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#### **CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD**

Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution provides that, "Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees". Standing Order 127 (3) provides that "the Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and take into account the views and recommendations of the public when the Committee makes its report to the House".

The Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021) introduced by Hon. Alfred Kiptoo Keter, MP underwent First Reading on 9<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 and was committed to the Departmental Committee on Health for consideration and reporting to the House.

This report contain the deliberations on the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill. Most importantly, the Bill seeks to amend the Pharmacy and Poisons Act to prohibit the sale or dispensing of medicine without a written prescription from a registered health practitioner. This is aimed at safeguarding the health of all Kenyans and encouraging them to always seek medical attention from qualified health practitioners, notwithstanding that an ailment may be considered as minor.

Following placement of advertisements in the print media on 11<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 requesting for comments on the Bill from members of the public and relevant stakeholders pursuant the provisions to Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3), the Committee received memoranda from five (5) stakeholders, namely- the Ministry of Health, Kenya Pharmaceutical Association, Pharmaceutical Society of Kenya, Mwalimu Muthisya and Astone Ashioya. The public participation meetings was held via the ZOOM video online platform on the 13<sup>th</sup> July, 2021.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Health and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 199 (6), it is my pleasant privilege and honour to present to this House the Report of the Committee on its consideration of the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021). The Committee is grateful to the Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical and technical support accorded to it during its sittings. The Committee further wishes to thank all stakeholders who submitted their comments on the Bill. Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the Honourable Members of the Committee and the Committee Secretariat who played significant role in preparation and production of their report.

It is my pleasure to report that the Committee has considered the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021) and have the honour to table in the House the Committee's report on the Bill with recommendations that the House passes it with ammendments as proposed.

#### PART I

#### 1 PREFACE

#### 1.1 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE COMMITTEE

- 1. The Departmental Committee on Health is established pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 216 of the National Assembly and in line with Article 124 of the Constitution which provides for the establishment of the Committees by Parliament. The mandate and functions of the Committee are:
  - a) Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments;
  - b) Study the programme and policy objectives of the Ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;
  - c) Study and review all legislation referred to it;
  - d) Study, assess and analyze the relative success of the Ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with its stated objectives;
  - e) Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
  - f) Vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204;
  - fa) Examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
  - g) Make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
  - h) Consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
  - i) Examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate

#### **PART II**

### 2.0 OVERVIEW OF THE PHARMACY AND POISONS (AMENDMENT) BILL, NATIONAL ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1 OF 2021

#### 2.1 ANALYSIS OF THE BILL

6. The Bill seels to amend the Pharmacy and Poisons Act to prohibit the sale or dispensing of medicine without a written prescription from a registered health practitioner. This aims to safeguard the health of all Kenyans and encourage them to always seek medical attention from qualified health practitioners, notwithstanding that an ailment may be considered minor. The sale of over the counter medication has always encouraged self-diagnosis of ailments without the benefit of medical advice from a health or medical practitioner. This endangers the lives of those who may consume harmful medication, suffer adverse reactions or even develop drug resistance owing to abuse or misuse of certain medications like antibiotics.

#### Proposed amendments

Amendment of Section 19 of Cap 224

- 7. Clause 2: Section 19 of the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Act is amended by deleting subsection (5) and substituting therefor, the following new subsections
  - (5) A person shall not sell or dispense medicine to another person without a prescription signed by a registered health practitioner, medical practitioner, dentist or veterinary surgeon.
  - (6) Any person who contravenes subsection (5) shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable upon conviction to a fine not exceeding thirty thousand shillings or to imprisonment to a term not exceeding three years or both

#### **PART III**

### 3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND STAKEHOLDER ENGANGEMENT ON THE BILL

8. Following placement of advertisements in the print media on 11<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 seeking views on the Bill from Membbers of the Public and relevant stakeholders pursuant the provisions of the Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3), the Committee received memoranda from only five (5) stakeholders i.e. the Ministry of Health, Kenya Pharmaceutical Association, Pharmaceutical Society of Kenya, Mwalimu Muthisya and Astone Ashioya. The Public participation exercise was held virtually on 13<sup>th</sup> July, 2021.

