5. Chairman’s Statement

Mautuma Level (4) County hospital is a level four facility located in Mautuma ward, Lugari Sub County, in Kakamega County. It is among the three level four facilities within the sub county offering comprehensive services, this puts a heavy load on the workforce who have to bear the workload despite extreme staff shortage and minimal infrastructure within it. The facility offers both outpatient and inpatient services which is inclusive of Maternity, Mother Child Health Clinic and Medical Outpatient Clinic. The facility has a bed capacity of 42 which is not sufficient to cater for the large and ever growing population of Mautuma. Male ward has a bed capacity of 8 beds, maternity 8 beds, isolation ward 4beds, female ward 11 beds and paediatrics 11 beds. Much needs to be done such as an improvement in water supply, power supply is sufficient from KPLC and backup generator. Additionally, the facility has a total of 15 solar panels that need servicing to offer a third power source alternative. The County has contracted security in place, the facility has contracted services offering cleaning and catering services. The facility has a shortage of technical staff which hinder management and service delivery to the public. All these are needed in order to move the facility forward as well as provide a conducive environment for patients, health workers and the community. The erratic fund disbursement from the county allocation has derailed plans to improve the facility and clear its pending bills, this in-efficient system needs to be changed and a better financing system developed. The facility needs a lot of infrastructural development which need to be factored in the county development budget in order to cater for the ever-growing population which should go hand in hand with service provision. On matters funding and utilities, there is a need for the facility to be able to retain its revenue collection on top of the allocated funds from treasury. This will allow the facility to clear its pending bills as well as continue utility purchase and maintenance. More needs to be done to improve the facility as a whole

6. Report of The Medical Superintendent

Mautuma Sub County Hospital is a level four facility located in Mautuma ward, within Lugari Sub-County. The facility has been allocated a catchment population of approximately 48,000 and serves as the one of the three subcounty facilities within the sub county.

The facility has a bed capacity of 42.

The facility offers the following services but not limited to:

1. Out-patient Services
2. In patient Services
3. Maternity Services
4. Laboratory Services
5. Radiology Services
6. Mother Child Health services
7. Comprehensive Care Clinic services
8. Health Record Services
9. Public Health Services
10. Pharmaceutical Services
11. Nutrition Services
12. Immunization Services

These services are provided by a competent and dedicated team of staff whom despite a persistent staff shortage strive to provide quality services in the facility.

CHALLENGES FACING THE FACILITY

Inadequate Bed Capacity

Mautuma Sub County Hospital has a bed capacity of 42 beds.

Staff Shortage

The facility experiences an acute shortage of staff to man the various departments, this has forced certain departments to be unable to offer comprehensive services on a 24hr basis.

Inadequate Funding

The facility receives inadequate funding from the county government which has caused an increase in pending bills and utility stock-outs. The stock outs lead to poor patient turn-up and a reflective revenue dip.

Mautuma Sub County Hospital (Kakamega County Government)
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Legislative and legal Framework

The facility as per the county is a level 4 hospital, but nationally it is classified as a level 2 hospital under **KMPDC** and its registration number **GK-013941**. This has limited the hospital from providing services to patients who have chronic conditions like hypertension, diabetes and sickle cell diseases. Additionally, a there is no provision for admissions under the SHA insurance cover, this limits admission of these patients and by so they are forced to pay cash which is a challenge.

9. Management Discussion and Analysis

The financial report for Mautuma Sub-county Hospital presents the financial situation of the facility over the past one year.

The promulgation of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 under Chapter 11 ushered Kenya into a new system of governance, replacing the centralized system with a devolved system of governance. The devolved system of governance consists of the National Government and 47 County Governments. Health was among the devolved functions.

The following is a highlight analysis of the facility

Sponsorships and partnerships

The facility receives its main support from the County Government of Kakamega and other program supporting partners and stakeholders like USAID.

Financial performance that includes: -

Revenue sources,

The facility's main source of revenue is NHIF and cash banked by clients consuming services

Utilisation of funds

The funds are collected into two accounts, one collects revenue received from NHIF and the other is for cash based collection, the funds are then swiped to The County Revenue Account. The facility then receives allocated funds from disbursements and spends using Imprest Accounts after acquisition of AIE from Chief Officer Health Services. During the year under review, the Hospital recorded a revenue of Kshs 25.9 M from which a total expenditure of Kshs 29.9M leaving a deficit of Kshs 4.0M.

