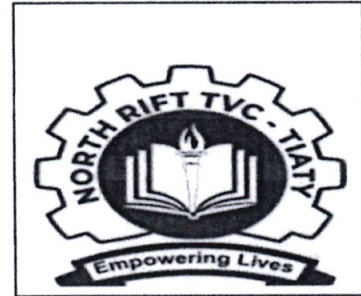

North Rift Technical and Vocational College is a public institution established under the Technical and Vocational Education act of 2013 (TVET Act 29 of 2013)

The college is located in Tiaty Constituency at Chemolingot Centre approximately 65 kilometres off Marigat -Chemolingot Road.

The college is built on 116 acres piece of land, it has a twin single storey building with one wing partially completed. Construction of phase two is underway and when completed the institution will have a capacity of 3000 students. First enrolment was in January 2023 with a batch of 52 trainees.

North Rift Technical and Vocational College was constructed by the National Government through the Ministry of Education in 2012 and stalled up to 2022 July when first Principal was posted.

We look forward to continued support from the Government as we manage the challenges of newness and further enhancing technical education and re – aligning it to meet the global trends.

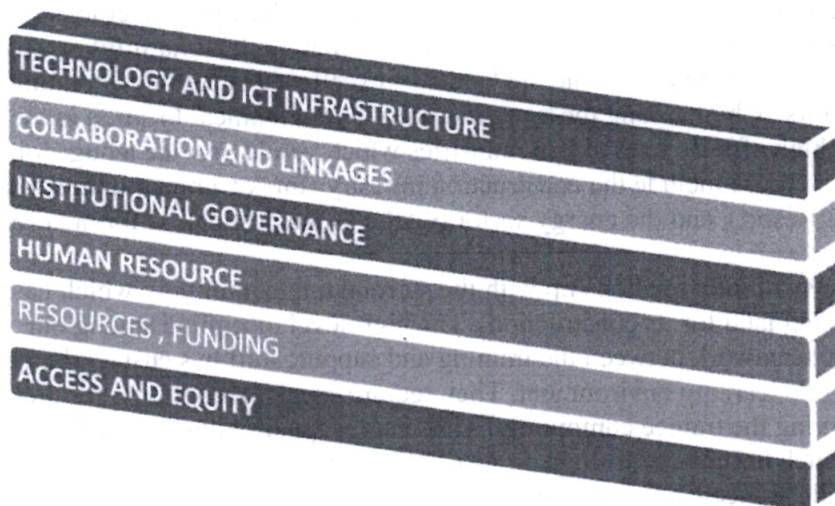

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## **8. Corporate Governance Statement**

North Rift Technical and Vocational College is committed to good corporate governance, which promotes the long-term interests of the Government of Kenya and any other stakeholder, strengthens Board of Governors and management accountability and helps build public trust in the College.

The Board is appointed by the Government of Kenya through the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Education, to oversee their interest in the long-term health and the overall success of the business and its financial strength in order to discharge its mandate in training. The Board serves as the ultimate decision making body of the College, except for those matters reserved to or shared with the Government of Kenya. The Board selects and oversees the members of senior management, who are charged by the Board with conducting the business of the College in line with the Technical, Vocational, Education & Training Act of 2013 and the Constitution of the Republic of Kenya.

The Board held three full Board meetings and four subcommittee meetings in the financial 2024/2025. The current board was appointed on 15<sup>th</sup> March 2023 for a term of three years ending 15<sup>th</sup> March 2026.

On expiry of the tenure of the current Board the process of appointment of a new Board of Management is as laid out in the TVET act of 2013 shall be followed

Under the TVET act of 2013, the functions of Board as set out under section 28 (1) shall include

-

- Overseeing the conduct of education and training in the Colleges in accordance with the provisions of this Act and any other written law;
- Promoting and maintaining standards, quality and relevance in education and training in the Colleges in accordance with this Act and any other written law;
- Administering and managing the property of the Colleges;
- Developing and implementing the Colleges' strategic plan;
- Preparing annual estimates of revenue and expenditure for the College and incurring expenditure on behalf of the Colleges; (1) receiving, on behalf of the College, fees,