#### MINISTRY OF HEALTH

9. The Ministry of Health proposed deletion of clause 2.

#### Justification

- i. The Ministry of Health is mandated to ensure availability and access to Health Products and Technologies (HPTs) used for the treatment of ailments at all levels of healthcare including pharmacies.
- ii. It is in the Ministry's interest that the balance between access to these products and protection of the public health and safety is maintained.
- iii. Health products and health technologies (HPTs) are usually classified into sheedules according to the level of regulatory control required, need for their availability and protection of public health and safety. This has culiminated in the development of a HPT scheduling system which guides the access restrictions based on their risk-benefit profile.
- iv. The key considerations that guide scheduling of medical products globally include: accessibility, therapeutic index, abuse potential, inappropriate use, precaution, community harm, precedence, efficacy, availability of medicines with similar active ingredient, legal control, pack sizes, dosage forms, item in essential medicines list and levels of prescribing among others.
- v. Therefore, if this provision is enacted into law, implementation will limit access to essential HPTs and thus negate the gains made in achievement of Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

#### KENYA PHARMACEUTICAL ASSOCIATION

10. Kenya Pharmaceutical Association proposed deletion of clause 2

#### Justification

i. It will lead to an increase in the cost of access to pharmaceutical services.

- ii. It will interfere with internationally set standards on good pharmacy practice.
- iii. It will worsen the already over-burdened healthcare system.
- iv. The proposed amendments in the Bill are taken care of by a new guideline on Scheduling and Rescheduling of Health Products and Technologies being developed by the Pharmacy and Poisons Board.

#### PHARMACEUTICAL SOCIETY OF KENYA

11. Pharmaceutical Society of Kenya proposed deletion of clause 2

#### Justification

- i. The Bill provides no balance between access and business over safety and health.
- ii.It is an affront to access to medicines.
- iii.Section 3 of the Pharmacy and Poisons Act gives the Pharmacy and Poisons Board the powers to schedule medicines.

#### **MWALIMU MUTHISYA**

12. Mwalimu Muthisya proposed deletion of clause 2

#### **Justification**

The Bill is malicious and is a continuation of the business war by pharmacists

#### **ASTONE ASHIOYA**

13. Astone Ashioya proposed deletion of clause 2

#### Justification

- i. Pharmacy professionals are well equipped with knowledge on drugs.
- ii. The Pharmacy and Poisons Board regulates the pharmacy practice and do regular inspections to guarantee safety.

#### **PART IV**

#### 4.0 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

- 14. After considering the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021, the Committee observed the following:
  - i) Should this provision be enacted into law, implementation will limit access to essential Health Products and Technologies (HPTs) and thus negate the gains made in Universal Health Coverage (UHC) achievement, which advocates for expanding the range of healthcare services to all citizens.
  - ii) In addition, one of the pillars of the UHC is financial risk protection which will be threatened by the implementation of this law, which would increase the cost of access to pharmaceutical services.
  - iii) The Bill assumes that all Kenyans have the same level of access to pharmaceutical services. In reality, the ratio of medical professionals to patients in Kenya is skewed, which is highly pronounced in low-income and rural areas, where people depend on community-based pharmacies.
  - iv) The Bill would interfere with internationally set standards on good pharmacy practice where drugs are classified into different categories or classes based on their formulation, mode of action, site of action, adverse effects.
  - v) If enacted into law, it would interfere with the acceptable standards of good pharmacy practice by imposing a prescription requirement for pharmacy-only medicines/over the counter General sales medicines.
  - vi) The law would overstretch the already weakened healthcare facilities. Since it would require a person seeking medicine to visit a hospital and go through all the processes required before being dispensed medicine. Some ailments or procedures are better managed at the community-based pharmacies.
  - vii) The proposed amendments in the Bill are already factored in the new guideline on scheduling and rescheduling of Health products and technologies being developed by the Pharmacy and Poisons Board.

