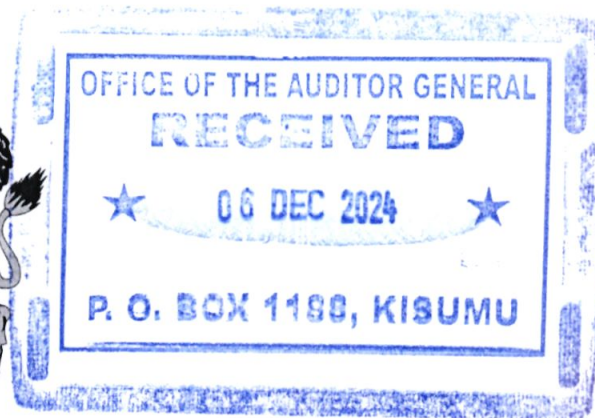

## **6. Report of The Medical Superintendent**

I am pleased to present a summary of Madiany Sub-County Hospital's annual report and financial and operational performances for the financial year 2023/24.

### **Operational Performance.**

Madiany Sub-County Hospital proudly provides a variety of specialized medical and surgical services ranging from maternal & child health, paediatrics, minor surgical services, medical services, gynaecological and rehabilitation amongst others. With our dedicated team of healthcare personnel, we offer safe, timely, efficient and effective medical services that are patient-centred to the population we serve, making us the facility of choice to our patients. In this financial year the facility attended to 65,000 patients in total with 83% of them being in-patients. We strive to improve our catchment population and services provided so as to provide holistic care to our patients. Management is tirelessly putting in efforts to operationalize its' maternity theatre and x-ray machine to provide these services within the next financial year.

### **Centres of Excellence.**


Madiany Sub-county Hospital has established centre of excellence in TB, HIV and Nursing training and services delivery. The facility boasts as the best in TB diagnosis, treatment and follow-up in the region having been one of the 9 facilities in the country to be stationed with the portable Chest X-ray machines. This has greatly improved the prognosis of patients with regards to the fight against chronic illnesses. Being a one-stop centre for provision of most, if not all, medical services has led to better prognosis and outcomes in the patients we serve.

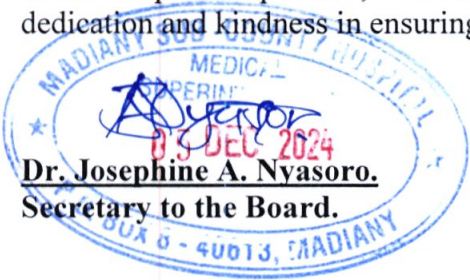
### **Financial Performance.**

The hospital's operations and maintenance expenses are mainly funded by its' own source revenue and occasionally get support from partners too. In the financial year under review, the hospital generated a total of Kshs. 22,872,302 (inclusive of NHIF) which marked a 6.8% increase in revenues collected in comparison with the last financial year. This can be attributed to the wider variety of medical and laboratory services offered and increased inpatient capacity and the hospital being 24/7 operational. The hospital's funding gap still stands at 11.5million (total debts + NHIF/Linda Mama dues -8.9 million) thus affecting financial sustainability of the hospital. The hospital is closely following up with NHIF for reimbursements to aid it clear off its pending debts of 2.6million as at end of this financial year.

## **9. Management Discussion and Analysis**

### **Operational Performance.**

Madiany Sub-County Hospital proudly provides a variety of specialized medical and surgical services ranging from maternal & child health, paediatrics, minor surgical services, medical services, gynaecological and rehabilitation amongst others. With our dedicated team of healthcare personnel, we offer safe, timely, efficient and effective medical services that are patient-centred to the population we serve, making us the facility of choice to our patients. In this financial year the facility attended to 65,000 patients in total with 83% of them being in-patients. We strive to improve our catchment population and services provided so as to provide holistic care to our patients. Management is tirelessly putting in efforts to operationalize its' maternity theatre and x-ray machine to provide these services within the next financial year.

