INTRODUCTION

1. Resolution of the National Assembly

On Wednesday 29th April 1992, the National Assembly passed the following resolution:-

"THAT, while appreciating the Government's efforts to stop tribal clashes in western and other parts of Kenya, and in view of the continued fighting in the region despite these efforts, and considering the repercussions this has on our Government locally and internationally; this House resolves to appoint a Select Committee to probe the root causes of the fighting and to make recommendations with a view to averting such incidents in future".

At its first sitting on 14th May, 1992, the Committee elected the Hon. J.K. Kiliku, M.P. as Chairman.

2. Interpretation and Modalities

The Committee, at its second sitting on 19th May 1992, set out the modalities and scope of its mandate and agreed that it was required under the Resolution to:-

- (a) investigate the root causes of the recent ethnic clashes that have raged since September 1991;
- (b) identify person or persons, if any that may have perpetrated the clashes.

In this respect, the Committee set out to examine the roles of the following:-

- (i) politicians and political parties;
 - (ii) organized groups such as churches and other religious organizations, voluntary and professional organizations;
 - (iii) the general public including individuals;
 - (iv) the Provincial Administration and the security personnel;
 - (v) local and international mass media;
- c) make recommendations that would avert recurrence of similar clashes in the future.

3. The Committee was to be investigative and fact finding and all proceedings were to be recorded and to be confidential in keeping with the Procedure of the House and the National Assembly (Powers and Privileges) Act (Cap 6). It was agreed that the name

of the Committee should be "Parliamentary Select Committee to Investigate Ethnic Clashes in Western and other parts of Kenya", hereinafter referred to as "the Committee".

4. On 20th May 1992, the Committee, through advertisements in the mass media called on all members of the public, religious organizations, public and private bodies, trade unions, professional bodies, lobby groups or affected persons, who may:-

- (i) have in their possession any evidence which may be useful to the Committee; and
- (ii) have any information which could assist the Committee in its investigation;

to write or contact the Secretary to the Parliamentary Select Committee on Ethnic Clashes, Parliament Buildings, P.O. Box 41842, Nairobi.

5. The Committee received both oral and written evidence and information. The Committee held 48 sittings both at Parliament Buildings and in the affected areas between 14th May and 5th September, 1992. For over a four-week period the Committee visited clash affected areas as follows:-

LEG I	5th to 13th June 1992	Nakuru, Trans Nzoia, Bungoma, Kakamega, and Uasin Gishu districts.
LEG II	2nd to 16th July 1992	Uasin Gishu, Nandi, Kisumu, Kericho, Kisii, Nyamira, Kisii and Narok districts.
LEG III	29th to 30th July 1992	The committee split into three sub-committees each visiting:- <ul style="list-style-type: none">(i) Molo and Ndoinet in Nakuru district;

(ii) Londiani and Soy divisions in Kericho and Uasin-Gishu district respectively; and

(iii) Saboti division and Mt. Elgon sub district in Trans-Nzoia and Bungoma.

6. In addition to the formal sittings, the Committee visited the scenes of clashes, camps of displaced persons, took photographs, collected an assortment of weapons purportedly used during the clashes, visited alleged training camp sites and collected data available at Provincial Administration and the Police on deaths, injuries, prosecutions, stolen or destroyed property.
7. The Committee received hundreds of written memoranda and interviewed 836 witnesses, including leaders of political parties, administrators, religious organisations and wananchi.
8. The Committee devised the most efficient and time-saving ways of collecting evidence, taking care not to compromise confidentiality with economy of time. Accordingly, witnesses who appeared to have a common interest were interviewed together, with their concurrence.

CHAPTER ONE:

PRELUDE TO THE ETHNIC CLASHES

1.0 MULTIPARTY AND MAJIMBO DEBATES

1.1 The Multi-party debate

1.1.1 Kenya became independent on December 12, 1963, after nearly seventy years of British Colonial rule. The independence constitution had a multi-party political set-up on which the pre-independence general elections of May, 1963, were contested by the three leading political parties - namely the Kenya African National Union - KANU, the Kenya African Democratic Union - KADU and the African Peoples Party - A.P.P.

1.1.2 At independence KANU formed the government under the late Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, first as Prime Minister and from December 12, 1964, as President. A **de facto** one party state, was achieved following the voluntary dissolution of KADU and A.P.P, and their merger with KANU prior to declaration of the Republic. Initially, in 1960 when the colonial government had lifted the ban on the formation of national political parties by Africans, the move was to form one party-the Kenya African National Union. Indeed KANU was formed in June, 1960 by a cross section of multi-ethnic Kenyan nationalists and elites. Since its formation, KANU has pursued a political philosophy favouring unitary set up of government with central executive authority in one head of government and state, a national legislature, national judiciary and all other institutions with a national apex. This approach to management of national affairs raised sizeable fears among certain ethnic groups. It soon became clear that, KANU was totally dominated by the Kikuyu and Luo ethnic groups that at the time were the largest and second largest single ethnic groups. The smaller ethnic groups saw that joining KANU would have led to their perpetual domination by the two. They sought to counter this by forming their own national party - the Kenya African Democratic Union - KADU.

- 1.1.3** From its inception KADU pursued a political philosophy of regionalism that sought to create a government in which the semi-autonomous regions "majimbo", would have substantial say over many matters affecting them. The central government would have its role and authority carefully defined and regulated by ceding most of its power to the regions.
- 1.1.4** The independence constitution had a strong dose of the frame-work and structures that fulfilled the desires of the "majimbo" architects. In order to forestall any possible domination of one ethnic group by another, the architects of "majimbo" ensured that the provincial boundaries were drawn along ethnic divide lines. The outcome was that, a conglomeration of one ethnic group, say the Kikuyu, Abaluhya, Kalenjin, etc. were grouped together in one province, in effect the "majimbo". The "majimbo" framework thus ensured that Kenyans exuding many similarities were grouped together to enable them dictate their common future as best suited them.
- 1.1.5** However following Independence, and with the cultivation of a definite national outlook by the KANU government, coupled with an overwhelming national desire to promulgate a republican constitution on the first anniversary of independence, the fears of the leaders of KADU were sufficiently allayed to make a merger with KANU possible. Hence following extensive and intensive negotiations and bargaining, KADU leaders agreed to effect a voluntary dissolution and subsequent merger with KANU.
- 1.1.6** The *de facto* one-party status lasted till March, 1966, when the then Vice-President Jaramogi Oginga Odinga resigned his portfolio and renounced KANU membership during the heated Limuru Annual Delegates Conference of KANU.
- 1.1.7** In April, 1966, Mr. Oginga Odinga with others, launched an opposition party-the Kenya Peoples Union - KPU. Following more defections from KANU, a "mini-general" election was held in June, 1966, and thus K.P.U. became a Parliamentary opposition party. This was shortlived as in August 1969 following disturbances in Kisumu during a visit by the late President Mzee Kenyatta, KPU was proscribed. A

de facto one party status was to exist till June, 1982, when Parliament enacted section 2A of the constitution to make Kenya a **de jure** one party state.

- 1.1.8** During a New Year's sermon at the PCEA St. Andrews church in Nairobi on 1st January 1990, the Rev. Dr. Timothy Njoya urged an end to the one party system in Kenya in view of what was happening in Eastern Europe. His remarks drew heavy criticism from many KANU leaders. In the debate on the Presidential Address at the State Opening of Parliament, several honourable Members in their contributions opposed the idea of introducing the multi-party system in Kenya on the grounds that the Kenyan situation was totally different to what had existed in Eastern Europe.
- 1.1.9** In April of that year, Bishop Henry Okullu of the Maseno South CPK diocese called for a constitutional change and suggested a two five- year term limit for future Presidents in Kenya. Soon thereafter, Messrs Charles W. Rubia and Kenneth S.N. Matiba who had fallen out of favour with the Government, called for a national referendum to decide the country's political future. Parliament mounted a strong counter attack against them.
- 1.1.10** In June 1990 a KANU Review Committee led by H.E. the Hon. Professor Saitoti, EGH. M.P. - the Vice-President and Minister for Finance, was established by the KANU National Governing Council to hear wananchi's views on the country's political future.
- 1.1.11** In July 1990 Messrs Rubia and Matiba were detained just before the 'Saba Saba' riots of 7th July which left over 20 people dead and over 60 injured around Nairobi. On 23rd November 1990, Mr. Oginga Odinga announced his intention to launch a new political party (the National Democratic Party), which could not be registered in view of the existing Constitutional provisions.
- 1.1.12** In August 1991, Messrs Oginga Odinga, Martin Shikuku, the late Masinde Muliro, George Nthenge, Philip Gachoka and Ahmed Bamahriz announced the formation of the Forum for Restoration of Democracy (FORD) as a pressure group.

1.1.13 On 8th and 21st September 1991 respectively, a number of Rift Valley leaders at two rallies at Kapsabet and Kapkatet vehemently attacked advocates of multipartyism and proposed Majimboism as an alternative. There followed three other rallies in Narok on 28th September, Machakos on 7th October and Mombasa on 17th October 1991 which appeared to have softened in tone as time went by.

1.1.14 On 16th October 1991⁷,^{Nov.} the FORD attempted to hold a meeting at Kamukunji grounds in Nairobi which was, however, dispersed by the police as it was not licensed. Thereafter on 19th October 1991, Parliament passed a Motion condemning the involvement of the United States Ambassador to Kenya, Mr. Smith Hempstone, in the organisation of an illegal gathering and demanded his recall. On 3rd December, 1991 a KANU Special Delegates' Conference recommended repeal of Section 2A of the constitution. Thereafter, on 10th December 1991, Parliament repealed section 2A of the constitution reverting Kenya to a multiparty state.

1.2 THE "MAJIMBO" DEBATE AND RALLIES

1.2.1 The two "Majimbo" rallies which were often quoted by witnesses as having fanned ethnic antagonism, were respectively held at Kapsabet in Nandi and Kapkatet in Kericho districts both in Rift Valley Province.

These rallies were preceded by a statement by the Hon. Dr. J.K. Misoi, Member of Parliament for Eldoret South, at a press conference in Eldoret, declaring that he had drafted a 'Majimbo' constitution which he would table before the House if proponents of multi-partism continued their crusade.

1.2.2 According to evidence received and press reports which have since not been denied by the those mentioned, the following transpired at the meeting held at Kapsabet on 8th September 1991:-

The meeting was chaired by Mr. Henry Kosgey Chairman of KANU Nandi branch. It was attended, among others, by Ministers John Cheruiyot, Timothy Mibei, Assistant

Ministers Kipkalia Kones, Eric Bomett, Willy Kamuren, M.P.s Paul Chepkok, Benjamin Kositany, Ezekiel Barngetuny and 34 councilors from Nandi Kericho/Bomet and Nakuru districts. Members of Parliament present supported the introduction of a "Majimbo" constitution which they said they intended to table in parliament when the House resumed. Under the constitution, they said, outsiders in Rift Valley would be required to go back to their "motherland".

1.2.3 The Kapsabet meeting resolved:-

- (a) to take action against FORD members;
- (b) to fight anti-establishment figures using all means at their disposal so as to protect the government and the ruling party KANU; and
- (c) to ban Mr. Paul Muite (who was strongly advocating multi-partism), from setting foot in Rift Valley Province.

1.2.4 The Kapkatet rally held on 21st September, 1991 was attended by the following leaders from Rift Valley: Ministers K.N.K. Biwott, John Cheruiyot, Assistant Ministers Kipkalia Kones, Francis Mutwol, Willy Kamuren, William Kikwai, John Terer, Lawi Kiplagat, Christopher Lomada, Peter Nangole and Members of Parliament Ayub Chepkwony, Robert Kipkorir and Samson ole Tuya. It was chaired by Minister Timothy Mibei.

The Members "banned" advocates of multi-partyism from setting foot in Rift-Valley Province and reportedly ordered the late Mr. Masinde Muliro, a founder Member of FORD, to move out of Trans Nzoia district.

1.2.5 They further condemned Nairobi leaders for offering safe haven to the opposition and decided that a motion be tabled in parliament to proscribe the Law Society of Kenya. Hon. Biwott said that FORD members would be "crushed" and added that KANU youthwingers and wananchi were ready to fight to the last person to protect the

Government of President Moi. He said that Kalenjins were not cowards and that they were ready to counter attempts to relegate them from leadership. Hon. Mibei instructed wananchi in the province to visit beer - halls and 'crush' any government critic and later make reports to the police that they had finished them, while Hon. Kamuren said that the Kalenjin were ready to protect the government using any weapons at their disposal. Another Member said that FORD members would be "crushed" to serve as a lesson to other would-be dissenters. Hon. Chepkok urged wananchi to arm themselves with pangas, rungas, bows and arrows to destroy any FORD member on sight.

- 1.2.6** These two rallies, according to the evidence of several witnesses before the Committee alarmed Kenyans especially the non-Kalenjin living in the Rift Valley.

CHAPTER TWO:

NAKURU DISTRICT

2.1 HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1.1** Of all the "ethnic clash" areas in the country, the Molo and Olenguruone divisions comprise the largest single area. The two divisions cover a wide area west of Nakuru district neighbouring Narok and Kericho districts to the West, and Uasin Gishu and Baringo districts to the North. Most of Nakuru district was part of the colonial settlers 'White Highlands'. Molo is comprised of Keringet, Ndoinet, Keriso and Molo South locations which cover a vast area. Located on the West Mau highlands, Molo with its undulating hills and cool climate was one of the bastions of the white settler community in Kenya. On the advent of independence in 1963, many indigenous Kenyans moved in to acquire farms left by the departing European settlers, through co-operatives societies, or outright purchase by individuals. However, a big proportion of the land was purchased by the government under the Settlement Fund Trustees or the Agricultural Development Corporation. The process of settling people in Settlement Fund Trustees or ADC operated farms spanned over many years and was continuing even in the late eighties. Concomitant with this, selling and buying of land on individual basis has continued over the years. The result is that Molo division is a cosmopolitan society, the majority of the population being Kikuyu, Kalenjin and Abagusii with a good representation of most other Kenyan communities.
- 2.1.2** Olenguruone is markedly different, no doubt due to its distant location and poor accessibility. Situated on the highlands of South West Mau Plateau, it was part of the Maasai land unit. However, 34,700 acres were purchased by the colonial government in 1941 in order to settle over 4000 Kikuyu squatters originally displaced by white settlers in Central Province.

The displaced squatters had been turned into ready cheap labour on the white highlands. As time went by, the squatters started to flee the white highlands and settle in Il Melili and Nairage Ngare in North Narok. In their new habitation, the squatters carried out lucrative cultivation which attracted more squatters from the white highlands. The white settlers in Nakuru started getting alarmed that the settlement in Narok would attract more squatters from their farms thereby denying them a ready labour supply. Consequently it was decided to move them to far-off Olenguruone, where discontented Kikuyu could be 'abandoned' without the danger of spreading squatter discontent.

The first squatters were moved there in 1941. Unlike their counterparts who had been moved to Lari in Kiambu, the Olenguruone settlers were not given any rights to the land. Further, new rules of land use began to be enforced. There was open defiance of the administration whereupon the government decided to evict the squatters. By early 1950 most of the squatters had already been evicted, their houses and crops destroyed. They were removed to Yatta B in Machakos. The resistance of these squatters and their open defiance of the colonial government had a major impact on the subsequent Mau Mau movement.

The resettlement of people in Olenguruone resumed after independence when in the 1970's the government settled Kikuyus, Kalenjin and the Dorobo living in the Ndoinet forest. These diverse groups of people have been living harmoniously over the years, until the ethnic clashes erupted in March 1992.

2.2 TIME SPAN OF THE ETHNIC CLASHES

Evidence and information available to the Committee indicated that the time span of the Clashes in Molo and Olenguruone covered the period Mid-February to August 1992. Since the initial clashes started in Meteitei farm in Nandi district in late October 1991, tension and suspicion in Molo had increased. The first incidents of house burning was reported on 15th March 1992 in Nguirubi farm. The clashes

spread to Olenguruone from Kamwaura. A Mr. Chepkilach is alleged to have died at the hands of the Kikuyu whereby the Kalenjin attacked to revenge his death.

