CHAIR'S FOREWORD

The petition regarding human-wildlife conflict in Meru County was tabled before the House by the County Women Representative for Meru County the Hon. Florence Kajuju, M.P. pursuant to Standing Order 227 (1). The Petition was committed to the departmental committee on Environment and Natural Resources for consideration and response to the petitioners as provided for under the Standing Orders. The Petition prayed that the National Assembly through the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources intervenes and stop the conflict between human and wildlife through erection of

The Committee in its investigations, held several meetings with various stakeholders who included officials of the Kenya Wildlife Service and the Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources. The Committee also carried out a fact finding visit to some select areas in Meru County deemed to be human- wildlife conflict hotspot areas where it held meetings with the residents.

The Committee wishes to register its appreciation to the offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the support accorded to the Committee in the execution of its mandate.

Finally, it is my pleasant duty, on behalf of the Departmental Committee on Environment and Natural Resources to present this Report to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 227 (2).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report has considered and responded to the prayers presented by the residents of Meru County regarding human - wildlife conflict in Meru County. The Petition prayed that the committee recommends erection of a fence along the human - wildlife conflict hotspots and also recommends that the Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources compensates all the victims of human-wildlife conflict. The Committee found out that the prayers of the petitioners were valid given the increased cases of human-wildlife conflict and further since the Wildlife Conservation & Management Act, 2013 provided for compensation of victims of human-wildlife conflict.

The report details presentations by the Petitioner, Hon. Florence Kajuju, M.P who informed the Committee that human-wildlife conflict had resulted to destruction of crops, injuries and even death. The Committee also met officials the Kenya Wildlife Service and the Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources who stressed on the need to erect a fence to prevent wildlife from leaving the forest to invade homesteads and farms.

The Committee recommends that the Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) should include in their budget Kshs. 100 million to complete the 34 KM remaining part of the fence. The Committee also recommends that the Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources should clear all pending bills of Kshs. 4.8 billion on compensation to victims of human-wildlife conflict, some of these funds should go towards offsetting all the pending claims in Meru County.

COMMITTEE MANDATE

The Committee is established pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 216, with the following terms of reference:

- Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments;

- 3. Study and review all legislation referred to it;
- 4. Study, access and analyze the relative success of the Ministries and Departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with its stated objectives;
- 5. Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
- Vet and report on all appointments where the constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204; and
- 7. Make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation.

The Committee oversees issues to do with climate change, environment management and conservation, forestry, water resource management, wildlife, mining and natural resources, pollution and waste management amongst others.

PRAYERS

The petitioners prayers were that the National Assembly, through the Departmental Committee on Environment and Natural resources:

- Recommends the erection of an electric fence covering the entire park and provision of additional forest stations and wardens;
- 2. Recommends that the ministry of Environment and natural resources puts in place mechanisms to ensure human and wildlife conflict ceases forthwith;
- 3. Recommends the qualification and compensation of victims of human- wildlife conflict and such other affected person, and / or families and properties as a result of the damages suffered due to the massive destruction of homes and crops and loss of life; and
- 4. Makes any other order or direction that fits in the circumstances of the case.

RESPONSE TO PRAYERS

Following meetings held and evidence gathered, the Committee responds as follows:

- The Kenya Wildlife Service should include in their budget Kshs. 100 million to complete the remaining 34 KM stretch that remains unfenced, further the agency should consider engaging community wardens as a local solution to enhancing the capacity of rangers and to boost response rate;
- The National Treasury should allocate Kshs. 4.8 billion requested by the Committee in its Report on the estimates for the Financial Year 2016/2017. The funds will go towards offsetting pending claims of compensation for victims of human-wildlife conflict;
- The Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources should clear all pending bills amounting to Kshs. 4.8 billion on compensation to victims of human wildlife conflict, some of these funds should go towards offsetting all the pending claims in Meru County; and
- KWS should explore a partnership with the Nyayo Tea Zones to plant a belt of 100
 Metres next to the forest to act as a buffer zone to prevent elephants from leaving the
 forest.

1.0 Introduction

On Thursday, 3rd December, 2015, the County Women Representative for Meru County, the Hon. Florence Kajuju, MP presented a petition on behalf of residents of her county regarding human wildlife conflict.

