1979.

- 57. Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki holds a Master Degree in Business Administration (MBA) from University of Eastern Africa, Baraton University in Eldoret Kenya and a (2009) a Bachelor of Education Degree from the Catholic University of Eastern Africa.
- 58. She sat for her KCSE level examinations at Kabare Girls Secondary School in 1997 and KCPE in 1993 at Ngiriambu.

3.1.3 Work experience/career progression

59. Ms.Mary Muthoni Muriuki has worked all her career life in the following capacities:

- a) She is currently the Chief Executive Officer of the Women in Business Kenya.
- b) Managing Director of the St.Petroc Premier Schools from 2012 to 2018
- c) Teachers Service Commission (High school teacher) (2003-2012)

3.1.4 Networth

60. The nominee through her submitted documents indicated that she is worth Ksh. 600 million. The source of her wealth is from the following sources: Family Investments (420 Million), Inherited Land (20 Million) Farming Activities (70 Million), Cars and movable property (30 Million) and Homes and rental properties (60 Million).

3.1.5 Clearance Requirements

61. The Committee confirmed that the nominee had been cleared by KRA, ORPP, DCI, EACC and HELB, having obtained clearance certificates to that effect.

3.1.6 Other issues under consideration

To examine suitability or otherwise of the nominee, the Committee posed questions to the nominee in the following thematic areas:

CHAPTER FOUR

4 OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS

- 62. The Committee observations were guided by Article 155 of the Constitution, section 47 of the Public Service Act and section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) in terms of issues for consideration as follows:
 - i. the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
 - ii. any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
 - iii. suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is made.
- 63. The Committee made the following general observations on the nominee:
 - i. The nominee is a Kenyan and is not a citizen of any other country. She therefore meets the requirements of Article 78 of the Constitution;
 - ii. The Public Service Commission submitted the report of the recruitment of principal secretaries to the National Assembly hence the Committee was able to ascertain that the interview process was competitive and that the nominee was in the shortlist as required by Article 155(3) of the Constitution;
 - iii. The nominee was cleared by KRA on tax compliance, HELB on the payment of their education loans, EACC on integrity, DCI on their criminal status and ORPP on membership to political parties; and
 - The Clerk of the National Assembly invited members of the public to submit memoranda on the nominee pursuant to section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011. The Committee did not receive any memoranda in support or contesting the suitability of any of the nominee.
 - v. The nominee demonstrated drive not only reform the sector but also to transform the department into a center that offers psycho-social support, educational and technical training

rehabilitation and reintegration aspects of the prison systems.

- vi. The nominee demonstrated she is a dynamic individual who has been able to transition from various disciplines having started as a teacher with the Teacher's Service Commission to her current role designation as Chief Executive Officer of the Women in Business Kenya.
- vii. The nominee is confident and came out as a team player as she currently heads Women in Business Kenya, an organization which brings together over three million women entrepreneurs in diverse fields in the world.
- viii. The nominee demonstrated managerial skills and an innovative mind which would go a long way in managing historical pending bills that has impoverished many Small and Medium Enterprises in the supply chain.
- ix. The nominee is knowledgeable with regard to her understanding of the State Department for Correctional Services and demonstrated an understanding of the institution's facilities across the country.

The meeting was called to order at 10:45 a.m. with a word of prayer from the Chairperson and the agenda was adopted as filed on a proposal from Hon. Onyiego Silvanus Osoro, M.P. and seconded by Hon. Maina Jane Njeri, M.P.

The Chairperson informed Members that the main agenda was to conduct approval hearing for the person nominated for the position of Principal Secretary, State Department of Correctional Services. He further informed the meeting that there were no memoranda received contesting the suitability of the nominee.