2.3 EVIDENCE

2.3.1 The Committee set out to gather evidence by first calling on the Nakuru District Commissioner Mr. Ishmael Chelanga, who gave an overview of the situation in the affected areas of Molo and Olenguruone. For the next three days, the Committee took evidence at Kamwaura, Kerisoi (two days) and Saosa Primary School in Olenguruone.

2.3.2 Evidence was received from the representatives of different ethnic groups, namely the Kikuyu, the Kalenjin, the Dorobo, Abaluhya and Abagusii communities, on the first day, Friday 5th June, 1992, at Kamwaura shopping centre in Molo South location, where 22 persons were appointed by the crowd to represent their views. Later the same day, the Committee travelled to Kerisoi Health Centre where there was a large gathering. As the sitting went on into the night, the meeting had to be rescheduled to the following Sunday so as to complete the task.

On 6th June, the Committee visited Olenguruone which is over 75 kilometers from Molo. The journey was made more arduous by the state of the roads and prevalent rain at the time. Twenty one witnesses appeared on behalf of a large group of residents, who turned up to give evidence. Each ethnic group's views were presented by representatives freely chosen by all.

2.3.3. For procedural convenience, each group appeared in turn before the committee and gave their side of the story. Generally, in Molo and Olenguruone, the clashes pitted the Kalenjin (mainly Kipsigis) on the one hand, and non-Kalenjins (mainly Kikuyu, Abagusii, Abaluhya, Luo and others) on the other.

2.3.4 The evidence given at Kamwaura related to the ethnic clashes in Sitoito, Ngori, Boron, Lagwenda, Temyotta, Muchorwi, Chemanel, Ikumbi, Sakiatim, (

irubi,
reticha,

Keringet, Tebere and other nearby farms. There were witnesses also from Mau Summit and Turi areas which are outside Molo South. The Dorobos sent representatives from nearby Ndoinet Forest.

Witnesses were agreed that the burning of houses started on the night of 15th March 1992. Prior to that, the Kalenjin claimed that two houses had been burnt by the Kikuyu on 15th February 1992 after which there was an address by the District Officer, Molo, at a public meeting at Sitoito centre, whereupon the two groups promised to keep the peace. The Kikuyu alleged that they found anonymous leaflets which were telling non-Kalenjins to leave, as Molo South was a 'Kalenjin area'. There was then a lull.

2.3.5 On March, 14, 1992 at about 10 p.m., a house belonging to a Maina Wakahiu in Nguirubi farm was burnt. Mayhem thereafter ensued and the burning of houses and the killing and maiming took a swift turn. The weapons used by the Kalenjin were bows and arrows and spears, while the Kikuyu used rungas and pangas. The non-Kalenjin stated that the Kalenjin appeared to be well organised and that there were 'warriors', whose faces were smeared with clay, who appeared to be well co-ordinated and trained. It was alleged that they had the support of the administration as, at one stage, at the Highland Grass Research Station, Molo, a helicopter carrying administration and security personnel landed in their midst and no action was taken to disarm the Kalenjin 'warriors'. Further, they claimed that those non-Kalenjin from Molo and other towns coming to assist in the fighting were themselves disarmed on the way and ordered to go back by the police.

By 20th April 1992, most of the area around Kamwaura inhabited by the non-Kalenjin had been deserted. The Kalenjin had similarly deserted farms nearer Molo town, where they were less in number. Hundreds of houses had been razed to the ground. At the time of the Committee's visit in early June, 1992, many farms were still deserted and people were now living in nearby towns and markets or in camps.

- 2.3.6** Witnesses at Kerisoi Health Centre (Kerisoi Trading Centre) were drawn from the Kipsigis, Kikuyu, Kisii and others, of Tachasis, Set Kotes, Bochege, Central, Temyotta, Mwaragania, Kamuingi, Murinduko, Haraka, Mawingo and surrounding farms. Accusations were traded between the Kalenjin on the one hand, and the non-Kalenjin, on the other.
- 2.3.7** Evidence given by Mr. Kiprono arap Chumo, a representatives of the Kalenjin, pointed to utterances by the local Member of Parliament, Hon. John Njenga Mungai, as one of the reasons for the clashes. According to him, these utterances were directed to the Kikuyu community and tended to incite them against the Kalenjin. Another reason given was the lack of understanding of the newly introduced multipartyism. The Kalenjin believed that anybody who was anti-KANU was against them and must therefore be resisted at all costs. The recently registered FORD was recruiting members from the non-Kalenjin communities. Mr. Chumo claimed to have seen about 400 Kikuyu youth burning houses in Tachasis farm. The youth also allegedly killed Mr. Samuel Sambu, the headmaster of Lagwenda Primary School. He identified a number of youth who were involved in the burning of houses. The Kikuyu and Abagusii representatives alleged that clashes were instigated by the Kalenjin as evidenced by leaflets requiring non-Kalenjin to leave Molo South, as it was 'Kipsigis land', that started circulating in early March. This was followed by the burning of houses on 24th April 1992.
- 2.3.8** Mr. Njoroge of Haraka farm claimed to have seen two army helicopters on 24th April 1992, which to him indicated that the government was involved in the clashes. He claimed that he saw Kalenjin 'warriors' in T-shirts and shorts, their faces adorned with clay, who were following the police, who were chasing away the Kikuyu, to pave way for the burning of houses. He maintained that the Kalenjin were the attackers and that non-Kalenjin only rose in self-defence after these attacks.

Mr. Francis Makori of Central Farmers Company alleged that the clashes may have been sparked off by statements made by various Kalenjin leaders. One Mr. Kiplangat arap Cherubo of Bochege farm is said to have threatened stern action against those

who would attempt to introduce FORD or DP in Kerisoi area, during a meeting on 16th March 1992 at Kamuingi farm. According to Mr. Makori, Mr. arap Cherubo repeated the sentiments at two other meetings, one chaired by the local Assistant Chief Mr. Elijah Tanui. Mr. Peter Kinuthia of Central Farmers recalled that at a public meeting in April 1992 attended by the Nakuru D.C. Mr. John Abduba, nominated Member of Parliament Hon. Wilson Leitich stated that if residents of Kerisoi remained in KANU, 'there would be no fire' while if they didn't, there would be fire. Mr. Isaac Wachira of Kamuingi alleged that Kiptoror Forest was the training ground for the 'warriors' who were later transported by tractor-trailer. A total of 8 people were killed in Kamuingi, Murinduko and Central Farms while 306 houses were burnt. Six Kalenjin youths were killed by the General Service Unit who had alighted from a helicopter at Kipkewa Farm to quell the clashes.

2.3.9 The Committee took about four hours to cover the 75 kilometres to Saosa Primary School in Olenguruone division on Saturday 6th June 1992. The roads are in very poor condition, and there was heavy rain in the area at the time. Evidence was taken separately from the Kalenjin/Dorobo, Kikuyu and Abagusii/Kamba, respectively. Sixteen witnesses gave evidence on behalf of a huge gathering of residents of the area. The residents are mainly Kipsigis, Dorobo, Kikuyu and Abagusii who had been living together in Saosa, Kiptaragoi, Amalo, Chigamba, Chepakundi and Gorofa schemes.

2.3.10 According to Mr Kiprotich arap Tanui of Kiptaragoi, relationships between the Kikuyu and Kalenjin which had been cordial, started to cool off with the advent of multipartyism. As related by Susan Chepkemai of Amalo centre, during a church service on 29th March 1992 at St. Kizito Catholic church Olenguruone, Father Moses Mahuho, of the Catholic Church, Mr Richard Kamunge and Mr. Josephat Kigo, headmaster of Olenguruone Secondary School engaged in anti-KANU utterances. Mr Kigo read a pastoral letter after which he made disparaging remarks against KANU and its leaders. She later informed the local D.O Mr. Cheruiyot who picked up Mr. Kigo and Father Mahugu from the Church, later the same day. Thereafter there was tension and inter-ethnic relations deteriorated. The clashes started immediately after

the death of Kiplangat arap Chepkilach at Amalo centre on 25th April 1992, allegedly at the hands of the Kikuyu. Reports of fighting in Kamwaura earlier on appeared to have aggravated the situation.

2.3.11 As related by Mr Karanja Muhoro together with seven others on behalf of the Kikuyu in the area, the D.O of Olenguruone had in anticipation of fighting escalating from Molo South, formed a leaders' committee of twelve, six Kalenjin and six Kikuyu to maintain the peace, with Mr Muhoro as Chairman. The Kalenjin withdrew from the Committee and formed their own under the chairmanship of Mr Joshua Ng'eno. He alleged that a group of Kalenjin 'warriors' were brought from Chemanel in Molo South to avenge the death of Kiplangat arap Chepkilach, on 25th April 1992. The fighting erupted on that day and the burning of houses continued. It was alleged that on 28th April 1992, at Saosa, an Administration Police Officer gave his gun to a Mr. Richard Rono, a former Kenya Air Force personnel and now a teacher at Kaptambui Primary School who shot dead a Mr. Kinyanjui. Mr. James Gichere Mwaniki of Amalo centre claimed to have witnessed four vehicles, among them a Peugeot 504 pick-up driven by Mrs. Mary Leitich, wife of Hon. Leitich full of 'warriors' ferrying them to Chepakundi on 25th April 1992. He identified a number of people who attacked him and the registration numbers of vehicles used to ferry the warriors.

2.3.12 The clashes stopped with the visit of the Rift valley P.C Mr. Yusuf Haji on 29th April 1992 by which time the non-Kalenjin population had virtually left Olenguruone.

The non-Kalenjin had travelled from as far as Elburgon and other areas to give evidence before the Committee. The Committee visited some of these people on the morning of Sunday 7th June in Elburgon town and witnessed the pathetic condition that the men, women and children were living in a go-down in the town.

2.4. VISIT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE TO MOLO AND OLENGURUENE DIVISIONS

In the evidence and information received at Kamwaura centre in Molo division of Nakuru district, allegations were made to the effect that homesteads and farms of certain prominent persons, as well as Ndoinet forest in the area were used as hideouts, sanctuaries and retreat havens for Kalenjin warriors during the ethnic clashes. The sanctuaries were allegedly located in homesteads and farms belonging to the Hon. Prof. George Saitoti, EGH, MP, Vice President and Minister for Finance, at Nyota, the Hon Prof. Jonathan K. Ng'eno EGH, MP, Speaker of the National Assembly, the Hon. Wilson Leitich, M.P., at Muchorwi settlement scheme, Mr. Benjamin K. Kipkulei, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Education (Gatatha farm) and Kipng'eno arap Ng'eny, Managing Director, Kenya Posts and Telecommunications, at Nyota.

A sub-committee of the Committee, visited these homesteads and farms and Ndoinet Forest between July 29 and 30, 1992. The sub-committee interviewed Hon. and Mrs Mary Leitich; J. arap Rotich, Manager of Gatatha farm; the Manager of Prof. Ng'eno's farm; Joseph Barngetuny, (Manager of Mr. Ng'eny's farm); Mrs. Hannah Nyambura Kipusi, sister to Prof. G Saitoti and manager of the farm and a number of Dorobo residents of Ndoinet forest.

The Committee has reviewed the findings of the sub-committee and finds no visible evidence to lend credence to allegations that there were sanctuaries in these places.

During their visit, the sub-committee paid a courtesy call on the D.C. Mr. Ishamael Chelanga who informed them that the situation in Molo and Olenguruone was back to normal. However, when the sub-committee visited Molo South, they found the people vacating houses towards Molo and Elburgon towns as there was a rumour that they would be attacked again on 1st and 8th August, 1992, when schools closed.

2.5 CAUSES OF THE ETHNIC CLASHES

From the evidence and information as given by witnesses in Molo and Olenguruone, the causes of the clashes may be summarised as follows:-

- (a) rivalry over the distribution of administrative posts;
- (b) the "Majimbo" rallies of September 1991 which were held in Nandi and Kericho districts, which propagated the theory that Rift Valley was for the Kalenjin and those espousing political parties other than KANU should leave the province;
- (c) utterances by leaders as exemplified by Hon. Leitich and Councillor Maiywo at Kerisoi where they spoke vehemently against opposition parties; Hon. Njenga Mungai at Sondu River farm where he tended to address one section of his constituents (the Kikuyu), ignoring their cosmopolitan nature.
- (d) the re-introduction of multi-parties without proper education of wananchi, which was misinterpreted by the Kalenjin as a direct attack on the presidency; and
- (e) to a lesser extent rivalry over land ownership as claimed in Kerisoi (in other settlement schemes, land issue was not a factor).

2.6 THE PERPETRATORS/INSTIGATORS/FIGHTERS

From the evidence given, the fighters were organised groups of youth of between 14 and 30 years, who were well armed with bows and arrows, in some cases their faces adorned with clay 'munyu'. The youth were invariably described by the witnesses as 'warriors'. The Kikuyu youth carried pangas, rungas and makeshift wooden or plastic shields as weapons. They were being ferried in lorries and other forms of transport to the clash areas. According to the evidence given, the perpetrators or instigators of the clashes, through public utterances and actions, were among others, the Hon. Wilson Leitich, M.P., the Hon. John Njenga Mungai, M.P. D.O. Cheruiyot (then at Olenguruone), Chief Benjamin Ndegwa of Molo South, Assistant Chief Maritim, Ndoinet, Assistant Chief Kiplangat arap Keino Cherubo of Bochege farm, Father Moses Mahuho of St. Kizito Catholic Church Olenguruone, Mr. Josphat Kigo -

Headmaster of Olenguruone Secondary School, Chief Jonathan Mutai of Amalo location, Mr. Richard Rono, teacher, Kaptambui primary school and Assistant chief Mr. Soi.

2.7 RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee recommends the following solutions in order to bring lasting peace in this area:-

- (i) that the Government should ensure a fair distribution of provincial administrative posts, particularly those of chiefs and assistant chiefs in such cosmopolitan areas;
- (ii) that the Government should take firm action to resolve all pending land disputes and cases;
- (iii) that the leaders from all shades of political persuasion, including religious leaders, should devise ways and means of educating the public on the position, role and operation of multi-partyism;
- (iv) that Mr. Richard Rono of Kaptambui Primary school, Amalo location, Olenguruone, together with an Administrative Policeman who was on 25th April, 1992 working under the D.O Olenguruone, and allegedly gave the former his gun which he used to shoot dead Mr. Kinyanjui, should be investigated with a view to prosecuting them in connection with perpetration of crime;
- (v) that all public servants should exercise total impartiality in the discharge of their duties;
- (vi) that all leaders should exercise restraint in their public utterances;

- (vii) that security should be intensified and those willing to return to their farms should be ensured of security as they reconstruct their homes and farms;
- (viii) that the myth that an ethnic community can own a province or a district should be dispelled by the Government and that the constitutional provisions with regard to ownership of property anywhere within the Republic should be respected;
- (ix) that the Dorobos living in Ndoinet forest be considered for allocation of land for permanent settlement.

CHAPTER THREE

BUNGOMA, TRANS-NZOIA AND WEST POKOT ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

3.0 THE ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

3.1. The Trans-Nzoia, Bungoma and West Pokot Ethnic clashes Belt generally runs around Mt. Elgon enclosing the upper parts of Kwanza and Saboti division of Trans-Nzoia district in Rift Valley Province and Mt. Elgon sub-district in Bungoma district in Western Province. The western boundary of the belt is delineated by the Kenya/Uganda border, which generally traverses Mt. Elgon from north to south. To the north the belt touches the boundary of Trans-Nzoia and West Pokot districts.

3.2. BACKGROUND

3.2.1. Most of Trans-Nzoia was alienated early this century to pave way for European settlers. The Sabaot, who claim to be the original inhabitants of Trans-Nzoia were confined to the upper moorlands of Mt. Elgon, where the Carter Land Commission of 1932 recommended that an area of 40,000 acres on the moorland be alienated as a "Native Reserve" for them. This area was subsequently expanded to 42,500 acres. The Sabaot tribe is a cluster of sub-tribes- the Koony, Book, Sabiiny, Bongom and Somek.

