1.0 PREFACE

Hon. Speaker,

The Departmental Committee on Education and Research is established under the National Assembly Standing Order 216.

1.1 Mandate of the Committee

- ix) consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
- x) examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate

1.3 Committal of Petition

Pursuant to Standing Order 220 and Section 4 (1) (a) of the Petition to Parliament (Procedure) Act, 2012, Mr. Njoroge Waweru on 2nd May 2018 presented a Public Petition to the National Assembly on Sweeping Reforms on Kenya's Public Universities (ANNEX 1).

The Petition was referred to the Departmental Committee on Education and Research pursuant to Standing Order 227 for consideration.

The Petitioner drew the attention of the National Assembly to the following:

1. That there is a serious sustained crisis afflicting the higher education sector which if not urgently and holistically addressed, many public universities will soon collapse and the reputation of Kenya's education system will be greatly jeopardised.

- 2. That the magnitude of the crisis at hand is so ubiquitous, entrenched, and astounding that the attention of the Ministry of Education, however well-meaning seems not to suffice in arresting it.
- 3. That the propulsion of the higher education expansion having reposed to meretriciously, it can never be so opportune than now to ask all questions on what really happened to the sector.
- 4. That the matter raised in the petition is not pending in any court of law but the Ministry of Education has since 2012 employed a number of legislative and administrative interventions which unfortunately have not yielded any reforms in higher education.
- 5. That the Cabinet Secretary for Education has since conceded that public universities are confronted with multiple challenges like poor management and low academic output.

The Petitioner prayed that the National Assembly deliberates on the crisis in higher education as a matter of national importance and pass a resolution of the House forming an inquiry composed of the most accomplished university administrators from the world's most acclaimed universities to investigate among others:

- (i) The administration of universities.
- (ii) The criterion of recruiting Vice-Chancellors and other university administrators.
- (iii) The modus operandi of appointing university council members and the value council members lend to the universities.
- (iv) The regulatory regime giving oversight to universities in Kenya.
- (v) Academic programmes and facilities.
- (vi) Status, quality and fate of module II programmes.
- (vii) Supervision of PhD students.
- (viii) Capacity and adequacy of faculty.
- (ix) Research output.
- (x) Publishing; and,
- (xi) Management of resources.

1.4 Committee Proceedings

The Petition was placed before the Departmental Committee on Education and Research Sub-Committee on University Education. In considering the Petition, the Sub-Committee held a total of four (4) sittings. The Petitioner appeared before the Sub-Committee on 3rd July, 2018. During the Sittings, the Sub-Committee received oral and written submissions from the Petitioner. The Sub-Committee thereafter considered and deliberated on the Prayers by the Petitioner.

The records of evidence adduced, documents and notes received by the Sub-Committee form the basis of the Committee's observations/findings and recommendations as outlined in the Report and can be obtained in the Parliamentary Library.

2.0 CONSIDERATION OF THE PETITION

The Petitioner, Mr. Njoroge Waweru appeared before the Sub-Committee on University Education on 3rd July 2018 and presented his Prayers that the National Assembly deliberates on the crisis facing higher education as a matter of national importance and pass a resolution of the House to form an inquiry composed of the most accomplished university administrators from the world's most acclaimed universities to investigate among others:

- (i) The administration of public universities in Kenya.
- (ii) The criterion of recruiting Vice-Chancellors and other university administrators.
- (iii) The modus operandi of appointing university council members and the value council members lend to the universities.
- (iv) The regulatory regime giving oversight to universities in Kenya.
- (v) Academic programmes and facilities.
- (vi) Status quality and fate of module II programmes.
- (vii) Supervision of PhD students.
- (viii) Capacity and adequacy of faculty.
- (ix) Research output.
- (x) Publishing; and,
- (xi) Management of resources.

3.0 COMMITTEE'S OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS

The Committee observed that:

- 1. The Petitioner failed to provide evidence and facts to support his allegations that public universities in Kenya are under a serious crisis ranging from poor administration, absence of a clear procedure of recruiting University Chancellors, Vice-Chancellors, University Council members and other university administrators.
- Further the Petitioner could not prove his averment that the regulatory regime giving oversight to university academic programmes, facilities, quality of module II programmes, supervision of PhD students and management of university resources amongst others is weak and ineffective.
- 3. The Universities Act, 2012 with proposed amendments in the Statute Law (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill, 2018, National Assembly Bills No. 12, currently before the National

Assembly, provides clear guidelines on the criteria of recruitment, appointment and tenure of office of University Council, Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor or Deputy Vice Chancellor of a public university or Principal or Deputy Principal of a constituent college.

- 4. The Commission for University Education as established by the Universities Act, No. 42 of 2012 regulates the quality of university education through setting standards, issuing guidelines and monitoring compliance to achieve global competitiveness by:
 - (i) Setting and assuring standards relevant in the quality of university education, including the promotion and maintenance of internationally recognized standards;
 - (ii) Monitoring and evaluating the state of university education systems in relation to the national development goals;
 - (iii) Undertaking regular inspections, monitoring and evaluation of universities to ensure compliance with the provisions of Universities Act, 2012 or any relevant regulations;
 - (iv) Promoting quality research and innovation; and,
 - (v) Accrediting universities and ensuring that the institutions concerned have adequate physical, human and financial resources, and offer viable, quality and relevant academic programmes including module II programmes.

4.0 COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the above observations and findings on the consideration of the Prayers of the Petitioner, the Committee **rejects** the Prayer of forming a commission of inquiry to investigate the alleged crisis facing university education in Kenya as presented by the Petitioner and recommends as follows:

- 1. The Commission for University Education should continuously address the need to regulate, coordinate and assure the highest quality in university education as a result of growth and expansion of the university sub sector in Kenya.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellors of various universities should ensure that their respective universities promote the highest standards of teaching and learning and institutionalize internal quality assurance mechanisms in academic programmes and management of university resources. Universities should only offer those programmes that are commensurate with the institutional accreditation status and meet the set standards.