10. Environmental And Sustainability Reporting

i) Sustainability strategy and profile

Mautuma Sub County Hospital maintains a Mission to promote and participate in provision of an integrated quality curative and rehabilitative services to all Kenyans. This is a continuous objective that needs to be sustained over time, to achieve this Mautuma Sub County Hospital has identified the following sustainability priorities; consultative planning and budgeting process, improving revenue collection and lobbying for staff deployment.

In consultative planning and budgeting the facility has brought together the county health management and various stakeholders in order to achieve the facility's mandate. This has directly affected the budgeting process where aside from the in house priorities, program based targets are given a say in the budgets. This has greatly influenced indicators of the facility on the positive side. On matters improving revenue the Hospital management team charges for Sub County have sealed loopholes that led to revenue loss. This together with encouraging the local populous on NHIF uptake has led to tremendous revenue increase.

Staff numbers and appropriate deployment is key to quality service provision which is line with the facility's core mandate, this has put to task the Medical Superintendent to lobby for deployment of staff to Mautuma Sub County Hospital

However, in the course of implementation of the above mentioned, there are challenges experienced in the facility. They include; effects of Covid-19 which saw the facility scale down most of its operations while maintaining the same recurrent expenditure and Inadequate staffing, Inadequate funding and delays in disbursement also had a derail in implementation of the facility annual work plan.

ii) Environmental performance

Mautuma Sub County Hospital has yet to establish an environmental policy guideline, however the facility uses established National Guidelines on environmental issues as its guiding principles in the matter.

Some of the environmental issues experienced in the facility include; waste generation, waste segregation, waste disposal and management. These still remain a challenge for the facility and more engagements are needed.

iii) Employee welfare

The Majority of employees within the facility are County Government of Kakamega employees, followed by UHC engaged staff. Despite the effort the facility has a massive shortage of staff that, that gap is plugged by Casual staff engaged by hospital Management.

To improve staff performance, Mautuma Sub County Hospital has initiated capacity building programmes to staffs through on-job trainings, continuous medical education, workshops and conference attendance that is supported. Furthermore, the facility management conducts staff appraisal performance which is coordinated from the County department of health and the Human Resource Department.

The facility has complied to Occupational Safety and Health Act of 2007, (OSHA) by providing adequate office space that is regularly cleaned, providing sanitation facilities, regular trainings on drug and substance abuse and providing PPEs to all staff.

iv) Market place practices-

a) Responsible competition practice.

All staff are inducted into the Code of Conduct, Human Resource Manual and Disciplinary process as well as made aware of their scope of service, this sorts a lot of the issues with regards to corruption. The facility has also embraced a total cashless system for easier accountability and reduce the risk of corruption.

b) Responsible Supply chain and supplier relations

All procurement processes in the facility adhere to the laid down regulations, with the facility procurement officer taking lead to ensure guidelines and regulations are followed. The facility maintains good practices and treats its own suppliers responsibly by honouring contracts, all of which are subject to funds availability.

c) Responsible marketing and advertisement

The facility through Continuous Medical Examination ensures that all its staff are well aligned with the International, National and County guidelines in regards to Ethical practices within the facility.

d) Product stewardship

The Patients' rights Charter which all staff are well aligned with and frequently reminded of is one of the documents we use to ensure that Client's rights are respected and upheld.

v) Corporate Social Responsibility / Community Engagements

Mautuma Sub County Hospital is fostering interaction with the surrounding community from which majority of clients come from. Regular community dialogues are conducted on dialogue days which are usually planned and executed. The dialogue brings on board the administrative arm of the government, the community health volunteers and other NGOs.

