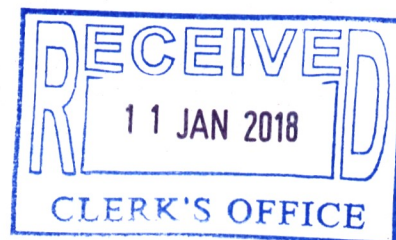

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The convening of the Assumption of Office of the President Committee was informed by the provisions of Section 19 of Assumption of Office of President Act of 2012. The report of this Committee is, therefore, prepared for submission to Parliament pursuant to the Act.

The overall mandate of the Assumption of Office of President Committee was to coordinate events leading to the swearing-in of the President-Elect and his Deputy as well as carry out duties and responsibilities related to the inauguration ceremony. To execute its mandate effectively, the Committee formed six Sub-committees. These were:

- i. Legal
- ii. Security, Protocol & Logistics
- iii. Entertainment
- iv. Media & Communication
- v. State Luncheon
- vi. Budget.

As is evident in this report, the various tasks assigned to the Sub-committees were, in sum, satisfactorily executed. As would be expected, each Sub-committee took note of lessons arising from challenges, oversights or omissions. These lessons form the basis of the observations and recommendations made by each Sub-committee as documented in this report.

The Legal Sub-committee ensured that the inauguration ceremony was conducted in accordance with the Constitution and the law. It developed various legal scenarios that guided the process and provided legal advice as necessary.

Security, Protocol and Logistics Sub-committee coordinated a number of functions. The Sub-committee provided security before, during and after the function. It also oversaw protocol and hospitality arrangements for the invited guests, venue preparation as well as the preparation and execution



of the programme. Moreover, this Sub-committee coordinated transport, logistics and essential services. The Kenya Defence Forces mounted a tri-service guard of honour, Presidential Fanfare and 21-gun salute.

The ceremony was graced by 13 Heads of State/Government, four (4) former Heads of State, and 84 Heads of Delegations.

The Entertainment Sub-committee was responsible for preparing an executing the entertainment programmes at MISC, Kasarani and State House. Over 900 performers comprising cultural groups, choral performances, popular artists, contemporary bands, modern dancers and acrobats were engaged to provide entertainment at both venues.

The Media and Communication was tasked to publicize the event, messaging and branding the venue alongside other selected spaces. The branding exercise comprised mounting banners and teardrops. Other activities by the Sub-committee included advertisement in various channels interviews, production of documentaries, press briefings, accreditation of journalists and live coverage of the event.

The State House Sub-committee organised the State Luncheon that hosted 5,500 guests including ten (10) visiting Heads of State and Government. The Sub-committee prepared the venue, the programme, entertainment and coordinated both essential services and access control and parking.

The Judiciary managed the swearing in part of the programme. The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary Anne Amadi conducted the swearing in of the President-Elect and Deputy President-Elect at the venue before the Chief Justice Hon. David Kenani Maraga. The ceremony was conducted pursuant to the provisions of Article 141 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010 and sections 12, 13, 15 and 16 of the Assumption of the Office of President Act No. 21 of 2012 between 10.00 am and 2.00 pm.



In view of the fact that the incumbent had been re-elected, the provisions of section 14 (1) with regard to handing over of the instruments of power did not apply as provided for under section 14 (2) of the Assumption of the office of President Act.

Arising from the execution of the mandate of this committee, the following key recommendations are made:

- 1) A fresh audit of key legal-cum-constitutional provisions that in view of the experience of the Assumption of Office of President—in both 2013 and more so 2017—call for review. Specific areas of concern are detailed in the report.
- 2) Budgetary allocation for the Assumption of Office of President Committee be factored in the main national budget during a presidential election.
- 3) Institute strict regulations for managing and coordinating the invitation of guests to such national events.
- 4) The Government should consider procuring Executive Shuttle Buses, preferably armoured, to provide pool transport for VVIP guests during such occasions.

On the overall, the Committee delivered the envisaged results in every aspect of the entire task in spite of the short time available.



## **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

The committee is established pursuant to the Assumption of office of President Act, 2012 to ensure the smooth transfer of power from the outgoing President to the Incoming as enshrined in the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. The Act makes it mandatory for the Committee to submit a report of its activities to Parliament. This report therefore gives an account of the activities undertaken by the committee in pursuance of the objectives of the Act on Assumption of the Office of President.

