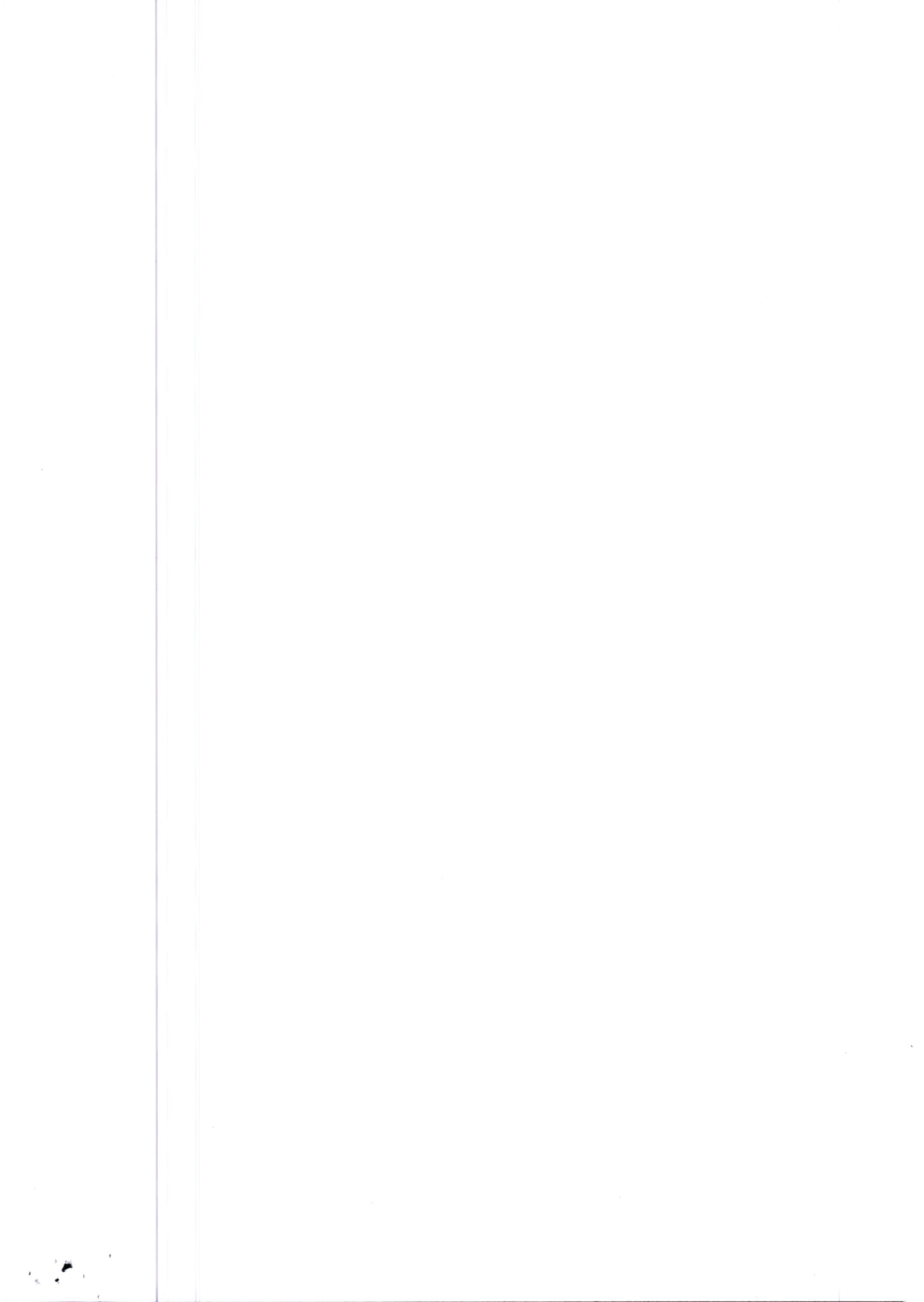


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PREFACE

I submit this Fourth Report to the National Assembly on Treaties ratified within the Financial Year 2019/2020 in fidelity to the Constitution of Kenya.

Since independence, considerable energy has been invested in Kenya's foreign policy priorities such as the ratification and implementation of treaties which protect, promote and protect Kenya's national interests. Treaties provide predictability and transparency to Kenya on issues of global concern. Additionally, Kenya has been involved in the creation and maintenance of various international treaty regimes through active diplomacy such as the Revised Law of the Sea Convention, in the process, gaining sovereign rights over extensive areas of sea and continental shelf.