Community Health volunteers linked to the facility are also engaged in marketing the facility services and escort clients especially for delivery and ante natal clinic services. This has led to a drop in maternal mortalities and morbidities.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON MAUTUMA SUB COUNTY HOSPITAL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2025 - COUNTY GOVERNMENT OF KAKAMEGA

PREAMBLE

I draw your attention to the contents of my report which is in three parts:

- A. Report on Financial Statements that considers whether the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework, accounting standards and the relevant laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the financial statements;
- B. Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources which considers compliance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, gazette notices, circulars, guidelines and manuals and whether public resources are applied in a prudent, efficient, economic, transparent and accountable manner to ensure the Government achieves value for money and that such funds are applied for the intended purpose; and,
- C. Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance which considers how the entity has instituted checks and balances to guide internal operations. This responds to the effectiveness of the governance structure, risk management environment and internal controls, developed and implemented by those charged with governance for orderly, efficient and effective operations of the entity.

A Qualified Opinion is issued when the Auditor-General concludes that, except for material misstatements noted, the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. The Report on Financial Statements should be read together with the Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources, and the Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance.

The three parts of the report are aimed at addressing the statutory roles and responsibilities of the Auditor-General as provided by Article 229 of the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, and the Public Audit Act, 2015. The three parts of the report when read together constitute the report of the Auditor-General.

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Mautuma Sub County Hospital - County Government of Kakamega set out on pages 1 to 41, which comprise of

the statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2025 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net assets, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts, for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Mautuma Sub County Hospital - County Government of Kakamega at 30 June, 2025 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and comply with the Health Act, 2017, and Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

1. Unconfirmed Net Assets Balance

The statement of changes in net assets indicates a negative net assets balance of Kshs.1,914,769 which comprises a revaluation reserve of Kshs.2,086,876 and accumulated deficit of Kshs.4,001,645. The net assets were accumulated during the year under review, being the first year of preparation of the financial statements of the hospital. However, the hospital's property, plant and equipment were not revalued and therefore the revaluation reserves balance of Kshs.2,086,876 could not be explained.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of net assets negative balance of Kshs.1,914,769 could not be confirmed.

2. Unconfirmed Transfers from Other Government Entities

The statement of financial performance reflects transfers from other government entities amounting to Kshs.8,944,538, and disclosure Note 7 to the financial statements indicates an amount of Kshs.9,143,166, resulting in an unexplained variance of Kshs.198,628. The supporting schedules indicates an amount of Kshs.8,754,830, further resulting in an unexplained variance of Kshs.189,708 with statement of financial performance.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of transfers from other government entities amounting to Kshs.8,944,538 could not be confirmed.

3. Unsupported Employee Costs

The statement of financial performance and Note 10 to the financial statements reflect employee costs amounting to Kshs.6,456,707. The amount includes casuals' wages of Kshs.5,256,707 and NSSF penalty of Kshs.1,200,000. However, the expenses were not supported casuals' payrolls, master rolls, and demand notice from the National Social Security Fund (NSSF).

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of employee costs amounting to Kshs.6,456,707 could not be confirmed.

4. Unsupported Receivables from Social Health Authority (SHA)

The statement of financial position and Note 18 to the financial statements reflects receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.3,685,198 relating to the Social Health Authority (SHA), and as disclosed in Note 18 to the financial statements. However, the supporting ledgers and claim statements from SHA were not provided for audit verification.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.3,685,198 could not be confirmed.

5. Unsupported Inventories Balance

The statement of financial position and Note 20 to the financial statements reflects inventories balance of Kshs.1,671,069, which comprises pharmaceutical supplies of Kshs.923,355, and dressings and non-pharmaceuticals of Kshs.747,714. However, the supporting ledgers and stock take sheets for inventories were not provided for audit review.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of inventories balance of Kshs.1,671,069 could not be confirmed.

6. Unsupported Property, Plant and Equipment Balance

The statement of financial position and Note 21 to the financial statements indicates property, plant and equipment balance of Kshs.121,588 in respect to plant and medical equipment. However, supporting invoice, delivery note, and inspection and acceptance certificate and goods received note for the unspecified assets were not provided for audit review. Further, the hospital did not maintain an assets' register for recording its assets.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of property, plant and equipment balance of Kshs.121,588 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of the Mautuma Sub County Hospital-County Government of Kakamega's Management in accordance with ISSAI 130 on the Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Emphasis of Matter

Budgetary Control and Performance

The statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts reflects a final receipts budget and actual on a comparable basis of Kshs.21,924,620 and Kshs.21,308,643

respectively resulting in under-funding of Kshs.615,977, or 3% of the budget. Similarly, the hospital expended Kshs.21,479,455 against actual receipts of Kshs.21,308,643 resulting to an under-expenditure of Kshs.170,812 or 0.8% of the actual receipt.