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grants, subscriptions, donations, bequests or other moneys and to make disbursement to the College or other bodies or persons;

- Determining the fees payable and prescribing conditions under which fees may be remitted in part or in whole in accordance with the guidelines developed under the provisions of this Act;
- Developing and reviewing programmes for training and to make representations thereon to the Board;
- Regulating the admission and exclusion of students from the Colleges, subject to a qualifications framework and the provisions of this Act;
- Approving collaboration or association with other Colleges and industries in and outside Kenya subject to prior approval by the Board;
- Recruiting and appointing trainers from among qualified professionals and practising trades persons in relevant sectors of industry;
- Determining suitable terms and conditions of service for support staff, trainers and instructors and remunerating the staff of the Colleges, in consultation with the Authority;
- Making regulations governing organization, conduct and discipline of the staff and students;
- Preparing comprehensive annual reports on all areas of their mandate, including education and training services and submits the same to the Board;
- Providing for the welfare of the students and staff of the Colleges;
- Encouraging, nurturing and promoting democratic culture, dialogue and tolerance in the Colleges; and
- Discharging all other functions conferred upon it by this Act or any other written law.

The board in the period it has been in existence has endeavoured to discharge its functions independently with vigour and passion. Their diligence and prudent management of resources has been result oriented and much has been achieved during their term in office. They have been able to interpret government policies and TVET Act as well as other relevant laws in existence making the College to move forward as we actualize the strategic plan. Moving forward, the Board is aligning its discharging of duties by improving on its operations while surpassing the set targets where possible. In the interest of quality service delivery, the board is able to read from the same script as they render their duties above board.

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This will be attained with the incorporation of team spirit and self-sacrifice that is deep within them.

**9. Management Discussion and Analysis**

**North Rift Technical and Vocational College operational and financial performance**

The various projects under consideration include:

1. Fencing of the college (Perimeter wall) for security.
2. Completion of stalled workshops and Tuition block
3. Construction of student hostels approx. 600 capacity
4. Staff housing (10 units for administrators and Nurse)
5. Drilling of borehole for sufficient water (domestic and irrigation use)

Major risk facing the College in insecurity of staff, trainees and the theft of college properties..

However the management is looking forward to be in a position to hire more security personnel and to fence the College.

***Major risks facing the organisation.***

The Colleges' major risks are mainly related to its core business which is training and human resource development. Some of the identified risks include;

- i. Low student enrolment.
- ii. Lack of student accommodation and support facilities (hostels)
- iii. Delayed disbursement of capitation, recurrent grants and HELB bursary to students
- iv. Lack of vehicles for ease of movement such as students trips.
- v. Insecurity as the College is located in bandits related activities.

**12. Statement of Board of Governors/ Council's Responsibilities**

Section 164 and Section 81 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and section 14 of the State Corporations Act, and section 29 of schedule 2 of the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Act, 2013 require the Board of Governors to prepare financial statements in respect of that entity, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the entity at the end of the financial year/period and the operating results of the entity for that year/period. The Board of Governors are also required to ensure that the entity keeps proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the entity. The Board of Governors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the entity.

## **REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON NORTH RIFT TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL COLLEGE - TIATY FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2025**

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### **PREAMBLE**

I draw your attention to the contents of my report which is in three parts:

- A. Report on Financial Statements that considers whether the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework, accounting standards and the relevant laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the financial statements;
- B. Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources which considers compliance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, gazette notices, circulars, guidelines and manuals and whether public resources are applied in a prudent, efficient, economic, transparent and accountable manner to ensure that the Government achieves value for money and that such funds are applied for the intended purpose; and,
- C. Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance which considers how the entity has instituted checks and balances to guide internal operations. This responds to the effectiveness of the governance structure, risk management environment and internal controls, developed and implemented by those charged with governance for orderly, efficient and effective operations of the entity.

A Qualified Opinion is issued when the Auditor-General concludes that, except for material misstatements noted, the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. The Report on Financial Statements should be read together with the Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources, and the Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance.

The three parts of the report are aimed at addressing the statutory roles and responsibilities of the Auditor-General as provided by Article 229 of the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, and the Public Audit Act, 2015. The three parts of the report when read together constitute the report of the Auditor-General.