Treaties establish international rules or standards that bind States and other actors of the international community. At present, Kenya is a party to Three Hundred and Sixteen Treaties (316). The implementation of these treaties advances the progressive realization of its development goals and priorities such as envisaged under Vision 2030 and the Big 4 Agenda, which focus on enhanced manufacturing, food security and nutrition, universal health coverage and affordable housing.

In order to guard the sanctity of treaty making, Kenya adopted a revised treaty regime through the promulgation of the 2010 Constitution and enactment of the Treaty Making and Ratification Act No. 45 of 2012 (Rev. 2018). Article 2 (6) of the Constitution provides that any treaty or convention ratified by Kenya shall form part of the law of Kenya. This was the first time since independence that the application of Treaties and Conventions was expressly provided for in the Constitution.

It is therefore my pleasure to present to you this report which is a public awareness tool on Kenya's international obligations. It will also be instrumental in other activities like research and policy formulation and service delivery for national development in tandem with the Kenya Vision 2030 and The Big Four Agenda.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Section 15 (1) of the Treaty Making and Ratification Act, No. 45 of 2012 (Rev. 2018) herein referred to as the Act, requires the Cabinet Secretary to submit to the National Assembly, once every financial year, a report containing a record of all treaties which Kenya has ratified and which may in any way bind Kenya to specific actions. This Fourth Report has been prepared in compliance with the Act.

The report provides the public with a concise breakdown of treaties ratified by Kenya during the Financial Year 2019/2020. This is anchored on the principles of transparency and accountability, which require the Ministry to disseminate treaty information annually to ensure public awareness of our international obligations. Additionally, the report outlines the steps involved in the treaty making and ratification process.

Treaties have a binding effect both at the domestic and international levels and as such, the ratification procedure in Kenya is a multi-stage process, involving treaty negotiation, adoption and signature by the Executive and approval for ratification by the National Assembly.

Implementation of treaties is a collective mandate of all the three arms of Government: Parliament ensures that legislative measures are put in place to implement provisions of treaties and reviews measures undertaken by the Executive arm in implementation; the Executive arm implements through various policies and programmes; the Judiciary holds to account the Executive on implementation of treaty obligations and upholds the rights enshrined in the treaties.

During the reporting period July, 2019 to June, 2020, Kenya ratified Five (5) treaties namely: The Treaty establishing the International Academy of Anti-Corruption; The Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products; The Beijing Treaty on Audio Visual Performances; The Revised Constitution of the African Civil Aviation Commission and The East African Community Protocol on Information, Communications and Technology Networks.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 The making and ratification of treaties internationally is governed by the Vienna Convention on the Law of Treaties (VCLT) 1969. The Convention is a multilateral treaty that has codified existing customary international law and the progressive development of the law of treaties.

1.2 The VCLT defines a treaty as “an international agreement concluded between States in written form and governed by international law, whether embodied in a single instrument or in two or more related instruments and whatever its particular designation”. Treaties can be referred to by various terms such as, Conventions, Agreements, Covenants, Final Acts, Charters, Protocols, Pacts, and Accords including Constitutions establishing Intergovernmental Organizations.

1.3 Treaties can be bilateral, multilateral or pluri-lateral: bilateral treaties are those between two subjects of international law; multilateral treaties are those between three or more subjects of international law, generally developed under the auspices of International Organizations and pluri-lateral treaties are between groups of States that come together to formulate, influence or negotiate outside multilateral frameworks.

1.3 According to the VCLT, A treaty only becomes binding on a State upon ratification. The Treaty Making and Ratification Act defines ratification as the international act by which the state signifies its consent to be bound by a treaty, and includes acceptance, approval and accession where the treaty provides for it; thereby adopting the approach of the Vienna Convention.

1.4 The Government's decision on whether the ratification of a treaty is in the national interest is based on information obtained during consultations with various Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) and other relevant stakeholders. The consultation as required by the Act is meant to analyze the treaty in question and develop a consensus within the Country before taking definitive treaty action. Inevitably, the final decision necessarily involves a balancing of competing interests.

1.5 The Constitution and the Treaty Making and Ratification Act allocate primary responsibility for initiating the treaty making process to the Executive branch. However, Parliament as the Legislative Arm has the final say as to whether a treaty shall form part of the law of Kenya.