The activities leading to, during and after the inauguration of His Excellency Hon. President Uhuru Kenyatta, CGH for his second term in office as the Fourth President of the Republic of Kenya were varied and detailed. They were executed through the following Sub-committees, whose composition, mandates and reports are detailed in this report:

- i. Legal
- ii. Security, Protocol and Logistics
- iii. Entertainment
- iv. Media and Communications
- v. State Luncheon
- vi. Budget

Despite the challenges related to organizing and staging a national event of such magnitude, within a very short time, the second inauguration ceremony of His Excellency Hon. President Uhuru Kenyatta held on 28<sup>th</sup> November 2017 at the Moi International Sports Centre, Kasarani, the event was successful. It was also broadcast live to all parts of the country, the region and the world.



## **1.1 Objectives of the report**

The main objective of this report is to:

- Apprise Parliament on the activities of the Assumption of Office of President committee as provided under Article 141 of the Constitution 2010 and the Assumption of the Office Act 2012, section 19.

The report also seeks to:

- Provide detailed activities/events of the committee that precede the swearing-in ceremony at Moi International Sports Centre (MISC) Kasarani.
- Parliament's support in the provision of specific budgetary allocation to the committee as well as necessary amendments to the Act.
- Make necessary recommendations towards strengthening the work of the committee

## **1.3 Terms of Reference**

- Organize security for all Presidential candidates and running mates during the campaign period.
- To make appropriate security arrangements for the President-Elect and Deputy President-Elect upon the declaration of the Presidential election results.
- Organise the Swearing in ceremony of the President-Elect and the Deputy President-Elect in accordance with the constitution and relevant legal provisions.



## **1.4 Mandate of the Committee**

In order to achieve its objectives, the committee was mandated to:

- Prepare a swearing-in program for the ceremony;
- Organize security for;
  - ✓ The Presidential and Deputy Presidential candidates
  - ✓ The President-Elect and the Deputy President-Elect upon declaration of the results by the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC).
- Co-ordinate the briefing to the President-Elect by public officers from various ministries/departments;
- Organize for the necessary facilities and personnel for the President-Elect;
- Facilitate briefing on security to the President-Elect; and
- Carry out any other activity necessary for the performance of its functions under the Act and perform any other function in pursuance of any other written law.



## 2.0 SUB-COMMITTEE MANDATE AND ACTIVITIES

In order to exercise its mandate effectively, the Committee established six (6) Sub-committees each headed by the relevant Principal Secretaries/ Accounting Officers as shown in table 1 below.

The Sub-committees reported the progress of assigned tasks for deliberations and approval by the main Committee.



## **2.1 Legal Sub-Committee**

### **2.1.1 Overview**

The Swearing -In ceremony of the President-Elect is guided by the Constitution and relevant Legal provisions.

The Legal Affairs Sub-committee had its membership representation drawn from some of the offices set out under Section 5(2) of the Act as well as co-opted members of the Sub-committee, co-opted pursuant to Section 7(2) of the Act. As follows:

- a) The Office of the President;
- b) The Judiciary; and
- c) The Office of the Attorney General.

The Terms of Reference and Mandate of this Sub-Committee were:

- i. To analyse the constitutional and statutory provisions relating to the Assumption of the Office of President by the President-Elect and advise the Committee on their effect and requirements;
- ii. To analyse and advise the Committee on the different possible scenarios affecting the Assumption of the Office of President by the President-Elect; with particular emphasis on how the various scenarios are applied to constitutional timelines, and their consequent effect on the various possible dates for the Swearing-In and Inauguration of the President-Elect; and
- iii. To engage with Government Agencies with regard to legal matters arising from the Assumption of the Office of President.

In Kenya, the Presidential Election begins with the nomination of Presidential Candidates. As per Article 138(1) of the Constitution, if only one Candidate is validly nominated, that candidate is declared as the President-Elect without the need for a poll. Accordingly, the work of the Legal Affairs Sub-Committee began at the presidential nominations stage, with the Sub-committee monitoring the outcome of the 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> May, 2017 Presidential Candidate nominations exercise.



The Legal Affairs Sub-committee also monitored, analysed and evaluated the legal ramifications of the various Gazette Notices issued by the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC). Of those Gazette Notices issued by the IEBC, the following were of particular import with regard to the ToRs and mandate of the Sub-Committee:

- i. Declaration of the Presidential Election Date and Nomination of Presidential Candidates – Gazette Notice Number 2692 of 11<sup>th</sup> March, 2017.
- ii. Declaration of the Result of the Presidential Election of 8<sup>th</sup> August 2017 and the Declaration of the President-Elect- Gazette Notice Number 7718 of 11<sup>th</sup> August, 2017;
- iii. Declaration of the Date of the Fresh Presidential Election - Gazette Notice Number 8751 of 5<sup>th</sup> September, 2017 as read with Gazette Notices Number 9800 of 29<sup>th</sup> September, 2017 and No. 10562 of 24<sup>th</sup> October, 2017; and
- iv. Declaration of the Result of the Fresh Presidential Election of 26<sup>th</sup> October 2017 and the Declaration of the President-Elect- Gazette Notice Number 10808 of 30<sup>th</sup> October, 2017. (Appendix IA & IB)