The petition sought to draw the attention of the House to the following:-

- Residents of Meru County have been engaged in human and wildlife conflict for a long period;
- 2. Recently over 300 stray elephants trampled down fences, ruined farmlands and damaged crops and homes, caused injuries and loss of life;
- 3. The residents of Meru County have suffered extreme crop loss and destruction, hunger, and suffering;
- 4. There remains deep anxiety and fear in Kithoka, Nkunga and Tigania West areas and other parts of the larger Meru County due to the continued wanton destruction of crops by the elephants;
- 5. The Kenya Wildlife Service wardens take a long duration to respond to the residents' distress. Concerned that only twenty kilometers(20 km) of the entire park area is fenced hence making it easier for the animals to stray more often;

The petitioners prayers were that the National Assembly, through the departmental committee on Environment and Natural resources:

- 1. Recommends the erection of an electric fence covering the entire park and provision of additional forest stations and wardens;
- 2. Recommends that the ministry of Environment and natural resources puts in place mechanisms to ensure human and wildlife conflict ceases forthwith:
- Recommends the qualification and compensation of victims of human- wildlife conflict and such other affected person, and / or families and properties as a result of the damages suffered due to the massive destruction of homes and crops and loss of life; and
- 4. Makes any other order or direction that fits in the circumstances of the case.

2.0 Evidence

Having been seized of the Petition, the Committee commenced its consideration by meeting the petitioner and residents of Meru County on diverse dates. During the meetings, written and oral evidence was adduced as recorded hereunder:

2.1 Meeting with the County Women Representative for Meru, the Hon. Florence Kajuju, M.P

The Hon. Kajuju appeared before the Committee on 28th April, 2016 and informed the Committee that the destruction of crops had forced the residents of Meru County to rely on relief food which should not be the case, given that the area is very agricultural productive area. The Member informed the Committee that erection of the electric fence for Meru game reserve has not been done because the Ministry of Environment and Natural resources has not provided their share of the money.

She further stated that the problem of human wildlife conflict was a major catastrophe that needed the urgent attention of the National Government and the County Government. She therefore impressed on the Committee to find a lasting solution to the problem to avoid further damage of crops mostly caused by the Elephants;

The Honourable Member also requested the Committee to recommend that the Kenya Wildlife Service undertakes more Corporate Social Responsibility activities (CSR) in the area for the residents to reap the benefits of having a national park in their neighbourhood.

2.2 Fact Finding Visit to Meru County

On 26th May, 2016, five Members of the Committee comprising the following carried out a field visit to Meru County:

- 1. Hon. Chachu Ganya, M.P.- Chairperson/Leader of the Delegation
- 2. Hon. Kathuri Murungi, M.P.
- 3. Hon. Isaac Mwaura, M.P.
- 4. Hon. Emanikor Joyce, M.P.
- 5. Hon. Tonui Ronald, M.P.

During the visit, the Committee held a meeting with officials of Kenya Wildlife Service and the Ministry of Environment and Natural Resources and later received submissions by residents of Meru County.

2.2.1 Submission by Mr. Simon Gitau, Head of Eastern Conservation Area, Kenya Wildlife Service

Mr. Gitau submitted that Imenti Forest Reserve covers 17,713 hectares. It covers parts of Meru Sub counties: Imenti central, Imenti North, Tigania East, Tigania West, Buuri and Maara. The hot spot areas for human wildlife conflict were the following: Nkunga, Maili Kumi, Nchoroiboro, Kamatune, Themba, Kithoka, Naari and Mbeu areas. Reported cases were on Human death, Human injuries, Crop destruction, Property damages and Elephant mortalities/ injuries through electrocution.

He informed the committee that 47 cases of human-wildlife conflict were compensated between the year 2010 and 2014, however in the Financial Year 2015/2016 no deaths were compensated. He further stated that there are a number of Corporate Social responsibilities going on in the area by KWS which included building of classrooms and school halls. Mr. Gitau informed the committee that the Community, local leadership and KWS were collaborating in the conservation of wildlife and the forest.

Mr Gitau presented the following table of reported cases of human-wildlife conflict:

2.2.2 Meeting at the Meru University Multi-Purpose Hall

The following made submissions to the Committee:

1. Mr. John Marage

Mr. Marage informed the Committee that Meru County has six forests and the elephants were always leaving the forests to look for food at farms. The residents spent most of their nights awake chasing elephants and this had affected school going children and also the general health of the residents. He also informed the meeting that other than elephants there were other wild animals such as leopards that had also been attacking the residents and eating their livestock and therefore urged the committee to look for other means to prevent human/wildlife conflict since the attacks by wild animals cannot be prevented by ordinary fences.

2. Mrs. Martha Karume

Ms. Karume informed the meeting that farmers in the area have had their crops had destroyed by elephants and had no food for their children yet there was no compensation forthcoming. The water pipes are also destroyed by the elephants and she suggested that there was need to fence and employ local youth as KWS wardens to assist in enhancing the capacity of KWS.