3.2.2 In 1962, the Boundaries' Commission mapped out the Regional boundaries and the Sabaot of Mt. Elgon Sub-district expressed their wish to be administered from Trans-Nzoia and to be included in Rift Valley together with fellow Kalenjin. However, the Bukusu leaders insisted that Trans-Nzoia should be included in Western Province. The colonial government did not accede to this request. The Kenya Government thereafter declared certain former European farms in Trans Nzoia bordering the former North Nyanza district as settlement schemes for settling the landless, which led to the creation of Kamukuywa, Kibisi, Naitiri, Tongaren and Ndalul settlement schemes which were ceded to Western Province. The schemes formed a substantial proportion of land formerly within Trans-Nzoia district. The settlement process continued in Cherangani and Kwanza constituencies even after independence but the Sabaot

community do not appear to have considered it necessary to buy some of the land in the settlement schemes. By historical accident they had become disadvantaged. Those in Bungoma, Kakamega and Narok districts had acquired permanent resident status and title to land ownership, while those in Trans Nzoia expected that some of the former 'White Highlands' would have been set aside exclusively for their settlement.

The Sabaot in Trans-Nzoia and Bungoma have upto to-date been confined to the upper reaches of Mt. Elgon and occupy a belt round the mountain. Mount Elgon constituency, in which the majority live, is in Bungoma district.

3.2.3 Historical records indicate that the Bukusu were living in the lower slopes of Mt. Elgon north of Nzoia River in the 19th century. The British commander Charles William Hopley, who led a military expedition that led to the surrender of Bukusu independence to the British in 1895, gives a detailed account of the military operation where the Sabaot and Wanga joined forces with the British to fight what he called the 'powerful' Bukusu, at Lumboka and Chetambe. The British explorer Joseph Thompson between 1883 - 84 explored the present Bungoma and Trans-Nzoia where he found Bukusu in mud-walled forts. At a higher altitude he found the Sabaot whom he reckoned to be marooned Tugen and Elgeyo in the caves. Sir Frederick Jackson also records that between October 1889 and 1890 travelled between Mumias and Lake Turkana. He encountered Bukusu settlements on his journey. He also encountered the Sabaot at an altitude of 7,000 feet on the southern and south western side of the mountain where they lived in caves. They were subject to Nandi raids but were on less hostile terms with the Bukusu who were nearby.

3.2.4 It is therefore quite evident that the Bukusu and the Sabaot have been living as neighbours for centuries. The onset of the settler community and the alienation of land for settler use in Trans-Nzoia appears to have changed the equilibrium in this area forever. The Sabaots' demand for land has had a major impact on inter-tribal relationship in the area. Indeed since independence, the Sabaot have been pressing as a tribe to be administered from Trans-Nzoia instead of some of them being in

Bungoma while others are in Trans-Nzoia. To them, this would create an enlarged area, leading eventually to their own district.

3.2.5 TIMESPAN AND ORIGIN OF THE CLASHES

From the evidence and information given to the Committee the time span of clashes in this belt covers the period between 26th November 1991 when the first incident of burning of houses was reported, to September 1992. The clashes in Saboti and Kwanza appeared to have intensified around 25th December 1991, spreading quickly around this belt into Mt. Elgon sub-district.

3.3. TRANS-NZOIA

3.3.1. The Committee visited Trans-Nzoia district for two days. On Monday 8th June, the Committee first visited the District Commissioner for Trans-Nzoia, Mr. Wilfred Ndolo. Flanked by his senior officers, Mr. Ndolo gave an account of the clashes that had raged in the district beginning late December 1991. Later on in the morning, the committee visited Endebes and viewed Quentin and Mwangi Farms, which had been victim to Sabaot attacks. At Mwangi Farm, the Committee was informed that the Sabaot had occupied farms and houses of those who had ran away from the clashes. At Endebess town, the Committee visited a makeshift camp where there were about 600 families of displaced, mainly Bukusu, who had ran away from clash areas around Endebess. The Committee then proceeded to the Kitale Municipal Hall and received evidence for the remainder of the day. On Tuesday 9th June, the Committee travelled to Saboti Primary School in Saboti division. Prior to the sitting, the Committee visited Kapretwa Farm where they witnessed the destruction caused to homes during the clashes. Kapretwa primary school was completely deserted. The Committee also interviewed some people residing at Kapretwa trading centre.

3.3.2 At Kitale Municipal Hall, the Committee heard evidence from representatives of the Sabaot, Abaluhya, Kikuyu and Teso respectively, and leading figures of the two opposition parties in the district, the Forum for Restoration of Democracy (FORD) and

the Democratic Party (DP). In all, evidence was received from 39 persons representing residents of Kwanza and Cherangani divisions of the district.

3.3.3 The first group to appear before the Committee were the Sabaot, represented by Messrs Samwel Kisoro Moiben of Kaa Farm, Lorian Ngeiywa of Saboti farm, William Chebusi of Mwangi farm, Simon Psiwa Cheprot of Mwisho farm, Richard Leitich of Motosiet farm among others, who gave a lengthy submissions which is summarised as follows:-

- (i) Mr. Samwel K. Moiben stated that leaflets were circulated in December 1991 threatening the Sabaot. Thereafter, fighting started on 25th December. He alleged that the police and GSU were partisan and were taking sides with the Bukusu, even to the extent of leading them in the burning of houses. He alleged that despite the recommendation of the 1932 Carter Land Commission that the Sabaot be given 80,000 acres and £2,000 (Sterling) per family as compensation for their land, nothing was done and that over 40,000 Sabaot remain landless to date. He claimed that the Bukusu look down upon the Sabaot calling them cattle rustlers. Fighting erupted because FORD followers were saying that if FORD ever came to power, the Sabaot would be forced into Uganda.

He submitted that problems would only end if the Sabaots were settled in some of the Government forests and ADC Farms in Trans Nzoia district. He also suggested that Trans Nzoia should be re-named Mt. Elgon district.

- (ii) Mr. Lorian Ngeiwa who works with the Nairobi City Commission and is a resident of Sabaot Farm submitted that the first cause of the clashes is the Constitution of Kenya which allows wananchi to buy land anywhere in the Republic. He strongly felt that the section should be repealed because it favours the big tribes. He said that the whole trouble of clashes was started by the pronouncements at public meetings, e.g. Hon. Joash wa Mango'li who stated on several occasions

that the Sabaot would be fought to extinction; He stated that Hon Mwangale and Hon. Wekesa opposed to the idea of the administration of Mt. Elgon from Trans Nzoia which is the wish of the Sabaot.

He suggested that the constitution be amended to protect the interests of minority tribes, in land and political issues. To avoid more conflicts, he recommended that parliamentary seats in Saboti and Kwanza should be set aside for the Sabaot, and further that as a matter of urgency, Mt. Elgon sub-district in Bungoma district should be transferred to Trans Nzoia and that the Sabaot should be granted their own district to encompass Mt. Elgon sub-district and Trans Nzoia.

- (iii) Mr. William Chebus Tummet related how two Co-operative Societies, the Mango Farmers and Namutokholo Farmers Societies respectively, had competed to buy Mr Mwangi Kabure's farm in Endebess. Both societies had members from different ethnic groups, including the Sabaot and Abaluhya, but were in disagreement as to who should buy the farm. He claimed that the Bukusu from both societies joined together to oust the Sabaot. In the meantime, Sabaot who had been evicted from Kiboror forest joined the Namutokholo society and all entered Mr. Mwangi's farm. He stated that after wrangling between the two groups, tribal clashes started on 25th December 1991 when the Bukusu from Mango farm started burning houses belonging to the Sabaot. Fighting continued and the Bukusu deserted the farm leaving the Sabaot on the farm. He suggested that the Sabaot should be allowed to buy the farm.

3.3.4

Evidence was given by the Abaluhya, Teso and Kikuyu represented by Messers Cleophas Wayongo Wanyonyi of Kimondo farm, Councillor Mathew Wafula of Lunyu Farm, Councillor Richard Wabwire and Mrs. Elina Naswa Simiyu, Chairlady, Endebess location KANU branch.

- (i) Mr. Wanyonyi said that the Abaluhya and Sabaot lived together on farms bought through co-operative societies. In 1979 theft of household goods which would find their way to Sebei in Uganda started. Occasionally killing of people and cattle rustling have been occurring over the years.

He said that burning of houses started in November 1991 after some problems in Mango Co-operative Society Farm. A meeting was held on the farm on 12th November 1991 in which the local D.O. spoke to the people. After he left, houses belonging to the Abaluhya were burnt. Tension increased in December and houses belonging to the Abaluhya and other non-Sabaot communities continued to be burned. On 27th December 1991. His father, Wanyonyi Isaac, was killed on his farm. Thereafter people started to seek refuge elsewhere because of insecurity. Elders from the Sabaot and the Abaluhya were appointed to discuss peace, but houses continued to be burned.

- (ii) Councillor Mathew Wafula, who also presented a memorandum blamed the violence on armed Pokot homeguards who he claimed kill people and take away their cattle. The non-Kalenjin had been written letters to quit Trans-Nzoia. He claimed that whenever they held meetings to establish peace, the Sabaot shied away. He submitted that homeguards should be deprived of guns given by authority of the government.
- (iii) Mrs Elina Naswa Simiyu of Endebess alleged that arrows were being made at the home of Aramisi King'a of Kimondo in Kaboywa Location. She had made a report to the administration but no action has been taken. She narrated an incident on 26th December, 1991 when her home was attacked

and houses burnt, the arsonists having been led by Aramisi King'a. She said that amongst the attackers were Sebeis from neighbouring Uganda. She did not believe that the multiparty era was the cause of clashes, as she herself was a KANU official while those who were burning houses were shouting "KANU JUU! choma huyo mama KANU"

- (iv) Mr. Wafula Nabwera of Chepsiro location blamed the Chief of Chepsiro Mr. Andrew Rotich for the burning of houses on 24th December, 1991. He alleged that Chief Rotich took no action on their reports to him about threats to the Abaluhya community by the Sabaot. In particular, the chief accused the Abaluhya of bringing trouble upon themselves because of supporting the opposition FORD. He claimed that the Chief asked the Abaluhya to send 50 people to his house on 24th December 1991, failing which they should not blame anybody for the consequences. On 24th December when they declined to send people as required by the Chief, burning of houses started. At another meeting on 25th December, 1991 a councillor known as Simeon of Kapsikilai said that whoever joined FORD or DP in Chepsiro location must leave. A youth who was involved in the burning of houses was found in possession of a note from chief Andrew Rotich authorising him to burn houses.

3.3.5 According to the evidence given by interim officials of FORD Messrs Zachariah Shimechero (Chairman), Ezekiel Okul (Secretary) and Enoch Imbuye (Treasurer), and Peter Mburu Kinyanjui (DP Chairman - Trans-Nzoia), the cattle rustling on the West Pokot/Trans Nzoia border had increased. They claimed to have noticed an influx of Sebei from Uganda into Endebess where Chief Geoffrey Kipkut was alleged to be assisting them to obtain Kenyan identity cards to enable them settle in Kenya. They said that Hon. Kisiero has spearheaded a campaign for the Sabaot to get their own

district curved out of Bungoma and Trans Nzoia districts. They claimed that the clashes had pitted the Sabaot against the non-Kalenjin and that some Sabaot homeguards were using their guns to terrorise non-Sabaot neighbours.

- 3.3.6** Evidence was received at Saboti primary school in Saboati division on 9th June 1992. Witnesses comprised representatives of the Sabaot, the Abaluhya, the Kikuyu, the Teso, the Luo, the Kamba and others in the largely cosmopolitan Saboti division.
- 3.3.7** The Sabaot were represented, among others, by Messrs. Maurice Checkman Siyoi of Tulwet farm; Lawrence Langat Kipsoi of Saboti, Pius Kauka of Chepkui farm, William Sichei of Sabot, Ben Jipcho of Maliki and Mining Temo representing the Bong'omek from Kanduyi who were camping at Saboti.

Mr. Maurice Checkman Siyei alleged the additional reason for the push by the Sabaot to have their own district, emanated from the leaflets circulated at the time of the clashes which threatened their removal from Saboti if they did not oblige by joining FORD; and the discrimination in the allocation of the recent Rural Enterprise Fund in Trans-Nzoia district. He accused the Provincial administration of harassing the local Sabaot chiefs for no reason during the clashes and cited the case of Assistant Chief Saima of Machewa who he alleged was killed by the General Service Unit for no reason.

Mr. Lawrence Langat Kipsoi of Saboti and a Nominated Councillor in Nzoia County Council alleged that the Bukusu had a binding declaration in 1987, by which they vowed to remove the Sabaot from Trans-Nzoia district and continued to subjugate them; that Government had not yet settled the over 10,000 Sabaot thrown out of Kiborwa forest; that the evidence of the Abaluhya youths, as shown in the Kenya Times of May 05, 1992, training in Libya, and the continued inflammatory utterances by Abaluhya leaders, e.g. the Chwele Declaration and at Endebess, were alarming.

Mr. Pius Kauka of Chepkui farm alleged that a Mr. Sitati Maboni of Matisi in Kitale municipality recruited youths for training in Libya. He called for mutual respect between the Sabaot and the Bukusu.

Mr. William Sichei of Saboti alleged that the Abaluhya leaders, namely Hons. Mwangale, Wekesa and Wabuge were opposed to any deliberation towards the creation of a district for the Sabaot and they (the Sabaot) had decided to fight as a means of driving home their desire.

Mr. Ben Jipcho of Meliki and a Primary School Assistant Inspector of Schools in Trans-Nzoia district alleged that the Sabaot who qualified in interviews for teacher training college places were always replaced by the Abaluhya candidates. He said that a total of sixteen Sabaot had died in the clashes - six of whom were killed by the security personnel.

Mr. Mining Temoi representing the 6,000 Bong'omek who were displaced from Kanduyi division of Bungoma district, stated that they had to flee their homes as being part of the Sabaot who were waging war against the Bukusu in Mt. Elgon Sub-district, they had become a target for retaliation.

Mr. Kaburungo of Sukwo farm stated that clashes in Trans-Nzoia started in Sukwo farm on December 25, 1991. and that the initial burning of homes was on November 26, 1991 by some Bukusu assisted by Administration Police officers and forest guards.

3.3.8 The evidence and information given by the Abaluhya, the Kikuyu, the Teso and other non-Sabaot and represented among others by Messrs James Kihia, John Nandasaba Wekesa, Wanyonyi Wefwila, David Kaboya and Maurice Etiang' Esembe had the following additional details that varied or were not in the evidence given at the Kitale Municipal Chambers:-

- Mr. James Kihia at Gituamba farm alleged that, 'Majimbo' rallies of 1991 inflamed the clashes. He said that the information they had on the imminent start of clashes by the Sabaot, was passed on to the local Assistant Chief, the District Commissioner and the Officer Commanding Police Division, who took no preventive measures. During the burning of houses belonging to non-Kalenjin, he alleged that the following assisted to some degree by their carefree attitude and disinterest:-

- (i) Senior Superintendent of Police Mr. Raphael Ndala Ndiwa resident of Gituamba;
- (ii) Trans-Nzoia O.C.P.D. Mr. Soi;
- (iii) Saboti District Officer Mr. Omweno;
- (iv) local chief Mr. Christopher Kiraro Saikwa;
- (v) Assistant Chief William Kasisi of Kiborwa;
- (vi) KANU Chairman of Kiborwa location, Mr. Charles Cheptais; and
- (vii) Councillor Toil, who stated that all FORD Members would have to be removed from the area.

Mr. Emmanuel Baraza Milimo of Mukunyuni farm stated that the causes and motives of the clashes should be seen against the background of the 'Majimbo' rallies of 1991. He further said that there were allegations of oathing among the Sabaot.

Mr. John Nandasaba Wekesa of Nasianda farm in Kiborwa location, alleged that an Oathing ceremony attended by the Sabaot had taken place in early December, 1991 at the home of Chief Christopher Kiraro Saikwa, led by Mr. John Ndiema Choto, resident in the late Mr. Andrew Saikwa's farm. He stated that the contents of the oath was a mixture of the blood of dog and sheep - and a binding citation to remove all

non-Sabaot from Saboti division. He alleged that oathing also took place at the late Mr. Andrew Saikwa's farm. Mr. David Kaboya of Gituamba farm alleged that a gun had been found by police at the house of a Mr. Benson Chesiwa, a neighbour of Assistant Chief Mr. William Kasisi.