### **Financial Performance.**

### **Clinical/operational performance**

The hospital currently has a bed capacity of 49 in total in the 5 wards as follows: paediatrics-8; male medical- 8; female medical- 13; maternity-20. Plans are underway to build an inpatient complex thus increase the bed capacity to the required 150 beds. Overall patient attendance during the year for both inpatient and outpatient was 65,000. Accident and Emergency attendance for the year was 3,000 with majority being attributed to road traffic accidents and partly assault cases. The hospital offers specialised clinic on Tuesday(s) of every week for the chronic diseases and 1st Wednesday of each month there's Psychiatry clinic led by the county's Psychiatrist. We are planning to start gynaecology outpatient clinic too once the maternity theatre is operationalized. The average length of stay for in patient during admission ranges from 3-10 days with very chronic cases going even up to 14 days. The daily bed occupancy rate ranges from 40% to 80%. Mortality rate for maternal was 0% throughout the period in review. The maternity theatre is yet to be operational; plans are underway to have it operational in the first quarter of the next financial year. The hospital is also in partnership with Centre for Health Solutions (CHS) through the county government of Siaya and receives support in carrying out various activities from Non-governmental Organizations (e.g Rafiki wa Maendeleo).

## **10. Environmental and Sustainability Reporting**

### *i) Sustainability strategy and profile*

Madiany Subcounty level 4 hospital exists to transform lives. It is what guides the facility to deliver on its strategic mandate by putting the client/Citizen first while providing quality health services, and improving on operational efficiency. Below is an outline of the of the Facility's policies and activities that promote sustainability.

#### *Sustainability strategy and profile*

Madiany Sub County level 4 hospital has identified the following sustainability priorities: -

- Improving the Hospital infrastructure
- Increasing the Hospital bed capacity
- Improving on collections from facility improvement fund (FIF)
- Bringing on board development partners to support the Hospital
- Enhancing working relations with the National Hospital insurance fund (NHIF).

### *ii) Environmental performance*

Madiany subcounty level 4 hospital is yet to develop an environmental policy. However, the Hospital endeavours to continue adopting and adhering to the National policies and regulations that guide compliance with the existing environmental management laws.

The Hospital has greatly improved on disposal of its' biomedical waste despite not having an incinerator in the facility.

### *iii) Employee welfare*

The Facility endeavours to continuously comply with Occupational Safety and Health Act ,2007 (OSHA) by providing adequate office space that is regularly cleaned; providing sanitation facilities; regular training **on drug and substance abuse and adequate PPE for frontline healthcare workers.**

*iv) Market place practices-*

*a) Responsible competition practice.*

The Facility as an appendage of the County Government was declared a corruption free zone after engagement with the officers from the Ethics and Anticorruption Commission. The Facility advocates for fairness in the provision of its services to the public.

*b) Responsible Supply chain and supplier relations*

The Facility treats its own suppliers responsibly by honouring contracts and endeavouring to pay for goods and services received on time and clear its pending debts to suppliers in a timely manner.

*c) Responsible marketing and advertisement*

All advertisements of tenders for supply of goods and services for the Hospital are openly displayed in public. Similarly, advertisements for employment vacancies are publicly displayed.

*d) Product stewardship*

The Hospital has put in place a cash less system for revenue collection to seal loop holes for revenue leakages.

*v) Corporate Social Responsibility / Community Engagements*

The Hospital partners with players mainly NGOs in the health sector carry out various outreach services. The facility partners with NGOs to provide medical camps for screening of patients. The Facilities also supports regular clinic for mothers and new-borns.

**11. Report of The Board of Management**

The Hospital did not have a functional Board in place during the period under review.

The Board of Management accepts responsibility for the Hospital's financial statements, which have been prepared using appropriate accounting policies supported by reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates, in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), and in the manner required by the PFM Act, 2012 and the PFM County Government Regulations, 2015. The Board members are of the opinion that the Hospital's financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of Hospital's transactions during the financial year ended June 30, 2024 and of the Hospital's financial position as at that date. The Board members further confirm the completeness of the accounting records maintained for the Hospital, which have been relied upon in the preparation of the Hospital's financial statements as well as the adequacy of the systems of internal financial control.