The Nominee appeared before the Committee and submitted as follows;

<u>Ms. Mary Muthoni Muriuki – Nominee for the position of Principal Secretary, State</u> Department of Correctional Services

a. On personal background, the nominee stated that she is married and a mother of four, a Kenyan citizen born in Kirinyaga County and residing in Kirinyaga & Nairobi Counties. nolds a Master's in Business Administration, double major in Management and Marketing from Baraton University (2013-2019); Bachelor of Education (English Language, Grammar and Literature) from Catholic University of East Africa (CUEA) (2011-2012); and a Diploma in Humanities from Kagumo College (2016).

- c. On Experience and employment record, the nominee stated that she has over 30 years' experience and has worked in various positions including: Vice Chair, Kirinyaga Investment and Development Authority: (current); President & CEO Women in Business Community Network: (Current); and as a Teacher & Trainer for a period of over Ten(10) years
- d. On membership, she indicated that she was a Board Member, Tobacco Control Board, Ministry of Health: (2018-2021); Board Member, Moi High School, Mbiruri: (2019) Ministry of Education: (Current); Board Member, County Elections Board: (2017); Board Member, Kenya National Chamber of Commerce & Industry (2018); Board Member, Kabare Girls High School, Ministry of Education: (3 years); and Board Member, St. Petroc Premier School.
- e. On awards and honors, she indicated that she was awarded a Head of State Commendation (HSC) in 2021 in recognition of her role in community service; Uzalendo Award for exemplary effort in organizing business women to distribute sanitizers to low-income markets, matatu and boda-boda operators; Regional Winner in business and professional sector for the most influential Women in Business and Government (2019); African Women Impact Award by the International College of Peace (September 2019); Current holder of the Africa Business Leaders award in regards gender (June 2018); The Devolution Warrior Award (Kenya), Gender Response Delivery Category (March 2017); 6 most influential women in Kenya (2017); Best performing director, Kenya National Chamber of Commerce (2017); Patron of the year, Research Club Kenya Chapter Awarded by IPSOS/ Synovate (2018); and Diligent Service at Student Leadership Council
- f. On professional and relevant skills, she indicated that her entrepreneurial and managerial skills are one of the strengths she would bring to the State Department and that this would aid in management of Correctional Services
- g. On her relevant experience and exposure, she informed the meeting that she has vast experience and exposure in diverse fields including the legal sector, private sector and government on matters of human rights ranging from issues on, leadership skills, management skills, financial management, peace and security which she would use to reform the State Department if appointed.
- h. **On pending bills,** the nominee stated that she will look into past reports of the State Department on Correctional Services to identify the cause. The nominee noted the need to carry out an audit and that this would enable her to deal with the issues from a point of knowledge.

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- i. On how well she knows the country and how it would impact her role if approved, the nominee stipulated that there are one hundred and thirty-nine (139) prisons in the country, twenty eight thousand (28,000) officers deployed in prisons, three (3) juvenile institutions, nine (9) maximum prisons, forty six (46) mini prisons and seventy seven (77) medium prisons. She pointed out the need to explore other forms of restorative justice due to the few number of prisons available. The nominee also pointed out the lack of transformation of prisoners once they come out of prison.
- j. On the overcrowding in prisons, the nominee highlighted the need to explore other forms of dispute resolution and the need to come up with other ways of dealing with petty offenders. The nominee pointed out the need to work with Parliament, the Judiciary and the Police to better enforce bail and bond legislation so as not to unnecessarily incarcerate people who need not face the justice system while in prison. The nominee emphasized the need for the Committee on the prerogative of mercy to sit more often so as to aid in the release of prisoners who have been reformed and can be integrated back to society.
- k. On the issue of Corporal punishment, the nominee stated that correctional service is not supposed to be a punishment but is meant to help prisoners. Petty offences such as loitering should not attract custodial sentences.
- I. On how she will lift the morale of the prison wardens, the nominee pointed out the need to come up with better criteria in promotions. She also stated that she would ensure that officers are recognized for work well done. The nominee further started that if appointed she would ensure better housing for officers and get rid of thatched and mud houses.
- m. On the capacity of prisons in Kenya, the nominee stated that the correctional services do not have enough personnel to deal with prisons. She also stated that there's need to improve prisons and make them more habitable. She further informed the Committee on the need to work with legislators, judiciary and the police for the better enforcement of bail and bond to reduce the number of people detained in police cells and remand.
- n. On how the nominee will deal with escalated cybercrime in prisons, she pointed out the need to deal with how mobile phones get to prisons and better use of technology to filter telecommunication devices. This would also include creating awareness to prisons personnel on the purpose of correctional services and why certain individuals have to be detained. She further pointed out the need to decisively deal with any rogue Prison Wardens who may be involved in the vice.
- o. On whether the nominee as, Principal Secretary would face a likely conflict on financial control with The Commissioner of Prisons, the nominee indicated that they have different mandates and she therefore did not see any potential areas of conflict. She further indicated that they would work together in consultation with the cabinet Secretary in charge of the ministry of Interior and Administration of National Government.