Mr. Maurice Etiang' Esembe, of Kapretwa farm gave a lengthy submission of the clashes, including the planning, training, and persons involved. The following were the highlights:-

- (i) soon after the 'Majimbo' rallies of 1991, Hon. Kisiero held several night meetings with only the Sabaot in Saboti location. He informed Chief Christopher Kiraro Saikwa;
- (ii) on December 27, 1991, Kefa Imai was allegedly killed by Wilson Chemosat using panga and axe; Patrick Appollo an employee of Mr. Stephen Sisimo was killed by an A.P. on the order of Assistant Chief Solomon Kirui of Saboti sub-location;
- (iii) on May 13, 1992, Trans-Nzoia D.C. Wilfred K. Ndolo, held a meeting at Saboti centre. In the evening of the same day, Messrs. John Moss, Chief of Saboti location, Christopher Kiraro Saikwa chief of Kiborwa, Assistant Chief William Kasisi, Ben Jipcho, (A.P.S.I.) and others held their own meeting;
- (iv) on May 14, 1992, Mr. Majani's daughter and an old man were killed and 300 cattle stolen. He alleged that among the escorts was Ben Jipcho;
- (v) in December 1991, there were meetings at Kapsakwony convened by Hon. Kisiero, at which Sabaot from Saboti division were presented by Mr. Stephen Sisimo, resident of Museng' farm in Kiborwa, who also takes charge of the local organization;

- (vi) the training of the Sabaot youth and retired security personnel and planning were carried out in Kiborwa forest. Mr. Stephen Sisimo is a Sebei from Uganda who has been a resident of Saboti since 1966;
- (vii) On December 26, 1991, Mr. Joseph Cherogony, the KANU Chairman of Saboti Sub-location, was restrained by Mr. Esembe from burning his house. Mr. Cherogony was accompanied by youths whose faces were adorned with clay.

3.4.0 BUNGOMA DISTRICT

- 3.4.1** The Committee heard evidence in Bungoma district for two days, at Kapsakwony on 10th June 1992 and at Kimilili the following day.

At Kapsakwony in Mt. Elgon sub-district, the Committee held a four-hour hearing at the NCPB depot. Prior to that, the Committee visited destroyed homes in the neighbourhood, accompanied by the D.C. for Bungoma district, Mr. Rintari. The Sabaot were represented by Mr. Job Kipnus Kiboi of Chelabei, Enos Kiberenge of Cheptais, Reuben Samoe Ndara of Kapsakwony and Benjamin Letebe Sirimoi of Cheptais while the clergy were represented by Rev. Daniel Naibei of CPK, Andrew Chemayiek, Member of the CPK synod and Benjamin Mutai of SDA, who gave oral evidence and presented written memoranda.

- 3.4.2** Mr. Job Kipnus Kiboi of Chelabei, blamed the administrative and political representation manipulation process that ensured the domination of the Sabaot by the Bukusu.

Mr. Enos Kiberenge of Cheptais saw the clashes as the explosion of the long endurance by the Sabaot of the manipulation and chicanery of the Bukusu to entrench their domination of the political and other affairs in the whole district. He produced a map on which he marked out what he saw as the progressive alteration of administrative boundaries to ensure the hegemony of the Bukusu and the frustration

of the growth of Mt. Elgon sub-district by Bukusu leadership. He referred to an Oath 'the Maniandeet', of the dog between the Sabaot and the Bukusu to respect the domain of each other as per boundaries established there.

Mr. Reuben Samoe Ndara, Chairman of Kapsakwony Town Council, cited as possible causes of the recent clashes, the utterance of Councillor Opindu of Nzoia County Council to the effect that all Sabaot should be moved to Uganda as they are aliens. During the clashes, he said the police assisted the Bukusu in burning the homes of the Sabaot. He alleged that Messrs Julius Wandari and Joseph Namayiengo Wekesa were in a convoy that burned the houses of the Sabaot in Kapsakwony location.

Mr. Benjamin Latebo Sirimoi of Cheptais cited as possible causes and motives the reaction of the Sabaot to the persistent frustration of development in Mt. Elgon sub-district by Bukusu leadership - e.g. the transfer of a planned tea factory and Kshs.6m. earmarked for Chepsiro health centre to other parts of the district. He said that the continued membership of KANU by the Bukusu is false as they are 'like wolves in sheeps skin', and that the Sabaot had received little assistance from the government since Independence.

3.4.3 Evidence by the Bukusu, Teso and the Kikuyu, was given as follows:-

Mr. Julius Wandari Nandasaba of Kabutola stated that burning of houses belonging to Bukusu began on December 25, 1991. The motive of the Sabaot fighting the Bukusu and Teso was to chase them out of Mt. Elgon sub-district to facilitate creation of an exclusive Sabaot district. He stated that the area Member of Parliament, Hon. Kisiero had throughout adopted a partisan approach and had made no moves to reconcile the various groups of people in the constituency. At a public meeting convened by the District officer, Councillor Reuben Samoe Ndara allegedly referred contemptuously to the Bukusu and Teso customs.

Joseph Wekesa Namayiengo of Kamasielo felt that the current councillors in the area were not conversant with the political trends in the country and have therefore incited

the Sabaot to harass the Bukusu. He alleged that the following had been behind the clashes by masterminding the entire operation from training to equipping (arming) the fighters:-

- (i) Reuben Samoe Ndara - Chairman Kapsakwony Town Council;
- (ii) Andrew Muneria - Vice Chairman Bungoma County Council;
- (iii) Masai Masaranja - Vice Chairman Kapsakwony Town Council;
- (iv) Andrew Chamayeik Member, C.P.K. synod, Nambale;
- (v) Assistant Chief Reuben Sabet of Kibuku; and
- (vi) Ben Jipcho - Assistant Inspector of Primary Schools, in Trans-Nzoia.

He said that these have also brought Sebei armed with guns from Uganda and this information was given to Kimilili Police station on April 13, 1992. He alleged that there are about two to five hundred Sebei training under Sabaot direction in the Chepkitale (Bagdad) forest, where stolen livestock has also kept. The fighters were teenagers of about eighteen years who were dressed in red shorts. The Sabaot have taken an Oath which is made out of blood from a strangled cow (chesekut), mixed with that of a dog and then administered by an old woman over seventy-years, which took place in December, 1991 at Namoga sub-location in Koshoki.

Rev. Daniel Naibei of C.P.K. on behalf of the Clergy in Mt. Elgon Sub-district cited the disagreement between the Nambale and Katakwa dioceses over boundaries as another contributory factor to the recent clashes. Even within the church the differences and feelings of domination of the Sabaot by the Bukusu were prevalent.

3.4.4. Prior to visiting Kimilili on 11th June, the Committee called on the District Commissioner Bungoma District, Mr. Kibiti Rintari, who gave a brief background on

the clashes. He also gave some statistics relating to the clashes, as well as samples of weapons used during the fighting.

On the way to Kimilili, the Committee visited a Chwele Friend's church compound housing displaced Bukusu from Mt. Elgon where there were about 200 families living in deplorable conditions. In Kimilili, the Committee heard evidence from representatives of the Bukusu, Kikuyu and Teso. They included officials of KNUT Bungoma Branch, interim officials of the opposition FORD and residents of Kimilili, Sirisia and Mt. Elgon-Sub district.

The highlights of the evidence were:-

- (i) that inflammatory remarks were made by Mr. Mark Too, the then Chairman of KANU in Nandi district during a harambee meeting at Kaptama Moi Secondary School on 14th July 1989 when he urged the Sabaot to remove "madoadoa" (spots) from their midst if they expected assistance; the interpretation was that this meant removal of non-Sabaot;
- (ii) that during celebrations to mark the inauguration of the Katakwa diocese at Kipchiria on 24th April 1992, a group of Sabaot 'warriors' led by Councillor Andrew Muneria raided the celebrations; some were arrested but later released by the then Bungoma DC Mr. William Changole;
- (iii) that Mr. Changole the DC made inciting remarks at a public baraza at Chemoge Market on 16th December, 1991 at which he spoke in the Kalenjin language and urged the Sabaot to remove "Madoadoa" and "chui" (leopard) from the midst of their flock;
- (iv) that the clashes were perpetrated by the Sabaot 'warriors' led by some of their army personnel e.g. Mr. Siai Tirot an army officer who was

on leave at the time and who allegedly killed Kimiyu Mushi in early January 1992;. Mr. David Naibei an army officer who allegedly killed a son of Mr. Nicholas Odilo of Nambaoni but the police, who were informed, made no arrest; and Wycliffe Naibei, a Senior Sergeant with the 78 Tank Battalion at Isiolo, who was arrested by wananchi on April 08, 1992, while burning houses belonging to the Bukusu;

- (v) that, the local Member of parliament Hon. Kisiero and other leaders, such as Councillors Reuben Samoei Ndara and Andrew Muneria, together with prominent Sabaots were instrumental in bringing ill feeling towards the non-Sabaot and were indeed advocating their removal from Mt. Elgon;
- (vi) that Sabaot 'warriors' were being trained in Chepkurkur, 'Bagdad' in Chepkitale forest for the fighting, with the knowledge of the local Assistant Chief Mr. Patrick Cherogony; and
- (vii) that policies introduced by the government such as the quota system in education and the District Focus for Rural Development have enhanced tribalism, as has the appointment of administrators who could not rise above tribal considerations.

3.5 VISIT BY THE SUB-COMMITTEE TO TRANS-NZOAIA AND BUNGOMA

As a follow-up to the Committee's visit, a sub-committee of three Members was appointed to revisit Trans-Nzoia and Mt. Elgon areas to verify certain evidence presented, between 28th and 30th July 1992.

The sub-committee visited a number of police stations and posts and were able to obtain a lot of valuable information regarding the clashes. The Sub-committee visited various places in Saboti, Kwanza division and Mt. Elgon sub-district, namely Gituamba, Kiborwa Forest, Endebess in Saboti; Chepkurkur (at the periphery of

'Baghdad'), Chebiuk, Amaya and Kipsigon locations in Cheptais division of Mt. Elgon sub-district. The sub-committee also called on the D.C. Bungoma, the D.O. Cheptais and at Kimilili police station.

The sub-committee noted that the displaced persons staying in various camps in Bungoma district had not returned due to Sabaot hostility.

Having reviewed the evidence and information gathered by the sub-committee, the Committee did not find any proof of the existence of training camps for 'warriors' at either Kiborwa forest or Chepkurkur (Bagdad).

3.6 CAUSES OF THE RECENT ETHNIC CLASHES

The causes of the clashes as described by witnesses in Trans Nzoia and Bungoma Districts may be summarised as follows:-

- (a) the perennial demand by the Sabaot to have their own district, comprising parts of Kwanza and Saboti divisions of Trans-Nzoia and Mt. Elgon sub-district of Bungoma district;
- (b) the hunger for land by the Sabaot who feel neglected by the Government in that they have not, as a tribe, been considered for settlement schemes like other communities;
- (c) influx into Kenya by armed Sebei from across Uganda, who engage in cattle rustling with the support of some of their Sabaot relatives, making it assume a tribal dimension;
- (d) the nature of the terrain as Mt. Elgon is on the boundary between Kenya and Uganda and some parts are completely inaccessible to security forces;

- (e) utterances by political and administrative leaders which instead of enhancing peace created more tension; e.g. those of D.C. Changole, Mark Too, the Chwele and Endebess declarations;
- (f) rivalry over the distribution of administrative posts;
- (g) the distribution of resources such as the rural enterprise fund, rural development funds, facilities, and services through the DDC in districts where there are different ethnic groups;
- (h) perceived domination of the Saboot who feel that they are the 'rightful' residents of the area, by the Bukusu;
- (i) the introduction of multi-partyism; and
- (j) the "majimbo" rallies of 1991.

3.7 THE PERPETRATORS/ INSTIGATORS

Among the perpetrators and instigators in the area, the following were among those described by witnesses as having contributed to the clashes:-

- Mr. William Changole - former D.C. Bungoma District
- Mr. Mark Too - former Chairman KANU - Nandi Branch
- The Hon. E. Mwangale, M.P. - Kimilili
- The Hon. J. wa Mang'oli, M.P. - Webuye
- The Hon. N. Wekesa, M.P. - Kwanza
- The Hon. W. Kisiero, M.P. - Mt. Elgon
- Mr. Andrew Muneria - Vice Chairman, Bungoma Country Council
- Mr. Stephen Sisimo - resident of Kiborwa location
- Mr. Joseph Cherogony - KANU Chairman - Saboti location
- Mr. Solomon Kirui - Assistant Chief - Saboti Sub-location
- Mr. Aramisi Kinga - Kimondo location
- Mr. Geoffrey Kipkut - Chief, Endebess location

Mr. Samwel K. Moiben - Kaa Farm
Mr. Charles Cheptais - KANU Chairman - Kiborwa location
Councillor Toil - Nzoia County Council
Councillor Opindu - Nzoia Country Council
Mr. Michael Kitio
Mr. Sitati Maboni of Matisi, Kitale municipality
Mr. Ben Jipcho - Assitant Primary School Inspector, Saboti division
Wafula Buke - former University of Nairobi Student leader.

3.8 RECOMMENDATIONS

Having considered the evidence from Trans Nzoia and Bungoma, and being concerned by the continued tribal fighting in this Belt, even at the time of compiling this Report, the committee recommends that the following measures be taken as a matter of urgency in order to bring lasting peace in the area:-

- (a) that the Government should ensure equitable distribution of administrative and other government posts to all the communities in the area;
- (b) that the Government should establish a commision to investigate the recurring problems in Mt. Elgon area with a view to finding a permanent solution;
- (c) that the Government should consider the resettlement of people evicted from Chebiuk/Chepkurkur (Baghdad) in 1989;
- (d) that the displaced persons willing to return to their deserted farms should be given adequate security;
- (g) that in order to improve security along the Kenya/Uganda border especially Chepkube, Chepkitale Cheskaki and Endebess, adequate security personnel should be deployed and security roads maintained;
- (f) that in view of the misuse of guns in the area, the Government should disarm all the home guards as well as all those with illegally acquired guns.

CHAPTER FOUR:

4.0 KAKAMEGA/KISUMU/KERICHO/NANDI/UASIN-GISHU ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

4.1.0 THE ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

4.1.1 The Kakamega-Kisumu-Kericho-Nandi-Uasin-Gishu Ethnic Clashes Belt is a loosely disjointed Belt running roughly along the provincial administrative boundaries between Western and Nyanza Provinces on one side and Rift Valley province on the other. The northern most tip of this Belt is at the convergence of Western and Rift Valley provinces, at the touch point of Lugari and Soy divisions in Kakamega and Uasin Gishu districts, respectively. The southern most tip is at the convergence of Nyanza and Rift Valley provinces, at the touch point of upper Nyakach and Belgut divisions in Kisumu and Kericho districts, respectively.

4.1.2 The principle spots forming this loosely disjointed Belt, and which the Committee visited, held sittings and received evidence and information from wananchi are, starting from the northern most tip - Turbo market, on June 13; Kakamega municipality for the borders of Hamisi, Shinyalu and Malava divisions with Nandi district on June 12; Kamasai centre on July 04; Koru centre on July 06; Sondu market on July 07; and Londiani township on July 09, 1992. A sub-committee of the Committee made follow-up visits to Londiani on July 29 and Turbo on July 30, 1992. In addition several memoranda have been submitted to the Committee.

4.2.0 BRIEF BACKGROUND AND COMPOSITION OF POPULATION

4.2.1 With the exception of the Sondu spot in the southern most tip of this Belt, and parts of Kamasai area, the rest is virtually part of the former "white highlands". In the early decades of this century, the rich and fertile high potential agricultural highlands in the Rift Valley and Central provinces, totalling approximately eleven million acres, were alienated by removal of the indigenous peoples, and set aside for the exclusive

use by white settlers. The remainder was divided into "reserves" for habitation by the various ethnic groups. In the course of time, most "reserves" became identified as the ancestral home and land of say the Kalenjin, Luo, Abaluhya or Kikuyu ethnic groups. With the advent of Independence, most of the white highlands were bought by the government of Kenya through a joint Fund set up by the Kenya Government and the departing British Government.