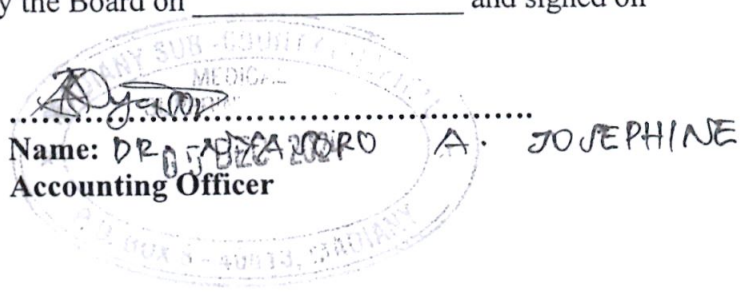
Nothing has come to the attention of the Board of management to indicate that the Hospital will not remain a going concern for at least the next twelve months from the date of this statement.

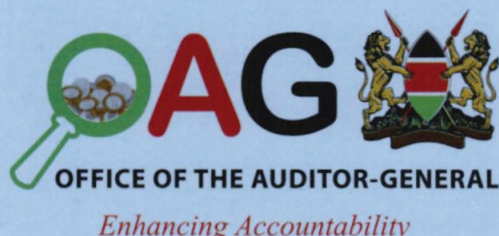

## REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON MADIANY SUB-COUNTY LEVEL 4 HOSPITAL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2024 - COUNTY GOVERNMENT OF SIAYA

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### PREAMBLE

I draw your attention to the contents of my report which is in three parts:

- A. Report on the Financial Statements that considers whether the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework, accounting standards and the relevant laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the financial statements.
- B. Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources which considers compliance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, gazette notices, circulars, guidelines, and manuals and whether public resources are applied in a prudent, efficient, economic, transparent and accountable manner to ensure Government achieves value for money and that such funds are applied for the intended purpose.
- C. Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance which considers how the entity has instituted checks and balances to guide internal operations. This responds to the effectiveness of the governance structure, the risk management environment and the internal controls, developed and implemented by those charged with governance for orderly, efficient and effective operations of the entity.

A Qualified Opinion is issued when the Auditor-General concludes that, except for material misstatements noted, the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. The Report on Financial Statements should be read together with the Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources and the Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance.

The three parts of the report are aimed at addressing the statutory roles and responsibilities of the Auditor-General as provided by Article 229 of the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and the Public Audit Act, 2015. The three parts of the report, when read together constitute the report of the Auditor-General.

### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Madiany Sub-County Level 4 Hospital set out on pages 1 to 54, which comprise of the statement of financial

position as at 30 June, 2024, and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net asset, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Madiany Sub-County Level 4 Hospital as at 30 June, 2024 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and comply with the County Governments Act, 2012 and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

#### **1. Non-Disclosure of Property, Plant and Equipment.**

The statement of financial position reflects a Nil balance of property, plant and equipment under non-current assets. However, physical inspection on assets revealed that the Hospital had several non-current assets that were not valued and disclosed in the financial statements. This is contrary to IPSAS 1 on presentation and disclosure of financial statements. Further, ownership documents for the land, equipment, motor vehicle and motorcycles were not provided for audit.

In the circumstances, the property plant and equipment amount of Nil could not be confirmed.

#### **2. In Kind Contributions.**

The statement of financial performance reflects an amount of Kshs.43,683,577 in respect of In-kind contributions and as disclosed in Note 7 to the financial statements. Included in the amount are salaries and wages paid by the County Government of Siaya amounting to Kshs.40,164,008 which differs with amount in the schedules of Kshs.37,495,429, resulting to unreconciled variance amount of Kshs.2,668,579. In addition, the Note includes medical supplies amounting to Kshs.3,519,569 which were not supported with any documentations such as invoices, Stores Receipt (S11) and (S13) forms.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of the In- Kind Contributions of Kshs.6,188,148 for the year ended 30 June, 2024 could not be confirmed.