- 1.6 Every treaty in force is binding upon Kenya and must be performed in good faith. Kenya cannot invoke the provisions of its domestic law as a justification for its failure to perform its obligations under a treaty.
- 1.7 Generally, treaties do not apply retroactively, unless a different intention appears or is established in the provisions of the treaty. In addition, a treaty applies and is binding to the entire territory of Kenya.
- 1.8 Some treaties have a periodic reporting obligation to the treaty bodies on implementation of the respective treaty at the national level. Pursuant to Section 16 of the Act, the Cabinet Secretary for Foreign Affairs in conjunction with the Attorney General and the relevant Ministry and State Department facilitate the preparation of the periodic reports for submission to the relevant treaty bodies, through a consultative process involving all stakeholders.
- 1.9 The Ministry of Foreign Affairs through the Office of the Registrar of Treaties is charged with the overall management of Kenya's treaty actions.

THE TREATY MAKING AND RATIFICATION PROCESS IN KENYA

2.1 INITIATION OF THE TREATY MAKING PROCESS

- 2.1.1 The national executive shall be responsible for initiating the treaty making process, negotiating and ratifying treaties.
- 2.1.2 When deciding whether or not to initiate the treaty-making process, the relevant Ministry shall in consultation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Office of the Attorney-General and Department prepare a proposal and a country position paper in respect of the subject treaty, consider and ensure that the conditions under Section 5(2) of the Act have been fulfilled.

2.2 NEGOTIATIONS

- 2.2.1 The relevant Ministry, in consultation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Office of the Attorney General and Department of Justice, shall nominate a negotiating team of suitably qualified and competent officers from among the stakeholders to form part of the Government delegation to negotiate the draft treaty in the interest of the people of Kenya.
- 2.2.2 After receipt of the names of the Negotiating Team from the relevant Ministry or State department, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs shall prepare the Credentials authorizing the Government delegation to negotiate the treaty on behalf of Republic of Kenya.
- 2.2.3 The Negotiating Team shall uphold national interest and put their best efforts and skill in analyzing and negotiating the text of the draft treaty until consensus is achieved upholding the national interest. The Negotiating Team shall be bound by the values and principles of the Constitution and shall take into account the regulatory impact of any proposed treaty.

2.3 RATIFICATION PROCESS

2.3.1 APPROVAL BY CABINET

- 2.3.1.1 The relevant Ministry shall in consultation with the Cabinet Secretary for Foreign Affairs, the Attorney General, and in the case where there are financial implications, the Cabinet Secretary responsible for the National Treasury, prepare and present a Memorandum to Cabinet to commence treaty making for approval by the Cabinet pursuant to section 5(3) of the Act.

2.3.1.2 Cabinet shall consider the proposal for treaty-making within a reasonable time and provide its directions, either approving or disapproving the proposal for treaty-making.

2.3.1.3 Upon Cabinet approval, the Cabinet Secretary for Foreign Affairs shall within a reasonable time submit the Treaty and a Memorandum on the Treaty to the Speaker of the National Assembly.

2.3.2 CONSIDERATION BY THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

2.3.2.1 Upon receipt of the Treaty and the Memorandum by the Speaker of the National Assembly, the relevant parliamentary committee shall consider the treaty and ensure public participation in accordance with the laid down parliamentary procedures.

2.3.2.2 The National Assembly may approve or disapprove the ratification of a treaty. The decision on ratification shall be in writing and communicated within fourteen (14) days by the Clerk of the National Assembly.

2.3.2.3 The National Assembly shall not approve the ratification of a treaty if that treaty, or part of its provisions are contrary to the Constitution of Kenya.

2.4 APPROVAL FOR RATIFICATION

2.4.1 Where the ratification of a treaty is approved by the National Assembly without any reservations to the treaty, the relevant Cabinet Secretary of the Ministry shall, within **thirty (30) days** from the date of the approval of the ratification of the treaty, request the Cabinet Secretary for Foreign Affairs to prepare the instrument of ratification of the treaty.

2.5 PREPARATION OF INSTRUMENTS OF RATIFICATION

2.5.1 Upon receipt of a request to prepare the instrument of ratification of the treaty and Certificate of Approval on the ratification of a treaty from the National Assembly, the Office of the Registrar of Treaties shall prepare the Instrument of Ratification, Accession, or Acceptance (as the case may be) for signature by the Cabinet Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

2.5.2 It is a criminal offence for a person to ratify any treaty on behalf of the Republic of Kenya without consideration and approval by Cabinet and Parliament in accordance with the law. Such a person shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding fifteen (15) years or to a fine not exceeding KSh. 20 million or to both fine or imprisonment.