4.2.2. In turn the Government of Kenya vested the bought-out "white highlands" into two state agencies, the Agricultural Development Corporation and Settlement Fund Trustees. Most of the land vested in these agencies was set aside for the settlement of the many squatters who had been on them in the days of the white settlers and other deserving, interested wananchi. This was in the main in form of settlement schemes, in which the squatters and other interested and deserving persons gained allocation through balloting. Some of the other land was sold directly to some wananchi, individually or as land buying co-operatives, societies and companies.

4.2.3 A cursory look at the historical setting of human settlement gives a little more credence to claims of ancestry to this Belt to the Kalenjin peoples (Nandi in the northern part and Kipsigis in the southern part), than to other ethnic groups. Nevertheless at the time, the settlement schemes and land buying co-operative societies and companies were established to buy the former white highlands from the two state agencies, most wananchi deserving to be settled for having been squatters or otherwise and also with interest to buy, were drawn from the Luo, Abaluhya, Abagusii and Kikuyu. The latter four ethnic groups initially came into this Belt to supply the labour that the Kalenjin could not supply. The Kalenjin being pastoralists who practised scanty agriculture were not pliable to the agricultural set up the white settlers wanted to establish. Thus, the Luo, Abaluhya, Abagusii and Kikuyu moved in to fill the void; but also partly because the four ethnic groups were facing population explosion in their "reserves".

4.2.4 As a result of the scenario in paragraph 4.2.3 above, most of the population in this Belt is composed of the Kalenjin, Luo, Abaluhya, Abagusii and Kikuyu, in spite of

the perennial claim to it by the Kalenjin. In addition to the scenario created by colonial settlement, in the early 1970's some of the Kalenjin who got some land in the settlement schemes or society and company farms, started selling off some of it to members of these four communities. The little concern for land shown by the Kalenjin can be said to be also due to the fact that they had not been subject to high population pressure on the land in their "reserves".

4.2.5 Against the foregoing backdrop, the population set-up in the Belt can be described as cosmopolitan, largely due to the inevitable historical factors. Yet, the information available to the Committee indicates that, again, with the exception of the Sondu spot, virtually all political (parliamentary and civic) and administrative positions are held by persons from the Kalenjin community.

4.3.0 THE TIME SPAN AND ORIGIN OF THE ETHNIC CLASHES

4.3.1 The evidence and information available to the Committee indicate that the time span of the Clashes in this Belt roughly covers the period mid-October, 1991 to June, 1992. Meteitei farm in Tinderet division of Nandi district, Rift Valley Province is the acknowledged origin or cradle of the recent Ethnic Clashes. It is widely believed that they sparked off here on the night of October 29, 1991 and spread out to the rest of Tinderet division, lasting till May 1992. The clashes then spilled over to other spots in this Belt as follows - Koru and its environs, November 04 to May, 1992; Chegaiya Settlement Scheme and its environs on November 06 to March 1992; Londiani its and its environs on November 18, to July, 1992; Turbo and Kamasai and environs, on December 17 to May, 1992; and finally at Sondu and its environs in March 1992.

At Meteitei farm, the evidence received by the Select Committee, indicate that, the burning of houses belonging to the non-Kalenjin begun on the night of October 29, 1991. This was a day after the latest of the many meetings convened by the provincial administration in its attempt to resolve conflicts between members of Meteitei Farmers Company. At this meeting which was addressed by the Nandi District Officer I, Mr. Mwashu, no business was transacted as the members disagreed

on the legibility of membership. The disagreement split the members into two groups. One group of 310, comprising mostly the Kalenjin (Nandi) walked away from the venue of the meeting. This group held its own meeting under chief Philip Karoney of Meteitei location and Kipyego Matelong Korir, the current chairman of the unlawful committee of Meteitei Farmers Company and also KANU chairman for Meteitei sub-location. The other group of 279 was comprised of Abagusii, Kikuyu, Abaluhya, Kalenjin and others.

Further evidence indicates that, the 310 members claimed to be the **bone fide** members of Meteitei Farmers Company and demanded that the 279 should evacuate from the farm. This claim was allegedly supported by the District Officer I. It was also alleged that further support for the stand taken by the 310, came from the Hon. Ezekiel K. Bargentuny, M.P. and Samwel Chelule, the Chairman of Nandi County Council. It was further alleged that with the departure of Mr. Mwashii, the 310 continued to meet; and finally, they seem to have decided to create a situation that would compel the 279 to evacuate. Thus, the burning of houses of non-Kalenjin started. The first house to be burnt belonged to Ms. Kamene (Akamba).

In evidence which was corroborated by among others, the Commissioner of Police, Mr. Philip M. Kilonzo, it was stated that the first person to be killed on the night of October 29, 1991, was Ms. Mong'ina (Abagusii). As a result, Mr. Kilonzo added, two police constables, Lang'at and Stephen Otieno, were deployed to guard Mong'ina's body. During the night, a gang of the Nandi attacked the two police officers, with the intention of setting Mong'ina's body on fire. An exchange ensued resulting into police constable Lang'at killing Julius Kipsang, the alleged leader of the gang. On learning of the death of Kipsang, the Nandi, presuming that the death had been caused by police constable Stephen Otieno, became incensed and went venting their anger on any Luo found around.

The Nandi spread their vengeance to Owiro farm in Songhor location, where they had learnt that police constable Stephen Otieno had a piece of land and a home. Owiro farm with an acreage of about 2,610, has been the home of about 4,000 Luo, since

1970. The damage effected on Owiro farm was so excruciating that when the Committee visited it on July 06, 1992, there was evidently not a single person in sight. The wanton destruction and looting meted at Owiro farm had similarly been carried out at Kotnalel farm which the Committee had visited on July 03, 1992.

The evidence of several witnesses, indicated that the Kalenjin "warriors", who caused so much havoc and so fast in Tinderet division and the neighbouring Belgut, and Muhoroni divisions in Kericho and Kisumu districts, respectively, received transportation facilities and powerful spotlights with which to identify non-Kalenjin houses from the Hon. Ezekiel K. Bargentuny, M.P. There were also allegation that the warriors were each paid Kshs 1,000 per person killed and Kshs. 500 for safe return from the clash front; from funds allegedly supplied by the Hon. K.N.K. Biwott, EGH, MP.

4.3.2 Prior to the commencement of the Ethnic Clashes, the Kenyan political environment had been progressively stirred up and was highly charged. This highly charged political environment was a result of a determined crusade for a return to multi-partyism, which had crystallized in the formation of the pressure group the Forum for Restoration of Democracy - FORD in August, 1991. The political temperature rose further with the launching of a counter crusade, characterised by the highly parochial utterances by leaders from Rift Valley province at political meetings which came to be dubbed "Majimbo Rallies".

4.3.3 REPORT OF THE VISIT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE TO KERICHO AND UASIN GISHU DISTRICTS

Evidence and information received at both Turbo in Uasin-Gishu and Londiani in Kericho districts indicated that certain homesteads and farms in these areas were used as hideouts and sanctuaries or training grounds for warriors.

A sum-committee of three members visited Kericho and Uasin-Gishu districts between 28th and 30th July.

In Kericho the Sub-committee were shown the tools found at Mr David Mwathi's house which were being used to make arrows on contract.

The sub-committee visited several places attacked by warriors and also visited several home-steads and collected further information and evidence.

After reviewing the findings of the sub-committee, the Committee finds no visible evidence to lend credence to allegations that there were training grounds/sanctuaries in these places.

4.4.0 CAUSES OF THE RECENT ETHNIC CLASHES

4.4.1 The various witnesses who appeared before the Select Committee, gave several possible causes of the recent Ethnic Clashes within this Belt. As it is not possible to go into each of the possible causes, the following which cut across this Belt are briefly discussed below:-

4.4.2 The utterances of leaders and politicians at public meetings that seemed to have inadvertently sent out signals and messages appealing to and whipping up emotions for preservation of parochial and sectional interests, provides one of the causes of the ethnic clashes. Such utterances were made prior to, during and after the time span indicated in paragraph 4.3.1 above, at the "majimbo rallies" within this Belt. The ostensible message at these two meetings which was to urge Kenyans to opt for the lesser "evil" political set-up of "Majimbo framework" than "Multi-partyism", could hardly eschew the inference that the appeal was directed at and meant to awaken the ethnic communities from which the speakers were drawn, to the risks and dangers that would befall them in opting for multi-partyism. In addition to the utterances at "**Majimbo rallies**", intermittently, some of these leaders reacted to the advent of multi-partyism by declarations that made KANU appear as one and the same as Rift Valley and the Kalenjin. This introduced the "**KANU Zones**" phenomenon, through declarations at various public meetings, e.g on February 21, 1992 Kericho politicians at a public meeting at Chesol Primary School, chaired by Acting Branch Chairman,

declarations at various public meetings, e.g on February 21, 1992 Kericho politicians at a public meeting at Chesol Primary School, chaired by Acting Branch Chairman, the Hon. Kimunai arap Soi, M.P., and addressed by the Hon. Kipkalia K. Kones, M.P. and the Hon. William K. Kikwai, M.P. among others, they reportedly ordered a presumed pro-multi-partyism lawyer, of Kikuyu ethnic community, based in Kericho township to leave immediately; warned the Democratic Party of Kenya - (DP) and the Forum for Restoration of Democracy - (FORD) not to open offices in Kericho; and that any opposition party daring to enter Kericho district would only have itself to blame when the wrath of the local people unfolded before it.

4.4.3 There has been indication that, the foregoing which were repeated at various meetings by various leaders, could have awakened, incensed, inflamed and brought to light other lesser causes imbedded in the otherwise tolerable, perennial, common place distrusters, disputes, animosities and parochial considerations, to which it served as an impetus for fulfilment or realization . Some of the perennial commonplace distrusters, disputes, et cetera, included -

- (i) disputed sub-divisions in land buying co-operative societies, companies and partnerships;
- (ii) disputed transfers of land sold through individual agreements, and others which the Land Control Boards seem to have encouraged by not solving as required by administrative and legal processes, (e.g. in Nandi and Uasin Gishu district;
- (iii) incessant stock thefts;
- (iv) inadequate knowledge available to wananchi on the practise of multi-partyism; hence construing the membership of different parties as inevitable ground for open hostility to be settled physically;
- (v) the quest for ethnic purity and preservation by coercing some ethnic groups thought to be distorting that status to evacuate, e.g. evidence given at Turbo,

Kamasai and Tinderet indicated that local politicians - William Morogo Saina (former M.P. for Eldoret North) Jackson Kibor, Chairman of KANU Branch Uasin Gishu, Ezekiel Bargentuny, M.P., occasionally alluded to the need to remove "madoa doa" and "kwekwe", (misconstrued to mean the non-Kalenjin) from the midst of the Kalenjin peoples;

- (vi) rivalry over the staffing of the political and administrative positions, which at the moment are as at paragraph 4.2.5 above; and there was an indication that the ethnic clashes could have had an underlying motive to influence and change the voter population by removing the "kwekwe", thus ensuring dominance by the other;
- (vii) perennial rivalry over commercial concerns as at Sondu township which was triggered off by a dispute between George Manyala Ong'era (Abagusii) and a Market Master at the Upper Market, a Joseph Allan Kosgey; at Ong'era's reluctance to pay market entrance fee;
- (viii) perennial ancestral claims to some portions of land dismembered from one ethnic community and apparently given to the other as in the case of the Koru location elongation between Kisumu and Kericho districts, which "mkia" the Kalenjin would like "cut" and incorporated in Kericho district, where it belongs.

There was strong possibility that the ethnic clashes which occurred after those at Meteitei farm that pitted the Kalenjin against the non-Kalenjin were a spillover in which the non-Kalenjin were retaliating for the presumed havoc caused to their kinsmen.

4.5. THE FIGHTERS/INSTIGATORS/PERPETRATORS

4.5.1 From the evidence and information given by various witnesses, there was a distinct group of persons involved in the recent ethnic clashes, who could be loosely designated as Fighters, Instigators and Perpetrators.

4.5.2 The possibility of there being an organized group of fighters could be traced from the various evidence indicating that the attack was often launched by groups that seemed to move under some command. Most accounts indicate that the fighters were youths aged between twelve and thirty years, clad in white/red T-shirts and black shorts with or without a white sheet spread over with a knot on one of the shoulders. Others were in casual wear, but were distinguishable by their slim, athletic and clean shaven outlook with face adorned with clay "munyu". These youth were variously termed Kalenjin, and Kikuyu or Luo "warrior's", depending respectively on whether the evidence was given by non-Kalenjin or Kalenjin witnesses. It was also stated that the Kalenjin warriors had a rear back-up comprising persons with maturer appearance. The "warriors" weapons included bows, arrows, spears, catapults and stones (scuds), pangas, axes, fire igniters, paraffin, petrol and guns.

4.5.3 The possibility of there having been another group of Instigators and Perpetrators or Facilitators who in the link-up were organisers of the entire operation, could also be traced from the various accounts as to the mode of movement of the warriors and rewards for their labour. Some of the evidence indicating the existence of Fighters and Instigators is as follows:-

- (i) a witness from Shinyalu division who appeared before the select Committee at Kakamega, alleged that during the ethnic clashes on the border of Shinyalu division and Nandi district, one Kalenjin "warrior" was captured. The "warrior" is alleged to have said that he hailed from Elgeyo Marakwet district and was executing orders from his commanders and paymasters. The witness further, alleged that the "warrior" said he was part of a group of "warriors", each of whom was paid Kshs.1000 per every person killed and Kshs.600 per each house burned. The witness also alleged that this "warrior" was thoroughly beaten up and was only spared when he conceded to disclose his

identity and mission. The "warrior" was then allegedly taken to Kakamega district hospital by his captors from where he vanished. He is alleged to have said that the funds paid to them were supplied and managed by the Hons. Nicholas Biwott, EGH, M.P.; Reuben Chesire, M.P. and Ezekiel Barngetuny, M.P.

- (ii) a witness from Tapsagoi scheme who appeared before the Committee at Turbo Market, alleged that in the early hours of April 17, 1992, over 1000 Kalenjin "warriors" armed with bows and arrows, were dropped by lorries from unknown places at Turbo Girls Secondary School. The wananchi who saw the "warriors" ran for cover. The "warriors" remained within the confines of the school, until the arrival of Uasin Gishu District Commissioner, Mr. Paul Lang'at, the O.C.P.D. and the local Member of Parliament. The witness alleged that the trio addressed the "warriors", pleading with them to disperse peacefully. The "warriors" eventually dispersed but after ransacking Turbo Girls Secondary School and the homesteads nearby;
- (iii) a witness who appeared before the Committee at Chegaiya centre alleged that prior to the commencement of the ethnic clashes in Chegaiya Settlement Scheme on November 06, 1991, there were allegations that certain persons of the Kikuyu ethnic community, e.g. Ibrahim Mungai, were planning to set their own houses on fire, so as to spark off the Ethnic Clashes, by alleging that their houses had been set on fire by Kalenjin "warriors". He further alleged that these persons were not to suffer any loss as they were to be compensated by the Instigators of the ethnic clashes. It was also alleged that Kikuyu "warriors" from Mbogoini and Subukia were transported in vehicles belonging to Messrs. Peter Mwangi Nga'ng'a and Mutemi both from Chegaiya Centre.
- (iv) another witness at Chegaiya centre alleged that on the night of February 08, 1992, an only Kalenjin meeting was held at Kipkurosiet attended by the Hon. Ezekiel Barngetuny, M.P. and Assistant Chief Simon arap Too. He further

alleged that the former gave the latter Kshs.2000, allegedly to facilitate KANU recruitment;

- (v) several witnesses who appeared before the Committee at Tinderet Secondary School, alleged that several local leaders such as Hon. Ezekiel Barngetuny, M.P., Chairman of Nandi County Council, Samwel Chelule, Chief of Meteitei location, Philip Karoney, and Kipyego Matelong Korir, current Chairman of Meteitei Farmers Company were closely involved in the problems of Meteitei Farm and had incited wananchi to fight through utterances urging the Kalenjin to remove "madoa doa" from the area. The witnesses also alleged that each Kalenjin "warrior" received Kshs.1000 per person killed, and Kshs.500 for safe return from the battlefield. It was also alleged that Kalenjin warriors were transported in vehicles belonging to Meteitei Farmers Company, Kapsabet Girls High School, and Hon. Ezekiel Barngetuny,. The witnesses further alleged that the youths were organized by the KANU youth organizing secretary in Kaptie sub-location, David Rono.