The above Gazette Notices issued by the IEBC were informed by the Judgements of the Supreme Court of Kenya in Presidential Election Petition No. 1 of 2017, which nullified the Declaration of the President-Elect made pursuant to the initial Presidential Election of 8<sup>th</sup> August 2017; and in Presidential Election Petitions No. 2 & 3 of 2017 [Consolidated] which upheld the Declaration of the President-Elect made pursuant to the Presidential Election of 26<sup>th</sup> October 2017. The Sub-Committee took note of the Petitions filed in the Supreme Court as well as the consequent decisions of the Apex Court as the same would have ramifications on the date of the Swearing-In and Inauguration of the President-Elect.

Appended hereto are two documents of the Sub-Committee which outlined the scenarios and attendant possible dates of the Swearing-In and Inauguration of the President-Elect; which give detailed analysis of the above considerations.

Upon the affirmation by the Supreme Court of the Declaration of the President-Elect made pursuant to the Presidential Election of 26<sup>th</sup> October 2017; by virtue of



Article 141(2)(b) the Swearing-In and Inauguration of the President-Elect was to take place on the seventh day following the Declaration of Validity upholding the Declaration of the President-Elect. Accordingly, the Date was Tuesday, 28<sup>th</sup> November 2017.

The Sub-Committee on Legal Affairs was instrumental in ensuring that the provisions of Article 141 of the Constitution and Sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 18 of the Act were applied and the requisite legal requirements, processes and deliverables met. This was done in conjunction with the Judiciary, in recognition of the requirement that the President-Elect be sworn in before the Chief Justice by the Chief Registrar to the Judiciary.

The Assumption of the Office of President Committee undertook a successful dry-run Swearing-In and Inauguration the day before the Seminal Day, to ensure that the event would be conducted in an efficient, safe, cost-effective and legally compliant manner; which it was.

Key outputs of the Sub-Committee's activities included:

- i. The Scenario Analysis on the possible Swearing-In and Inauguration Date;
- ii. Legal Opinions on Constitutional and Statutory Questions arising;
- iii. Advice to various Government Agencies including the Cabinet Secretary-Interior on issuance of Gazette Notices;
- iv. Engagement with the Judiciary to streamline and dry-run the processes required of the Judiciary with regard to the Swearing-In and Inauguration of the President-Elect;
- v. Input into the Committee's Gazette Notice, issued by the Committee pursuant to Section 12(2) of the Act;
- vi. Suggestion of and outlining possible amendments to the Act in light of the 2017 experiences as well as those that occurred before them; and
- vii. Providing advice that was incorporated into the Main Committee's Press Briefings and Statements to the Public.



### **2.1.2 Observations**

The key observations of the Sub-Committee in light of this year's Assumption of the Office of President processes are as follows:

- i. Section 5 of the Act does not have provisions for another Member of the Committee to act as the Chairperson of the Committee in the event of the absence of the Secretary to the Cabinet or in the event of a vacancy in that Office;
- ii. Section 5(2)(c) of the Act specifies the Cabinet Secretary of the Ministry responsible for matters relating to the registration of persons and immigration as a Member of the Committee whereas all the other State Departments under Section 5(2) are represented by the respective Principal Secretary;
- iii. The window for the President-Elect taking the Oath/Affirmation of Office is too narrow, in light of the organizational, security and logistical requirements of the Event;
- iv. After the nullification of the Declaration of the Incumbent President as the President-Elect, the first such occurrence in both Kenyan and Commonwealth legal history; it was unclear whether the Article 134 limitations on the Powers of the President under Temporary Incumbency had also been lifted or were still in force;
- v. There are no statutory provisions elucidating the processes, requirements and scope of the scenario set out under Article 147(3) of the Constitution; which allows the Deputy President to act as the President whenever the President is absent, temporarily incapacitated or temporarily designates the Deputy President as the Acting President; and
- vi. The Report of the Committee required to be published and presented to Parliament has a very wide scope and it is difficult to prepare the same within one month of the Swearing-In of the President-Elect.



### **2.1.3 Recommendations**

The Legal Affairs Sub-Committee recommends the following:

- i. In any Presidential Election cycle, the IEBC and the Judiciary should enhance their public sensitization of the various requirements, timelines and outcomes surrounding the nomination of Presidential Candidates, effect of certain occurrences on the Election Date and the interplay between those Agencies and the Swearing-In and Inauguration ceremony;
- ii. In any Presidential Election cycle, the Government should enhance public sensitization on the existence, mandate and functions of the Committee;
- iii. Amendment of Section 5(2)(b) of the Act to specify that the Hon. Attorney General shall act as the Chairperson of the Committee in the absence of, or in the event of a vacancy in the office of the Secretary to the Cabinet;
- iv. Amendment of Section 5(2)(c) of the Act to replace the specified Cabinet Secretary with the Principal Secretary of the same, an amendment that brings consistency to the membership of the Committee;
- v. Amendment of Section 13(2) of the Act to enlarge the time period within which the President-Elect must take the Oath/Affirmation of Office to between 09:00am and 04:00pm;
- vi. Introduction of a new Section into the Act stating that whenever a Declaration of a President-Elect is nullified by the Supreme Court the Article 134 limitations on the Powers of the President under Temporary Incumbency are also lifted up to and until the casting of the first vote in the subsequent Fresh Presidential Election;
- vii. Introduction of statutory provisions into the Act elucidating the processes, requirements and scope of the scenario set out under Article 147(3) of the Constitution; which allows the Deputy President to act as the President whenever the President is absent, temporarily incapacitated or temporarily designates the Deputy President as the Acting President; so as to provide certainty and clarity on the same; and



- viii. Amendment of Section 19(1) of the Act to enlarge the time period for preparation of the Committee's Report to ninety (90) days.

## **2.2 Security, Protocol & Logistics Sub-committee**

### **2.2.1 Overview**

The Sub-committee was mandated with the task of coordinating activities relating to security, protocol and logistics during the Second Inauguration Ceremony of the Fourth President of Kenya was held at the Moi International Sports Centre (MISC), Kasarani, on 28<sup>th</sup> November 2017.

This Sub-committee was, specifically tasked with the following:

- Coordinating and providing security before, during and after the function.
- Coordinating matters of protocol and logistical nature during the function.
- Mobilizing members of the public from within and outside Nairobi to attend the function.
- Preparing venues for the event.
- Preparing various programmes for the event.
- Coordinating transport for different cadres of guests.
- Providing essential services during the event.

### **2.2.2 Composition of the Sub-Committee**

The Security, Protocol and Logistics Sub-committee comprised members drawn from the following Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs):

- Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government.
- Office of the Deputy President
- Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
- Government Protection Security Office (GPSO).
- National Police Service (NPS).
- Presidential Escort Unit (PEU).
- Moi International Sports Centre, Kasarani.



- Kenya Defence Forces.
- Kenya Airports Authority.
- Kenya Civil Aviation Authority.
- National Disaster Operation Centre (NDOC)
- National Youth Service (NYS).
- Nairobi City County Government.
- Permanent Presidential Music Commission (PPMC)

### **2.2.3 Execution**

The Committee held a number of meetings—both at Harambee House and at MISC— and conducted a rehearsal of the event on 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2017 at the MISC, Kasarani.

A debriefing conducted on 6<sup>th</sup> December, 2017 deliberated on the documentation of the key highlights of the event, lessons learnt and proposed recommendations to form a reference point for the improvement of related future events.

To discharge its mandate effectively, the Sub-committee established Operational Committees to execute specific tasks related to its overall mandate. These included:

- Security
- Protocol
- Mobilization
- Venues
- Programmes
- Transport
- Essential Services

Each Operational Team prepared a report outlining how it undertook its respective mandates. Alongside, each of them highlighted lessons learnt, how it utilized and



accounted for resources allocated to it and recommendations that would inform more efficient execution of similar tasks in the future.

#### **2.2.4 Security Team**

The Security Team was mandated with coordinating the security arrangements during the Ceremony.

It comprised of membership drawn from the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Government Protection Security Office (GPSO), National Police Service, Presidential Escort Unit, MISC, Kenya Defence Forces, Kenya Airports Authority, Kenya Civil Aviation Authority, Directorate of Immigration & Registration of Persons, National Disaster Operation Centre, National Youth Service and Nairobi County Government.

This Team delivered on its mandate satisfactorily.

#### **2.2.5 Protocol Team**

The Protocol Team was charged with the task of coordinating all aspects the etiquette, decorum and order required for the ceremony. Its membership was drawn from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Government Reception Office, Parliament, GPSO, Council of Governors (CoG) and State House.

#### **2.2.6 Invitations Team**

Several Heads of State and Government and Special Guests were invited to the event. Despite the short notice and prior commitments, eleven (11) Heads of State and Government graced the occasion. Further, 34 delegations were represented at various levels ranging from Prime Ministers, Vice Presidents, Ministers, Ambassadors and Special Envoys. Other special guests included two (2) former presidents. Overall, forty-seven (47) foreign delegations attended the ceremony (Appendix IIA)



### **2.2.7                      Hosting of Foreign Guests**

Most of the dignitaries were received at the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport (JKIA). The East African Community (EAC) Secretary General arrived through the Namanga border point.

Presidents and Heads of Government were received at the Presidential Pavilion. Non-executive Prime Ministers and Vice Presidents were received through VIP 3 while ministers and ambassadors came through VIP 2.

Ambassador-level greeters were available throughout the duration of the arrival and departure of the dignitaries. All arriving Presidents and Heads of Government were presented with a bouquet of flowers. In some cases, the Kenya Defence Forces mounted a Guard of Honour or Troop-in-Line as applicable. The receptions and departures were conducted proficiently and satisfactorily.

### **2.2.8                      Escorts of honour**

Most official delegations were allocated ambassador-level escorts of honour. However, other delegations were allocated senior officials from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The guests were properly chaperoned throughout their stay to guarantee their comfort and easy acclimatization.

### **2.2.9                      Transportation of foreign dignitaries**

All foreign dignitaries were allocated adequate transport commensurate to their status. Vehicles were allocated as follows:

- i. Presidents/Heads of Government – seven (7) vehicles.
- ii. Non-executive Prime Ministers and Vice Presidents – three (3) vehicles.
- iii. Ministers, Ambassadors, Special Envoys – two (2) vehicles.



### **2.2.10 Coordination of accommodation of foreign dignitaries**

All Presidential/Head of Government delegations and their entourages were allocated suitable and adequate accommodation based on their preferences.

### **2.2.11 Ushering and seating guests at the venues**

There were two main venues, the Moi International Sports Centre, Kasarani and State House, Nairobi. At Kasarani, ushering was a joint responsibility between personnel from Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Government Reception Office and Servicemen from the National Youth Service. Guests were chaperoned from their hotels following a well laid out order of precedence.

Heads of State/Government were ushered into a holding room and then escorted to the arena. Other foreign dignitaries were led straight to the dais.

### **2.2.12 Attendance**

An estimated 180,000 people drawn from 47 Counties attended the event. There was provision for overflow of the high number of the public in attendance.

### **2.2.13 Venues Team**

The Venues Team was tasked to prepare the venues for the event. Its tasks included doing necessary repairs, renovations facelifts and protecting the tartan track. Its membership comprised of the Ministry of Sports Culture and the Arts and State Department of Interior.

Fabrication of a 1600-seater dais to accommodate VVIPs and VIPs at the MISC, Kasarani was undertaken and completed on time. Likewise, the general preparation of the MISC, Kasarani and State House venues was completed in time



## **2.2.14 Programmes Team**

The Programmes Team was responsible for the smooth flow of the event's activities, time management as well as the preparation of the programmes that guided the course of events of the day. This Committee consisted of representation from the Government Reception Office, State Functions Office, the Judiciary, Kenya Defence Forces and the Regional Commissioner, Nairobi. The preparation of the various programmes was undertaken as detailed below.

### **2.2.14.1 Events prior to the arrival of the President-elect at the inauguration venue**

This segment of the programme entailed programming with regard to settling in members of the public and offering them entertainment as well as ushering local and foreign dignitaries at the MISC, Kasarani prior to the arrival of the President-elect. This part of the day's programme took care of events that preceded the swearing in. *(See more elaborate details of the entertainment function in the report on Entertainment Sub-committee.)*

### **2.2.14.2 Ceremonial parade**

The Kenya Defence Forces prepared and displayed a Tri-Service Guard of Honour, Presidential fanfare and 21 Gun Salute in honour of His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya and Commander in Chief of the Defence Forces on the occasion of his second inauguration. Prior to the event, the KDF conducted adequate parade rehearsals.

### **2.2.14.3 Printing of the official programmes and Invitation Cards**

Attendance was open to the general public. However, 18,000 invitation cards and official programs were printed (Appendix IIB).



#### **2.2.14.4 Prayers**

Christian Prayer was led by Rev. Fr. Francis Rodriguez of the Roman Catholic Church and J.B. Masinde of the Protestant Church. The Muslim Prayer was conducted by Mr. Omar Ali, Deputy Chief Kadhi while the Traditional Prayer was led by Stephen Oruma Ole Nkaru.

#### **2.2.14.5 State Luncheon**

A State Luncheon was held at State House Nairobi where approximately 5,500 guests were hosted. The luncheon was graced by a number of Heads of State and Government. (Appendix IIC and IID)

#### **2.2.15 Transport Coordination Team**

The Transport Coordination Team was responsible for the coordination of the movements of selected invited guests. The purpose was to ease flow of traffic and parking in view of the large number of guests expected.

The committee comprised the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government, CoG, Parliament, National Police Service, National Youth Service (NYS), and Kenya Private Sector Alliance and the Cabinet Affairs. Vehicles sourced from the various organizations provided transport to the VIPs.

#### **2.2.16 Essential Services Team**

The Essential Services Team was responsible for the preparation and execution of an effective disaster response, preparedness and management system.

It comprised the following: Ministry of Health, National Disaster Operation Centre, Kenya Red Cross Society, St. John's Ambulance and Nairobi City County Government.



The Essential Services Operational Committee deployed 19 Ambulances as follows:

- Kenya Red Cross Society-10
- St. John's Ambulance-3
- Nairobi City County Government-4
- Ministry of Health-2
- Beyond Zero Mobile Clinic-1 (for VVIPs and VIPs)
- Aga Khan University Hospital Mobile Clinic-1 (for VVIPs and VIPs)

## **2.3 Entertainment Sub-committee**

### **2.3.1 Overview**

The Entertainment Sub-committee was tasked with:

- a) Preparing a work-plan indicating the objectives, activities, actors and timelines.
- b) Identifying performing artistes and groups to perform in the two specified venues.
- c) Arranging for the selection, vetting, auditions and rehearsals of the performing artistes and groups to underpin quality and standards ahead of the event.
- d) Draw an indicative budget for entertainment activities.
- e) Liaise with other relevant sub-committees such as Security, Protocol and Logistics to realise set objectives.

Consequently, proposals and work-plans to realize the terms of reference were drawn.

### **2.3.2 Membership of the Entertainment Sub-Committee**

The membership of the Sub-Committee was drawn from the following:

- Chairing: - The Principal Secretary, State Department of Culture and the Arts
- Member: - Director of Administration, State Department of Culture and the Arts
- Member: - Director, Permanent Presidential Music Commission



- Member: - State House Spokesman, Representative of the President Elect
- Member: - Deputy Director & Officer, State Functions
- Member: - Representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs
- Member: - Deputy Director of Culture
- Member: - Director of Film
- Member: - Director Brand Strategy & Events, State House
- Member: - Music Director, Office of the First Lady, State House
- Member: - Chairman, Youth Enterprise Development Fund
- Member: - Director, Sports Kenya

### **2.3.3 Meetings**

The Sub-committee held meetings to discuss and chart the way forward. The first round of meetings took place in August, 2017 and continued later in November. Based on the TORs, the Sub-committee developed a work-plan, overview of the entertainment programme and budgetary requirements.

The approved budget catered for rehearsals, transport and accommodation of the performing groups, performance fees, costume improvement and other logistics.

### **2.3.4 Selection of Performing Groups**

Performing groups were selected as indicated in (Appendix III).

### **2.3.5 Outline of the Entertainment Programme**

The entertainment scheduled for both the Kasarani stadium and the State House garden party featured various groups/artistes under the following subcategories:

- i. Bands and popular artistes.
- ii. Cultural dance groups.
- iii. Modern dances and acrobatic troupes.
- iv. Choral performances.
- v. Disk Jockeys (DJs)

The Sub-committee developed the following programmes:



- a) Early-morning entertainment prior to the swearing in.
- b) 20-minute entertainment interlude within the timespan allocated to the actual swearing in ritual.
- c) Entertainment at the State Luncheon, State House.

### **2.3.6 Production and Rehearsals of the Performances**

Teams of traditional dancers, artistes and choirs rehearsed at PPMC prior to the dress rehearsals held at the venue of the event.

- Officers from the PPMC worked with the selected groups of traditional dancers drawn from the Counties for six days in their local areas prior to their travel to Nairobi. The aim was to reinforce quality and standards of their performances.
- The identified bands, the DJs and the identified popular artistes rehearsed at the PPMC rehearsal rooms and studio to heighten quality standards of half-live performances.
- County-based cultural teams met and rehearsed with PPMC staff at their respective domiciles ahead of reporting to the PPMC grounds on 26<sup>th</sup> November 2017 for exhaustive final preparations and dress rehearsals before performing on the 28<sup>th</sup> November 2017.
- The combined group of cultural dancers rehearsed at the PPMC grounds from the 21<sup>st</sup> of November with the technical team to compel quality and standards of entertainment befitting the occasion.
- The group Redfourth Chorus together with gospel musician Florence Mureithi rehearsed their performance, *Inuka Mteule* at the PPMC grounds for six days.
- Groups Bel Canto Chorus and the Kenya Boys Choir also rehearsed at the PPMC grounds to upscale quality and standards.

- All artistes and traditional dancers rehearsed from Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November, 2017 at the Permanent Presidential Music Commission before proceeding for dress rehearsals at the Kasarani Stadium on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> November, 2017 for a thorough dress rehearsal.
- On Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> November, 2017, all performing artistes and teams draped in their appropriate costumes, reported to PPMC at 5.30am in readiness for the celebrations. Performances began at 7:00am as planned. The entertainment programme of the day is attached on Appendix IIIB.

### **2.3.7 Transporting entertainment teams**

Most traditional dance troupes from the counties were transported to Nairobi using institutional vehicles or hired public transport and accommodated in Nairobi. This ensured they were available for rehearsals at PPMC and dress rehearsals at the stadium. More institutional buses and hired public transport were used to transport all performing teams in Nairobi during to all rehearsal sessions and on the day of the event itself.

## **2.4 Media and Communication Sub-committee**

### **2.4.1 Overview**

The activities leading to, during and after the inauguration of His Excellency President Uhuru Kenyatta for his Second Term in Office as the Fourth President of the Republic of Kenya were varied and detailed. One of the core activities was media and communication management that entailed media and press relations, messaging and brand application.

### **2.4.2 Mandate of the Media and Communication Sub-Committee**

The mandate of the Media and Communications Sub-committee was to:



- (1) Facilitate wide media coverage and public awareness of the ceremony both locally and internationally.
- (2) Manage all aspects of media engagement before, during and after the ceremony.
- (3) Develop a brand signature to showcase the **Kenya Mbele** theme.
- (4) Develop and distribute relevant content and messages.

### **2.4.3 Membership of the Media and Communication Sub-Committee**

The Media and Communication Sub-committee comprised of:

- Chairing: - PS Broadcasting and Telecommunications
- Member: - Secretary for Communication and State House  
Spokesperson
- Member: - Presidential Delivery Unit
- Member: - Information Secretary, MoICT
- Member: - Director, Government Advertising Agency, MoICT
- Member: - Office of the Deputy President
- Secretary: - State Department of Interior - National Government  
Communication Centre (NGCC)

The following activities before, during and after the ceremony summarize, the activities undertaken by this Sub-committee to achieve the aforementioned mandate:

### **2.4.4 Press Briefings**

- A total of six press briefings were held between 20<sup>th</sup> to the 27<sup>th</sup> November 2017. The briefings provided a forum for the main committee to officially update the public and other key stakeholders on the following issues:



Date and venue of the occasion, security arrangements, number of guests expected, media accreditation, budget, foreign dignitaries expected, and traffic management.

#### **2.4.5 Media Accreditation**

With a high number of expected journalists and in order to prepare adequately to facilitate them, accreditation was compulsory. Media accreditation registration was conducted from 21<sup>st</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> November 2017. Journalists and crew attending the inauguration were registered online through a designated link: <http://accreditationkenya.com/register/login>. A total of 759 journalists were accredited and issued with badges. Of them, 654 were local while 105 were international. Car passes were also issued to media crews to facilitate entry into Kasarani Stadium.

#### **2.4.6 Messaging and Branding**

Key messages centred on the ***Kenya Mbele*** theme were formulated. The theme was adopted to depict Kenya as a nation on the move. ***Kenya Mbele*** also resonates with the patriotic significance of ***placing Kenya first***. The messages were distributed through a fact sheet capturing the highlights of Kenya's journey. Branding the venue and key strategic points around the city was also done. This branding emphasized the values that unite Kenyans besides publicizing the event.

#### **2.4.7 Live Coverage**

Live coverage was successfully executed with all major local television stations carrying the event live. Notably, the day's coverage was uninterrupted for the entire period of the inauguration ceremony.

The broadcast quality was high definition and had different camera angles providing comprehensive coverage of the entire stadium, the catchment areas as well as the route from Statehouse to the stadium.



There was YouTube and Facebook live stream links, connecting the event to anyone around the world with Internet access and satellite feed. Digital feed was also provided to both local and international media across the globe.

#### **2.4.8 Media Centre and Onsite Management of Journalists**

The Sub-committee successfully activated and managed the Media Centre at the MISC Kasarani. As part of the activation, the Media Centre was equipped with high speed Internet; edit suites and transmission booths for live TV and radio broadcasts that were utilized by media crews. The press corps accompanying the Heads of State and Heads of Delegation were facilitated accordingly.

#### **2.4.9 Special Projects in MyGov**

The four leading newspapers—Daily Nation, The Standard, The Star and People Daily—carried a souvenir edition of MyGov, pull-out. The edition featured an article on Government’s accomplishments between 2013 to 2017 Presidential term.

The Daily Nation and The Standard newspapers carried a panorama (infographic insert) summarizing the Government's achievements and planned programmes.

#### **2.4.10 Souvenirs**

The committee produced a documentary based on the *Kenya Mbele* theme, a coffee table book and a souvenir publication (The Presidency) aimed at inspiring Kenyans to forge ahead as a united nation.



## 2.5 Budget Sub-committee

The Budget Sub-committee was chaired by the Principal Secretary, National Treasury. It was responsible for receiving, harmonizing, approving and disbursing budgetary requirements from various Sub-committees. The Sub-committee was composed of all the chairs of the Sub-committees.

The approved budget is indicated in the table 2 below:

### **3.0 SWEARING IN- CEREMONY**

#### **3.1 Rehearsals of swearing in**

The Judiciary and other members of the committee conducted rehearsals both at the main venue and the Statehouse on the 25<sup>th</sup> November 2017 and 27<sup>th</sup> November 2017.

#### **3.2 The swearing-in process on 28<sup>th</sup> November 2017**

After prayers, the Chief Registrar of the Judiciary Ms. Anne A. Amadi took her position at the Inauguration Arena with a view to conducting the swearing in ceremony and the administration of the oaths of the President-Elect and Deputy President-Elect.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary invited the Chief Justice and the President of the Supreme Court of Kenya Hon. Justice David Kenani Maraga to take his position at the Inauguration Arena.

The Chief Justice proceeded to introduce the President-Elect Hon. UHURU KENYATTA to the nation and invited the President-Elect to take his position at the Inauguration Arena.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary then invited Her Excellency the First Lady Margaret Kenyatta to take her position on the Inauguration Arena.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary invited both the President-Elect and Her Excellency the First Lady Margaret Kenyatta to the podium and requested Her Excellency to hold the Constitution of Kenya 2010. The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary then requested the President-Elect to raise the bible with his right hand and place his left hand on the Constitution of Kenya 2010



and administered the Oath of Allegiance to the President-Elect before the Chief Justice.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary proceeded to administer the Oath of Due Execution of the Functions of Office to the President-Elect before the Chief Justice.

The two Oaths were administered pursuant to the provisions of Article 141 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010 as prescribed in the Third Schedule.

After the administration of the two Oaths, the Chief Registrar then invited His Excellency the President Hon. Uhuru Kenyatta to take his seat at the Inauguration Arena and sign the Oath of Allegiance, the Oath of Due Execution of Functions of Office and the Certificate of Inauguration.

The Chief Justice witnessed the signing of the three documents by appending his signature, introduced the President to the people of Kenya and presented a set of Oath of Allegiance, the Oath of Due Execution of Functions of Office and Certificate of Inauguration to His Excellency the President Hon. Uhuru Kenyatta.

The Chief Justice of the Republic of Kenya Hon. David Kenani Maraga then introduced the Deputy President-Elect WILLIAM SAMOEI RUTO to the Nation and invited him to take his position at the Inauguration Arena.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary in turn invited Her Excellency Rachel Ruto to take her position at the Inauguration Arena.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary invited both the Deputy President-Elect and Her Excellency Rachel Ruto to move to the podium.



The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary requested Her Excellency Rachel Ruto to hold the Constitution of Kenya 2010 and requested the Deputy President-elect to lift the bible with his right hand and place his left hand on the Constitution of Kenya 2010 and administered the Oath of Allegiance to the Deputy President-Elect before the Chief Justice.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary then proceeded to administer the Oath of Due Execution of Functions of Office to the Deputy President-Elect before the Chief Justice.

The Chief Registrar of the Judiciary invited the Deputy President William Samoei Ruto to take his seat at the Inauguration Arena with a view to signing the Oath of Allegiance and the Oath of Due Execution of Functions of Office.

The Chief Justice witnessed the signing of the two Oaths by appending his signature.

The Chief Justice then introduced the Deputy President William Samoei Ruto to the people of Kenya and presented a set of the Oath of Allegiance and the Oath of Due Execution of Office to His Excellency the Deputy President of the Republic of Kenya Hon. William Samoei Ruto.

The swearing in ceremony ended with the Chief Justice, Chief Registrar of the Judiciary, His Excellency the President and the First Lady, His Excellency the Deputy President and Her Excellency Rachel Ruto taking several photographs.

The swearing in ceremony was performed at MISC, Kasarani, Nairobi between 10.00 am and 2.00 pm as provided under Section 13 of the Assumption of the Office of President Act 2012.



In view of the fact that the incumbent President had been re-elected, the provisions of Section 14 (1) of the Assumption of the Office of President Act with regard to the handing over of instruments of power did not apply.

After the swearing in, His Excellency the President proceeded to give his Inaugural speech pursuant to Section 16 of the Act.