2.6 DEPOSIT OF INSTRUMENTS OF RATIFICATION

2.6.1 The Office of the Registrar of Treaties shall deposit the signed Instrument of ratification, accession or acceptance with the relevant Depository of the treaty or at the requisite international body and a copy thereof shall be filed with the Registrar of Treaties.

2.6.2 Following the deposit of the instrument of ratification, accession or acceptance, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs shall undertake to register the treaty with Secretary-General of the United Nations pursuant with Article 102 of the Charter of the United Nations.

3.0 THE STAGES OF THE TREATY MAKING AND RATIFICATION PROCESS IN KENYA

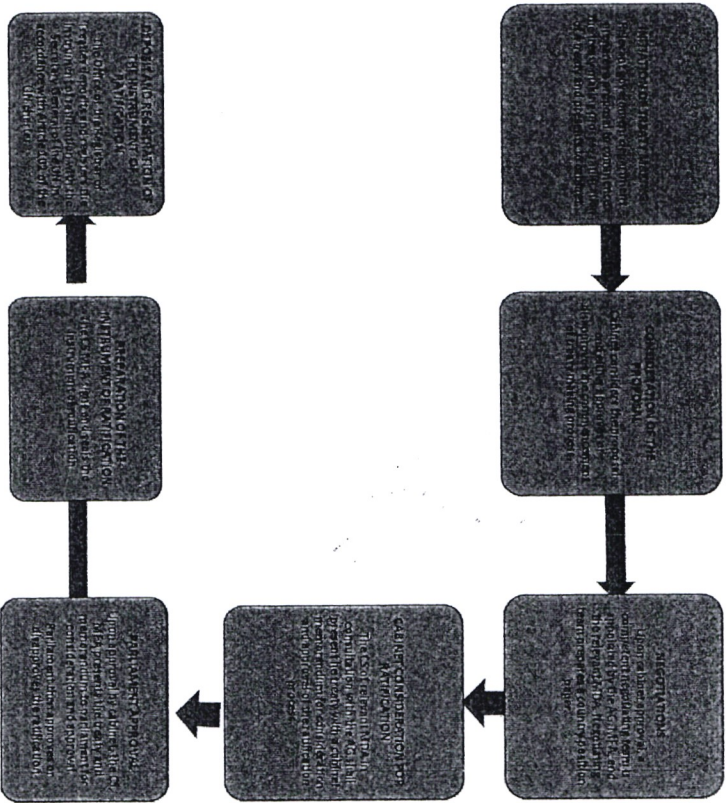


Figure 1: Illustrates Kenya's treaty Making and Ratification Procedure

4.0 POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

4.1

There is need to review existing policy and legal framework in order to streamline legal and institutional gaps that exist in Kenya's treaty making and ratification process. This will accelerate the ratification and domestication of treaties that are of strategic importance to Kenya.

4.2

The National Assembly should enhance budgetary allocation to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to ensure optimal monitoring of treaty implementation by MDAs and County Governments. Additionally, this will ensure the institutionalization of the *ad hoc* committee that prepares annual reports on the implementation of Kenya's international obligations.

4.3

There is need to enhance capacity of Members of The Judiciary on treaties ratified by Kenya and obligations arising thereof to ensure the full realization of Article 2 (6) of the Constitution.

5.0 TREATIES RATIFIED BY KENYA FROM THE YEAR 2013 TO 2020

5.1 This report contains the ratification status of forty (40) Treaties concluded by Kenya from the establishment of the revised treaty regime in December, 2012.

5.2 The treaties are in the realms of Safety of Life at Sea; Corruption; Marine Environment; Telecommunications; Justice; Health; Environment; Forestry and Agriculture; Trade; Peace and Security; Transport; Diplomatic Relations; Fisheries; Human Rights; Intellectual Property; Education, Science and Technology and Fiscal Matters.