### **REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

#### **Qualified Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of North Rift Technical and Vocational College -Tiaty set out on pages 1 to 27, which comprise of the statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2025 and the statement of financial performance,

statement of changes in net assets, statement of cash flows and the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of North Rift Technical and Vocational College - Tiaty as at 30 June, 2025 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and comply with the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Act, 2013 (Revised 2014) and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

#### **1. Inaccuracies in the Financial Statements**

The statement of cash flows reflects net cash flows from operating activities amount of Kshs.1,805,166. However, the corresponding Note 47 to the financial statements has not been disclosed as required.

Further, the statement reflects purchase of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets amount of Kshs.3,380,420. However, Note 15 to the financial statements reflects assets additions amount of Kshs.3,840,360 resulting in an unexplained variance of Kshs.459,940.

In addition, the statement reflects net decrease in cash and cash equivalents amount of Kshs.1,515,834. However, the recomputed amount is Kshs.1,575,254 resulting in an unexplained variance of Kshs.59,420.

The statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts reflects actual total receipts amount of Kshs.36,435,918. However, the statement of cash flows reflects an amount of Kshs.9,719,839 resulting in an unexplained variance of Kshs.26,716,079.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of the financial statements could not be confirmed.

#### **2. Unsupported Transfers from Other National Government Entities**

The statement of financial performance reflects transfers from other National Government entities amount of Kshs.1,999,310 which as disclosed in Note 6 to the financial statements relates to operational grants. However, the amount was not supported with the relevant documents including the supporting schedule and bank statements.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of transfer from other National Government entities amount of Kshs.1,999,310 could not be confirmed.

### 3. Unreconciled Variance in the Tuition Fees

The statement of financial performance reflects rendering services – fees from students amount of Kshs.33,884,608 which as disclosed in Note 7 to the financial statements relates to tuition fees. However, review of the supporting schedules revealed an amount of Kshs.37,958,519 resulting to unexplained and unreconciled variance of Kshs.4,073,911.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of rendering services – fees from students amount of Kshs.33,884,608 could not be confirmed.

### 4. Use of Goods and Services

#### 4.1 Variances in the Use of Goods and Services Amount

The statement of financial performance reflects use of goods and services amount of Kshs.4,405,977 as disclosed in Note 8 to the financial statements. However, review of the supporting ledger revealed ten (10) expenditure sub-components which varied with the amounts in the financial statements as detailed in the table below;

#### 4.2 Unsupported Use of Goods and Services

The statement of financial performance reflects use of goods and services of an amount of Kshs.4,405,977 and as disclosed in Note 8 to the financial statements. However, the supporting schedules provided for audit did include details on description on the purpose of payments and was not supported with end user requisition. Goods purchased were not taken on charge in the store records and there was no reacquisition of goods from users as well as issuance cards.

Further, review of sampled payment vouchers revealed that some cash purchases considered as low value procurements exceeding allowed values contrary to the prescribed threshold. This was contrary to Regulations 92(a) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Regulations, 2020 requires that procuring entity may use low value procurement method under section 107(b) of the Act, where the estimated cost of the goods, works or services being procured per item per financial year is as per the threshold matrix in the Second Schedule.

In addition, the supporting cash purchase records did not have ETR receipts and approval from the procuring officer. This was contrary to Regulation 93(2) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Regulations, 2020 which states that any procurement under paragraph (1) shall be supported by the original Kenya Revenue Authority Electronic Tax Receipt (KRA ETR Receipt) duly signed by the person undertaking the low value procurement of goods, works or services.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of the use of goods and services of an amount of Kshs.4,405,977 could not be confirmed.

#### **5. Unsupported Current Receivables from Exchange Transactions**

The statement of financial position reflects current portion of receivables from exchange transactions of an amount of Kshs.32,312,711 in respect of student debtors, as disclosed in Note 14 (a) to the financial statements. However, the balance was not supported with individual student debtors' ledgers and detailed ageing analysis of the receivables including dates indicating of how long the debtors had remained outstanding. Further, included in the balance is an amount of Kshs.4,587,038 which has remained outstanding for more than one (1) year.

