





#### **CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD**

In exercise of powers conferred by Section 9(1) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya forwarded to the Clerk of the National Assembly, a notification of nomination containing the name and Curriculum Vitae of Mr. Kennedy Nyabuti Ogeto as a nominee for appointment to the position of Solicitor-General.


Pursuant to provisions of Standing Order 42(1) of the National Assembly Standing Orders, the Honourable Speaker on 22<sup>nd</sup> February, 2018 conveyed to the House the message from His Excellency the President to the House effectively committing the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for vetting.

Section 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act gives a timeline of fourteen (14) days within which a committee must conclude vetting and report to the House. The fourteen (14) days include seven (7) days of receiving memoranda from the public on the suitability of the nominees for appointment.

The Committee was supposed to table its report in the House on or before 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2018. However, the House altered its calendar for the session as adopted on 14<sup>th</sup> February, 2018 to proceed on a short recess from Friday, 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2018 and resume on 14<sup>th</sup> March, 2018. In view of the Committee's predicament, the House extended the timeline for the for vetting and submission of a report by a further period of ten (10) days from 7<sup>th</sup> March, 2018 in order to comply with the law.

The Committee held a total of two (2) sittings on the vetting process. The nominee appeared before the Committee for vetting on 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2018 at 10.45 a.m. and at 4.00 p.m. of the same day the Committee held its second sitting where it considered and unanimously adopted its report on the vetting.

May I take this opportunity to express gratitude to the Honourable Members of the Committee for their resilience and devotion to duty which made the vetting exercise successful. May I also take this opportunity to express gratitude to the Committee's secretariat for its exemplary performance in provision of technical and logistical support services which made the work of the Committee a success. May I also



on behalf of the Committee appreciate the media for covering the Committee proceedings thereby enhancing transparency and accountability.



#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In exercise of powers conferred by Section 9(1) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya forwarded to the Clerk of the National Assembly, a notification of appointment containing the name and Curriculum Vitae of Mr. Kennedy Nyabuti Ogeto as a nominee for appointment to the position of Solicitor-General.

Pursuant to provisions of Standing Order 42(1) of the National Assembly Standing Orders, the Honourable Speaker on 22<sup>nd</sup> February, 2018 conveyed to the House the message from His Excellency the President to the House effectively committing the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for vetting.

The Committee held a total of two (2) sittings on the vetting process. The nominee appeared before the Committee for vetting on 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2018 at 10.45 a.m. and at 4.00 p.m. of the same day the Committee held its second sitting where it considered and unanimously adopted its report on the vetting.

As per the provisions of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, among the issues that the Committee considered in determining if the nominee was suitable to hold office were the procedure used to arrive at his name, constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the position in question and whether the nominee's ability, experience and qualities meet the needs of the position to which the nomination was made.

The public was invited through newspaper advertisements to submit memoranda on the suitability of the nominee to hold office. There were no memoranda received contesting the nominee's nomination and suitability to hold office by the deadline of 1<sup>st</sup> March, 2018, 5.00 p.m.


Upon hearing the nominee and examining his CV, certificates and testimonials, the Committee was convinced that the nominee qualifies to be appointed as Solicitor-General and recommends that the House approves his appointment by His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya.



#### 1. PREFACE

#### 1.1. Mandate of the Committee

The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs derives its mandate from Standing Order No. 216(5) which provides for the functions of Departmental Committees as follows:-

- (a) investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
- (b) study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of their implementation;
- (c) study and review all legislation referred to it;
- (d) study, assess and analyse the relative success of the ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
- (e) investigate and enquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
- (f) vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments)
- (g) examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
- (h) make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
- (i) consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
- (j) examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.



The Second Schedule of the Standing Orders on Departmental Committees further outlines the Subjects of the Committee, as follows-

- (a) Constitutional affairs;
- (b) The administration of law and Justice
- (c) The Judiciary;
- (d) Public prosecutions;
- (e) Elections;
- (f) Ethics, integrity and anti-corruption; and
- (g) Human rights.





#### PART 2

#### 2. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

#### 2.1. The position of Solicitor-General

The Office of the Attorney General's Act, 2012 provides for the position of Solicitor-General in the Office of the Attorney General. Section 9 of the Act provides as follows-

(1) there shall be a Solicitor-General who shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the National Assembly.