#### 5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

- 15. Taking into account the above observations, the Committee rejects the proposed amendment to Section 19 of the Pharmacy and Poisons Board Act, Cap. 224 as proposed in the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, 2021 (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021). In this regard, the Committee recommends—
  - (a) THAT clause 1 of the Bill be deleted; and
  - (b) THAT clause 2 of the Bill be deleted.
- 16. In the alternative, and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 140(1), the Committee recommends that the Member in charge of the Bill withdraws the Bill to allow for further consultations.

#### **Justification**

The proposed deletion of the clauses by the Committee seeks to allow the Pharmacy and Poisons Board to discharge its functions as provided in section 3B of the Pharmacy and Poisons Board Act, Cap. 244. These functions include the scheduling and rescheduling of substances which is a key requirement in the development of a Health Products and Technologies scheduling system.

The deletion is also necessary to guard against the requirement for prescriptions even in the case of general medicines that do not require prescription by a medical practitioner.

- iv) The Bill would interfere with internationally set standards on good pharmacy practice where drugs are classified into different categories or classes based on their formulation, mode of action, site of action, adverse effects.
- v) If enacted into law, it would interfere with the acceptable standards of good pharmacy practice by imposing a prescription requirement for pharmacy-only medicines/over the counter General sales medicines.
- vi) The law would overstretch the already weakened healthcare facilities. Since it would require a person seeking medicine to visit a hospital and go through all the processes required before being dispensed medicine. Some ailments or procedures are better managed at the community-based pharmacies.
- vii) The proposed amendments in the Bill are already factored in the new guideline on scheduling and rescheduling of Health products and technologies being developed by the Pharmacy and Poisons Board.

#### Committee Recommendation

- 1. Taking into account the above observations, the Committee rejects the proposed amendment to Section 19 of the Pharmacy and Poisons Board Act, Cap. 224 as proposed in the Pharmacy and Poisons (Amendment) Bill, 2021 (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2021). In this regard, the Committee recommends—
  - (a) THAT clause 1 of the Bill be deleted; and
  - (b) THAT clause 2 of the Bill be deleted.
- 2. In the alternative, and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 140(1), the Committee recommends that the Member in charge of the Bill withdraws the Bill to allow for further consultations.

#### Justification

The proposed deletion of the clauses by the Committee seeks to allow the Pharmacy and Poisons Board to discharge its functions as provided in section 3B of the Pharmacy and Poisons Board Act, Cap. 244. These functions include the scheduling and rescheduling of substances which is a key requirement in the development of a Health Products and Technologies scheduling system.

The deletion is also necessary to guard against the requirement for prescriptions even in the case of general medicines that do not require prescription by a medical practitioner.

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#### CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution provides that, "Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees". Standing Order 127 (3) provides that "the Departmental Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and take into account the views and recommendations of the public when the Committee makes its report to the House".

The Health (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 14 of 2021) introduced by Hon. Moses Mwambu Wekesa Mabonga, MP underwent First Reading on 9<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 and was committed to the Departmental Committee on Health for consideration and reporting to the House.

This report contains the deliberations on the Bill. Most importantly, the Bill seeks to amend the Health Act No 21 of 2017 to provide that the National government and County governments shall, in consultation through the existing inter-governmental relations mechanism establish regional cancer centers; to make it an offence for a person in-charge of a Public Health facility to demand or permit payment of advance medical fees as pre-condition for the provision of medical services; to make it an offence for person in charge of a Public Health facility to detain a body of a deceased person as means of enforcing settlement of outstanding medical bills and to provide for regulation on levying of charges for the practice of conventional medical practice.

Following placement of advertisements in the print media on 11<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 requesting for comments on the Bill from members of the public and relevant stakeholders pursuant to the provisions of Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3), the Committee received memoranda from only one (1) stakeholder i.e. the Ministry of Health. The public participation meeting was held virtually on 13<sup>th</sup> July, 2021.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Health and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 199 (6), it is my pleasant privilege and honour to present to this House the Report of the Committee on its consideration of the Health (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 14 of 2021). The Committee is grateful to the Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical and technical support accorded to it during its sittings. The Committee further wishes to thank the Ministry of Health for submitting their comments on the Bill. Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the Honourable Members of the Committee and the Committee Secretariat who played significant role in preparation and production of this report.