#### **3. Unsupported Miscellaneous Income**

The statement of financial performance reflects revenue from exchange transactions of Kshs.16,684,154. Included in the amount is miscellaneous income of Kshs.217,615

as disclosed in Note 14 to financial statements. However, Management did not provide supporting schedules or ledgers.

In the circumstances, the accuracy of the miscellaneous income amount of Kshs.217,615 could not be confirmed.

#### **4. Inaccuracies in Medical Service Income**

The statement of financial performance reflects medical service income amounting to Kshs.16,466,539, as disclosed in Note 11 of the financial statements. Included in the income is the National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF) claims amounting to Kshs.9,613,071. However, supporting schedules provided reveals an amount of Kshs.13,882,115, resulting in unreconciled variance of Kshs.4,269,044. The NHIF claims paid during the year amounted to Kshs.6,440,066, which results in NHIF receivables of Kshs.7,442,049 for the year. However, the receivables were not included in the receivables balance of Kshs.9,146,600 disclosed in Note 28 to the financial statements balance.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of medical services income of Kshs.16,466,539 could not be confirmed.

#### **5. Unsupported Receivable from Exchange Transactions**

The statement of financial position reflects a balance of Kshs.9,146,600 in respect of receivables from exchange transactions as disclosed in Note 28 to the financial statements. However, the balance was not supported with receivables' ledger or a schedule indicating transaction dates, invoice numbers, description of good or service rendered and amount on credit. In addition, the balance did not include receivables in respect of outstanding NHIF claims.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of receivables from exchange transactions of Kshs.9,146,600 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of Madiany Sub-County Level 4 Hospital Management in accordance with ISSAI 130 on Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

#### **Emphasis of Matter**

##### **Budgetary Control and Performance**

The statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year ended 30 June, 2024, reflects budgeted revenue amount of Kshs.22,486,552 against actual receipts of Kshs.16,466,539, resulting in under funding of Kshs.6,020,013 or 26% of

budgeted revenue. Similarly, the Hospital utilized Kshs.16,870,728, against available funds of Kshs.16,466,539 resulting in over-utilization of Kshs.404,189 or 2% of available funds.

The under-funding affected the planned activities and may have impacted negatively on service delivery to the public.

My opinion is not modified in the respect of this matter.

### **Key Audit Matters**

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion, I have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in my report.

### **Other Matter**

#### **Unresolved Prior Year Matters**

Various prior year audit issues remained unresolved as at 30 June, 2024. The Management did not provide a report on how it has addressed the recommendations and findings of the previous year's audit as required by Section 31(1) (a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015

In the circumstances, the Management was in breach of Section 31(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, which requires the entity to submit a report on how it has addressed the recommendations and findings of the previous year's audit.

### **Other Information**

The Management is responsible for the other information set out on page iii to xvii which comprises of Key Entity Information and Management, Board of Management, Key Management Team, Report of the Medical Superintendent, Statement of Performance Against Predetermined Objectives, Corporate Governance statement, Management Discussion and Analysis, Environmental and Sustainability Reporting and Report of the Board of Management. The Other Information does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon.

In connection with my audit on the Hospitals' financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard

## **REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES**

### **Conclusion**

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness

and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

## **Basis for Conclusion**

### **1. Late submission of the Financial Statements**

The financial statements for Madiany Level 4 Hospital for the year ended 30 June, 2024 were submitted on 18 October, 2024 which was beyond the statutory deadline of 30 September, 2024. This is contrary to Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 (1) and (2) which provide that the financial statements required under the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act (Cap. 412A) and any other legislation, shall be submitted to the Auditor-General within three (3) months after the end of the fiscal year to which the accounts relate.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

### **2. Long Outstanding Trade and other Payables**

The statement of financial position and as disclosed in Note 34 to the financial statement reflects trade and other payables balance of Kshs.2,594,465. Examination of the ageing analysis provided indicates that the trade payables had been outstanding for more than one (1) year. Management failed to put measures in place to ensure bills are paid on time to avoid further accumulation and possible litigation costs.