#### 2.2. Functions of the Solicitor-General

Section 9 (4) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act provides that; the Solicitor General shall assist the Attorney-General in the performance of duties of the Attorney-General.

Section 9 (5) of the Act provides as follows-

The Solicitor-General shall carry out any function, discharge any duty and exercise any power as may be directed by the Attorney General and shall-

- (a) organize, co-ordinate and manage the administrative and legal functions of the Office;
- (b) assist the Attorney-General in the performance of his duties as the principal legal advisor to the Government;
- (c) conduct, or assign and supervise all court cases, including appeals or petitions on behalf of the Attorney-General; an
- (d) subject to Article 234 of the Constitution, be responsible for the discipline of State Counsel and other members of staff of the office

Section 9 (6) of the Act further states as follows-

In the performance of the functions and the exercise of the powers of the Solicitor-General, the Solicitor-General shall be responsible for:-

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- (a) organizing and coordinating the administrative legal functions of the Office;
- (b) formulating and ensuring implementation of development strategies for Government Legal Services:
- (c) undertaking duties of alternate Chairperson of the Disciplinary Tribunal;
- (d) performing duties of alternate Chairperson of the College of Arms;
- (e) performing duties as a member of the Council of Legal Education;
- (f) coordinating the attachment of candidates for pupillage in the office; and
- (g) performing such other duties as may be conferred by law or otherwise assigned to the Solicitor-General by the Attorney-General

#### 2.3. Notification of nomination to the House

Following the occurrence of vacancy in the position of Solicitor-General, Office of the Attorney-General and in exercise of powers conferred to him by Section 9(1) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya vide a letter dated 21<sup>st</sup> February 2018 as per annexure 2 forwarded to the Speaker of the National Assembly a notification of appointment containing the name of Mr. Kennedy Nyabuti Ogeto as the nominee for approval for appointment to the position of Solicitor-General.

The Committee noted that Mr. Ogeto had been nominated to replace Mr. Njee Muturi who had since been appointed as Deputy Chief of Staff in the Office of the President.



### 2.4. Committal of the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for vetting

Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 42(1) and 42(3) of the National Assembly Standing Orders, the Honourable Speaker on 22<sup>nd</sup> February, 2018 conveyed to the House the message from His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya effectively committing the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for vetting.

#### 2.5. Public participation in the vetting process

Article 118 (1) (b) of the Constitution provides as follows:-

''Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees''

Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act of 2011 provides as follows:-


'Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of candidate to hold the office to which a candidate has been nominated'

On Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup>February, 2018, the Clerk of the National Assembly through advertisement in the local daily newspapers of *Daily Nation*, *The Star* and *The Standard* attached as annexure 3 invited the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath on the suitability of the nominee to hold the position he had been nominated for. There was no memoranda received contesting the nominee's nomination and suitability for appointment.

Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, provides as follows-

''The Committee shall notify the public of the time and place for holding an approval hearing at least seven days prior to the hearing''

The National Assembly Standing Order 45(3) states as follows-



"Before holding an approval hearing, a Committee to which proposed appointments have been referred shall notify the candidate and the public of the time and place for the holding of the approval hearing at least seven days before the hearing'

In line with Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution of Kenya, Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, of 2011 and Standing Order 45(3) of the National Standing Orders, the Committee in the local daily newspapers of *Daily Nation, The Star* and *The Standard* of Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> February, 2018 notified the public of the date, time and venue of approval hearings as per annexure 4.

#### 2.6. Notification of approval hearings to the nominees

Section 6(3) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, provides as follows:-

'The Clerk shall notify a candidate of the time and place of holding an approval hearing'


The National Assembly Standing Order 45(3) states as follows:-

"Before holding an approval hearing, a Committee to which proposed appointments have been referred shall notify the candidate and the public of the time and place for the holding of the approval hearing at least seven days before the hearing'

Pursuant to Section 6(3) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, and the National Assembly Standing Order 45(3), the Committee by way of letter invited the nominee for approval hearing on Friday, 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2018, at the specified time in the Boardroom on 4<sup>th</sup> Floor, Continental House, Parliament Buildings. Owing to unavoidable circumstances, the venue was changed to Committee Room, 7 in the Main Parliament Building where the approval hearing took place.

