1 The Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations was constituted on 16<sup>th</sup> May 2013 during the First Session of Eleventh (11<sup>th</sup>) Parliament pursuant to provisions of Standing Orders 216 (1). The Committee executes its mandate in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order 216 (5), from which it draws its mandate to, inter alia;

- a) *investigate, inquire into and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments; and*
- b) *vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204.*

- vii. Agreements, Treaties and Conventions.

5 Article 155(1) of the Constitution of Kenya provides that there is established the Office of the Principal Secretary, which is an office in the public service. Further, Article 155 (3) provides that the President shall nominate a person for appointment as Principal Secretary from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission; and with approval of the National Assembly, appoint the Principal Secretaries. The duties of Principal Secretaries shall be the administration of a State Department.

6 On the 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2015 in your communication, you informed the House that in a message from H. E. the President by way of letter dated 1<sup>st</sup> December 2015; H.E. the President had submitted nominees for the Office of Principal Secretary in the respective State Departments for approval by the House pursuant to Article 155 (3) (b).

Subsequently, you referred the Message from H. E. The President containing the names of twenty four Nominees together with their curriculum vitae to the relevant Departmental Committees of the House to conduct the vetting of the nominees. Further, you directed that the Committees deliberate on the nominees and table their reports.

The following two nominees were referred to the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations;

7 The Committee held its sittings on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> December 2015 and Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> December 2015 to familiarize themselves with the curriculum vitae of the nominees and to consider memoranda received thereof. On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> December 2015, the Committee held an approval hearing meeting, during which the two

nominees appeared and were vetted. In conducting the vetting exercise, the Committee made reference to the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap 136, and the Standing Orders. During the exercise, the nominees made submissions on why they should be appointed to the positions of Principal Secretaries in the respective Ministries.

- 8 The Committee, in compliance with the Constitutional and other legal requirements and established procedures for vetting, ensured its meetings were open to the public and covered by the media. The Committee also placed notifications in the mainstream print media, on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2015, inviting the public to submit memoranda, in tandem with the law.



## 1.0 BACKGROUND

### Establishment of the Office of Principal Secretary and nomination

Article 155 of the Constitution provides that;

- (1) *There is established the office of Principal Secretary, which is an office in the public service.*
- (2) *Each State department shall be under the administration of a Principal Secretary.*
- (3) *The President shall—*
  - (a) *nominate a person for appointment as Principal Secretary from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission; and*
  - (b) *with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries.*

### Issues for consideration in conducting the Approval hearing

In conducting the Approval hearing, the Committee was guided by Article 73 (2)(a) (b)(c) and (e) of the Constitution, and the provisions of Sections 6 (7) and 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136.

12. Article 73 (2) of the Constitution provides that:

- (2) *The guiding principles of leadership and integrity include—*
  - (a) *selection on the basis of personal integrity, competence and suitability, or election in free and fair elections;*
  - (b) *objectivity and impartiality in decision making, and in ensuring that decisions are not influenced by nepotism, favouritism, other improper motives or corrupt practices;*
  - (c) *selfless service based solely on the public interest, demonstrated by—*
    - (i) *honesty in the execution of public duties; and,*
    - (ii) *the declaration of any personal interest that may conflict with public duties;*

- (d) accountability to the public for decisions and actions; and  
(e) discipline and commitment in service to the people.

#### Message from H.E. the President

13. On 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2015, ~~pursuant to Standing Order 42 (1),~~ the Speaker of the National Assembly conveyed a message to the House from H.E. the President dated 1<sup>st</sup> December 2015 ~~that Amb. Peter Kimani Kaberia and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, MBS were among the candidates~~ nominated to serve as Principal Secretaries. Article 155(3)(a) ~~of the Constitution~~ confers upon the President the power to nominate, and subject to approval by the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries.
14. After conveying the message from H. E. the President on the nomination, the Speaker of the National Assembly ~~forwarded~~ the names of the nominees and their curricula vitae to the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations to conduct Approval hearings.

#### **Clearance Requirements**

15. On 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2015, the Clerk of the National Assembly wrote two letters to the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission and the Criminal Investigation Department, respectively, seeking information on the integrity of the nominees. Three other letters were written to the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Credit reference Bureau and the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), respectively, requesting for information on whether the nominees were tax compliant and whether they owed any loans to the loans Board. The nominees were also required to present their Certificates of Good Conduct.