It is my pleasure to report that the Committee has considered the Health (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 14 of 2021) and have the honour to table in the House the Committee's report on the Bill with recommendation that the House passes it with amendments as proposed.

### 2.0 OVERVIEW OF THE HEALTH (AMENDMENT) BILL, NATIONAL ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 14 OF 2021

#### 2.1 ANALYSIS OF THE BILL

- 5. The Bill seeks to amend the Health Act No 21 of 2017 to provide that the National government and County governments shall, in consultation through the existing intergovernmental relations mechanism establish regional cancer centers;
- 6. The Bill also seeks to amend the principal Act to make it an offence for a person in-charge of a Public Health facility to demand or permit payment of advance medical fees as precondition for the provision of medical services;
- 7. The Bill also seeks to make it an offence for person in charge of a Public Health facility to detain a body of a deceased person as means of enforcing settlement of outstanding medical bills and to provide for regulation on levying of charges for the practice of conventional medical practice.

#### Proposed amendment

- 8. New subsection (5)-
  - "(5) The national government and county governments shall, in consultation through the existing inter-governmental relations mechanisms, establish regional cancer centres."
- 9. New subsections (4) and (5)
  - (4) A person in charge of a public health facility commits an offence, if the person demands or permits the demand of payment of advance medical fees or admission fees prior to treating or admitting a patient as the case may be, and is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding three million shillings or to imprisonment for a term of three months, or to both.
  - (5) A person in charge of a public health facility commits an offence, if the person detains or permits the detention of the body of a deceased person for purposes of enforcing settlement of pending bills and, is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding two million shillings or to imprisonment for a term of three months or to both.
- 10. New paragraph after paragraph (d)-
  - "(da) levying of charges on the practice of conventional medicine in consultation with relevant statutory bodies and stakeholders."

#### **PART III**

#### 3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION/STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION

11. Following placement of advertisements in the print media on 11<sup>th</sup> June, 2021 seeking views on the Bill from members of the public and relevant stakeholders pursuant to Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution of Kenya and Standing Order 127(3), the Committee received a memorandum from the Ministry of Health. The meeting was held virtually on 13<sup>th</sup> July, 2021.

#### MINISTRY OF HEALTH

#### **CLAUSE 3**

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- 12. The Ministry of Health proposed an amendment to the proposed new subsections (4) and (5) as follows—
  - (4) A person in charge of a health facility commits an offence, if the person demands or permits the demand of payment of advance medical fees or admission fees prior to providing emergency medical care, and is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding three million shillings or to imprisonment for a term of three months, or to both.
  - (5) A person in charge of a health facility commits an offence, if the person detains or permits the detention of the body of a deceased person for purposes of enforcing settlement of pending bills and is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding two million shillings or to imprisonment for a term of three months or both.

#### Justification

- i. Emergency medical care should be provided in both public and private health facilities as provided in subsection (3) of the Health Act.
- ii. The requirement not to detain dead bodies in health facilities due to non-payment of hospital bills should apply to both public and private facilities.

#### **PART IV**

#### 4.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

13. The Committee having considered the Health (Amendment) Bill, National Assembly Bill No. 14 of 2021 recommends that the House approve the Bill with amendments as proposed in the schedule.

#### PART V

### 5.0 SCHEDULE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

14. The Committees proposed the following amendments to be considered by the House in the Committee stage:

#### **CLAUSE 3**

- 15. **THAT**, clause 3 of the Bill be amended—
  - (a) in the proposed new subsection (4), by deleting the words "three months" and substituting therefor the words "two years"; and
  - (b) in the proposed new subsection (5), by deleting the words "three months" and substituting therefor the words "one year".

#### Justification

The amendment seeks to ensure that the term of imprisonment to be imposed for the offences of demanding advance payment before emergency medical treatment, and for detaining dead bodies in public health facilities, shall be proportional to the amount of monetary fine that may be imposed.