#### 2.7. Clearance requirements

By letters dated 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2018, the Clerk of the National Assembly requested for information regarding the nominee from the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Directorate of Criminal Investigation (DCI); the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and the Registrar of Political



Parties (RPP). The information requested sought to establish the status of the nominee on the following issues-

- (i) Integrity
- (ii) Tax compliance
- (iii) Criminal record
- (iv) Educational loan repayment records
- (v) Political parties affiliation

The EACC, KRA, HELB and RPP informed the National Assembly that they did not have any outstanding issues with the nominee as per their letters in annexure 5 The nominee provided a Certificate of Good Conduct issued by the DCI as per annexure 6.

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## 3. <u>ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION DURING THE APPROVAL HEARING</u>

The Committee observed that the issues for consideration are provided for under Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 201 which provides as follows-

The issues for consideration by the relevant House of Parliament in relation to an approval shall be –

- (i) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
- (ii) any Constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question;
- (iii) the suitability of the nominee for appointment proposed with due regard as to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meets the needs of the body to which the nomination is made

#### 3.1. Procedure used to arrive at the nominee

The procedure for appointment of the Solicitor-General is provided for by the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 Section 9(1) and (2) of which states as follows:-


- 9 (1) There shall be a Solicitor-General who shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the National Assembly;
  - (2) The President shall nominate a person for appointment as a Solicitor-General from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission

The Committee observed that the nominee's name was forwarded to the House by His Excellency the President as per annexure 2.

### 3.2. Constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question

#### (i) Qualifications for appointment as Solicitor-General

Section 9(3) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act provides-



- (3) a person shall be qualified for appointment to the Office of the Solicitor General if the person
  - (a) is qualified to hold the office of Judge of a superior court under the Constitution; and
  - (b) meets the requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution

Article 162 (1) of the Constitution defines superior courts as the Supreme Court, the Court of Appeal, the High Court, the Employment & Labour Relations Courts and the Environment & Land Courts.

Article 166(2) provides for the qualifications for appointment as a superior court Judge and states as follows:-

Each judge of a superior court shall be appointed from among persons who-

- (a) hold a law degree from a recognized university or are advocates of the High Court of Kenya, or possess an equivalent qualification in common law jurisdiction;
- (b) possess the experience required under clause (3) to (6) as applicable, irrespective of whether that experience was gained in Kenya or in another Commonwealth common-law jurisdiction; and
- (c) have a high moral character, integrity and impartiality.


Article 166 (3), (4) and (5) provide for the experience that a judge of a superior court must possess:-

#### 1. Chief Justice and Judges of the Supreme Court

- (a) at least fifteen years' experience as a superior court judge;
- (b) at least fifteen years' experience as distinguished academic, judicial officer, legal practitioner or relevant experience in other legal field; and
- (c) held the qualifications specified in paragraph (a) and (b) for a period amounting, in the aggregate to fifteen years.

#### 2. Court of Appeal Judges

(a) at least ten years' experience as a superior court judge;



- (b) at least ten years' experience as a distinguished academic or legal practitioner or such other experience in other relevant field
- (c) held the qualifications specified in paragraph (a) and (b) for a period amounting, in the aggregate to ten years.

#### 2. High Court Judges

- (a) At least ten years' experience as a superior court judge or professionally qualified magistrate
- (b) at least ten years' experience as a distinguished academic or legal practitioner or such other experience in other relevant field
- (c) held the qualifications specified in paragraph (a) and (b) for a period amounting, in the aggregate to ten years.


#### (ii) Leadership and Integrity

While determining the suitability of the nominee for appointment as Solicitor-General, the Committee took into account the provisions of leadership and integrity as provided for by Chapter 6 of the Constitution of Kenya. Most importantly, the Committee took into account the following provisions-

Article 73(2) states as follows-

The guiding principles of leadership and integrity include:-

- (a) Selection on the basis of personal integrity, competence and suitability, or election in a free and fair election;
- (b) Objectivity and impartiality in decision making, and in ensuring that decisions are not influenced by nepotism, favouritism, other improper motives or corrupt practices;
- (c) Selfless service based solely on the public interest demonstrated by:-
  - (i) honesty in the execution of public duties; and
  - (ii) the declaration of any personal interest that may conflict with public duties;
- (d) Accountability to the public for decisions and actions; and



(e) Discipline and commitment in service to the people.