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Secretary, she stated the need to enhance literacy levels of prisoners so that they can acquire knowledge and skills to enable them re-integrate into the society. She also pointed out the need to inform the society to better accept those released from prisons. The nominee pointed out that the prisons and borstal institutions were still being run based on pre-colonial legislation and there was need to enhance the prison enterprise to enable prisoners acquire knowledge and skills that would better enable them to re-integrate into society upon release. The nominee highlighted the need to not only reform but also transform prisoners.

Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 42(3), I hereby refer the Message together with the curriculum vitae of the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for consideration.Section 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act provides that, unless otherwise provided in law, the Committee to which such nomination is referred shall consider the matter and table a report in the House <u>within twenty-eight (28)</u> days.
- 5. Honourable Members, for clarity, and to enable the House conclude this exercise speedily, I direct the Clerk of the National Assembly to take the necessary action by notifying the nominee and the general public by placing an advert in the daily newspapers of national circulation and the Parliamentary Website of the time and place of holding the approval hearings tomorrow, Friday, 11th November, 2022, following which the approval hearings should commence.

6. Thereafter, the said Committee should table its report in the House on or before Tuesday, 29th November, 2022 for the House to debate and make decision on the nominee before the House proceedsfor its long recess on Thursday, 1st December, 2022.




WHEREAS, Articles 132(2)(d) and 155(3)(b) of the Constitution provides that the President shall nominate and with the approval of the National Assembly appoint Principal Secretaries;

WHEREAS, in exercise of powers conferred under Article 132(2)(d) of the Constitution and Sections 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, on 2nd November 2022, His Excellency the President submitted to the National Assembly names of various persons nominated for appointment as Principal Secretaries under Article 155(3) of the Constitution;

FURTHER WHEREAS, in keeping with the requirements of Article 155(3)(b) of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 45(1), on 3rd November 2022, I conveyed the Message of His Excellency the President to the assembled House and referred the names of the persons so nominated to various Departmental Committees for purposes of conducting the necessary approval hearings;

AND WHEREAS, the vetting of persons nominated to serve as Principal Secretaries commenced on Monday, 14th November 2022 in the various Departmental Committees of the House, after according the public a period of seven (7) days within which to file any memoranda and/or submissions on the persons nominated for appointment as Principal Secretaries;


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FURTHER WHEREAS, on 15th November, 2022, the Employment and Labour Relations Court in Constitution Petition No. E186 of 2022, (Dr. Magare Gikenyi versus The President of the Republic of Kenya and 55 Others) and in Constitution Petition No. E192 of 2022, (Law Society of Kenya versus The National Assembly and 4 Others), granted CONSERVATORY ORDERS temporarily staying the vetting process pending inter-parte hearings scheduled for 21st November, 2022;

NOTING that Article 3(1) of the Constitution places an obligation on the Speaker and indeed the House to respect and uphold the Constitution in particular by abiding and upholding the rule of law;

NOWTHEREFORE, IT IS NOTIFIED to all Chairpersons of Departmental Committees, all persons nominated for appointment as Principal Secretaries and the general public-

- (1) THAT, the vetting of persons nominated to serve as Principal Secretaries is hereby **suspended forthwith** until further notice;
- (2) THAT, the Departmental Committees which had already concluded the vetting proceedings and approval hearings are to suspend any activity relating to **reporting** to the House on the proceedings, until further notice; and,
- (3) THAT, I have directed our Litigation Counsel to move the concerned courts to set aside the *ex-parte* orders based on various legal grounds. Thereafter, the proceedings will resume subject to the directions of the Court.