In addition, the College did not have debt management policy to guide on debt collection mitigation and recovery of debt. Failure to track its debtors could indicate that the Collage was not in a position to monitor its liquidity and therefore take appropriate measures.

In the circumstances, the accuracy, completeness and recoverability of the current portion of receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.32,312,711 could not be confirmed.

#### **6. Unsupported Cash and Cash Equivalents Balance**

The statement of financial position reflects cash and cash equivalents balance of Kshs.1,791,790 which includes balances of Kshs.1,394,469 and Kshs.397,321 in respect of two (2) bank accounts held in a local bank, as disclosed in Note 13 to the financial statements. However, Management did not provide the cash book for the account with a balance of Kshs.1,394,469.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness and of the cash and cash equivalents balance of Kshs.1,394,469 could not be confirmed.

## **7. Undisclosed Value of Land**

The statement of financial position reflects property, plant and equipment balance of Kshs.6,551,786 and as disclosed in Note 15 to the financial statements. However, as previously reported, Management did not disclose the value of land measuring approximately one hundred and sixteen (116) acres where the College is located.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of property, plant and equipment balance of Kshs.6,551,786 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of the North Rift Technical and Vocational College - Tiaty Management in accordance with ISSAI 130 on the Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

### **Emphasis of Matter**

#### **Budgetary Control and Performance**

The statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts reflects total revenue budget and actual on comparable basis amounts of Kshs.6,718,900 and Kshs.36,435,918 respectively resulting to over-collection of Kshs.29,717,018 or 442% of the budget. Further, the statement reflects that the College spent an amount of Kshs.11,171,601 against actual receipts of Kshs.36,435,918 resulting to an under-absorption of Kshs.25,264,317 or 69% of the actual receipts.

Further, there were no explanatory notes for the variances between the budgeted amounts and the actual amounts as required under Section 81(2)(a) (iv) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 which states that the Accounting Officer shall include in the financial statements - appropriation accounts, showing - a statement explaining any variations between the actual expenditure and the sums voted.

The under-absorption affected the activities of the College and may have impacted negatively on service delivery to the public.

My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

### **Key Audit Matters**

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section, I have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in my report.

## **Other Matter**

### **Unresolved Prior Year Matters**

In the prior year's audit reports, several issues were raised under the Report on Financial Statements, Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources, and Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance. Review of the status during the audit of the College in 2024/2025 revealed that several matters remained unresolved as detailed in **Appendix 1**.

### **Other Information**

The Management is responsible for the other information set out on page iii to xxxi which comprise of Key Entity Information and Management, The Board of Management, Key Management Team, Chairman's Statement, Report of the Principal, Statement of Performance against Predetermined Objectives, Corporate Governance Statement, Management Discussion and Analysis, Environmental and Sustainability Reporting, Report of the Board of Management and Statement of Board of Management Responsibilities. The Other Information does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon.

In connection with my audit on the College's financial statements, my responsibility is to read the Other Information and in doing so, consider whether the Other Information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information and I am required to report that fact. Based on the audit procedures performed and the matters described in my Basis for Qualified Opinion, I confirm that Other Information is not materially inconsistent with the financial statements.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the Other Information and accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

## **REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN THE USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES**

### **Conclusion**

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

## **Basis for Conclusion**

### **1. Failure to Maintain an Updated Fixed Asset Register**

The statement of financial position reflects property, plant and equipment balance of Kshs.6,551,786 and as disclosed in Note 15 to the financial statements. Review of the fixed assets register provided for audit revealed that the register was not up- to-date and lacked key information including land, building, office equipment, identification or serial numbers, acquisition dates, description of assets, location, class, cost of acquisition for some of the assets, land reference/certificate number, ownership details as per ownership documents, asset condition and ownership documents held. The assets are also not tagged. This is contrary to Section 143(1) of the Public Financial Management Regulations 2015 which states that Accounting Officer shall be responsible for maintaining a register of assets under his or her control or possession as prescribed by the relevant laws.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law and the effectiveness of internal controls related to asset management could not be confirmed.