In addition, the hospital's budgeting process lacked credibility and independent oversight, as the hospital did not have a functional Board of Management to review and approve the budget. Further, the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts indicated Zero balances for the performance differences for all items contrary to our recalculated amounts based on the budget and actual amounts disclosed in the statement.

The under-funding and underutilization affected the planned activities and may have impacted negatively on service delivery to the public.

My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section, I have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in my report.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the Other Information set out on page iii to xviii which comprise of Key Entity Information and Management, the Board of Management, Key Management Team, Chairman's Statement, Report of the Medical Superintendent, Statement of Performance Against Predetermined Objectives, Corporate Governance Statement, Management Discussion and Analysis, Environmental and Sustainability Reporting, Report of the Board of Management, and Statement of Board of Management's Responsibilities. The Other Information does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon.

In connection with my audit on the Hospital's financial statements, my responsibility is to read the Other Information and in doing so, consider whether the Other Information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the Other Information and accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN THE USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES

Conclusion

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

Basis for Conclusion

1. Operation Without a Board of Management

The annual report under Board of Management (BoM) profile indicates that the hospital did not have a constituted Board during the year under review. As a result, key oversight roles such as approval of budgets, monitoring of performance, and policy guidance were not effectively carried out. Matters that required board deliberations were handled directly by management without independent oversight. This was contrary to Section 56(1) of the County Governments Act, 2012 and the County Health Services Act which require the establishment of hospital management boards to provide oversight, policy direction, and strategic leadership in the management of public health facilities. Good governance practices also require that every public institution has an active Board to ensure accountability and effective decision-making.

Further, as a result of absence of a constituted BoM, the chairman's statement, statement of Board of Management's responsibilities contained in the annual report, and entire set of financial statements were not signed by the chairman of the Board. The statement of Board of Management's responsibilities indicates that the financial statements were approved by the Board on 28 August, 2025, when there was no BoM in place.

In the circumstances, the county executive of Kakamega was in breach of law.

2. Unconfirmed Classification of Mautuma Sub County Hospital

The hospital's operating license revealed that Mautuma sub-county hospital was registered as a Level 2 medical facility whereas, the county government of Kakamega has listed the facility as a Level 4 hospital. Despite having a fifty (50) bed capacity, the hospital does not meet the Social Health Authority (SHA) requirements for admitting patients, resulting in denial of treatment and admission for SHA-registered citizens as the discrepancy in classification had led to revenue loss, as the facility cannot claim reimbursements for services under SHA.

Further, the county executive did not provide supporting documentation for classification of hospital as a level 4 facility, and the significant efforts made to resolve the conflicting status. This was contrary to Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) Target 3.8 aims to achieve universal health coverage, including financial risk protection and access to quality essential health-care services and affordable essential medicines and vaccines for all.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of law.

3. Failure to Meet Level 4 Hospital Requirements

Review of hospital records, staffing levels, and physical verification of medical equipment revealed significant shortfalls against the Kenya Quality Model for Health standards for a Level 4 facility as follows:

Further, despite availability of the essential equipment, including laundry machine, radiology unit and ultrasound machines, these critical functions remained not functional after breakdown. Patients were referred to other hospitals for services even when the hospital lacked an equipped ambulance for transferring critically ill patients.

In addition, the physical verification at the hospital revealed underutilization of available infrastructure since the wards operated below its fifty (50) bed capacity by admitting only patients who were paying in cash. This was contrary to the First Schedule of Health Act, 2017 and which implies that accessing highest attainable standard of health, which includes the right to healthcare services, including reproductive health care, and Article

43(1) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 states Every person has the right (a) to the highest attainable standard of health, which includes the right to health care services, including reproductive healthcare.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

4. Non-Compliance with the Facilities Improvement Financing Act, 2023

The statement of cash flows and Note 14 to the financial statements includes transfers to Facility Improvement Fund (FIF) of Kshs.6,016,961. Further, the statement includes transfers from other Government entities amount of Kshs.7,940,270 which differs with disclosure Note 7 to the financial statements amount of Kshs.9,143,166 relating to transfer from Facility Improvement Fund resulting in an overpayment of Kshs.1,923,309 and underpayment of Kshs.1,202,896 respectively. The under payment was retained at FIF account and not remitted to hospital or any other health facility.