Further, the settlement of the above payables was not prioritized contrary the provision of Regulation 139 (7) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Regulations, 2020 which requires a procuring entity on receipt of an invoice or fee note to make payment on first come first paid basis.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

### **3. Lack of Procurement Function**

Review of the operations of the Hospital with regard to how it carries out its procurement process indicated that it does not have a procurement unit within the facility contrary to Section 45(3) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act, 2015 which states that all procurement processes shall be within the approved budget of the procuring entity and shall be planned by the procuring entity concerned through an annual procurement plan (b) undertaken by a procuring entity as per the threshold matrix prescribed and (c) undertaken in strict adherence to Article 227 of the Constitution

In the circumstances, Management breached the law.

### **4. Deficiencies in Implementation of Universal Health Coverage (UHC)**

Review of Hospital records and interviews on verification of services offered, equipment used and medical specialists in the Hospital at the time of audit revealed that the Hospital did not meet the requirements of Kenya Quality Model for Health's

Checklist for Level 4 Hospitals. The Hospital did not satisfy all the requirements for a level 4 Hospital as indicated below:

These deficiencies contravene the First Schedule of Health Act, 2017 and imply that accessing the highest attainable standard of health, which includes the right to health care services, including reproductive health care as required by Article 43(1) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 may not be achieved.

In the circumstances, the understaffing and inadequate Hospital equipment may have impacted negatively on the service delivery to the public.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAIs 3000 and 4000. The standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance, in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

## REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

### Conclusion

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion

on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance section of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and overall governance were not effective.

## **Basis for Conclusion**

### **1. Lack of a Strategic Plan**

Review of the documents and records of the Hospital revealed that it does not have in place a Strategic Plan. This may lead to failure to prevent or detect risk as well as weak internal controls contrary to Section 149 (2)(g) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 states that in carrying out a responsibility imposed by subsection (1), an accounting officer shall, in respect of the entity concerned- prepare a strategic plan for the entity in conformity with the medium-term fiscal framework and financial objectives of the County Government.

There is need, therefore, for the Management to ensure it has a Strategic Plan in place.

### **2. Establishment of an Internal Audit Unit and Audit Committee**

The Hospital has not established an audit committee and internal audit function which is contrary to Regulation 167(1) of the Public Finance Management (County Governments) Regulations, 2015 which requires County Government entities to establish audit committees in accordance with prescribed regulations to monitor the entities governance process, accountability process and control systems, offer objective advice on issues concerning risk, control, regulatory requirements and governance.

In the circumstances, the effectiveness of internal controls and risks management could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAIs 2315 and 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal controls, risk Management and overall governance were operating effectively in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

## **Responsibilities of Management and the Board of Management**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and for maintaining effective internal control as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal control, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Hospital's ability to continue to sustain services, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to sustainability of services and using the applicable basis of accounting unless

the Management is aware of the intention to terminate the Hospital or cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities which govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

The Board of Management is responsible for overseeing the Hospital's financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how Management monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.


### **Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit**

My responsibility is to conduct an audit of the financial statements in accordance with Article 229(4) of the Constitution, Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and the INTOSAI Framework of Professional Pronouncements (IFPP). The Framework requires that, in conducting the audit, I obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with IFPP will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting the audit, Article 229(6) of the Constitution also requires that I express a conclusion on whether or not in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way. In addition, I consider the entity's control environment in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Further, I am required to submit the audit report in accordance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