Article 75(1) provides as follows:-

A state officer shall behave, whether in public and official life, in private life, or in association with other persons in a manner that avoids-


- (a) Any conflict between personal interests and public official duties;
- (b) Compromising any public or official interest in favour of personal interest; or
- (c) Demeaning the office the officer holds

Article 75 (3) of the Constitution prohibits any person who has been dismissed or otherwise removed from public office from subsequently holding any other public office.

Article 77 provides restriction on activities of state officers as follows-

- (1) A full time State Officer shall not participate in any other gainful employment;
- (2) Any appointed State Officer shall not hold office in a political party;
- (3) A retired State Officer who is receiving pension from public funds shall not hold more than two concurrent remunerative positions as chairperson, director or employee of
  - (a) A company owned or controlled by the state
  - (b) A State organ
- (4) A State Officer shall not receive remuneration from public funds other than contemplated in clause (3)

Article 78 of the Constitution disqualifies persons who are not Kenya Citizens and persons holding dual citizenship from appointment as state officers.



The Committee undertook due diligence on the nominee to establish his leadership and integrity record. This included obtaining information from relevant government agencies namely: EACC, KRA, HELB,RPP and DCI. The agencies did not have issues with the nominee.

Based on the nominee's submissions before the Committee and the information received from the five (5) government agencies, the Committee was satisfied that the nominee had met the leadership and integrity requirements as set out in Chapter Six (6) of the Constitution. Letters by all relevant government agencies and institutions attesting to his integrity are attached to this report as annexure 5 and 6.

## 3.3. The suitability of the nominee for appointment proposed with due regard as to whether his abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is made

The Committee was of the considered opinion that a nominee's suitability for the position should be evaluated in all relevant areas most importantly, academic credentials, professional training, and work experience and how he responded to questions and issues during the approval hearing.

The Committee's observations, findings and recommendations on the suitability of the nominee are as set out in Part 4-6 of this report.

#### 3.4. Memoranda from the public concerning the nominee

Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act of 2011 provides as follows:-


'Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of candidate to hold the office to which a candidate has been nominated'

On 23<sup>rd</sup> February, 2018, the Clerk of the National Assembly through a newspaper advertisement in the local daily newspapers invited the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath on the suitability of the nominee to hold the position he had been nominated for. The deadline of submitting memoranda was 1<sup>st</sup> March, 2018.

There were no memoranda received contesting the nominee's suitability for appointment. However, the Committee received a



memorandum from one Mr. Wilfred Ngunjiri Nderitu vouching for the nominee's appointment. The memorandum was inadmissible as it was not contesting the suitability of the nominee for appointment as required under Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.



## 4. <u>APPROVAL HEARING ON THE SUITABILITY OF MR. KENNEDY NYABUTI OGETO FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE POSITION OF SOLICITOR-GENERAL</u>

The Committee conducted the approval hearing on 2<sup>nd</sup>March, 2018 in Committee Room 7, Main Parliament Building when the nominee appeared and made submissions on his suitability for appointment. While conducting the hearings, the Committee was most importantly guided by provisions of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act, 2011, which confines examination of nominees to the following areas-

- (i) Academic qualifications;
- (ii) Employment record;
- (iii) Professional affiliations;
- (iv) Potential conflict of interest;
- (v) Knowledge of the relevant subject;
- (vi) Overall suitability for the position;
- (vii) Integrity;
- (viii) Vision and leadership; and
- (ix) Expectations and key priorities.

It should be noted that pursuant to the provisions of Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act, 2011, a questionnaire on criteria for vetting/approval of nominees for appointment was sent to the nominee to be filled and returned. The nominee returned the duly completed questionnaire which is attached to this report as per annexure 7.

While compiling this report, reference has been made to the questionnaire in respect of issues that may not have been discussed during the oral hearing.