- (vi) several witnesses who appeared before the Committee at Kamasai, alleged that the chairman of KANU Youth in Chepsaita Settlement Scheme, Henry Koech together with Councillor Solomon Magut; former local Member of Parliament, William M. Saina, were the instigators of the clashes in the area and that warriors were paid Kshs.10,000 for each permanent house burnt.

- (vii) several witnesses who appeared before the select Committee at Sondu Township, alleged that, there were both Kalenjin and Luo "warriors". Further that, the Kalenjin "warriors" were not composed of the youths from the local population but were from far, as they appeared not conversant with the geographical details of the area. It was also alleged that the Kalenjin "warriors" were often transported by familiar matatus, e.g. registration Nos. KYC 032 and KAA 551 B; and KZB 882.

- (viii) a witness from Nyakinyua farm, who appeared before the Committee at Londiani, alleged that a resident of the same farm, Ngugi Wacho had been contracted by Daniel Kitiria of Tengnot farm to make 800 arrows at Kshs. 10 each. He further alleged that Wacho was arrested and jailed by a Kericho court for four months. Another witness alleged that each Kalenjin "warrior" was paid Kshs.500 for safe return from a mission. The payments were allegedly made by the proprietor of a Guest House at Kedowa market; and
- (ix) several witnesses alleged that on occasions when some of the "warriors" were apprehended and handed to Chiefs, Assistant Chiefs, District Officers or police, they were invariably set free without any charge. Examples of these were found at Chegaiya centre where it was alleged that on November 07, 1991, the then District Officer of Timboroa apprehended a group of Kalenjin reinforcement from Meteitei farm to assist those at Chegaiya. This reinforcement group was locked in only to be released the following day by the Uasin Gishu District Commissioner Mr. Paul Lang'at and the D.O. instantly transferred.
- (x) from the evidence and information received from the various witnesses in this Belt, the following are among the Instigators, Perpetrators and Facilitators:-
- speakers at the majimbo rallies held at Kapsabet and Kapkatet;
 - Samwel Chelule, Chairman Nandi County council;
 - Philip Karoney, Chief - Meteitei Location;
 - Henry Tuwei, Chief - Songhor Location;
 - Kipyego Matelong Korir - currently heading the committee of Meteitei Farmers Company;
 - David Rono - KANU Youth Organizing Secretary in Kaptie sub-location
 - Henry Koech - KANU Youth Chairman in Chepsaita scheme;
 - Councillor Solomon Magut - Wareng' County council;
 - Jackson Kibor - KANU Chairman, Uasin-Gishu Branch;
 - William M. Saina - former M.P. for Eldoret North;

- David Mativo - former D.C. Nandi;
- Simon arap Too - Assistant Chief - Chegaiya;
- Samwel Boinett - Chief Chegaiya location;
- Kiptarus Kirior - former M.P. for Belgut; and
- Timothy K. Srima - D.C. Kericho

4.6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee having reviewed and deliberated on both oral and written evidence and information from witnesses who appeared in person and those who sent memoranda, recommends that:-

- (i) every effort be made by government and other concerned persons to ensure speedy resettlement of all displaced persons and restoration of peace and tranquillity in all parts of this Belt and Kenya;
- (ii) ways and means be devised to expedite creation of an Urban Council at Sondu township;
- (iii) urgent measures be taken to expeditiously adjudicate and issue title deeds to all deserving persons and further that the Land Control Boards should be guided by professionalism and legal requirements only;
- (iv) urgent measures be taken to enhance security by establishment of additional police posts, police patrol bases and Anti Stock Theft Units;
- (v) the government should as a matter of urgent priority establish a Commission comprising independent persons to study the issue of Meteitei Farm in Tinderet division, to ascertain the exact number of all persons with legitimate claims and ensure proper and equitable allocation of that farm to them; **in the meantime all previous demarcations and allocations should be nullified;**

- (vi) all leaders should make every effort to assist and encourage wananchi understand and practice the virtues of tolerance in this multi-party era;
- (vii) the government should consider the use of services of retired District Commissioners, Judges and Magistrates as members of Temporary Land Disputes Courts as a way of dealing with the numerous land disputes in Uasin Gishu, Nandi, Trans-Nzoia, and other districts with similar problems; and
- (viii) the government should find ways and means of assisting the squatters on government land, at a place popularly known as "Muhoroni nuclear farms" to find own permanent settlement.

CHAPTER FIVE

5.0 THE KISII/NAROK/NYAMIRA/BOMET ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

5.1 THE ETHNIC CLASHES BELT

The Kisii-Narok-Nyamira-Bomet Ethnic Clashes Belt runs roughly along the provincial administrative boundary of Nyanza and Rift Valley Provinces. The touch line of this Belt is the common border between Kisii and Nyamira districts in Nyanza Province and Narok and Bomet districts in the Rift Valley Provinces. The southern end of this Belt is at Nyamaiya market on the Kisii/Narok common border and the northern most is at Sondu market on the Kisii and Bomet common border.

5.1.2. The principle spots in this Belt and which the Committee visited, held sittings and received evidence and information from wananchi, are, starting from the north end of the Belt, Sotik township, on July 11; Eronge centre on July 10; Nyangusu centre on July 09; Nyamaiya market on July 08; and Kiligoris township on July 14 and 15; 1992. During visits to these spots, the Committee received oral evidence and information from a cross-section of wananchi. In addition, several memoranda were submitted to the Committee at the presentation of oral evidence or by persons who were not able to appear.

5.2 BRIEF BACKGROUND AND COMPOSITION OF POPULATION

5.2.1. With the exception of the Kisii/Nyamira/Bomet area, the rest of this Belt is part of the former "reserves" that have come to be identified as the ancestral habitation of the Kipsigis, Abagusii and Maasai. Most of Kisii and Nyamira has in that respect been looked upon as the ancestral home of the Abagusii; as has been Kericho and Bomet for Kalenjin (Kipsigis) and Narok for the Maasai.

5.2.2. In the early decades of this century as the colonial government was taking root, one of its creations was the splitting up of Kenya roughly into "reserves" and "white

highlands". The "reserves" are where the various Kenyan ethnic groups were left to live on their own, and with time, these have become their "ancestral land". The white highlands were created out of the very best and rich agricultural land in the highlands mostly within the Rift Valley province, and was for the exclusive use by white settlers. There were roughly about twelve square miles of white highlands between the Abagusii and Kipsigis.

- 5.2.3.** With the advent of independence, the white highlands between the Abagusii and the Kipsigis, was roughly split into two. Some of it went to Nyamira and the other to Bomet district. Like elsewhere in independent Kenya, the former white highlands were bought by government which in turn vested them into the Agricultural Development Corporation and Settlement Fund Trustees. With time some of the land was created into settlement schemes for squatters, landless and interested wananchi. Some of it was also sold to land buying societies, companies and individuals.
- 5.2.4.** Of the three ethnic groups in this Belt, the Abagusii have always had a higher population density, which is a plausible explanation of their presence in large numbers out of Kisii and Nyamira districts. This also explains why at the creation of settlement schemes, most of the settlers turned out to be Abagusii. The same explanation can amply be extended to their current presence in Kericho, Bomet and Narok districts. Suffice it to say that the Abagusii have been able to move into areas outside their "reserve". In comparison, both the Kipsigis and Maasai, apart from being pastoralists, had more land than their numbers. The Kisii movement into erstwhile Kipsigis and Maasai "reserves", was initially in settlement schemes, but lately through direct purchases and leases.
- 5.2.3.** From the foregoing brief background, it is obvious that, there may be good reasons for the presence of the Abagusii in both Bomet and Narok districts and whereas one would have thought that with time more tolerance and cohesion would have developed between them, the age-old suspicions of the numerically strong dominating the less are still alive. It is true that all has not been smooth between the three ethnic groups, mainly due to incessant stock thefts.

5.3 THE TIME SPAN OF THE ETHNIC CLASHES

5.3.1 From the evidence and information available to the Committee, the time span of the ethnic clashes in this Belt covers the period between October 1991 to July 1992. The earliest and longest ethnic clashes in this Belt were on the Narok/Kisii/Nyamira border. The ethnic clashes in this area seem to be perennial. It is therefore not easy to set a span of time for them. However, it would appear that intensity was noticeable in this period. Kilgoris experienced this intensity from October 1991 to July 1992; Nyamaiya and Nyangusu areas from January to June, 1992; Eronge from March to July, 1992; and Sotik from March to May, 1992.

5.3.2. The time span of the ethnic clashes in this Belt came at a time when the political environment in Kenya had a high temperature. The stirring up of the political environment had been brought about by the unrelenting crusade to re-introduce multi-partyism. The crusade had gained tangible momentum following formation of the pressure group - Forum for Restoration of Democracy - FORD in August, 1991. To counter the aims and objectives of this pressure group, leading politicians and parliamentarians, mainly from the Rift Valley province, started an equally committed crusade. The second crusade was characterised by highly parochial utterances at five rallies addressed by its promoters. These rallies which became known loosely as "Majimbo Rallies" were launched at Kapsabet in Nandi district and have been referred in 1.2. above.

5.4. CAUSES OF THE RECENT ETHNIC CLASHES

Several possible causes of the recent Ethnic Clashes were received by the Committee, in the evidence and information given by the very wide cross section of the many witnesses who appeared at the sittings of the Committee. Only a few of these causes are discussed briefly below:-

- 5.4.2. One of the most obvious possible cause of the recent ethnic clashes hinges on the crusade for and eventual re-introduction of multi-partyism and the consequent ramifications.

The brief background in paragraph 5.3.2. above indicates what kind of ramifications the advent of multi-partyism was bound to engender. One of the outstanding ramifications of the multiparty crusade was the launching of the "Majimbo" debate. Two of the five "majimbo" rallies were convened at venues in or within ample proximity of this Belt. One of these two was on September 21, 1991, at Kapkatet, hosted by the local Member of Parliament and Minister for Public Works, the Hon. Timothy Mibei, EGH, M.P. The second was on September 28, 1991, at Narok, hosted by the KANU chairman Narok Branch, who is also the area Member of Parliament and Minister for Local Government the Hon. William R. Ole Ntimama, EGH, M.P. This rally was addressed by H.E. the Vice-President and Minister for Finance, the Hon. Prof. George Saitoti, EGH, M.P.; Hons. Njoroge Mungai, EGH, M.P.; Nicholas Biwott, EGH, M.P.; Joseph J. Kamotho, EGH, M.P.; Burudi Nabwera, EGH, M.P.; John K. Cheruiyot EGH, M.P.; Hussein Maalim Mohamed, EGH, M.P.; John Kyalo, M.P.; Philip J.W. Masinde, M.P.; Joseph K. Ngutu, M.P.; Timothy Mibei, EGH, M.P.; Philip Leakey, M.P. and others;

- 5.4.3. The leaders continued to make utterances that clearly indicated their inclination towards the zoning off of their areas and ethnic communities so as to spare them from the perceived bad influence of others. This would no doubt be inferred as sufficient warning for the other ethnic communities to tread carefully. For instance several witnesses alleged before the Committee at Nyangusu, that on February 20, 1992, Hon. William Ole Ntimama made blatantly inciting utterances at a public meeting, by stating that the non-Maasai living in Maasai land should respect the Maasai, and further warned that the title deeds owned and cherished by such non-Maasai were mere papers that could be disregarded at any time. Such utterances became frequent, following the repeal of section 2A of the constitution, when declarations like the February 21, 1992 by Kericho leaders were made. Most witnesses who attended the Kapkatet rally, at which allegedly firm indication was given that if multi-partyism was

re-introduced, those wishing to re-introduce "Majimbo" would be free to do so; stated that thereafter they were constantly reminded by their Kalenjin neighbours, who presumed that all Abagusii and Luo were pro-multi-partyism, that with its coming their evacuation would start.

5.4.4. Whereas all the ramifications emanating from the crusades for and the advent of multi-partyism, and the bid to forestall it by the "Majimbo" scare-crow may not all be fully discussed here, suffice it to state that the evidence and information received by the Committee indicate that the political environment created by both was conducive and pliable for the ethnic clashes to trigger off at the flimsiest of excuses. Nonetheless, other possible causes would include the lesser but explosive issues that had perennially been part of the relationships of the various ethnic groups without escalating to the kind of proportions witnessed in the recent ethnic clashes. Some of these are the common-place mutual distrusts, disputes, animosities, parochial considerations, for instance:-

- (i) the perennial dispute between the Kipsigis and the Abagusii on the correct ancestral boundary between them; the Kipsigis insist that it should remain at Chebilat while the Abagusii want it to remain at the present Kisii and Nyamira/Kericho district boundary;
- (ii) the presumption by the Kipsigis that the Abagusii are all pro-multi-partyism and therefore members of the opposition parties, with whom they could not co-operate;
- (iii) the escalation of the perennial stock theft between the Kipsigis and Abagusii, and the Maasai and Abagusii; this has acquired new proportions with the use of sophisticated weapons; and by individuals seeking quick material gain;
- (iv) the long standing disputes on the point of ancestral boundary between the Maasai and Abagusii; the former insist it should remain at the present point on Nyamaiya river, while the Abagusii want it moved back to Keiyani. The

Abagusii feel that the present boundary has given to the Maasai, Sare, which is their ancestral land;

- (v) the discomfort of the Maasai with the presence of the Abagusii in Kilgoris as they hold the trump card in elections;
- (vi) the Maasai dislike of the continued use of their land by the Abagusii to carry out funeral rites and for unauthorized grazing;
- (vii) the discomfort of the Maasai with the advent of multi-partyism, which they view as a means to deny them their rightful share in the national political standing; and their view that the Abagusii are in the opposition and are out to ensure a dismal role for the Maasai; and
- (ix) the wish by the Maasai to protect their rights in view of their slow pace of modernization; hence the imperative need to push out all non-Maasai or subjugate them to their authority.

5.5. THE FIGHTERS/INSTIGATORS/PERPETRATORS

5.5.1 From the evidence and information given by the various witnesses, it seems plausible to say that there is a distinct category of persons to be designated as Fighters and, Instigators and Perpetrators. The plausibility of the existence of such a group is borne out by the numerous references to the existence of fighters known either respectively among the Kipsigis, Abagusii or Maasai as Kalenjin "warriors", "chinkororo" or "moran". The attire of the fighters was described as either blue/white shirts and black shorts or casual wear, with faces adorned with brown/white clay and were clean shaven. The age-limit was about sixteen to thirty years, and the "warriors" were armed with bows, arrows, shields, spears, knives, pangas, spotlights and guns.

5.5.2 The evidence and information received by the Committee, indicated that the fighters visibly worked on their own but were always backed up by the second category, the

Instigators and Perpetrators. Indication of this collaboration could be confirmed from accounts like the following in the evidence received from across this Belt:-

- (i) Witnesses residing in Kilgoris and who appeared before the Committee at Nyangusu, alleged that some of the persons instigating through inflammatory utterances within Narok district included Councillor Moses ole Naimadu; ex-Councillor Moses ole Sarumi; ole Saino, a teacher at Kiligoris Secondary school; Assistant Chief ole Nasa, who was once arrested for inciting the public; and Julius ole Sunkuli, a magistrate at Sotik; further that utterances as those of Hon. William R. ole Ntimama on February 20, 1992, at a public meeting as stated in paragraph 5.4.3 above, have influenced the Maasai to repudiate land leases they had properly entered into with the Abagusii;
- (ii) Several witnesses at Eronge, alleged that on March 18, 1992, they saw many Kipsigis "warriors" grouped at the home of Councillor Richard Chepkibet Mibei, Chairman of Kipsigis County Council, and then headed for Nyamira in many vehicles some belonging to Kipsigis Country Council; and a GK lorry No. GKJ 091; Councillor Mibei's home was nicknamed "Kasarani".
- (iii) Several witnesses at Sotik alleged that teachers within Kisii and Nyamira districts had made contributions of Kshs.500 each in support of the ethnic clashes; further that a Mr. Moses Nyaigoti Nyang'au of Chebilat used his vehicle to transport the arsonists; further, that, a Mr. arap Rono, a KANU sub-locational chairman allegedly told the Abagusii that if they did not register in KANU and voted for it, they would be chased away; and
- (iv) several witnesses at Kilgoris, Nyangusu, and other spots visited alleged that some of the instigators were:- the speakers at the Kapkatet and Narok meetings; former Member for Majoge Bassi, Mr. Zephania M. Anyieni; Chief Ongaro; Hon. Chris M. Obure, who supplied nails for making arrows; Peter Ondimu, former member of the Armed Forces medical corps now running a clinic at Kilgoris, at which injured "chinkororo" were treated.

