



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PREFACE

The Senate Standing Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries, was constituted in March, 2014 during the Second Session of the Eleventh (11th) Parliament pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 208(3). 
Mr. Speaker Sir,

On behalf of the Members of the Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries Committee and as required under the Senate Standing Orders, I hereby present to this House, the Committee's report on the Petition by Mr. Gideon Kiprotich Keter from Kericho County, on the mode of distribution of subsidized fertilizer and free seeds to farmers.

In his Petition, the petitioner states that there is need for the Senate to look into the matter as it touched on the agricultural sector, which is a key player in contributing to the GDP. Secondly, the farmers were the biggest losers in the scenario.

Apart from the petitioner the Committee held meetings with other stakeholders among them the Cabinet Secretary Agriculture, Hon Willy Bett and the National Cereals Produce Board Managing Director, Mr. Newton Keter. Indeed, their contributions helped the Committee to look more critically into the matter before it and conclude it with submission presented in its meeting held on Thursday 10th November, 2016.



I. PRAYERS OF THE PETITIONER FROM KERICHO COUNTY (MR. GIDEON KIPROTICH KETER)

Pursuant to Article 119 of the CoK and part XXIV of the Senate Standing Orders, the petitioner sought answers to the following prayers-

- a) Policy failure in distribution of fertilizer. (Regarding issues of theft of subsidised fertilizers that was meant for farmers as reported during the deliberations)
- b) Farmer's payment for the subsidized fertilizer before importation.
- c) Amendment of the National Cereals and Produce Board Act to manage the challenges presented.
- d) Legislation(s) to compel county governments to allocate funding for distribution of farm inputs.



- e) Budgetary allocation by the national government to provide for subsidized fertilizer.
- f) The registration and distribution to recipients farmers at their nearby primary school will be a commitment by the Government. The Government will then import and take to the schools. This will cut out the middlemen who keep interfering with fertilizer subsidies.
- g) That the Committee favourably explores the ability of the NCPB to use public primary schools in the country as the distribution points for fertilizer. He further verified that, the Schools will not store the fertilizer. The trucks will drop off the preordered fertilizer and the farmers will easily collect.


Committee's General Observation and Recommendations by the Committee.

The Committee having considered the matters raised in the Petition made the following observations:

- i. The petition raised fundamental policy issues warranting serious address by the Government at both levels.
- ii. The petitioner should carefully consider the submissions from the Ministry as it had handled most of the issues he had raised.
- iii. Funding at both levels is minimal for the subsidised fertilizer and seeds.
- iv. There was no enforcement of Article 187 of the Constitution that caters for cooperation between the National and the County governments, therefore the prayer to compel both parties to work together cannot be enforced through legislation in Parliament.
- v. Amendment of the NCPB Act would not assist in solving the challenges raised. The suggestion to amend is well within the functions of the board.

The Committee having considered the matters raised in the Petition made the following recommendations:

- a) The petitioner should consider the submissions from the ministry as it had handled most of the issues he had raised.
- b) Funding should be increased to give farmers more subsidised fertilizer.



- c) Article 187 caters for cooperation between the GOK and the County governments; therefore the prayer to compel both parties to work together cannot be enforced through legislation in Parliament.
- d) Amendment of the NCPB Act would not assist in solving the challenges raised. The suggestion is well within the functions of the board.
- e) That the issue of diverting fertilizer should be investigated and action be taken to all found to be culpable.



III. INTRODUCTION

REVIEW OF THE PETITION TO THE SENATE OF THE REPUBLIC OF KENYA IN THE MATTER OF THE MODE OF DISTRIBUTION OF SUBSIDIZED FERTILIZER AND FREE SEEDS TO FARMERS

The Senate Standing Orders part XXIV provides for public petitions. It stipulates its meaning and provisions in the Constitution: A petition means a written prayer to the Senate under Article 37 or 119 of Constitution of Kenya by a member of the public requesting the Senate to consider any matter within its authority as contemplated in Articles 94 and 96 of Constitution including enacting, amending or repealing any legislation.

The Standing Orders further gives a template specifying the presentation design of a submission document in the Third Schedule. After submission, the Petition is received by the office of the Clerk and reported to the Senate by the Speaker or presented by a Senator on behalf of the petitioner, with the consent of the Speaker. The Petition is then committed to the relevant Committee, in this case, the Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries.


In this context the petitioner alleged that-

- a) There was a failure of policy in distribution of fertiliser, which led to rampant theft of the subsidised fertilizers;
- b) That the National Government imported 137 million metric tonnes and hundreds of thousands of bags were allegedly stolen;
- c) There were cartels in the business of selling the fertilizer for profit and this negatively impacted on the poor farmers. The fertilizer is intended to aid them increase their profit margins, but many were barely breaking even; and
- d) The fertilizer was not accessible to the targeted farmers in most parts of the country.

IV. HIGHLIGHTS ON THE ISSUES IN THE PETITION

Prayers of the Petitioner

- a) That the Senate legislates on the distribution of fertiliser to deal with the challenges mentioned;
- b) That the option of using primary schools as distribution points be considered. For easy access; of fertilizer by farmers;



- c) That there shall be prior payment for the fertiliser before importation as this would improve efficiency;
- d) That there should be an amendment to the NCPB Act to manage the challenges presented;
- e) That the Senate should compel county governments to allocate funding for distribution of farm inputs; and
- f) That the national government should disclose its budgetary allocation for subsidized fertilizer to help Counties in forward planning.


V. SUBMISSIONS BY STAKEHOLDERS

THE CABINET SECRETARY AGRICULTURE, Mr. WILLY BETT

The Cabinet Secretary thanked the Committee and the petitioner for being proactive in keeping to the ideals of the Constitution. He made the following submission;

- (i) The spirit of the petition was good; however there were some grey areas that needed to be sorted out;
- (ii) He agreed that the current arrangement was not enough, but the ministry had a target of making fertilizer available within a radius of 5KM;
- (iii) On the issue of theft, he stated that the government had not lost any fertilizer through (Stealing). The CS said that due to collusion between business persons guised as farmers and some staff- then the business persons often sell the subsidized stuff to the farmers irregularly. Thus the intended recipients fail to get the fertilizers. The 10,000 bags intercepted was occasioned by the same issue of collusion between staffers and business people. It was paid for but diverted and a few people were arrested. As a result of such malpractices- 22 persons were sacked;
- (iv) The subsidies are supposed to benefit the farmers. But they ended up buying it more expensive;
- (v) There is scarcity of fertilizers despite the subsidies and this makes farmers readily purchase the higher priced fertilizer from the business people;
- (vi) There is a vetting process through which farmers are put through and the area chiefs are involved. Farmers pay for fertilizers and wait for the delivery;
- (vii) Farmers have been encouraged to come together as a cooperative and order for their fertilizer needs as a cooperative. This worked in Uasin Gishu last seaso;
- (viii) E-subsidy is a pilot project by the ministry to have farmers request for it via mobile phones;
- (ix) The Ministry is registering farmers and building up a database. The same database shall be used to sort the distribution of the fertilizers. Registration is being done county by county and validation is also done at the same level;


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- (x) Societies: Many Members of Parliament have come up with various suggestions on how distribution should be done. Some are good and the ministry shall incorporate them moving forward;
- (xi) He agreed with registration at the Primary school;
- (xii) The payment beforehand is a method that the ministry wants to pursue; and
- (xiii) The county governments can be the linking factor between the GOK imports of fertilizers and farmers thus making sure fertilizer reaches the targeted farmers.

THE MANAGING DIRECTOR, NATIONAL CEREALS AND PRODUCE BOARD: MR. NEWTON KETER

- i. Accepted that there was an integrity issue affecting his staff;
- ii. Vetting procedure presented challenges- way forward is the registration of farmers as presented by the CS;
- iii. 137 metric tonnes was imported by Government, but that is only about 20% of the requirement in the country;
- iv. The alternative model of distribution should be the main focus of the petition. He encouraged the issue of cooperatives, as it was self-regulating and the farmers know each other and will guard against infiltration by brokers;
- v. A number of satellite depots and private partners have been used to help in the distribution of the stuff;
- vi. The issue of using primary schools as distribution centre may be difficult because of safety, storage, and cost benefit analysis;
- vii. NCPB is categorized as a commercial operator, it does not get any subsidy for management and distribution of fertilizer. The depots are draining their funds;
- viii. However, he agreed that there is need to look into the issue of distribution to make it more targeted and efficient;
- ix. The issue of quantities- is difficult because NCPB does not know the exact demand of the farmers;
- x. There are challenges in distribution of fertilizers in terms of distance, structured registered farmers database and agreed distribution centres; and
- xi. The Board distributes fertilizers but the Ministry decides on the quantities to distribute and location of recipients.



VI.KEY ISSUES TO BE ADDRESSED IN THE PETITION

- a) The issue of the cartels acting as middlemen and driving up the cost of fertilizer;
- b) Early payment as farmers order to help ensure efficiency and cut out the middlemen; and
- c) The possibility of drop off zoning to be done according to the nearest primary school and also to have farmers registered there.


VII. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS (RESPONSE TO PRAYERS OF THE PETITIONER)

- a) The petition is a serious one (Kenya being an agricultural country);
- b) Members agreed that there was loss on the farmers' side. That though they get the fertilizer, it was at a higher price, hence uneconomical;
- c) Some Counties are also active in distributing fertiliser to their farmers for example, in Trans-zoia county;
- d) The use of technology, e.g. GPS to locate the farmers should be explored;
- e) If there is a deficit in the provision of fertiliser- then registration at the primary school level will see many farmers coming for the products. This means that there is also a strong need for increasing funding to meet the gap;
- f) NCPB should consider application of equity in distribution of the fertilisers.

VIII. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee having considered the matters raised in the petition recommends as follows;

- i. The Petitioner should consider the submissions from the ministry as it had handled most of the issues he had raised;
- ii. Funding should be increased to give farmers more subsidised fertilizer;
- iii. Article 187 of the Constitution caters for cooperation between the National and the County governments; therefore the prayer to compel both parties to work together cannot be enforced through legislation in Parliament;
- iv. Amendment of the NCPB Act to regulate subsidized fertilizer would not assist in solving the challenges raised. The suggestion is well within the functions of the board; and
- v. That the issue of fertilizer being diverted should be investigated and action be taken to all found to be culpable.





- c) There were cartels in the business of selling the fertilizer for profit and this negatively impacted on the poor farmers. The fertilizer is supposed to aid them increase their profit margins, but many were barely breaking even.
- d) The fertilizer was not accessible to the targeted farmers in most parts of the country.



- h) However, he agreed that there is need to look into the issue of distribution to make it more targeted and efficient;
- i) The issue of quantities- is difficult because NCPB does not know the exact demand of the farmers;
- j) There are challenges in distribution of fertilizers in terms of distant, structured registered farmers database and agreed distribution centres; and
- k) National Cereals and Produce Board distributes fertilizers but the Ministry decides on the quantities to distribute and location of recipients.



The Committee observed and recommended the following-

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- a) Need to decentralize the distribution of fertilizers to be within reach of farmers;
- b) Need to register farmers in one systematically structured database to mitigate on the unscrupulous middlemen;
- c) Creation of taskforce and shared responsibility with the County Government since agriculture and in specific fertilizers distribution is a function of both the County Government and National Government; and
- d) Reallocation of more funds to increase food production for the betterment of the larger economy.