#### 4.1. APPROVAL HEARING OF THE NOMINEE

The nominee appeared before the Committee on 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2018 at 10.45 a.m., took oath and after issuing an opening statement responded to questions and issues raised by the Committee as follows-



#### (i) Employment and work experience

He was born in Nyamira County on 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2964. He attended primary and secondary schools in Nyamira before joining Thika High School in Kiambu County for A level. He joined the University of Nairobi in 1986 for a Bachelors' degree in Law and graduated in 1989 with an Upper Second-Class. He graduated with a Masters' of Laws degree from the same University in 2002.

He had practised law for the last twenty-seven (27) years since admission to the Bar in 1991. As at the time of appearance before the Committee, he was a Managing Partner at the law firm of Ogetto, Otachi and Company Advocates. From 1996 to 2006, he was a Defence Counsel at the United Nations International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda. In 2007 and 2008, he was a Defence Counsel at the United National Special Court for Sierra Leone. He had also been a Defence Counsel at the International Criminal Court.

He briefly served at the Attorney-General's Chambers (Kenya Law Reform Commission) immediately after admission to the Bar in 1991. He also served as the Chairman Anti-Money Laundering Advisory Board in 2015 and as at the time of vetting, he was a member of the board of directors of the Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) and Ecobank Kenya Ltd.


#### (ii) Professional Associations' membership

He was a member of the following professional associations:-

- (a) Law Society of Kenya;
- (b) The East African Law Society;
- (c) The International Criminal Law Network;
- (d) Commonwealth Lawyers Association
- (e) Association of Defence Attorneys at the United Nations
- (f) International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda;
- (g) International Criminal Bar; and
- (h) Institute of Certified Public Secretaries of Kenya

## (iii) What he would do to enhance service delivery at the Office of the Attorney General

He submitted that if appointed, he would do the following to enhance service delivery at the Office of the Attorney-General-



- (a) Embrace use of information technology, most importantly to make it possible to register a company within two (2) to three (3) working days;
- (b) Increase capacity of legal staff to handle the huge volume of work;
- (c) Improve terms and conditions of service of State Counsels to reduce their high turnover;
- (d) Attract and retain competent staff especially State Counsels in order to get best results in court cases;
- (e) Reduce litigation against the Government to save on huge sums of money paid as a result of cases against the Government;
- (f) Address the issue of pending bills in respect of cases the Government lost;
- (g) Strengthen relationship with law enforcement agencies;
- (h) Digitize services and processes; and
- (i) Put in place systems to address the issue of corruption.


## (iv) Why he wants to leave the private sector and take up the position of Solicitor-General in the public service which has many challenges

He stated that having worked in the private sector for many years, time had come for him to also serve in the public service. As an Advocate of the High Court of Kenya, he also experienced challenges in private practice. He was aware of challenges in the Office of the Attorney-General and he was up to the task serving in the position of Solicitor-General because of the following-

- (a) His experiences State Counsel as result of which he understood opportunities and challenges faced on the job;
- (b) His litigation practice and experience as State Counsel had laid ground for him to provide operational leadership;
- (c) His experience as a Board member of reputable institutions like the KPA and Ecobank Kenya Ltd had prepared him for the new job if appointed;
- (d) He had the energy, drive and vision required to transform the Office of the Attorney-General into a more effective and efficient Office.

#### (v) On responsiveness to oversight institutions

He submitted that if appointed, he would inculcate the spirit of cooperation and constructive engagement between the Office of the Attorney-General and oversight institutions such as Parliament, EACC



and Office of the Auditor-General with a view to ensuring enhanced oversight.

#### (vi) On managing potential conflict of interest

He informed the Committee that if appointed, he would-

- (a) He would resign as a board member of KPA and Ecobank Kenya Ltd;
- (b) Discharge duty with integrity and fidelity to the constitution to avoid any potential conflict of interest.

#### (vii) Political activities and affiliations

He stated that he was not a member, an affiliate or an official of a political party.

#### (viii) On intergovernmental relations

He averred that the National and County Governments were interdependent and that it was important for them to cooperate and consult on issues for the purposes of enhancing relations. If appointed, he would enhance relations between the Office of the Attorney-General and the counties by-

- (a) Seconding Legal Counsels to each of the fourty seven (47) counties to assist in legal work; and
- (b) Training the counties on legal affairs with a view to enhancing capacity.