6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

6.1 The Committee, having reviewed and deliberated on both oral and written evidence and information received from witnesses who appeared in person and those who sent memoranda, recommends that:

- (i) every effort be made by government and all concerned persons, to identify the persons belonging to the groups of fighters variously known as "Chinkororo", "Morans", "Warriors" and disarm and disintegrate them;
- (ii) all current and future leases of land within Narok district be done with and be ratified by the relevant Divisional Land Control Boards, which should carry out their duties without any undue influence;
- (iii) the current deployment of G.S.U. personnel in Narok district but meant to serve also Kisii and Nyamira districts be discontinued; instead more police posts, patrol bases and Anti Stock Theft Units be set up on the border of the four districts;
- (vi) the disputed boundary between the Maasai and Abagusii at Nyamaiya be resolved by a Judicial Commission to be established by the government; and
- (f) the government should work out any way possible by which persons proven to have been victims and who lost capital goods or commercial merchandise acquired on mortgages could be assisted through extended moratorium or write-offs.

CHAPTER SIX

6.0 GENERAL INSECURITY PROBLEMS AND RAMPANT CATTLE RUSTLING IN:-

- (a) KITUI/MERU/MARSABIT/ISIOLO DISTRICTS OF EASTERN PROVINCES;**
- (b) MANDERA/GARISSA/WAJIR DISTRICTS OF NORTH EASTERN PROVINCE;**
- (c) TANA RIVER/LAMU DISTRICTS OF COAST PROVINCE; AND**
- (d) ELGEYO MARAKWET/WEST POKOT/SAMBURU/TURKANA DISTRICTS OF RIFT VALLEY PROVINCE**

6.1. Introduction

6.1.1. The evidence and information available to the Committee on the perennial ethnic clashes between the various ethnic communities in the above thirteen districts indicated that the ethnic clashes thrive on an almost permanent bedrock of general insecurity and rampant cattle rustling. It was clearly acknowledged from the evidence, that despite the renown desire of all Kenyans in the area to work for peace, circumstances invariably beyond their control have ensured perpetuation of insecurity, thus providing fertile ground for the carrying out of unlawful activities. Despite that cattle rustling, in addition to being an unlawful activity that modern societies in Africa are at great pains to contain and eradicate, it is a known fact that in most of our various ethnic cultures, ironically, it was and still is an accomplishment to be encouraged.

6.1.2 As a cultural activity, cattle rustling would never have stirred up the rambles of insecurity and economic destabilization that it has acquired in the last decade. The present day cattle rustling has been compounded by the availability of modern weaponry e.g. guns, to the rustlers. Alongside this fast growing sophistication in cattle rustling, the evidence available to the Committee is that the looting of property other than livestock has also been perpetrated. It is explicit that cattle rustling in this area would only be put to an end if the prevalent general insecurity is contained.

6.1.3. The evidence and information available to the Committee further indicated that most of the weaponry used to perpetrate insecurity in general, found their way into these areas from neighbouring countries, some of whose governments have undergone incessant instability during political change. Right across the borders from West Pokot to Marsabit, Garissa and Lamu, there has over the years been evident influx of persons fleeing from the unstable conditions in their countries. These refugees have invariably come into Kenya with ammunition, as some of them were members of rebelling armed factions or armies that lost out in the struggle for power in those countries. The evidence and information received also indicated that one other major factor that has continued to complicate any tangible moves to tackle the insecurity has been the fact that some of the Kenyan ethnic groups extend into the neighbouring countries. For instance, the ethnic groups in the Pokot, Turkana, Marsabit, Wajir, Garissa and Lamu districts extend into Uganda, Sudan, Ethiopia and Somalia. This situation which has been in existence for long, has in the modern era been complicated by an inevitable drive for gain, which could greatly influence the loyalty of one to his country. The scenario that has been prevalent is that some individuals have tended to maintain dual nationalities or collaborated with persons from neighbouring countries whenever it suited their interests. Existence of this has been extremely intricate to unravel, as often the ethnic cohesion and sectional interest have tended to override national consideration.

6.1.4 Thus, on the basis of the evidence and information available to the Committee, it is appropriate to take it that the incessant ethnic clashes in this area could easily fizzle out in the event of the general insecurity being contained. Every effort should therefore be directed at finding solutions to the general insecurity in this area.

6.2 THE CAUSES OF THE GENERAL INSECURITY/ETHNIC CLASHES

The evidence and information received by the Committee indicate that among the possible causes of the general insecurity and the ethnic clashes, include:-

- (i) the unwillingness of some of the Kenyan ethnic communities with kith and kin in the neighbouring countries to co-operate with security and administration personnel in assisting to disarm the incoming refugees and/or apprehend any persons who could possibly be a source of insecurity;
- (ii) the unlimited and uncontrolled inflow of guns and other dangerous weapons from neighbouring countries;
- (iii) the repudiation of the age-old traditional grazing zones set aside for specific ethnic groups;
- (iv) the fast spreading desertification in the horn of Africa extending to the North-Eastern and Eastern provinces of Kenya, and its consequences to the environment; and
- (v) the rampant drought and famine in the Sahelian belt of Africa, leading the inhabitants to engage in all sorts of activities to make ends meet and survive.

6.3 RECOMMENDATIONS

- The Committee noted that the magnitude of the problems of general insecurity and cattle rustling in this area are far beyond their mandate.

However, the Committee having reviewed and deliberated on the evidence, information and memoranda made available by witnesses, recommends, that:

- (i) the government should make every effort to deploy adequate security personnel to enhance security on all borders;
- (ii) all persons whether Kenyans or refugees, who may have in their possession weapons (guns), should forthwith surrender them to the administration and

security personnel; and further that where this is not done voluntarily, the government should take firm action to collect any available weapons;

- (iii) the security surveillance in the Tana River, Kitui, Garissa and Isiolo districts be beefed up by establishment of permanent security bases on the borders of Kitui North and Tana River district;
- (iv) the government in concert with the United Nations High Commission for Refugees should ensure that all refugee camps are moved back into the countries of origin, where all humanitarian facilities and services should continue to be provided; and
- (v) the leaders and provincial administration in the area should consult closely to reinstate the traditional grazing zones and find ways and means of providing more water resources and other infrastructure to accelerate social and economic development.

7.1.2 This sequence appears, with the exception of those in Chegaiya, Londiani, Molo and Olenguruone, to fall on the provincial boundary of the Western and Nyanza Provinces on the one hand and Rift Valley Province on the other. Further, the recent ethnic clashes seem to have occurred in the "hearing" of the venues of the first three "Majimbo" rallies that actually addressed the "majimbo" issues. Also the evidence received indicates that the ethnic clashes invariably pitted the Kalenjin and Maasai in the Rift Valley Province against virtually all other ethnic groups residing in Western Kenya. This was indeed the case even in Chegaiya, Londiani, Molo and Olenguruone which are wholly in the Rift Valley Province. The evidence further received indicates that the target or victims at whom the clashes were directed were the ethnic groups of Kikuyu, Luo, Abaluhya, Abagusii, Teso, who were not only suspected and presumed to be supporters of the multi-party crusade, but to whom also the main proponents of multi-partyism belong.

7.2 THE ROLE OF THE PROVINCIAL ADMINISTRATION

7.2.1 Evidence and information available to the Committee would appear to raise many queries among wananchi on the role played by the Provincial Administration during the clashes. The Committee's noble expectation, as always is, is that the Provincial Administration right from the grassroots would have been the very first to initiate definite measures to quell and contain the clashes. However, on balance, evidence received indicate an ambivalent position. Evidence showed numerous accounts that some of the officers were either inactive, facilitated in creating an atmosphere pliable to the sparking of the clashes, or did not act as expected. Incidents in this regard included:-

- (i) several witnesses at Saboti in Trans-Nzoia district alleged that in early December, 1991, the Sabaoti held an oathing ceremony in the farm of the late Andrew Saikwa, led by John Ndiema Choito and attended by the area Chief Christopher Kiraro Saikwa;

- (ii) the late Assistant Chief Rabson Saima Ngeywa was killed on April 24, 1992 during an operation by the G.S.U while quelling disturbances.
- (iii) Several witnesses at Kimilili in Bungoma district alleged that the then Bungoma District Commissioner, Mr. William Changole had exhorted the Sabaot to remove "madoadoa" and the "chui" from their "flock of sheep", at a public baraza at Chemoge on December 16, 1991. It was further alleged that Mr. Changole used to address barazas within Mt. Elgon sub-district in the Kalenjin language and would invariably start his address by conveying greetings from H.E. the President;
- (iv) Several witnesses at Turbo and Kamasai alleged that the Chief of Turbo location, Tilowen Tirop Salwa and Assistant chief Simon K. Ng'eny were openly partisan against the non-Kalenjin. This allegation was later corroborated by among others, Mr. Wilfred K. Kimalat, the Permanent Secretary in charge of Provincial Administration in the Office of the President. Further, another witness alleged that he lost a posho mill and over three hundred bags of maize, taken by Chief Kiprotich arap Kebenei, and Assistant Chief Laban Sirma of Eldoret Municipality on February 08, 1992.
- (v) Several witnesses at Koru, alleged that Assistant Chief Joseph Saina of Koguta in Belgut division in Kericho, used a panga to kill sixty year old James Julu Dia, a cripple on March 04, 1992; it was further alleged that on March 05 1992, the Kericho District Commissioner, Timothy K. Sirma, maintained inaction as the "warriors" burned down houses in Koguta. Later, at a public baraza in the presence of the Muhoroni District Officer, Mburu Waweru and O.C.S. Mwangi, Mr. Sirma directed the withdrawal of the beefed-up security from the area, and turning to the warriors, he wondered aloud, "why are houses still standing"? Immediately thereafter, the burning of houses commenced.
- (vi) Several witnesses at Tinderet in Nandi district alleged that on November 02, 1991, leaders from Nandi district, Hons. John. K. Cheruiyot, EGH, Ezekiel K.

Bargentuny, D.C. David Mativo, O.C.P.D. Otiemo, maintained inactivity and disinterest as the warriors continued to burn the houses in Owiro farm; it was further alleged that chief Henry arap Tuwei of Songhor location told residents of Owiro farm to evacuate in the face of impending attack by Kalenjin 'warriors' on March 12, 1992; they were to leave a day earlier;

- (vii) Witnesses who appeared at Saosa in Olenguruone division alleged that the then District Officer, Mr. Cheruiyot in collaboration with the local chief Jonathan Mutai were partisan in the ethnic clashes against non-Kalenjin and always set free Kalenjin "warriors" apprehended and brought before them;
- (viii) Witnesses from Hamisi division further alleged that wananchi were often aggrieved by the imposition of ineligible persons to positions of leadership. They alleged that in 1982, Kakamega D.C. Nicholas Mberia appointed Chief Kibery of Tambua, in spite of obvious reasons indicating he was ineligible.
- (ix) Witnesses from Saboti division of Trans-Nzoia district alleged that during the raid on the homestead of Mzee Omasette on the night of March 15, 1992, by over 200 "warriors", the three Administration Policemen despatched by Saboti District Officer Mr. Omweno, joined the invaders. The witnesses alleged that residents in self-defence cut one of the invaders who was armed with gun using a panga; the injured invader dropped his gun, which was snatched by the residents. The gun and the injured invader (who turned out to be one of the A.P.s. guarding the homestead) were handed to Trans-Nzoia D.C. Nicholas Mberia the following day, and no action taken.
- (x) Witnesses at Koru alleged that on or about May 08, 1992, the Chief of Kunyak location, Moses Kiptere, Assistant chief Toseph Kipchumba, KANU chairman for Kunyak location, Wilson Koros and others met at Kiptenden Primary school and resolved that all Luo were to move out of Kunyak location. On learning of this, the Luo began moving out.

- (x) Witnesses at Tinderet, alleged that the Nandi District Officer I, Mr. Mwash, was partisan in the manner he conducted the abortive meeting of shareholders of Meteitei Farmers company on October 28, 1991, by supporting the faction of 310 against the 279 members.

7.3 THE ROLE OF THE SECURITY PERSONNEL

7.3.1 Evidence and information available to the Committee indicate generally that wananchi had fewer words of praise for the role performed by the security personnel comprising the Kenya police, Administration police and General Service Unit, during the clashes. The Committee's noble expectation was that the various witnesses would have attested to some firm, definite and swift measures that the security personnel would have instituted to quell and contain the situation. Instead various witnesses recounted instances showing that some of these officers did compromise their expected role by either remaining inactive or disinterested, facilitating the activities of the fighters and instigators, or did not simply act as would have been expected of them. Invariably some of them are said to have acted admirably well in spite of the odds facing them. For instance, on the night of July 14, 1992, G.S.U personnel encountered and killed three cattle rustlers at Enosopukia, on the Nyamira/Narok border. The Committee visited the site of the exchange on July 15, 1992.

7.3.2 Some of the specific incidents on the role of security personnel include:-

- (i) The most widely alleged shortfall of the security personnel is that they did not take tangible measures to restrain the "warriors" in carrying out their activities, instead the inaction was taken as tacit backing for such activities: and that when it seemed like they were taking action, it was to shoot in the air which never distracted the Kalenjin 'warriors' from their mission. For instance, several witnesses at Tinderet alleged that on October 31, 1991, at Owiro Farm, the area chief, assistant chief and

Administration Policemen said they could not restrain the Kalenjin "warriors" in their mission as the "warriors" were carrying out "orders from above;"

- (ii) The second widely alleged shortfall was that on most occasions the "warriors" apprehended by wananchi and handed over to the security personnel were always let free, only to return to the clash front; for instance, allegations were made at Koru that some "warriors" involved in arson at Kiptenden were apprehended by wananchi on November 02, 1991; and also that on November 04, 1991, a Mr. Kibet and others of Kunyak farm were apprehended by wananchi while armed with arrows, bows and pangas; all these persons were taken to Kericho police station where they were set free;

- (iii) The third widely alleged short-fall was that on some occasions, the security personnel assisted the warriors in their activities. For instance, witnesses at Saosa alleged that on April 25, 1992, an Administration Policeman attached to the D.O.'s office, gave his gun to a Richard Rono, a former member of the disbanded Kenya Airforce, currently a teacher at Kaptambui Primary School, who used it to kill a Mr. Kinyanjui. Further at Sotik, several witnesses alleged that on March 17, 1992, an Administration Policeman in the company of five civilians took part in burning Kipsigis houses in Koiyet village in Kelekele sub-location. This A.P. was later injured in an encounter with other A.P.s. At Kimilili, several witnesses who alleged involvement of security personnel in clashes stated that, a Senior Serjeant Wycliffe Naibei with the 78 Tank Battalion based at Isiolo, was arrested for involvement in burning Bukusu houses on April 09, 1992; it was later confirmed from Kimilili police station that Senior Serjeant Naibei was arrested and charged with arson in the Principal Magistrate's Court at Bungoma on April 10, 1992, (case file No. 628/92).

- (iv) Another allegation was that helicopters belonging to security forces were used to assist the warriors. Evidence received from the provincial administration indicate that due to the poor terrain in the Molo and Olenguruone divisions, use of helicopters became the only suitable means of inspection tours and transportation of required security personnel. The Rift Valley Provincial Commissioner Mr. Yusuf Haji in his evidence before the Committee, stated that apart from himself, military helicopters had been used by the Nakuru and Kericho District Commissioners. Evidence received from several witnesses at Kamwaura, Saosa and Kerisoï centres confirmed Mr. Haji's statement. At Kerisoï Centre, several witnesses from Central Farmers company, Mwaragania, and Kipkewa alleged that on or about April 25, 1992, three military helicopters, two of which bore numbers 588 and 541, landed in the area. The witnesses alleged further that whenever the helicopters landed, the fighting seemed to intensify on their departure.