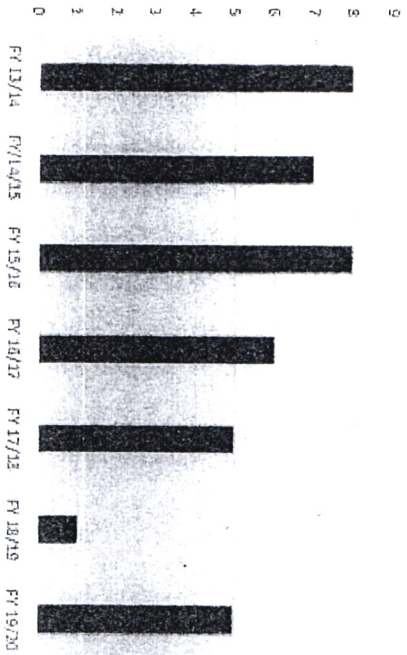


Figure 2. Illustration of treaties ratified by Kenya since 2013

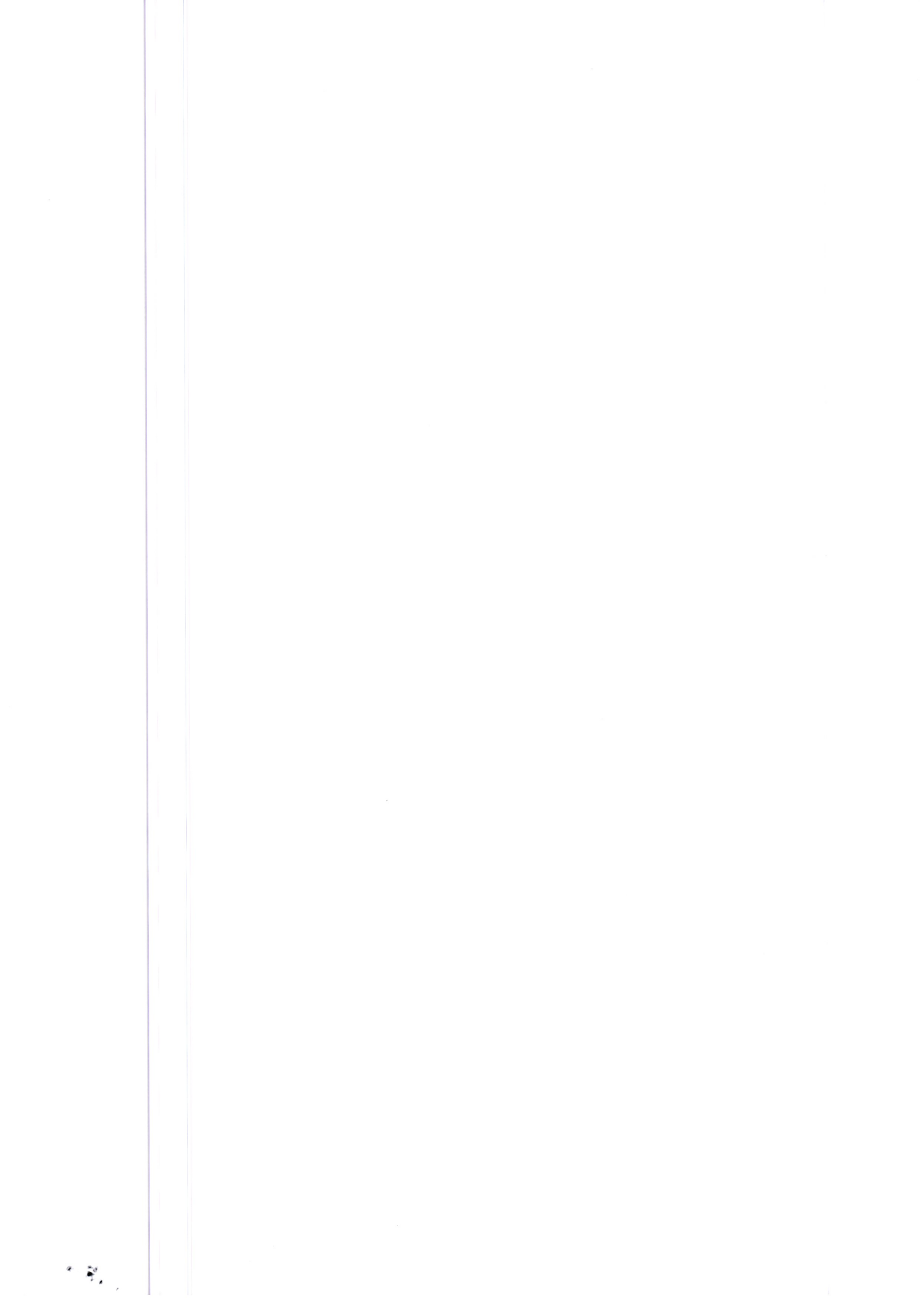