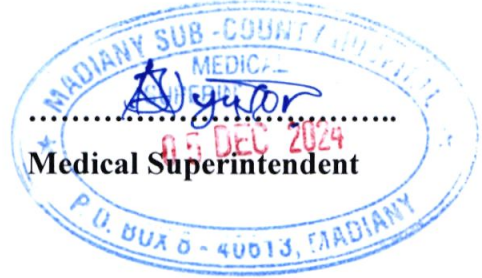

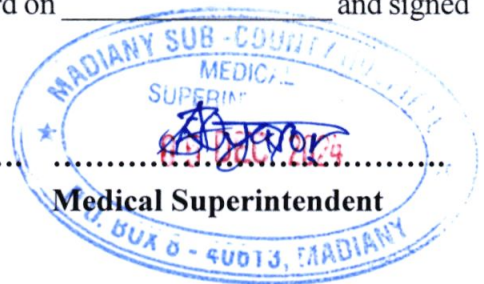

Madiany Level 4 Hospital is established by and derives its authority and accountability from Health Act. The entity is wholly owned by the County Government of Siaya and is domiciled in Siaya County in Kenya. The entity's principal activity is provision of comprehensive health services.

### **2. Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis except for the measurement at re-valued amounts of certain items of property, plant, and equipment, marketable securities and financial instruments at fair value, impaired assets at their estimated recoverable amounts and actuarially determined liabilities at their present value. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) allows the use of estimates and assumptions. It also requires management to exercise judgement in the process of applying the Hospital's accounting policies. The financial statements have been prepared and presented in Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the Hospital. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the PFM Act, and the PFM County Government Regulations, and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the *Entity* and can be measured reliably. To the extent that there is a related condition attached that would give rise to a liability to repay the amount, the amount is recorded in the statement of financial position and realised in the statement of financial performance over the useful life of the asset that has been acquired using such funds.

**ii) Revenue from exchange transactions**

**Rendering of services**

The entity recognizes revenue from rendering of services by reference to the stage of completion when the outcome of the transaction can be estimated reliably. The stage of completion is measured by reference to labour hours incurred to date as a percentage of total estimated labour hours. Where the contract outcome cannot be measured reliably, revenue is recognized only to the extent that the expenses incurred are recoverable.

**Sale of goods**

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods and when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential associated with the transaction will flow to the entity.

**Interest income**

Interest income is accrued using the effective yield method. The effective yield discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this yield to the principal outstanding to determine interest income for each period.

**Rental income**

Rental income arising from operating leases on investment properties is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease terms and included in revenue.

**b. Budget information**

- c. The original budget for FY 2023/2024 was approved by Health Management Team on **30.06.2023**. Subsequent revisions or additional appropriations were made to the approved budget in accordance with specific approvals from the appropriate authorities. The additional appropriations are added to the original budget by the entity upon receiving the respective approvals in order to conclude the final budget. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on a cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the accrual basis to the cash basis and reclassified by presentation to be on the same basis as the approved budget.
- d. A comparison of budget and actual amounts, prepared on a comparable basis to the approved budget, is then presented in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts. In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget.

**e. Taxes**

**Sales tax/ Value Added Tax**

Expenses and assets are recognized net of the amount of sales tax, except:

- When the sales tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the sales tax is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of sales tax included. The net amount of sales tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

***Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)***

**f. Investment property**

Investment properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. The carrying amount includes the replacement cost of components of an existing investment property at the time that cost is incurred if the recognition criteria are met and excludes the costs of day-to-day maintenance of an investment property.

Investment property acquired through a non-exchange transaction is measured at its fair value at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured using the cost model and are depreciated over a period of .xxx years. Investment properties are derecognized either when they have been disposed of or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit or service potential is expected from its disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognized in the surplus or deficit in the period of de-recognition. Transfers are made to or from investment property only when there is a change in use.

**g. Property, plant and equipment**

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the entity recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

*Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)*

**h. Leases**

Finance leases are leases that transfer substantially the entire risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Assets held under a finance lease are capitalized at the commencement of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the future minimum lease payments. The Entity also recognizes the associated lease liability at the inception of the lease. The liability recognized is measured as the present value of the future minimum lease payments at initial recognition.