3. Mr. James Ikunyua

Mr. Ikunyua informed the Committee that the elephants normally destroy their coffee, nuts, potatoes, pawpaw among others crops. The matter was reported to the KWS but nothing was forthcoming. As a result there was likelihood of starvation in the area and increased school dropout as students were afraid of going to school due to fear of attack by elephants.

He urged the Committee to ensure a permanent solution to the matter that was sought so as to avoid the matter getting out of hand. He further submitted that residents were threatening the killing of Elephants should they destroy their crops again. He called upon the KWS to take stock of all animals living in the forest so as to ensure better monitoring.

General concerns of the residents

The community had the following general concerns:

- They would want solutions to prevent death and destruction
- There should be animals designated routes for passage of animals;
- Leaders, both levels of governments and all other stakeholders;
- ♣ There is need for the local communities to be empowered to participate in conservation efforts;
- There is need to educate the public on the procedures for claiming compensation since there is a lot of expenses involved from one office to another;
- ♣ There is need for KWS wardens to engage the community in conservation and train community on how to live with the animals and create complains office nearby;

2.2.3 Meeting at Kithoka

The following made submissions to the Committee:

1. Mr. John Mugambi, Chairman Constituency Fencing committee

Mr. Mugambi informed the Committee that Rhino Ark foundation had partnered with KWS and the area Member of Parliament through the Constituency development fund and constructed 20km fence and therefore requested the completion of the fencing and its maintenance. He thanked the residents who provided support to the fencing initiatives by digging holes.

2. Mr. Daniel Gitau, a victim of attack by elephants

Mr. Gitau informed the Committee that he had been hospitalized for three months and despite forwarding the necessary papers to the County Wildlife Conservation and Compensation Committee nothing was forthcoming. He requested that the Committee fast tracks compensations to all victims.

2.2.4 Meeting at Nkunga Catholic Church

The following made submissions to the Committee:

1. Prof. Judi Njue, Representative of the Women

Prof. Njue stated that human beings have more value than elephant and therefore urged that the fence should be electric. She also recommended use of solar to power high beam lights along the roads as the light would repulse the elephants.

2. Mr. Benson Muthomi, Representative of the Youth

Mr. Muthomi informed the meeting that, no farming had taken place that season due to the previous destruction of crops by elephants which demoralized the farmers. He further informed the meeting that a resident had also been killed by elephants and his family was still awaiting compensation. Finally, he submitted that there was poor performance by children in schools in the County due to disrupted sleep at night hence sleeping in class or missing classes altogether for fear of attack and therefore requested that KWS station should be set up in the area.

3. Dr. Peter Rwanda, Member of the Nchuri Ncheke Council of Elders

He urged the committee to come up with both short and long term solutions to deal with the issue of human-wildlife conflict. The resident's income from farming has been affected therefore the residents could meet their needs, most parents had school fees arrears. He requested the Committee to ensure the all the victims were compensated as soon as possible.

3.0 Observations

The Committee made the following observations from evidence adduced in the meetings:

- 1. There was need to put up a permanent electric fence as attacks by elephants had caused immense destruction and even deaths in the area;
- 2. The leadership in the human-wildlife conflict hotspot areas has through the Constituency Development Fund allocated funds to KWS towards fencing while the residents had provided labour towards this cause. This shows that the goodwill and sense of cooperation in dealing with this problem;
- 3. The claims for compensation have been forwarded to the Ministry of Environment however no compensation has been done since January 2015 to date; and
- 4. There is need to have budgetary allocation for the maintenance of the fence once it was erected.

4.0 Recommendations/ Response to prayers of the Petitioners

The petitioners prayers were that the National Assembly, through the departmental committee on Environment and Natural resources:

- Recommends the erection of an electric fence covering the entire park and provision of additional forest stations and wardens;
- 2. Recommends that the ministry of Environment and natural resources puts in place mechanisms to ensure human and wildlife conflict ceases forthwith:
- Recommends the qualification and compensation of victims of human- wildlife
 conflict and such other affected person, and / or families and properties as a result of
 the damages suffered due to the massive destruction of homes and crops and loss of
 life and
- 4. Makes any other order or direction that fits in the circumstances of the case.

The meeting was called to order at 10.30 am after which prayers were said. The chair then welcomed the members to the meeting.

MIN. NO. DC/ENR/099/2016 – PRESENTATION BY HON. FLORENCE KAJUJU REGARDING THE PETITION HUMAN WILDLIFE CONFLICT IN MERU COUNTY.