7.4 THE ROLE OF RELIGIOUS BODIES

- 7.4.1** Evidence and information available to the Committee indicate that the clergy were very much involved in the clashes. It has been indicated to the Committee, in the evidence given by the General Secretary of National Council of Churches of Kenya (N.C.C.K.) Rev. Samwel Kobia, that the Clergy have always come out and commented on whatever affects their flock. Hence, their comments and fact-finding reports on the recent ethnic clashes, were made out of that concern. In that regard, however, further evidence received indicate that the involvement of the clergy did contribute to occasional widening of the gap between the multi-party and majimbo crusades as it was amenable to be misconstrued as more supportive of the former. Evidence received from various witnesses give indication that the clergy played a leading role in providing compassionate and relief services to the victims.

7.4.2 Further evidence received from wananchi and the clergy indicate that the involvement of the clergy was in some places influenced by ethnic affinity of its ministers. For instance, evidence received from the clergy at Kapsakwony in Bungoma district and Londiani in Kericho district, was split between the Kalenjin vis-a-vis the non-Kalenjin. During sittings of the Committee at the two venues, the clergy presented evidence either as Kalenjin or non-Kalenjin group. Such an approach would appear to compromise their acclaimed impartial role. Further, evidence available alleged that some of the clergy in Muchorwi African Inland Church Parish, Mt. Elgon Archideaconary of Church of the Province of Kenya and the Saosa Catholic parish took stances that were openly partisan.

7.5 PRESENCE OF ORGANIZED GROUPS OF FIGHTERS/WARRIORS

7.5.1 Evidence and information available to the Committee and some of which has already been alluded to above, indicate that the existence of an organized group of fighters, by whatever name known, in the course of the clashes could not be ruled out. Several witnesses recounted their personal encounters with some of the fighters in their evidence before the Committee, which seemed uniform in all areas, to the effect that most of the fighters acted and behaved in a manner akin to members of a tuned and disciplined group. The same witnesses also recounted the apparently similar attire used by the fighters. Witnesses from the Shinyalu border with Nandi district (see paragraph 2.5.2. (a) above) and from the environs of Ileho Secondary school in Sondu (see paragraph 2.5.2 (f) above) informed the Committee that some of the warriors they encountered were not from the local population and that they were on hire. Similarly evidence received at Turbo and Kamasai (see paragraph 3.5.2. (b), above) indicate that over 1000 Kalenjin "Warriors" transported to Turbo market on April 17, 1992, seemed to have been brought as an organised group from some central place.

7.5.2 Further evidence received by the Committee indicates that the fighters were transported to and from the clash fronts-several witnesses gave to the Committee registration numbers of several vehicles used in transporting the "warriors"; for instance in Molo and Olenguruone divisions, the following vehicles were implicated -

Peugeot car KQL 405 of a Dr. Soi, lorries belonging to Francis Chelule, for transport of warriors from Keringet to Chepakundi, vehicles GK 170T, KZV 486, KAB 626E, KZB 223, KZE 508, KYJ 301, and KAA 424W. In Sondu area, vehicles Nos. KYC 032; KAA 551B and KZB 882. In Eronge area vehicle No. GKJ 091, including several others belonging to Kipsigis County Council which ferried "warriors" from the home of Councillor Richard Chepkibet Mibei. In Sotik area, a vehicle belonging to Moses Nyaiyeti Nyang'au; in Meteitei, Tinderet division, vehicles belonging to Meteitei Farmers company and vehicles of Hon. Ezekiel K. Bargentuny (tractors and two Isuzu lorries KTP 048 and KTX 852), in Chegaiya area, vehicles belonging to Messrs. Peter Mwangi Ng'ang'a and Mutemi of Chegaiya Centre.

7.5.3 Further, evidence received by the Committee and which has already been alluded to above indicates that the fighters were on hire and were paid sums ranging from Kshs.500 for safe return from the clash front, Kshs.1000 to Kshs. 2000 for killing one person or burning a grass thatched house and Kshs.10,000 per permanent house burnt. Several witnesses also alleged that some of the persons funding the wages of the "warriors" were:-

- (i) the Hon. K.N.K. Biwott, EGH, M.P.;
- (ii) the Hon. Reuben K. Chesire, M.P.;
- (iii) the Hon. Ezekiel K. Bargentuny, M.P.;
- (iv) the proprietor of Guest House at Kedowa Market, Kipkelion division; and
- (v) the Hon. Wilson Leitich, M.P.

7.5.4 Further evidence received by the Committee alleges that some of the 'warriors' were recruited and trained for a purpose initially not disclosed, but which turned out to be as "warriors" in the clashes and similar activities in the future. A witness, Valentinus Uhuru Kodipo alias Abdul Kadir arap Kigen, who appeared before the Committee,

alleged that he had been recruited as early as 1981 into a military cum-civilian body of youths that he eventually came to learn that it served the personal interests of the Hon. K.N.K. Biwott, EGH, M.P., who paid him his first substantial earning of Ksh. 50,000 on June 01, 1986. In his detailed evidence, he alleged that some of the places the training took place included Masai Mara and Olenguruone. He further alleged that the whole group was split into those with bows and arrows and those with guns, the latter providing the rear backup. On missions accomplished by the group, he allegedly participated in the recent Ethnic Clashes in Tinderet division and the Upper and Lower Nyakach, and Belgut divisions, stemming from Sondu market. The witness further alleged that during training periods in the forest they received regular visits from Hons. K.N.K. Biwott, George Saitoti, William ole Ntimama, Kipkalia Kones, the late Capt. Belsoi, Benjamin Bett, and others.

7.5.5 Further evidence received by the Committee alleged that the "warriors" had sanctuaries at various places. The witnesses alleged that some of the sanctuaries were in forests in Ndoinet, Olenguruone, Masai Mara, Chepkurkur in Mt. Elgon sub-district, in the farms owned by the Hon. George Saitoti, Hon. Prof. Jonathan K. Ng'eno, Hon. Wilson Leitich, Mr. Benjamin K. Kipkulei, Councillor Maiywa in Molo division; Councillor Richard Chepkibet Mibei and Hon. Wilberforce Kisiero.

7.5.6 Regarding weapons used by "warriors" evidence available to the Committee so far indicate that they included bows, arrows, contrary shields, spears, pangas, stones, catapults (strings) nicknamed "scud missiles" and home made guns. Most of these weapons were locally made, including the arrows, contrary to allegations that some imported arrows were used. Evidence available to the Committee indicates that the only imported arrows in the country at the time of the clashes were those which were found on a transit passenger at the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport, Nairobi, on April 14, 1992. Evidence available to the Committee confirms that AK47 and G3 guns were used in virtually all areas. This is confirmed by the many bullet cartridges received from the witnesses and from Police stations and posts backed by their oral evidence of having actually snatched some of the guns from the "warriors".

7.6 THE ROLE OF THE (LOCAL & INTERNATIONAL) MASS MEDIA

- 7.6.1** Over the last decade the expansion of the mass media in Kenya has attained unparalleled proportions. This expansion has enabled Kenyans to get virtually any piece of information whether on local or international matters with minimal effort. The local scene continues to be enriched through the interaction with the largest number of international correspondents based in any other country on the African continent. On its own, local journalism has made distinctively remarkable expansion. To-day, there are many Kenyans owning and managing commendable establishments with renowned publications.
- 7.6.2** The foregoing rapid expansion in the mass media has resulted into uninterrupted bombardment of the public with information emanating from sources that are invariably far apart. Coupled with the recent advancement in information technology, Kenyans to-day find that they have almost unlimited access to information. The effect is such that unless endowed with some ability to sieve through such information and throw away the chaff, the public could easily get excited and alarmed.
- 7.6.3** In the course of the clashes, the line of reporting adopted by some of the locally published press appeared to highlight some issues that only served to excite and inflame sectional or parochial considerations. Such stances were taken by most of the media agencies, some of which are owned by government, private individuals and religious organizations. It has been evident that most of the media adopted an approach that only served to fan rivalry and conflict between the multi-party and "majimbo" proponents and contributed to the clashes by:-
- (i) exaggeration, for instance by highlighting untruths, e.g. the existence of imported arrows in the clash areas;
 - (ii) alarmist reports and sensationalism by giving inflated figures to build up a case (e.g. the report that there were 28 Kalenjin D.C.s in the country which was not factually correct);

- (iii) the churning out of unverified facts to the gullible reading public which has few or no facilities to verify the purported facts;
- (iv) giving credence to reports appearing in the foreign media which were touted as the gospel truth;
- (v) the denial of information by the Government-controlled media (the Kenya Broadcasting Corporation and the Kenya Times) to the population thereby forcing them to seek news from media outside the country.

7.7.1 SUMMARY BY DISTRICT OF PERSONS KILLED, INJURED, ARRESTED AND DESTROYED PROPERTY

- (i) The following is a summary of information available from the Provincial Administration and witnesses:-

- (ii) From evidence and information given by witnesses, the only specified value of property destroyed or livestock lost or stolen during the clashes amounts to approximately Kshs. 209 million. In addition, over 9,400 houses were destroyed and 3,379 livestock lost.
- (iii) Detailed information on both specified and unspecified values will be found in Part II of Appendix I, page Nos. 84 to 90.

CHAPTER EIGHT

8.0 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

8.1. The following conclusions were arrived at by the committee after careful review of evidence presented to it:-

8.1.1 THE ROLE OF THE PROVINCIAL ADMINISTRATION

Evidence received pointed to the fact that:-

- (i) some officers in the provincial administration directly participated or encouraged the clashes;
- (ii) response or reaction was poor and too slow thereby precipitating the escalation of the clashes;
- (iii) public utterances by some administrators were a contributory factor in inciting people to fight;

8.1.2 THE ROLE OF SECURITY PERSONNEL

Evidence adduced indicated that:-

- (i) the District Security Committees acted half-heartedly and did not forestall the clashes in the nick of time;
- (ii) immediate release of arrested suspects before their being charged in court encouraged the fighting;
- (iii) preferring lesser charges against those reported to be responsible for loss of life and destruction of property brought alarm and suspicion;

- (iv) there was failure to take firm and decisive action as dictated by Police Force Orders such as using necessary force to stop the fighting;
- (v) the security personnel were partisan in several cases when dealing with clash situations.

8.1.3 THE ROLE OF RELIGIOUS LEADERS

- (i) It was observed that religious leaders took a partisan role based on tribal lines at the lower levels, instead of being arbiters, and at the higher level by issuing inflammatory statements;
- (ii) While noting the important role they played in clothing and feeding victims, it was also observed that in providing this assistance, they tended to discriminate against the Kalenjin community, such as in Londiani.

8.1.4 THE ROLE OF THE MASS MEDIA

During the clashes, it was observed that the mass media:-

- (i) sensationalised the reporting of events;
- (ii) was biased in the way information was being disseminated, especially by the print media;
- (iii) carried inflammatory and alarmist reports; and
- (iv) the Kenya Broadcasting Corporation radio and TV did not give comprehensive information to the public.

8.1.5 THE ROLE OF POLITICIANS

The politicians contributed substantially to the clashes in their utterances which clearly indicated the following:-

- (i) that they engaged in talk that amounted to rumour mongering;
- (ii) that they publicly made inciting and inflammatory remarks and statements;
- (iii) that they were biased in the conduct of their public duties, in several instances taking sides on tribal lines, instead of providing non-partisan leadership;

8.1.6 THE PRESENCE OF THE "WARRIORS"

The different ethnic groups involved in the clashes had their "warriors". What appears to have given the term a military connotation is perhaps derived from historical background where tribes had a fighting group of young men to protect their societies. From the evidence received, the Committee observed the following:

- (i) that there were organised groups of youths of between 12 and 30 years armed with bows, arrows pangas, rungus, catapults, toy guns and other assortments of weapons;
- (ii) that the youths were generally dressed in shorts and T-shirts or were topless. In some cases some "warriors" had their faces adorned with clay (munyu) eg. Kalenjin "warriors";
- (iii) that in most cases the "warriors" were transported to clash areas from outside to reinforce the local ones;
- (iv) that they were mainly armed with home made weapons. The youths were also provided with other articles such as spotlights, jerrycans containing inflammables, food and money to enable them undertake their destructive missions.

- (iv) that they were mainly armed with home made weapons. The youths were also provided with other articles such as spotlights, jerrycans containing inflammables, food and money to enable them undertake their destructive missions.

The Committee did not find any evidence of the use of imported arrows.

8.1.7 ROOT CAUSES OF THE CLASHES

After reviewing the evidence presented, the committee is of the view that the clashes:-

- (i) were politically motivated and fuelled by some officers in the Provincial administration; and
- (ii) were instigated in the misconception that some ethnic communities could chase away other ethnic communities in order to acquire their land.

8.2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

After careful consideration of evidence presented, and in addition to recommendations made specifically for the respective Ethnic Clash Belts, and in order to deter any future recurrence of such clashes, the Committee makes the following recommendations:-

- (i) that appropriate action should be taken against those provincial administrative officers who directly or indirectly participated or encouraged the clashes;
- (ii) that there should be equitable distribution in the appointment of administrative and security personnel;
- (iii) that in view of the key role chiefs played in certain clash areas, government should consider making chiefs transferable;

- (iv) that in view of the long-standing disputes involving the transfer of land in some of the clash areas, the government should introduce amendments to the Land Control Act to make provision for Land Control Boards to have power to conduct **ex-parte** hearings of applications where one party fails to appear before the Board, after adequate notice has been given;
- (v) that to avoid Kenyans relying on foreign media for news and information, the government-controlled media should be open in covering events in Kenya;
- (vi) that all politicians who made inflammatory and inciting statements which caused tribal animosity during the clashes, should be investigated with a view to taking appropriate legal action against them;
- (vii) that allegations that Hon. K.N.K. Biwott and Hon. E.K. Barng'etuny were involved be investigated with a view to ascertaining their puported role in organising and financing the "warriors";
- (vii) that the very serious allegations made by Valentinus Uhuru Kodipo be fully investigated by the government to ascertain their authenticity; and
- (viii) that while appreciating the work done by Government, Non-Governmental and religous organisations to feed and clothe the victims, the Committee strongly recommends that a **Special Trust Fund** be set up for the purpose of overseeing the resettlement of clash victims, which will give assistance and funds for their smooth resettlement.

APPENDIX 1

DATA AND STATISTICS

The Appendix on Data and Statistics is to sum up some of the occurrences during the recent ethnic clashes. It is split into two parts - viz:

Part I

Comprises information on persons who-died both by action of members of the public and security personnel; injured, arrested in similar circumstances; charged and cases finalized; and those displaced by the Ethnic Clashes in some cases figures were unavailable;

Part II

Comprises information on property both inanimate and animate, that was lost, burnt, destroyed, et cetera. These are grouped under eleven leadings, indicating either value specified or unspecified;

1. HOUSE to include permanent and semi-permanent houses; stores, grass thatched kitchens built separately; cottages, latrines and commercial buildings in markets;
2. LIVESTOCK to include grade cattle, sheep, goats and Kenyan equivalents, unless indicated separately;
3. FURNITURE to include sofa sets, dining and coffee table sets; tables, chairs, cupboards, side boards, stools;
4. HOUSEHOLD to include, utensils, pans, cookers, jikos;
5. CLOTHING to include, ladies, mens and childrens wear;
6. FARM PRODUCE to include, maize, beans, potatoes, millet, fruits in bags; and those in plantation; bananas; cane; fruits;
7. ELECTRONICS to include, television sets; radios; radio cassettes; video cassettes; generators; music systems; refrigerators;
8. HARDWARE to include, farm tools and equipment; building materials such as iron sheets;
9. FARMS to include, coffee estates; sugar plantations; ordinary farms containing maize, millet, homesteads, fruits;
10. STATIONERY to include, books, files, stationery;
11. BEDDING to include, beds; mattresses; bedsheets; pillows; blankets; mosquito nets;

12. OTHERS

to include vehicles, lorries, cars;