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognized as finance costs in surplus or deficit.

An asset held under a finance lease is depreciated over the useful life of the asset. However, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Entity will obtain ownership of the asset by the end of the lease term, the asset is depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term.

Operating leases are leases that do not transfer substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Operating lease payments are recognized as an operating expense in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

**i. Intangible assets**

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognized at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Internally generated intangible assets, excluding capitalized development costs, are not capitalized and expenditure is reflected in surplus or deficit in the period in which the expenditure is incurred. The useful life of the intangible assets is assessed as either finite or indefinite.

***Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)***

**j. Research and development costs**

The Entity expenses research costs as incurred. Development costs on an individual project are recognized as intangible assets when the Entity can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset
- The asset will generate future economic benefits or service potential
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

Following initial recognition of an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortization of the asset begins when development is complete and the asset is available for use. It is amortized over the period of expected future benefit. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually with any impairment losses recognized immediately in surplus or deficit.

**k. Financial instruments**

IPSAS 41 addresses the classification, measurement and de-recognition of financial assets and financial liabilities, introduces new rules for hedge accounting and a new impairment model for financial assets. The entity does not have any hedge relationships and therefore the new hedge accounting rules have no impact on the hospital's financial statements.

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. At initial recognition, the entity measures a financial asset or financial liability at its fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial asset or financial liability not at fair value through surplus or deficit, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability.

**Financial assets**

**Classification of financial assets**

The entity classifies its financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through net assets/ equity or fair value through surplus and deficit on the basis of both the entity's management model for financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset. A financial asset is measured at amortized cost when the financial asset is held within a management model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding. A financial asset is measured at fair value through net assets/ equity if it is held within the management model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cashflows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. A financial asset shall be measured at fair value through surplus or deficit unless it is measured at amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity unless an entity has made irrevocable election at initial recognition for particular investments in equity instruments.

**Subsequent measurement**

Based on the business model and the cash flow characteristics, the entity classifies its financial assets into amortized cost or fair value categories for financial instruments. Movements in fair value are presented in either surplus or deficit or through net assets/ equity subject to certain criteria being met.

**Amortized cost**

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, and that are not designated at fair value through surplus or deficit, are measured at amortized cost. A gain or loss on an instrument that is subsequently measured at amortized cost and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognized in profit or loss when the asset is de-recognized or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

*Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)*

**Fair value through net assets/ equity**

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at fair value through net assets/ equity. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through net assets, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in surplus/deficit. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

**Fair value through surplus or deficit**

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity are measured at fair value through surplus or deficit. A business model where the entity manages financial assets with the objective of realizing cash flows through solely the sale of the assets would result in a fair value through surplus or deficit model.

**Trade and other receivables**

Trade and other receivables are recognized at fair values less allowances for any uncollectible amounts. Trade and other receivables are assessed for impairment on a continuing basis. An estimate is made of doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the year end.

**Impairment**

The entity assesses, on a forward-looking basis, the expected credit loss ('ECL') associated with its financial assets carried at amortized cost and fair value through net assets/equity. The entity recognizes a loss allowance for such losses at each reporting date. Critical estimates and significant judgments made by management in determining the expected credit loss (ECL) are set out in *Note xx*.

**Financial liabilities**

**Classification**

The entity classifies its liabilities as subsequently measured at amortized cost except for financial liabilities measured through profit or loss.

*Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)*

**l. Inventories**

Inventory is measured at cost upon initial recognition. To the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions (for no cost or for a nominal cost), the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition.

Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for as follows:

- Raw materials: purchase cost using the weighted average cost method.
- Finished goods and work in progress: cost of direct materials and labour, and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity but excluding borrowing costs.

After initial recognition, inventory is measured at the lower cost and net realizable value. However, to the extent that a class of inventory is distributed or deployed at no charge or for a nominal charge, that class of inventory is measured at the lower cost and the current replacement cost. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of operations, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange, or distribution. Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption in the ordinary course of operations of the Entity.

**m. Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when the Entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the Entity expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

*Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)*

**n. Social Benefits**

Social benefits are cash transfers provided to i) specific individuals and / or households that meet the eligibility criteria, ii) mitigate the effects of social risks and iii) Address the need of society as a whole. The entity recognises a social benefit as an expense for the social benefit scheme at the same time that it recognises a liability. The liability for the social benefit scheme is measured at the best estimate of the cost (the social benefit payments) that the entity will incur in fulfilling the present obligations represented by the liability.

**o. Contingent liabilities**

The Entity does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

**p. Contingent assets**

The Entity does not recognize a contingent asset but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Entity in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

**q. Nature and purpose of reserves**

The entity creates and maintains reserves in terms of specific requirements.

**r. Changes in accounting policies and estimates**

The Entity recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

**s. Employee benefits**

**Retirement benefit plans**

The Entity provides retirement benefits for its employees and directors. Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity (a fund) and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The contributions to fund obligations for the payment of retirement benefits are charged against income in the year in which they become payable. Defined benefit plans are post-employment benefit plans other than defined-contribution plans. The defined benefit funds are actuarially valued tri-annually on the projected unit credit method basis. Deficits identified are recovered through lump-sum payments or increased future contributions on a proportional basis to all participating employers. The contributions and lump sum payments reduce the post-employment benefit obligation.

**t. Foreign currency transactions**

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially accounted for at the ruling rate of exchange on the date of the transaction. Trade creditors or debtors denominated in foreign currency are reported at the statement of financial position reporting date by applying the exchange rate on that date. Exchange differences arising from the settlement of creditors, or from the reporting of creditors at rates different from those at which they were initially recorded during the period, are recognized as income or expenses in the period in which they arise.

**u. Borrowing costs**

Borrowing costs are capitalized against qualifying assets as part of property, plant and equipment. Such borrowing costs are capitalized over the period during which the asset is being acquired or constructed and borrowings have been incurred. Capitalization ceases when construction of the asset is complete. Further borrowing costs are charged to the statement of financial performance.

**v. Related parties**

The Entity regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the *Entity*, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the directors, the CEO/principal and senior managers.

*Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)*

**w. Service concession arrangements**

The Entity analyses all aspects of service concession arrangements that it enters into in determining the appropriate accounting treatment and disclosure requirements. In particular, where a private party contributes an asset to the arrangement, the *Entity* recognizes that asset when, and only when, it controls or regulates the services. The operator must provide together with the asset, to whom it must provide them, and at what price. In the case of assets other than 'whole-of-life' assets, it controls, through ownership, beneficial entitlement or otherwise – any significant residual interest in the asset at the end of the arrangement. Any assets so recognized are measured at their fair value. To the extent that an asset has been recognized, the *Entity* also recognizes a corresponding liability, adjusted by a cash consideration paid or received.

**x. Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year. For the purposes of these financial statements, cash and cash equivalents also include short term cash imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year.

**y. Comparative figures**

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.

**z. Subsequent events**

There have been no events subsequent to the financial year end with a significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2024.

## **5. Significant Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty**

The preparation of the Entity's financial statements in conformity with IPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

### **Estimates and assumptions.**

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Entity based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the consolidated financial statements were prepared. However, existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Entity. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur. (IPSAS 1.140)

### **Useful lives and residual values**

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to inform potential future use and value from disposal:

- The condition of the asset based on the assessment of experts employed by the Entity.
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes.
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed.
- Availability of funding to replace the asset.
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset.

### **Provisions**

Provisions were raised and management determined an estimate based on the information available. Additional disclosure of these estimates of provisions is included in Note xxx. Provisions are measured at the management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the reporting date and are discounted to present value where the effect is material.

**43. Financial Risk Management**

The amounts presented in the statement of financial position are net of allowances for doubtful receivables, estimated by the hospital's management based on prior experience and their assessment of the current economic environment.