### **2. Non-Compliance with Law on Employment of Persons with Disabilities**

Review of the human resource records including monthly payrolls and staff data revealed that out of the fifteen (15) employees hired during the year, none was a person living with disabilities. This was contrary to Section B.23(1) of the Human Resource Policies and Procedures Manual for the Public Service, 2016 which states that persons with disability shall be accorded equal opportunities for employment.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 3000 and ISSAI 4000. The standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

## **REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE**

### **Conclusion**

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and governance were not effective.

## **Basis for Conclusion**

### **1. Lack of Internal Audit Function and Audit Committee**

During the year under review, the college did not have in place functional internal audit department and audit committee. This was contrary to the Regulation 73(1)(a) of the Public Finance Management (National Government) Regulations, 2015 which states that every National Government entity shall ensure that it complies with the Act and has appropriate arrangements in place for conducting internal audit according to the guidelines of the Accounting Standards Board. Further, Regulation 174(1) requires that each National Government entity shall, subject to paragraph (2) of this regulation, establish an audit committee.

In the circumstances, the effectiveness of the internal controls, risk management and governance could not be confirmed.

### **2. Failure to implement the Information and Communication Technology Strategic Objectives**

Review of information technology systems in use revealed that the College had not put any measures in place to implement the Information Communication and Technology (ICT) strategic objective of enhancing information and communication technology system for efficient operation. This would have been achieved by establishing and maintaining an effective Management Information System. However, the College had not invested in an effective Management Information System to manage its core operations including finance, procurement, student management, stores and inventories, examinations, human resource and payroll, timetabling etc. Instead, the College relied on MS excel for information management, which is prone to manipulation, inaccuracies, incomplete records and data loss. Therefore, the ledgers provided for audit verification were incomplete with the description of the revenue and expenditure transactions missing.

In addition, there was no back-up retention strategy and a formal emergency procedure which stipulates the procedures and steps for the users to follow in case of an emergency or a disruption which would lead to business interference.

In the circumstances, the non-implementation of the ICT strategic objectives could result in data loss, theft and disruption of services in case of a disaster or cyber-attack.

### **3. Failure to Develop Finance and Procedures Manual**

During the year under review, the College did not have in place a finance manual that ought to clearly outline and document the procedures to follow to ensure the adoption of international standards and emerging best practices. This is contrary to Regulation 9(1) of the Public Finance Management (National Government) Regulations, 2015 which states that the National Treasury shall publish financial manuals and forms which may be used by national government entities to support implementation of these Regulations.

In the circumstances, the effectiveness of internal controls in relation to financial management could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 2315 and ISSAI 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal controls, risk Management and overall governance were operating effectively in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

### **Responsibilities of Management and the Board of Management**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and for maintaining effective internal controls as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the College's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless Management is aware of the intention to cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply with the authorities which govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

The Board of Management is responsible for overseeing the College's financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how Management monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

### **Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit**

My responsibility is to conduct an audit of the financial statements in accordance with Article 229(4) of the Constitution, Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and the International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). The standards require

that, in conducting the audit, I obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting the audit, Article 229(6) of the Constitution also requires that I express a conclusion on whether or not in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way. In addition, I consider the entity's control environment in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Further, I am required to submit the audit report in accordance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

## 19. Notes to the Financial Statements

### General Information

North Rift Technical and Vocational College is a public institution established under the Technical and Vocational Education act of 2013 (TVET Act 29 of 2013)

To be a centre of excellence in the provision of quality and relevant technical training.

#### **Mission**

To provide quality, technical and entrepreneurial skills that promote creativity for global challenges.

#### **Mandate:**

- Implementation of TVET curriculum and approved programmes Supervision, monitoring and evaluation of programmes.
- Strengthen linkages between the institution and industry
- Promote collaboration with other training institutions both locally and internationally.
- Development of efficient and effective manpower.
- Formulation, reviewing and coordination of institutional policies.

## 2. Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis except for the measurement at re-valued amounts of certain items of property, plant and equipment, marketable securities and financial instruments at fair value, impaired assets at their estimated recoverable amounts and actuarially determined liabilities at their present value. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) allows the use of estimates and assumptions. It also requires management to exercise judgement in the process of applying the *North Rift Technical and Vocational College* accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, will be disclosed. The financial statements have been prepared and presented in Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the NRTC. The values are rounded off to the nearest shilling. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the PFM Act,

the TVET Act and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

**3. Adoption of New and Revised Standards**

**i. New and amended standards and interpretations in issue and effective in the year ended 30 June 2025.**

There are no new standards and interpretations issued in the Financial Year.

**ii. New and amended standards and interpretations in issue but not yet effective in the year ended 30 June 2025.**

North Rift Technical and Vocational College is adopting IPSAS for the first time in year 2024.

**4. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

**a) Revenue recognition**

**i) Revenue from non-exchange transactions**

**Transfers from other government entities**

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the entity and can be measured reliably. To the extent that there is a related condition attached that would give rise to a liability to repay the amount, the amount is recorded in the statement of financial position and realised in the statement of financial performance over the useful life of the assets that has been acquired using such funds.

**ii) Revenue from exchange transactions**

**Rendering of services**

The entity recognizes revenue from rendering of services by reference to the stage of completion when the outcome of the transaction can be estimated reliably. The stage of completion is measured by reference to labour hours incurred to date as a percentage of total estimated labour hours. Where the contract outcome cannot be measured reliably, revenue is recognized only to the extent that the expenses incurred are recoverable.

**Sale of goods**

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods and when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential associated with the transaction will flow to the entity.

**b) Budget information**

The original budget for FY 2023/2024 was approved by the Board on 16<sup>th</sup> May 2023. The North Rift Technical and Vocational Colleges budget is prepared on a different basis to the actual income and expenditure disclosed in the financial statements. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the accrual basis to the cash basis and reclassified by presentation to be on the same basis as the approved budget. A comparison of budget and actual amounts, prepared on a comparable basis to the approved budget, is then presented in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts. In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget. A statement to reconcile the actual amounts on a comparable basis included in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts and the actuals as per the statement of financial performance has been presented on page 1 under section 1 of these financial statements.

**c) Property, plant and equipment**

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the item of property appropriately according to the acronyms you use in your financial statements plant and equipment. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the entity recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus, or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

**d) Research and development costs**

The Entity expenses research costs as incurred. Development costs on an individual project are recognized as intangible assets when the Entity can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale.
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset.
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits or service potential
- The availability of resources to complete the asset.
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

2 Following initial recognition of an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortization of the asset begins when development is complete, and the asset is available for use. It is amortized over the period of expected future benefit. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually with any impairment losses recognized immediately in surplus or deficit.

**e) Social Benefits**

Social benefits are cash transfers provided to i) specific individuals and / or households that meet the eligibility criteria, ii) mitigate the effects of social risks and iii) Address the need of society as a whole. The entity recognises a social benefit as an expense for the social benefit scheme at the same time that it recognises a liability. The liability for the social benefit scheme is measured at the best estimate of the cost (the social benefit payments) that the entity will incur in fulfilling the present obligations represented by the liability.

**f) Nature and purpose of reserves**

North Rift Technical and Vocational College creates and maintains reserves in terms of specific requirements. The Capital fund reserve is to account for all financial resources supporting the development projects.

**g) Changes in accounting policies and estimates**

North Rift Technical and Vocational College recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

**h) Related parties**

North Rift Technical and Vocational College regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the College, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the BOG Members, the Principal and staff..

**i) Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year.

**j) Comparative figures**

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.

**k) Subsequent events**

There have been no events subsequent to the financial year end with a significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2025.

## **5. Significant Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty**

The preparation of the *Entity's* financial statements in conformity with IPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

### **Estimates and assumptions.**

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Entity based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the consolidated financial statements were prepared. However, existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Entity. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur. IPSAS 1.140

### **Useful lives and residual values**

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to inform potential future use and value from disposal:

- The condition of the asset based on the assessment of experts employed by the *Entity*.
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes.
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed.
- Availability of funding to replace the asset.
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset

### **Provisions**

For the purposes of these financial statements, cash and cash equivalents also include short-term cash imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year.