Hon. Florence Kajuju M.P presented a petition on behalf of the residents of Kithoka, Nkunga, and Tigania West and other Parts of Meru County and drew the attention of the Members to the following-

- I. THAT, residents of the Meru County have been dealing with human-wildlife conflict for a long period;
- II. THAT, recently over 300 stray elephants trampled down fences, ruined farmlands and damaged crops and homes, caused injuries and loss of life;
- III. THAT, the residents of Meru county have suffered extreme crop loss and destruction;
- IV. THAT, there remains deep anxiety and fear in Kathioka,Nkunga and Tigania West areas and other parts of the larger Meru County due to the continued wanton destruction of crops by the elephants.
- V. THAT, the Kenya wildlife service wardens take a long duration to respond to the residents' distress. Concerned that, only twenty kilometers (20Km) of the entire park area is fenced hence making it easier for the animals to stray more often;
- VI. THAT, the matter presented in this petition is not pending before any constitutional or legal body.

The petitioners prayers were that the National Assembly, through the departmental committee on Environment and Natural resources:-

- i.) Recommends the erection of an electric fence covering the entire park and provision of additional forest stations and wardens.
- ii. Recommends that the ministry of Environment and natural resources puts in place mechanisms to ensure human and wildlife conflict ceases forthwith;

- iii. Recommends the qualification and compensation of victims of human- wildlife conflict and such other affected person, and / or families and properties as a result of the damages suffered due to the massive destruction of homes and crops and loss of life and
- iv. Makes any other order or direction that fits in the circumstances of the case.

In addition Hon. Kajuju, M.P said that, the destruction of crops had forced the residents of Meru County to rely of relief food which should not be the case, given that the area is very agricultural productive area; further, she informed the Committee that the electric fence for Meru game reserve has not been done because the Ministry of Environment and Natural resources has not provided their share of the money.

Submission by Hon. Kubai Iringo, M.P., Member of Parliament for Igembe Central Constituency

Hon. Iringo, M.P while supporting the Petition informed the Committee that wildlife has been destroying crops and properties and despite reporting the matter to KWS on various occasions nothing has been done so far. Further, he requested the Committee should fast track compensation to victims of the Human-wildlife conflict;

More rangers to be deployed to the area;

COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS;

- i. The county conservation and compensation committee in Meru county should have addressed all complains of the Meru residents.
- ii. There is need to prioritize electric fencing and maintenance of it to avoid compensation cost.
- iii. The committee will organize field visit to the affected areas to assess the damage and affected residents for a conclusive report.

RE: SUBMISSIONS TO THE PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES ON HUMAN-WILDLIFE CONFLICT: CASE OF IGOJI WEST WARD

Allow me to begin by sincerely thanking the Chair all the members and particularly Hon. Kajuju for the great job this committee is meant to do to alleviate the suffering of the people constantly suffering from Human Animal Conflict. Igoji West is one of the areas adversely affected by wildlife. It is our prayer that when the committee sits down to do a report and when the National Parliament sits to pass the report; the following will be put into consideration.

- 1. The government to stop immediately burning of ivory. It makes no sense to us as people affected by elephants when there is no compensation but we see ivory being burnt. We wonder what happens to elephants that die naturally why can't that ivory be sold under license, then the proceeds are used to employ youth as Rangers who can protect the living elephants? For that way we would both conserve and create employment.
- 2. In Turkana and other areas, residents benefit from natural resources like oil. How come our people do not have any known direct benefit from our forests? We want the government to allow local communities to harvest trees that are old fallen and just rotting in the forest. We have bamboo that could create employment for our youth but the system has made it unavailable to the people. This should be facilitated. We want the government to start a bamboo processing factory in the area, that way we will feel part of this country.
- 3. We have many natural salt links and sparkling water (mwonyo) in the forest, the government should facilitate in establishment of bottling and marketing of this product to create employment.
- 4. Finally we want a University or a natural resources exploitation training center built in the area. The Ndunguru area should not be fenced together with the rest of the forest. It should be set apart for this purpose.