RESUMPTION OF VETTING OF NOMINEES FOR APPOINTMENT AS PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES

Honourable Members,

- 1. You will recall that on 15th November 2022, the Employment and Labour Relations Court in *Constitution Petition No. E186 of 2022, Dr. Magare Gikenyi versus The President of the Republic of Kenya and 55 Others and in Constitution Petition No. E192 of 2022, Law Society of Kenya versus The National Assembly and 4 Others, granted <u>EX-PARTE CONSERVATORY ORDERS</u> temporarily staying the vetting process in respect of nominees for appointment to the position of Principal Secretaries pending hearing and determination of the Petitioners' application for conservatory orders.*
- 2. Consequently, on 16th November 2022 vide *Notification No. 02 of 2022*, I directed that the vetting process be suspended pending the outcome of the judicial process. This was informed by the appreciation of the provisions of Article 3(1) of the Constitution which places an obligation on myself and indeed the House, to respect and uphold the Constitution and in particular by abiding and upholding the rule of law.

- **3.** Further, I directed our litigation Counsel to move the concerned courts to set aside the ex-parte orders based on various legal grounds and more particularly on lack of jurisdiction on the part of Courts to interfere with active parliamentary processes.
- 4. Accordingly, the National Assembly challenged the court's power to hear and determine the case on the ground that the Petitions were in contravention of the constitutional principle of separation of powers, as they were inviting the court to determine a matter under the exclusive jurisdiction of the National Assembly under Article 155(3)(b) of the Constitution and the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.

Honourable Members

5. In its Ruling delivered today, Tuesday, 29th November 2022, the court agreed with the National Assembly's submission that the doctrine of separation of powers as provided for in the Constitution ought to be respected and upheld at all times. Further, the court observed that the National Assembly has exclusive original jurisdiction to first carry out the approval process before the court can intervene. The court therefore, paved the way for the resumption of the vetting process noting that the petitions were baseless, frivolous, vexatious and premature. The court also noted that the legislature must be allowed to carry out its constitutional mandate without undue interference by any person or other arm of government.

b. From the onset, I wish to note the very progressive view data by the court in this matter. Whereas it is the constitutional right of every person to approach the courts of law, state organs must be allowed sufficient leeway to carry out their mandate without undue interference by any person. Indeed, to a keen observer, the petitioners were moved more by a lack of proper information and legal guidance, and a push to stall a process for reasons other than national interest.

Honourable Members,

7. As observed by the court, comity among the organs of the State dictates that one organ shall not interfere in a matter under the active consideration of another organ. Indeed, our own Standing Order 89 on *Matters sub-judice* prohibit referral or consideration of any matter before a court of law. In the same vein, the courts are expected to exercise restraint and refrain from interfering with matters that are active before Parliament, a constitutional concept that the court has today once again upheld in its Ruling. As the National Assembly, we will endeavour to protect and uphold these constitutional principles in furtherance of the mandate bestowed on us.

Honourable Members,

- **8.** Following this ruling by the court, I wish to guide the House, the concerned Committees and indeed the general public as follows
 - (1) THAT, the suspension of the vetting of persons nominated to serve as Principal Secretaries is hereby lifted. The Committees are therefore expected to resume the vetting process immediately; and

(2) THAT, all Departmental Committees are to conclude the vetting proceedings and approval hearings as soon as possible to allow for the conclusion of process. In any case, noting that the House will be commencing the long recess on 2nd December 2022 in accordance with its calendar, it is expected that the Committees will hasten the process and report to the House by end of the morning sitting of Thursday, 1st December 2022, to pave way for consideration of the various approval motions by the House.