## (ix) On the role of the Office of the Attorney-General and the realization of Vision 2030

He informed the Committee that a conducive business environment was key in the realization of Vision 2030. Towards a conducive business environment, the Office of the Attorney-General would ensure legislation is developed for enactment by Parliament.

## (x) On delayed disposal of cases by the Advocates <u>Disciplinary Tribunal (ADT) chaired by the Solicitor</u> <u>General</u>

He admitted that there were close to four thousand (4,000) cases pending before the Advocates Disciplinary Tribunal which was of concern to the public considering that litigants had lost money in the

hands of Advocates. He attributed this to serious capacity and financial issues and submitted that if appointed, he would take action to address the issues to ensure service delivery.

### (xi) On the Advocates Training Programme and mass exam failure at the Kenya School of Law

He acknowledged that there was mass exam failure at the Kenya School of Law and submitted that the underlying issues for the mass failure were complex. He observed that during his time at the School, a class had 80 students whereas currently, a class has 1,500 students.

He submitted that if appointed, he would ensure the Council of Legal Education (CLE) takes the following steps to remedy the situation:-

- (a) Relook at the facilities available vis a viz the capacity to provide quality education;
- (b) Put checks and balances to ensure that only quality students are admitted to the school


## (xii) On the cases against the Government of Kenya and why the Government lost cases

He submitted that the Government of Kenya was a defendant in five (5) cases in International Arbitration Courts in which it could end up paying billions of USD if it lost, the effect of which would be significant on the economy. These cases would have been avoided if there was proper coordination between various contracting agencies and the Office of the Attorney General.

He informed the Committee that in many instances, the Government lost cases because Ministries and Departments failed to furnish the Office of the Attorney-General with proper instructions and evidence to support cases.

If appointed, he would institute measures to reduce litigation against the Government to the bare minimum. To achieve this, he would ensure strict compliance to Section 19 of the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 which requires all Government Agencies to seek opinion of the Attorney General on matters raising substantial legal or constitutional issues.

He would also initiate enactment of legislation to provide for sanctions against public officers who fail, refuse or neglect to cooperate with the




Office of the Attorney-General in providing instructions and evidence for cases involving them.

#### (xiii) The nominee's net worth

From the questionnaire, the Committee observed that his net worth was approximately Kenya Shillings three hundred and fifty million (Kshs.350,000,000).



### 5. <u>COMMITTEE</u> <u>OBSERVATIONS</u>, <u>FINDINGS</u> <u>AND</u> <u>CONCLUSIONS</u>

Upon hearing the nominee and examining his CV, certificates and testimonials, the Committee made the following observations, findings and conclusions about him:-

- (1) His academic credentials and professional training and experience are in compliance with the qualifications for appointment as Solicitor-General as set out under Section 9(3) of the Office of the Attorney-General Act, 2012 because-
  - (a) He holds a Masters' and Bachelors' degrees in Law from the University of Nairobi;
  - (b) He has over twenty-seven (27) years' experience as a legal practitioner having served in the Office of the Attorney-General and private practice;
  - (c) He is a person of high moral character, integrity and impartiality;
  - (d) He has not attained the age of seventy (70) years;
  - (e) He is qualified to hold the office of judge of a superior court as outlined in Article 166(2) of the Constitution;
- (2) His experience in both the public and private sector would add value to the Office of the Solicitor-General if appointed;
- (3) There was no memorandum received contesting his nomination and suitability for appointment;
- (4) He satisfied Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution because he is a Kenyan Citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
- (5) There would be no potential conflict of interest as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution should the nominee be appointed to the position;
- (6) He had never been dismissed or otherwise removed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution;




- (7) He satisfied the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity as DCI, KRA, RPP, HELB and EACC did not raise any issues against him;
- (8) He had never been charged with a criminal offence in a Court of Law;
- (9) He had not been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of Parliament or any other Commission of Inquiry in the last three (3) years;
- (10) He satisfied the requirements of Article 77(2) of the Constitution because he did not hold an office in a political party;
- (11) He had never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Article 75(1) on conflict of interest, Article 76 on financial probity, Article 77 on restriction of State Officers and Article 78(2) on dual citizenship;
- (12) He exhibited knowledge and understanding of the mandate and other pertinent issues relating to the Office of the Solicitor-General.




#### 6. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION
