
Committee meetings

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee on Administration and National Security is established under Standing Order No. 216 with the mandate under Standing Order 216 (5) to inter alia:-

(e) vet and report on all appointments where the constitution and any other law requires the National Assembly to approve...

2.2 APPOINTMENT PROCESS OF THE PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES NOMINEES

- (i) H.E. the President, in accordance with the provisions of Article 152(2) of the Constitution, forwarded to the Speaker of the National Assembly, the names of two (2) nominees vide a letter dated 10th June, 2013 for vetting and approval for appointment by the National Assembly as Principal Secretaries.
- (ii) On Tuesday, 11th June, 2013, the Honourable Speaker in a communication, referred the names of the nominees and their curriculum vitae to the Committee on Administration and National Security for vetting and reporting to the House on or before 25th June 2013.
- (iii) On Wednesday, 12th June, 2013, an advertisement was placed in the print media inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of affidavit on the suitability or otherwise of the two (2) nominees in conformity with Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act 2011. The submissions were to be received latest by Tuesday 18th June, 2013.
- (iv) On 14th June, 2013, an affidavit sworn by Ms. Edah Maina against the nomination of Ms. Josephtha Mukobe was received by the Clerk of the National Assembly.
- (v) On 17th June, 2013, an affidavit sworn by Mr. John Mbugua against the nomination of Mr. Mutea Iringo was received by the Clerk of the

National Assembly.

(vi) The Committee requested the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission, Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) and the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) to provide reports about the nominees on: -

- Matters touching on integrity;
- Tax compliance;
- Loan repayments.

In response, HELB confirmed that the nominees had benefited from the Loans Scheme and had cleared their loans, Kenya Revenue Authority confirmed that both nominees were tax compliant with Ms. Josephtha Mukobe being tax exempt, while the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission informed the Committee that there were no pending integrity related cases on the nominees but had received complaints against Ms. Josephtha Mukobe which is a matter of ongoing investigations.

3.0 MEETING WITH THE ETHICS AND ANTI CORRUPTION COMMISSION

The Committee on Thursday June 20, 2013 held a meeting with Mr. Michael Mubea, Deputy Secretary of the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission to brief the Committee on the nature and status of investigations being undertaken by EACC on the Ms. Josephtha Mukobe.

Mr. Mubea informed the Committee that they had received complaints from Ms. Edah Maina against the nominee and other NCPWD Board members on misuse of funds. They commenced investigations on the matter whereupon fresh allegations were again received. The investigation on the matter is still ongoing and will be completed in one month's time.

He further informed the Committee that if the nominee will be appointed that will not prevent the EACC from investigating and charging the nominee if found culpable.

4.0 VETTING OF THE NOMINEES

In conducting the vetting process, the Committee on Administration and National Security examined the nominees against the following criteria, amongst others, as set out in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011.

- (i) Academic qualifications
- (ii) Employment record
- (iii) Professional affiliations
- (iv) Potential conflict of interest
- (v) Knowledge of the relevant subject
- (vi) Overall suitability for the position
- (vii) Tax compliance
- (viii) Integrity

During its Sittings held on Thursday, 20th June 2013 the Committee conducted face to face interview of the nominees.

4.1 MR. MUTEA IRINGO – PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR INTERIOR IN THE MINISTRY OF INTERIOR AND COORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

Mr. Mutea Iringo appeared before the Committee on Thursday, 20th June, 2013, at 2.30 pm. The Chairperson informed Mr. Iringo that a Memorandum contesting his suitability for appointment to public office had been received. The memorandum stated that he had failed to stem the conflict between the Chairman of the Police Service Commission and the Inspector General of Police, that he was silent on matters of national security and had failed to address issues of the welfare of police officers (salaries and allowances, equipment and training) as well as failure to resolve issues of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP's).

I. Conflict between the Police Service Commission and the Inspector General

In reply to a question on the reforms in the police service and the conflict between the Police Service Commission and the Inspector General of police, Mr. Mutea Iringo informed the Committee that there are overlaps in the law providing for the existence of the two offices and misinterpretations in the provisions of Articles 245 and 246 of the Constitution had led to misunderstandings between the two offices. He further informed the Committee that the Ministry had sought legal advice from the Attorney General to amend the law as a way of addressing the challenge so as to achieve clarity of mandate. He further informed the Committee that there was need for the Police Service Commission to delegate certain functions to the Inspector General of Police with regard to transfers, promotions of officers, discipline among others considering that the Police Service is an Armed Force which requires discipline and chain of command. He also informed the Committee that the deployment of County Police Commissioners was necessary for security reasons in order to fill the void left after Provincial Police Commanders (PPO) were withdrawn.

II. Police reforms and welfare of police officers

Mr. Mutea informed the Members that the Constitution provides for the National Police Service Commission and creates an enabling environment for the police reforms. Reforms in the Police Service are already in progress. The Ministry together with the Police Service Commission are working towards the improvement of the welfare of the police officers in terms of their remuneration, living conditions, training and equipment. He further informed the committee that the Kenya police service reservists are an integral part in community policing particularly in pastoral areas. The Government is working on the modalities of appreciating through some form of remuneration and empowerment of police reservists. He also informed the Committee that he will strive towards the improvement of

working conditions and welfare of police officers in order to boost their morale and improve service delivery to the people.

III. Internally Displaced Persons

He informed the Committee that the Government had settled IDP's and had put in place measures to ensure that all genuine internally displaced persons are settled. He informed Members that there were allegations of misappropriation of funds meant for IDP's. The allegations were investigated and some provincial administration officers were found culpable and are now facing charges of misappropriation and corruption in courts.

IV. Linkage between the legislature and the executive

Mr. Mutea Iringo informed the Committee that the Constitution delineates the responsibilities and functions of each arm of government with the legislature making laws and the executive implementing the laws. The Constitution also provides for checks and balances between the arms of Government. He further informed the Committee that with the new dispensation parliamentary Committees and the office of the Leader of Majority will be the link between the Legislature and the Executive. The Ministry will however establish a liaison office to handle all the matters relating to the legislature for efficient and effective response by the Ministry to the requests by the legislature. He informed the Committee that in the past the response by the Ministry to issues raised by Parliament was at times slow due to the fact that information was being sought from the grassroots. He undertook to improve the situation and ensure timely response and delivery of accurate information to Parliament once approved by Parliament and appointed by the President.

V. Security and Vision 2030

Mr. Iringo stated that he has a passion for the job and the integrity that goes with the office having served in the civil service and in the Ministry

for 26 years and is committed to ensuring that the lives and property of Kenyans is protected as guaranteed in the Constitution.

He stated that the realization of the economic, political and social pillars of Vision 2030 is reliant upon security which is an enabling factor for the development of any country.

He informed the Committee that he is aware of security challenges facing Kenyans having served in administration for 26 years and as the Permanent Secretary for internal security.

He added that the recent attacks targeting people in Western Kenya, Garissa, Mandera and in other pastoral areas is being investigated by intelligence agencies in order to get to the root causes of the attacks. The Government is taking appropriate action to address the rising cases of insecurity in accordance with laws. He stated that if appointed he will ensure that all perpetrators are apprehended irrespective of their social standing.

He challenged Kenyans to work closely with security and intelligence agencies to address challenges to security by way of community policing and advocate for the use of technology to fight crime and insecurity.

VI. Conflict between Governors and County Commissioners

He informed the Committee that the Constitution outlines the functions of the National Government and those of the County Government and as such the role of the County Commissioners is to coordinate functions of the National Government at the County level and will not interfere with the roles of Governors.

VII. Corruption

Mr. Iringo pledged to ensure prudent management of public resources and fight corruption in procurement at all levels of the Ministry using all means available under the law.

VIII. Drug trafficking

He informed the Committee that he shall enforce relevant laws relating to drug abuse prevention and control while working closely with relevant government agencies such as NACADA in combating drug abuse. He stated his commitment to addressing the drug menace by ensuring that drug traffickers are arrested and prosecuted in accordance with the law notwithstanding their status in society. He further informed the Committee he will put in place measures to stop trafficking, sale and consumption of all forms of illegal drugs.

IX. Welfare of Police Officers

He informed Members that he will work closely with the Police Service Commission in ensuring that the welfare of police officers is improved. If appointed he will reform the Ministry and ensure recruitment, training, equipping of officers and change attitude for efficient and effective service delivery to Kenyans.

X. Rising insecurity

Mr. Iringo informed the Committee that incidences of rising insecurity have been reported in parts of western Kenya and Garissa as well as in the pastoralist areas. The Government has deployed additional security personnel to these areas. Intelligence agencies are also working in the areas with the aim of investigating the root causes of insecurity which has been attributed to illegal gangs, Al Shabaab, MRC and proliferation of small arms. In addressing the low police citizen ratio the Ministry will continue recruiting more Police officers and additional equipment to boost security.

Mr. Iringo appreciated the role of the Kenya Police Reservists (KPR) particularly those in areas with low Police presence such as pastoralist areas and informed the Committee that the Ministry is looking at modalities of appreciating the work of KPR through some stipend and further that they will be empowered to perform better.

XI. The Committee sought to know if he had applied for the position of Principal Secretary. He informed the Committee that he had applied for the position on 27th February, 2013 and was shortlisted by the Public Service Commission (PSC) and his name was recommended by PSC for appointment by the President.

The Committee found the nominee suitable for appointment as Principal Secretary for Interior in the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government.

4.2 MS. JOSEPHTA MUKOBE – PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR CO-ORDINATION IN THE MINISTRY OF INTERIOR AND CO-ORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

Ms. Josephtha Mukobe appeared before the Committee and after introductions, the Chairperson informed her that a Memorandum contesting her suitability for appointment to public office had been received. The memorandum stated that:-

- (i) The nominee while acting as a Board Member for the National Council for Persons with Disabilities (NCPWD) gave approval for the funding of a proposal worth Kshs. 15 million to United Disabled Persons of Kenya (UDPK) while knowing that the activities listed were not to be undertaken.
- (ii) As a Board Member of NCPWD the nominee gave approval for the purchase of a residential building in Mountain View Estate. The building was irregularly acquired without proof of ownership and is

not accessible to People with Disabilities (PWD's) and the change of user for the building has not been effected thus attracting complaints from residents of Mountain View Estate.

- (iii) The nominee gave approval for the multiple funding of the same project for the United Disabled Persons of Laikipia (UDPL) while knowing that the project had been funded by the UNDP. The project was funded at a cost of Kshs. 4.17 million which was withdrawn in cash from the UNDP Equity Bank Account. The same project was funded again and the money was transferred to UNDP through UNDPK.
- (iv) The nominee being a Board Member knowingly approved the funding of organizations founded by Board Member or Trustees or their relatives without them declaring interest. Example United Disability Empowerment of Kenya (UDEK) whose founder and CEO is Ms. Salome Wanjiku Kimata a Trustee of NCPWD, funding of Kenya Association of Parents of the deaf owned by Mr. Geoffrey M. Wathigo who is a Board Member. The organization was funded to the tune of Kshs. 2.95 million in spite failure to account for Kshs. 279,110 in previous funding.
- (v) Discrimination in allocation of scholarships. As a Board Member she approved the award of scholarship to Ms Salome Wanjiku Kimata to study a master's degree at Inoorero University while leaving out needy orphans and disabled students whose scholarship requests were of much lesser value. Ms. Salome Wanjiku is a trustee of NCPWD.
- (vi) While acting as a Board Member, Ms. Josephta Mukobe approved knowingly the funding of Kshs. 25 million as cash transfer for people with several disabilities but the bulk of the money (Kshs. 15.4 million) ended up in administrative costs such as travel, telephone, imprest, per diem and therefore not benefiting the intended recipients but the officials.
- (vii) The nominee failed to ensure that funds allocated to organizations are accounted for e.g. DT 72 and UNDPK were allocated millions of shillings and failed to account for the money. Some of the organizations such as DT 72 closed shop.

Ms. Mukobe informed the Committee that contrary to the assertions in the Memorandum:-

- (i) The allegations are vague and lack proof or evidence of wrong doing.
- (ii) As a state officer at the National Council of Persons with Disabilities, she has never used her position to unlawfully or wrongfully enrich herself for any other persons.
- (iii) The funds of the NCPWD are administered by a Board of Trustees (National Fund for Persons with Disabilities) which I am not a member. She is not aware of any loss of public funds at the NCPWD.
- (iv) The property (LR NO. 12948/14) was acquired properly at open market by the Board of Trustees of the Council with Ministry of Lands valuation. The property was acquired for purposes of housing offices of the Council and is accessible to the PWD's due to its proximity to Waiyaki Way.
- (v) Issues raised by the complainants had been brought before a court of law and withdrawn by the petitioners for lack of evidence.

The Committee found the nominee's explanations satisfactory and as such the issues raised lacked merit. The Committee noted that the issues raised by the complainant against Ms. Mukobe did not touch on her character and integrity as an individual but on her as a member of the NCPWD Board. The Committee also noted that the NCPWD Board did not have the mandate to deal with financial matters of NCPWD but only dealt with policy matters. The finances of NCPWD were being handled by the Trustees.

(vi) **Corruption**

She informed the Committee that she has no corruption case or criminal case against her in any court of competent jurisdiction in Kenya. She further informed the Committee that in her career as a Civil Servant she has never been associated with nepotism, favoritism or bias in the discharge of public service.

If appointed she will strive to instill public confidence in the public sector through openness in handling public affairs and timely delivery of services.

(vii) Disability Issues

Ms. Mukobe informed the Committee that she will mainstream disability issues in government and cascade it to the County level.

The Committee found the nominee suitable for appointment as Principal Secretary for Co-ordination in the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government.

5.0 COMMITTEE'S OBSERVATIONS

5.1 PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR INTERIOR IN THE MINISTRY OF INTERIOR AND COORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT - MUTEA IRINGO

The Committee having considered his curriculum vitae and heard his oral submission during the vetting exercise/interview, made the following observations:-

- (i) **Academic qualifications:** He holds a Master degree in International Studies from University of Nairobi and a Bachelor of Arts from the same University.
- (ii) **Employment history:** He is currently the Permanent secretary, Ministry of State for Provincial Administration and Internal Security having served in the public service for 26 years and rising through the ranks. He has also served as, Secretary Internal Security, Deputy Secretary-Security, District Commissioner, Administrative Officer and District Officer in the same Ministry, Assistant Secretary, Ministry of Supplies and Marketing and Ministry of Local Government.
- (iii) **Achievements:** He has coordinated enactment of key legislation in Ministry of State for Provincial Administration and Internal Security

and implementation of the on-going police reforms as well as the security operations to counter the Al Shabaab threats.

- (iv) He oversaw the successful implementation of key development programmes as contained in the Ministries plan.
- (v) As the accounting officer in the ministry of provincial administration and national security he prudently utilized all budgetary allocation to the Ministry.
- (vi) He also coordinated the development of the draft policy on Small Arms and Light Weapon and the development of Draft Policy on Peace and Conflict Management.
- (vii) Aably coordinated several state functions and officials functions involving Head of State and other Foreign dignitaries
- (viii) **Potential conflict of interest:** He has never been charged in a Court of Law, has no potential conflict of interest, and has fully complied with his tax obligation.
- (ix) **Integrity:** He has never been dismissed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution which deals with conduct of state officers that are adversely mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliament or any Commission of Inquiry.
- (x) **Overall suitability:** The Committee's analysis of the nominee on account of Integrity, Academic qualification, Employment Record, Professional qualifications, potential conflict of interest and tax compliance was satisfactory.
- (xi) **The Committee found the nominee suitable for appointment as the Principal Secretary for Interior in the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government.**

**5.2 PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR CO-ORDINATION IN THE
MINISTRY OF INTERIOR AND CO-ORDINATION OF NATIONAL
GOVERNMENT – JOSEPHTA MUKOBE**

The Committee having considered her curriculum vitae and heard her oral submission during the vetting exercise/interview, made the following observations:-

(i) **Academic qualifications:** She holds a masters degree in Human Resource Management from University of Manchester, United Kingdom and Bachelor of Arts degree in Humanities and Social Science from University of Nairobi.

(ii) **Employment record:** She has served in the public service in various Ministries in the following dockets;

- Deputy Director Human Resource Management, Ministry of State for Planning National Development and Vision 2030 -
- Senior Director Human Resource Management in the same Ministry.
- Assistant Director, Human Resource Management.
- Chief/ Senior Personnel Officer Local Government
- Personnel Officer I & II

She has experience as a career civil servant in various management positions in the field of human resource

(iii) **Potential conflict of interest:** She has never been charged in a Court of Law, has no potential conflict of interest and has fully complied with her tax obligation since she is tax exempt in accordance with the law.

(iv) **Integrity:** She has never been dismissed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution which deals with conduct of state officers that are adversely mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliament or any Commission of Inquiry.

(v) **Overall suitability:** The Committee's analysis of the nominee on account of Integrity, Academic qualification, Employment Record, Professional qualifications, potential conflict of interest and tax

compliance was satisfactory however she did not demonstrate capacity to perform or deliver.

- (vi) **On account of her overall suitability, the need for affirmative action as provided for in Article 54 (2) of the Constitution and taking into consideration the values and principles of public service as provided for in Article 232 (i) of the Constitution, the Committee found the nominee generally suitable for appointment as the Principal Secretary for Co-ordination in the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government.**

6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

Pursuant to Article 155(3) of the Constitution and Standing Order No. 45 and 216 (5) (f) the Committee recommends that:-

1. This House approves the following two (2) nominees for appointment by H.E. the President as Principal Secretaries in Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government:-
 - 1) Mr. Mutea Iringo - Principal Secretary for Interior
 - 2) Ms. Josephtha Mukobe - Principal Secretary for Co-ordination

MIN.NO. 53/2013 – PRELIMINARY

The Chairperson called the meeting to order at Three O'clock followed by Prayer and introductions. The Chairperson informed the Members that the purpose of the sitting was to vet two Principal Secretary Nominees; Mr. Elijah Mutea Iringo – Interior and Ms. Josephtha Oyiela Mukobe – Coordination.

**MIN.NO. 54/2013 – VETTING OF THE PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR
INTERIOR IN THE MINISTRY OF INTERIOR AND CO-
ORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT - ELIJAH
MUTEA IRINGO**

The Chairperson informed him that a petition had been forwarded to the Committee raising objections to his nomination.

Mr. Iringo informed the Committee he was born in 1961 in Imenti North District, Meru County and that he's a married man.

Education and professional qualifications

Mr. Mutea Iringo took members through his educational and professional background and stated as follows: -

- (i) Holds masters in International Studies and a Bachelor of Arts both from Nairobi University.
- (ii) He has undertaken various courses within the Country and abroad on Public Administration, Security and Leadership skills.
- (iii) He's currently Permanent Secretary Ministry of Provincial Administration and Internal Security December 2012 to date.
- (iv) He has also served as, Secretary Internal Security, Deputy Secretary-Security, District Commissioner, Administrative Officer and District Officer

in the same Ministry, Assistant Secretary, Ministry of Supplies and Marketing and Ministry of Local Government.

(v) He has coordinated enactment of key legislation in Ministry of State for Provincial Administration and Internal Security and implementation of the on-going police reforms as well as the security operations to counter the Al Shabaab threats. He also coordinated the development of the draft policy on Small Arms and Light Weapon and the development of Draft Policy on Peace and Conflict Management.

(vi) He oversaw the successful implementation of key development programmes as contained in the Ministries plan.

(vii) As the accounting officer in the ministry of provincial administration and national security he prudently utilized all budgetary allocation to the Ministry.

(viii) He has never been charged in a Court of Law, has no potential conflict of interest, and has fully complied with his tax obligation.

(ix) He has never been dismissed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution which deals with conduct of state officers that are adversely mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliament or any Commission of Inquiry

In response to issues raised by the Committee members, Mr. Elijah Mutea Ingingo stated that;

(i) He has 26 years experience in civil service, and has risen through the ranks from an Administrative Officer to the position of Permanent Secretary and that the skills acquired in past duties will come in hand in the discharge of his duties should he get the job.

(ii) He applied for the position on 27th February, before the closure of application period, got shortlisted and invitation to attend the vetting.

(iii) He will deal firmly with corruption according to the Constitution and adhere strictly to procurement rules and regulations.

- (iv) He understands the culture and economic challenges facing different communities and would use this in the discharge of his mandates.
- (v) The docket comes with a number of challenges as the Ministry spreads across the Country but with improved technology and proper leadership he will succeed in the fight against insecurity.
- (vi) He will ensure timely response to questions sought from the Ministry. A Liaison officer will be appointed to co-ordinate Parliamentary Business emanating from the Committee and the office of the Leader of Majority to ensure prompt response to issues raised.
- (vii) Mr. Iringo confirmed he has no plans of engaging in other gainful duties alongside his employment as Principal Secretary and has no personal or business interest that will likely present potential conflict of interest if appointed to the position.
- (viii) He has never been dismissed from office for contravening article 75 of the constitution, for any conflict between potential interest and public or official duties.
- (ix) On wrangles between Inspector General of Police and National Police Service Commission, he informed the Committee the matter is being addressed, and that there is need to delegate some powers from the National Police Service to the inspector general of police. The recent deployment of County Commanders was necessary for security reasons following the recalling of Provincial Police Officers.
- (x) He will be able to meet Public expectation, he agreed the Ministry has shortage of personnel but will do his best with the available man power to ensure security in the Country. Will continue embarking on police reforms in order to render essential services to the people of Kenya.

(xi) On war between Governors and County Commissioners, he noted that the two levels of Government at the County are assigned different duties hence the need for the two to restrict themselves to their mandates. He informed the Committee that the conflict witnessed between the two came as a result of office and transport challenges and has so far been resolved.

(xii) On drug abuse, he called on every Kenyan citizen to take their rightful position in the fight against drugs. He promised to arrest drugs barons, enforce relevant laws, and work closely with agencies dealing with drug abuse control such as NACADA to help eradicate the vice.

On memorandum by John Mbugua and Peter Mburu he stated that;

- (i) Compensation was made to the IDPs and on misappropriation of the fund; the responsible officers were taken to court and dealt with according to the law.
- (ii) On plain crash that killed the late former Vice President George Saitoti, he said a commission of inquiry had given out its report and the matter would be handled according to the recommendations of the probe team.
- (iii) He made attempts to mop up illegal fire arms in Baragoi and put in place security surveillance in the area. He further noted that the families of officers who died in Baragoi had been compensated and that Kenya Police Reservists who lost their lives were not compensated as previous arrangements didn't cater for Kenya Police Reservists. The Government is working out modalities for compensation of police reservists and that their welfare will be taken care of so as to improve on service delivery.

MIN.NO.55/2013 - MEETING WITH ETHICS AND ANTI-CORRUPTION COMMISSION

The Committee held a meeting with Mr. Michael Mubea from Ethics and Anti Corruption Commission over a letter by EACC indicating that the Commission had received complaints against the Ms. Josephtha Mukobe and that investigation is ongoing.

Mr. Mubea stated that;-

- (i) The Commission received a complaint against the nominee from National Council for Persons with Disabilities in 2010
- (ii) The said complaint was withdrawn in 2011 and a fresh one filed touching on the misuse of the Council's money by the Board to the Council which the nominee is a member.
- (iii) On 13th June 2013, the Commission received another letter which was also addressed to the Clerk of the National Assembly in which the nominee was directly implicated and they commenced investigation immediately.
- (iv) It was hard to tell the intention of the complainant, if she was driven by the nomination of Josephtha Oyiela Mukobe to the Coordination docket.
- (v) The investigation is ongoing and would give a comprehensive report in a month's time. If the nominee is appointed to the position this will not affect the investigation and or prosecution if found culpable.

The Chairperson informed her that a petition had been forwarded to the Committee raising objections to her nomination.

Ms. Josephtha Mubea informed the Committee that she was born in 1960 in Vihiga county.

In response to issues raised by the Committee, Ms. Josephtha Oyiela Mukobe stated that;-

- (i) She holds a masters degree in Human Resource Management from University of Manchester, United Kingdom and Bachelor of Arts degree in Humanities and Social Science from University of Nairobi.
- (ii) She has served in the public service in various Ministries in the following dockets;

- Deputy Director Human Resource Management, Ministry of State for Planning National Development and Vision 2030 -
- Senior Director Human Resource Management in the same Ministry.
- Assistant Director, Human Resource Management.
- Chief/ Senior Personnel Officer Local Government
- Personnel Officer 1 & II

(iii) She has never been charged in a Court of Law, has no potential conflict of interest and has fully complied with her tax obligation since she is tax exempt in accordance with the law.

(iv) She has never been dismissed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution which deals with conduct of state officers that are adversely mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliament or any Commission of Inquiry.

(v) She informed the Committee that she has no corruption case or criminal case against her in any court of competent jurisdiction in Kenya. She further informed the Committee that in her carrier as a Civil Servant she has never been associated with nepotism, favoritism or bias in the discharge of public service.

(vi) If appointed she will strive to instill public confidence in the public sector through openness in handling public affairs and timely delivery of services and mainstream disability issues in government and cascade it to the County Level.

On memorandum by Edah Maina against her nomination, she stated that;

- (i) The allegations are vague and lack proof or evidence of wrong doing.
- (ii) As a state officer at the National Council of Persons with Disabilities, she has never used her position to unlawfully or wrongfully enrich herself for any other persons.
- (iii) The funds of the NCPWD are administered by a Board of Trustees (National Fund for Persons with Disabilities) which I am not a member. She is not aware of any loss of public funds at the NCPWD.
- (iv) The property (LR NO. 12948/14) was acquired properly at open market by the Board of Trustees of the Council with Ministry of Lands valuation. The

property was acquired for purposes of housing offices of the Council and is accessible to the PWD's due to its proximity to Waiyaki Way.

(v) Issues raised by the complainants had been brought before a court of law and withdrawn by the petitioners for lack of evidence.

On the Committee tour to Mandera, the Committee resolved to postpone the visit in order to allow the Government deal with the issue. The Committee further resolved to visit the area to assess the security situation and oversee government action.

The Committee proposed to visit Bungoma and Busia in two groups to assess the security situation on 27th - 29th June, 2013. The Members agreed to hold separate visits then later converge at Rondo Golf Club to compile the report.

MIN.NO. 50/2013 – CONSIDERATION OF GUIDING QUESTIONS AND MEMORANDUM FOR VETTING

The Committee members took up questions they would ask during the vetting of the Principal Secretaries.

The Chairman informed the Committee that they had received two memoranda from the public, one against Mr. Elijah Mutea Iringo, CBS and two against Ms. Josephtha Oyiela Mukobe and that the latter had sent a replying affidavit.

The memorandum by Rev. John Mbugua and Peter Mburu against Mr. Elijah Mutea Iringo, CBS, laid the following claims against the nominee;-

- (i) inability to end dispute between Inspector General of Police and Chairman of National Police Service Commission,
- (ii) his silence on matters of National Security
- (iii) failure to address police related issues i.e. salaries, housing and police citizen ratio and the misappropriation of IDPs fund.

The memorandum from Ms. Edah Maina against Ms. Josephtha Oyiela Mukobe laid the following claims against the nominee;-

- (i) approved funding of a proposal worth Kshs. 15M to United Disabled Person of Kenya with the knowledge that the activities listed were not to be undertaken,
- (ii) Misrepresented facts with an aim of covering up loss of Kshs. 130 million at National Council for Persons With Disabilities (NCPWD),
- (iii) Discriminated in allocation of scholarship i.e. approving masters scholarship for Ms. Salome Wanjiku, a trustee of NCPWD, at the expense of needy orphans and People With Disabilities (PWD's),
- (iv) Approved the funding of organizations founded by Board Members, Trustees or their relatives without them declaring their interest.
- (v) Knowingly gave approval of Kshs. 4.17 million for the funding of United Disable Persons of Laikipia while UNDP had fully funded the same project.
- (vi) Approved purchase of an irregularly acquired residential building at Mountain View Estate in Nairobi without change of user. The building is inaccessible to PWD's.

(vii) Approved funding of Kshs. 25 million as cash transfer to people with severe disabilities while only Kshs. 9.6 million reached the said group, the remainder being diverted to Board Members accounts as allowances.

(viii) Failed to ensure the funds allocated to organizations are accounted for.

The Ethics and Anti Corruption Commission also notified the Committee through a letter dated 17th June, 2013 that they had received a complaint against the Ms. Josephtha Mukobe which was a subject of ongoing investigations.

The Committee resolved that the issues raised in the memoranda against the nominees be executed during vetting. The Committee further resolved that the Ethics and Anti Corruption Commission be invited to appear before the committee on Thursday, June 20, 2013 at 4.30 pm to shed more light on the nature and status of investigations on the complaint against Ms. Josephtha Mukobe.