#### **Notification to the Nominee**

16. On 2<sup>nd</sup> December, 2015, ~~the Clerk of the National Assembly,~~ pursuant to Section 6(3) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136, notified the nominees of the ~~time and place for holding~~ the Approval hearings.

### Notification to the Public

17. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136, provides that *"any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated"*.
18. On 3<sup>rd</sup> December, 2015, the Committee, through the Clerk, placed notifications in the print media informing the general public of the intention of the National Assembly to conduct an Approval hearing, pursuant to Article 118 (1)(a), (b) and (2) of the Constitution, Standing Order 198 (1) and Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136, which allow public participation in Committee proceedings. The Clerk of the National Assembly gave notification to the public to submit memoranda to his office, on the suitability or otherwise of the nominees, by Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> December 2015 at 5.00pm.

### Committee Meetings

19. The Committee carried out the vetting exercise on Friday, 11<sup>th</sup> December 2015. A total of five sittings were held. Prior to this, the Committee held two preliminary meetings to familiarize themselves with the curriculum vitae of the nominees, to formulate questions on the vetting in line with the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136, and examine Memoranda so far received.

### Submission of Memoranda

20. By close of business on Wednesday, 9<sup>th</sup> December 2015 the Committee had not received any memoranda from the public in respect of the two nominees.

### Clearance Letters

21. The Committee received letters from the Kenya Revenue Authority, indicating that the nominees were tax compliant, and the Higher Education Loans Board, stating that the Board was not owed any loans by the nominees. The Ethics and

Anti-Corruption Commission confirmed that there were no outstanding issues or ongoing investigations against the nominees. The nominees also presented before the Committee their Certificates of Good Conduct.

### The Vetting Process

22. On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> December 2015 the Committee held sessions with the Principal Secretaries nominees. In conducting the vetting exercise, the Committee was guided by, among other documents, the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136 and the National Assembly Standing Orders.

## 2.0 VETTING OF NOMINEES FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE POSITION OF PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES

23. The Committee examined the nominee using the guidelines provided for in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act Cap. 136. Section 6 (7) of Act provides that, *"An approval hearing shall focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and gackground."*
24. Section 7 of the Act further provides for issues for consideration by the relevant House of Parliament in relation to any nomination, and these shall be –
- (a) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
  - (b) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
  - (c) the suitability of the nominee for appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is being made.
25. The Committee therefore applied the following criteria in vetting the nominee: -
- i. Academic qualifications
  - ii. Employment record and work experience
  - iii. Professional associations
  - iv. Public office, political activities and affiliations

- v. Potential conflict of interest
- vi. Suitability to the position
- vii. Tax compliance
- viii. Integrity

**21 ~~AMB. PETER KIRIMI~~ KABERIA - PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE,  
~~MINISTRY OF DEFENCE~~**

26. ~~Amb. Peter Kirimi~~ Kaberia appeared before the Committee on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> December 2015 at 2.00pm. The Committee having heard his submissions during the meeting, made the following observations on his nomination to the position of Principal Secretary, Ministry of Defence: -

**a. Personal Background**

He was born on 19<sup>th</sup> August 1967 in Maua, Igembe South Constituency, Meru County. He is married to Ms. Serah Nduta with four (4) children, two (2) boys and two (2) girls.

**b. Academic Background**

He holds a Master's degree in International Law (2010), A Bachelor's Degree from Marquette University (1994), Bachelor of Arts Degree from Daystar University (1992) and various courses from various Universities and other institutions.

**c. Professional Experience**

Since 2010 to date he is the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, Kenya Embassy in Brasilia with accreditation to Argentina, Chile, Colombia and Venezuela.

Recent positions he has held include-

- (i) ~~Charge D' Affairs~~, Kenya Embassy Madrid, Spain;
- (ii) ~~Deputy~~ Head of mission /Head of Chancery, Kenya Embassy Madrid, Spain (2007-2010);
- (iii) ~~First~~ Counsellor/head of Chancery, Kenya Embassy Paris France;

- (iv) Head of ICT, Research and PR at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Headquarters in Nairobi; and
- (v) First Counsellor, Kenya Embassy in Washington DC;

Other experiences previously include-

- i. Director for International programs at Marquette University Les Aspin Centre, Washington DC (1996-2002);
- ii. Lecturer for Media and Campaigns strategy at Marquette University and Les Aspin Centre;
- iii. Washington times Foreign Desk News Analysis; and
- iv. British Broadcasting Corporation Reporter.

**d. Achievements**

Some of his accomplishments include-

- i. Founder ATCnet (African Trade Consultants Network) and organization specializing in Links for Africans and markets abroad.
- ii. Head of campaigns to increase Western countries/African Relations in trade and investments. Africa Beyond 2000.
- iii. Created and maintained a network of High-level private sector partners in the United States, France, Spain, Colombia and Brazil.
- iv. Designed campaign strategy for NGO and government Coalition in Africa to fight the spread of HIV/AIDS, capacity building, African interest advocacy etc.
- v. Founder of the International program for the Les Aspin Center and developer of the various strategies used in training of African Leaders and their follow-up programs.
- vi. He has written many publications including books, journal articles, occasional papers, chapters in books, and commissioned research and reports.
- vii. He has made immense input to many conferences and workshops as a either presenter, facilitator, chair, resource person or participant.

- viii. He has fully complied with his ~~tax obligations to the State~~ and has never been dismissed from office for contravention of provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution, which deals with conduct of state officers.
  - ix. He has never been adversely mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliament or any Commission of Inquiry.
  - x. He is not a member of any political party and does not expect any conflict of interest to arise.
  - xi. He has been involved in charity work in his community by among others, supporting curriculum development, undertaking career counseling sessions, giving lectures to various classes and paying secondary school fees for some five needy students.
  - xii. He has never been charged in a court of law for any offence.
27. Members of the Committee sought to find out the nominee's position regarding the withdrawal of the Kenya Defence Forces from Somalia following numerous calls for the withdrawal, in a bid to safeguard the Country from future terror attacks. In his response, the nominee held that such a move should be sanctioned by Parliament since it is the only body with such powers.
28. With regards to the recent negative publicity against the KDF following various allegations of illegal charcoal trade in Kismayu, the Ambassador maintained that there are stipulated guidelines in the KDF Act on how to handle such matters and would be applicable if the culprits are identified.
29. On how the nominee would address the issue of Corruption as a major ill in the Country, Amb. Kaberia agreed with the sentiments saying that as the accounting officer in the Ministry he would be guided by the set out rules. He also noted that his track record has shown that he never condoned corruption.

## 2.2 MS. BETTY CHEMUTAI MAINA – PRINCIPAL SECRETARY NOMINEE, EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY INTEGRATION

30. Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina appeared before the Committee on Friday, 11<sup>th</sup> December 2015, at 3.00 p.m. The nominee took an oath to affirm the details she

would divulge to the Committee. The chair then asked the honorable members of the committee and the committee secretariat to introduce themselves. During the introductions, the following members - Hon. Ndung'u Gethenji, MP, Hon. Elisha Busienei, MP and Hon. Annah Nyokabi, MP declared interests with the nominee under the Standing Order no. 90 of the National Assembly.

31. In her introductory remarks, the nominee affirmed that she is a trained land economist and policy analyst from the University College of London. The nominee informed the members that she is currently the Regional Representative for the Genesis Analytics, an economic analysis firm. She also said that previously she worked as the Chief Executive officer for Kenya Association of Manufactures and Institute of Economic Affairs. She was also an independent consultant in areas of economic governance and policy advocacy besides being a Research Assistant at the UN Habitat.

**On the suitability of the nominee for appointment as the Principal Secretary for East Africa Community Integration**

32. The nominee informed the committee that she would like to put into practice the experiences, ideas and information gathered for 20 years of consultancy, private sector and non-state organizations into actions and service in the public service.
33. The nominee informed the committee that her 11 years of familiarity with the market research, engagement with customs union and interacting with businesses facing frustrations in the EAC and the COMESA regions places her in a position of applying her leadership skills and management experience in coming up with programs and managing resources that enhance a better environment for establishing Business.

**How to move the state department of EAC and Integration forward having a Private Sector background experience and organize the EAC integration to get on trade and agreements working and eliminating bureaucracy and incorporate other partnerships.**

34. The nominee informed the committee that the private Sector is profit oriented while Public Sector is bent more on the political achieving of political objectives, and that her interactions were mainly with the public officers with whom they worked together to achieve shared objectives. She stated that she would bring in an analytical mind to help people know what is required for business and articulate issues of standards. She has an understanding of how public policy influence legislation and institutions especially in budgetary legislations.

**On how to overcome challenges faced by the EAC states**

35. The nominee informed the Committee that she would engage more inclusive and knowledgeable actors and negotiators who are socially accepted through public education and putting up legal and financial consequences to whoever impedes the integration process.
36. The nominee further informed the Committee that integration would require a political leadership that is willing to accept these legal consequences and comply and align modernization standards that will not be unfriendly to institute barriers and concessions.
37. The nominee informed the Committee that she would endeavor to increase the volume of exports in the region, which is already dropping as compared to other partner states, that has theirs shot up.

**Regarding how she will achieve the shortfall/deficit of budgetary resource requirement and deficit at the EAC state department.**

38. The nominee informed the committee that she would advise on bringing in partners such as United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and Trademark East Africa to help in education, support research and communication and regional travel.
39. She further said that the EAC state department deals with majorly political Issues and would work a lot with other departments who are principal negotiators of the deals and treaties to mobilize resources available in the country for development.

Achieving ~~Integration amongst~~ the EAC partner despite Kenya being viewed as an economic ~~Giant and how~~ would Kenya tap into this perception to ~~match countries like Egypt and South Africa.~~

40. The nominee ~~informed the Committee~~ that every country normally pursued its interest and ~~therefore it is important~~ to keep engaging with each without ~~infringing on the other states interests and~~ at the same time protect your countries own interests. ~~EAC Integration will~~ create more dynamics within the region.
41. The nominee ~~further stated that~~ Kenya should continue on the issue of the monetary union as it had expressed hosting the institution and it will enhance the integration process ~~and the member states~~. On the other hand Sudan should be may be admitted into the EAC because a stable Sudan would be in the best interest of Kenya. Ethiopia ~~looks at~~ a regional cooperation with Kenya as a long time roadmap. Integration will give the EAC member states an opportunity to share roles ~~and values considering~~ security.

#### With regard to corruption

42. The nominee informed the Committee that she would endeavor to cooperate with the institutions and legal framework that are in place in dealing with graft. She stated that she would adhere to procurement related decisions, and proper documentation, exercising vigilance and discipline.

#### Overlap of various departments in government such as EAC/Foreign Affairs and ~~involvement of State Department of EAC with the Parliamentary Committee on Regional Integration~~

43. The nominee ~~informed the Committee~~ that the state department of EAC was hived from ~~the Ministry of Foreign Affairs~~ in response to the treaty that established the EAC to ~~expedite coordination~~ of integration and agreements amongst member states. ~~Therefore she would adhere~~ to work alongside the EAC treaty and a new executive ~~order that will~~ definitely streamline the overlaps of the government

ministries. She would endeavor to exercise collaboration to minimize friction, and would ensure that the EAC responds to issues that are raised by the committee on regional integration as required by law and parliamentary standing orders.

44. In conclusion, the Committee summarized the nominees curriculum vitae as follows: -

**a. Personal Background**

She was born on 3<sup>rd</sup> April 1965 in Kericho County. She is not married.

**b. Academic Background**

She holds a Masters of Science degree in Development Administration and Planning from University College London; and a Bachelors of Arts Degree with honors in Land Economics from the University of Nairobi.

**c. Professional Experience**

Currently, she is an economic consultant with the East Africa Partner, Genesis Analytics that is a firm of more than 80 Consultants with offices in Johannesburg, New Delhi, Dubai and Nairobi.

Previously, she was the Chief Executive, Kenya Association of Manufactures, a position she held from July 2004 to June 2015. Prior to this position, she was the Chief Executive – at the Institute of Economic Affairs in Kenya between January 1997 and March 2003.

Other positions she has held previously include-

- i. Consultant in the Local government reform programme in Kenya (1996 – 1997)







The meeting was called to order at thirty five minutes past Two O'clock and prayers were said by the Committee's Vice-Chairperson, Hon. Elias Bare Shill, M.P.

The Agenda was amended to exclude agenda items numbered three (3) to eleven (11). It was then adopted, having been proposed by Hon. David Pkosing, MP and seconded by Hon. Elisha Busienei, MP.

The Chairperson asked the nominee to take an oath before the Parliamentary committee on Defence and Foreign Relations and thereafter invited the nominee to brief the committee on his educational and professional qualifications.

**1. Educational and Professional Qualifications**

The nominee took Members through his educational and professional background and stated that-

- i. He was born on the 19<sup>th</sup> of August 1967 in Meru County.
- ii. He holds a Master's degree in International Law (2010), a Bachelor's Degree from Marquette University (1994), a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Daystar University (1992) and various courses from various Institutions.

**2. Work Experience**

- i. He informed the committee that he has been the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, Kenya Embassy in Brasilia with accreditation to Argentina, Chile, Colombia and Venezuela since 2010 to date.
- ii. Recent positions he has held include Charge D' Affairs, Kenya Embassy Madrid, Spain; Deputy Head of mission /Head of Chancery, Kenya Embassy Madrid, Spain(2007-2010); First Counsellor/head of Chancery, Kenya Embassy Paris France; Head of ICT, Research and PR at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Headquarters in Nairobi; First Counsellor, Kenya Embassy in Washington DC.
- iii. He was the Director for International programs at Marquette University Les Aspin Centre, Washington DC (1996-2002)

- iv. He was a Lecturer for Media and Campaigns strategy at Marquette University and Les Aspin Centre

Members of the Committee sought to find out the nominee's position regarding the withdrawal of the Kenya Defence Forces from Somalia following numerous calls for the withdrawal, in a bid to safeguard the Country from future terror attacks. In his response, the nominee held that such a move should be sanctioned by Parliament since it is the only body with such powers.

With regards to the recent negative publicity against the KDF following various allegations of illegal charcoal trade in Kismayu, the Ambassador maintained that there are stipulated guidelines in the KDF Act on how to handle such matters and would be applicable if the culprits are identified.

The Committee noted with concern that Corruption was a major ill in the Country and sought to find out how the nominee would handle the matter if it arose in his line Ministry. In his response, Mr. Kaberia agreed with the sentiments saying that as the accounting officer in the Ministry he would be guided by the set out rules. He also noted that his track record has shown that he never condoned corruption.

With regards to achieving the deficit of budgetary resource requirement and deficit at the EAC state department, the nominee said that she would advise on bringing in partners to help in the education sector, support research, communication and regional travel. She further said that the EAC state department deals with majorly political Issues and will work a lot with other departments who are principal negotiators of the deals and treaties to mobilize resources available in the country for the development.

With regards to corruption, Ms. Betty informed the committee that she will endeavor to cooperate with the institutions and legal framework that are in place to dealing with graft. She will adhere to procurement related decisions, and proper documentation, exercising vigilance and discipline.

The Committee sought to find out how Ms. Betty would achieve Integration amongst the EAC partners despite Kenya being viewed as an economic Giant and how Kenya would tap into this perception to match countries like Egypt and South Africa. In her response, the nominee informed the committee that every country pursues its interest and therefore it is important to keep engaging with each Country without infringing on the other states interests and at the same time protecting

On the other hand Sudan should be admitted into the EAC because a stable Sudan is in the best interest of Kenya. Integration will give the EAC member states an opportunity to share roles and values considering security.



### **IV. Extra judicial Killings and Sale of Sugar/Charcoal**

During the meeting, It was alleged that KDF camps are being used as torture Chambers and that the KDF officers are allegedly carrying out heinous acts of extrajudicial killings as reported by Kenya national Commission on Human rights. The committee resolves to investigate these incidences including the disappearance of Kenyans living in Mandera.

During the meeting it was reported that there are accusations on the KDF regarding the selling of Sugar and Charcoal as report by the journalists for justice.

In view of the above allegations regarding extrajudicial Killings and sale of Charcoal/ Sugar. The committee recommended that evidences adducing to these allegations to be tabled before the committee so as to allow the committee to invite the following to the committee Sitzings to inquire on these matter: -

1. D.G. National Intelligence service
2. C.S. The Ministry of Interior (Director for Immigration)
3. C.S. The Ministry of foreign Affairs
4. C.S. Defence with Kenya Defence Forces to shed light on the matter.
5. C. S. Interior to shed light on the Matter.

6. Executive Director, Journalists for Justice.

The committee further resolved to visit Kismayu and the affected areas.