- (i) THAT, following the tragic political violence that engulfed Kenya in the aftermath of the disputed 2007 elections, the people of Kenya embarked upon comprehensive reforms aimed at ensuring Kenya transitioned into a peaceful, prosperous, stable, inclusive and democratic country where such violence did not reoccur;
- (ii) THAT, one of the measures adopted to address long-term issues that had contributed to the violence was the setting up of the Truth, Justice and Reconciliation Commission with a mandate to promote peace, justice, national unity, healing, and reconciliation among the people of Kenya by *inter alia* inquiring into gross violations of human and historical injustices that occurred in Kenya from 12 December 1963 and 28 February 2008;
- (iii)THAT, the TJRC recorded over 40,000 statements and memoranda and held public hearing across the country, concluded its work and handed over the Report to H.E the President, Hon. Uhuru Kenyatta, EGH on 21st May 2013;
- (iv)THAT, according to the Truth, Justice and Reconciliation Commission Act, the Minister was to table the TJRC Report in Parliament and operationalize the implementation mechanism in accordance with the recommendations of the Commission under section 48 (2) (f) of the Act to monitor the implementation of the recommendations of the Commission and to facilitate their implementation;
- (v) THAT, according to Section 49(3) of the TJRC Act, the implementation of the report of the Commission should have commenced within six months upon its publication;

- (vii) THAT, to-date National Assembly has not considered the report of the TJRC, while the victims and survivors of gross human rights violations continue to suffer;
- (viii) THAT, National Assembly's inability to prioritize, debate and act on the TJRC report is a source of great frustration for thousands of Kenyans still nursing injuries; physical, emotional and psychological from the dark years of our history;
- (ix) THAT the issues in respect of which this petition is made are not pending before any court of law, or constitutional or legal body;

HEREFORE, your humble petitioners Pray that the National Assembly –

- 1. That the National Assembly consider prioritizing for debate the Report of the Truth, Justice and Reconciliation Commission that has been pending before the House since 24th July 2013 without further delay;
- 2. That in addition to adopting the TJRC report, the National Assembly enacts necessary legislation requisite to anchor the implementation process in law;
- 3. That the National Assembly allocates sufficient budget for the immediate and effective implementation of the recommendations contained in report, in particular reparation of victims; and
- 4. That the National Assembly mandates the relevant Committee of the House to monitor the comprehensive and effective implementation of the TJRC Report.

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MIN. 48/85:- ADDRESS FROM THE CHAIR:-

The meeting was called to order at 1125 hrs. The Chairman started by thanking all the members who had come to attend the meeting.

MIN. 49/85:- CONFIRMATION OF PREVIOUS MINUTES:-

After the members went unrough the minutes of the previous meeting, they confirmed them as true record of what was discussed.

MIN. 50/85; - MATTERS ARISING FROM THE PREVIOUS MINUTES:-

EX. HIN. 38/86:- COMPENSATION OF FARMERS, IN TEA ZONES:-

The Warden informed the meeting that he had consulted the forest Department regarding the manner in which people are allocated plots to cultivate in the forest. The Forester had informed him that, those people are given plots purely on temporary, basis. One condition is that they cultivate it at their own risk as the forest is the home of wildlife and they risk losing crops to them. The question of compensating them does not arise. The warden further informed the-meeting that the Director had been informed accordingly.

At this juncture the Chairman made a clarification to members that, thy processing claim forms through the Committee, it did not mean that payment was ready now. He applealed to all members to inform the claimants that, after the forms have been passed by the Committee it is now up to the government to pay them when funds were available.

MIN. 51/85:- CONSIDERATION OF HUMAN (DEATH) CLAIMS:-

The Committee was informed that the two death claims which were passed in the previous meeting was returned from Nairobi, because it did not go along with the minutes of the meeting. They were excluded because the r.O.H. had not signed them. When he signed them they were sent separately by a covering letter which was not proper. They were returned for minuting. They were passed and are attached on Schedule 1.

The members were concerned with how much a person is compensated when he dies. The meeting felt that the Sh. 29,000/= paid as maximum compensation on death was toollittle. They called on law makers to revise the Workmens! Compensation act to increase compensation on human life.

All forms presented for consideration were approved and passed for payment. They are attached on schedule no. 11.

The Chairman thanked all members who had come to attend the meeting especially the m.O.H. He stressed that compensation for human life should be taken with great consideration as it involves the dependents of the deceased. He requisted the M.O.H. to attend these meetings frequently so that if there are death claims of human beings they should be presed immediately.

There being no other business, the meeting closed at 1315 PM.

I visited the farm on 18th November 2013 and found the following crops destroyed:

- Bananas 10 stools
- ➤ Maize 0.5 acres
- Napier 0.125 acres
- Terraces 13m

ESTIMATED VALUE

- 1. Bananas: 10 stools producing 4 bunches per year, selling at 250/-=10,000/-
- 2. Maize: 0.5 acres producing 30 bags, selling at 2,500/- =11,400/-
- Napier: 0.125 acres giving 2 tons/year, selling at 1000/- per ton

- 4. Terraces: 13 m repair/maintenance at 300/- per m = 3,900/-
