EXPLANATION

The Vote originally provided for a daily average prison population of 19,000. In the event the population (over which the Prisons Department had no control) totalled 22,632. While supplementary provision was made, this was calculated on the basis of a daily average population of 22,000 in the hope that this would be sufficient, but in spite of exercising every economy overexpenditure was unavoidable.