This was contrary to Section 5(1) of the Facilities Improvement Financing Act, 2023 which provides that there shall be retention of all monies raised or received by or on behalf of all public health facilities.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

5. Long Outstanding Trade and other Payables

The statement of financial position and Note 22 to the financial statements reflects trade and other payables balance of Kshs.8,439,285. The balance includes payables which have been outstanding for more than twelve (12) months, and Management did not provide explanations for the delay in settlement of these liabilities. This was contrary Regulation 42(1)(b) of the Public Finance Management (County Government) Regulations, 2015 requires that debt service payments form the first charge on the budget of an entity in the subsequent financial year.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of law.

6. Non-Compliance with Law on Occupational Safety and Health (OSH)

During the year under review, the hospital did not conduct mandatory fire safety audits and annual occupational safety and health audits by approved OSH advisors, as required by Occupational Safety and Health Act, 2007. Further, the hospital was not registered as a workplace under the Directorate of Occupational Safety and Health Services.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

7. Non-Adherence to Data Protection Act, 2019

Review of the personnel records revealed that the hospital had not appointed a Data Protection Officer as required under Section 24 of the Data Protection Act, 2019. The position remained vacant and no evidence was provided to indicate whether prescribed data protection functions were performed. Further, the hospital had not registered itself as either a Data Controller or Processor or both with the Data Protection Commissioner's.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 3000 and ISSAI 4000. The standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

Conclusion

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Conclusion on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and governance were not effective.

Basis for Conclusion

Failure to Operationalize Procurement Function

During the year under review, the hospital did not have an established procurement function or designated procurement officer. Procurement activities such as requisitioning, sourcing, and contract management were handled directly by departmental heads without technical guidance or oversight from a procurement professional. Supporting procurement documentation including evaluation reports and procurement plans were not provided for audit verification. This was contrary to Section 155(5) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act (PPADA), 2015 which requires every procuring entity to establish a procurement function staffed with qualified personnel responsible for planning, processing, and managing all procurement activities in accordance with the law. Good procurement practices also require segregation of duties and proper oversight to promote transparency and accountability in the use of public funds.

In the circumstances, the management was in breach of the law.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 2315 and ISSAI 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal controls, risk management and overall governance were operating effectively in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

Responsibilities of the Management and Board of Management

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual

Basis) and for maintaining effective internal controls as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Hospital's, ability to sustain services, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to sustainability of services and using the going concern basis of accounting unless Management is aware of the intention cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply with the authorities which govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

The Board of Management is responsible for overseeing the Hospital's, financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how the Management monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit

My responsibility is to conduct an audit of the financial statements in accordance with Article 229(4) of the Constitution, Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and the International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). The standards require that, in conducting the audit, I obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting the audit, Article 229(6) of the Constitution also requires that I express a conclusion on whether or not in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way. In addition, I

consider the entity's control environment in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Further, I am required to submit the audit report in accordance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

4. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Revenue recognition

i) Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Transfers from other Government entities

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the Hospital and can be measured reliably. To the extent that there is a related condition attached that would give rise to a liability to repay the amount, the amount is recorded in the statement of financial position and realised in the statement of financial performance over the useful life of the asset that has been acquired using such funds.

ii) Revenue from exchange transactions

Rendering of services

The entity recognizes revenue from rendering of services by reference to the stage of completion when the outcome of the transaction can be estimated reliably. The stage of completion is measured by reference to labour hours incurred to date as a percentage of total estimated labour hours. Where the contract outcome cannot be measured reliably, revenue is recognized only to the extent that the expenses incurred are recoverable.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods and when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential associated with the transaction will flow to the entity.

Interest income

Interest income is accrued using the effective yield method. The effective yield discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this yield to the principal outstanding to determine interest income for each period.

Rental income

Rental income arising from operating leases on investment properties is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease terms and included in revenue.

b. Budget information

The original budget for FY 2024/2025 was approved by Board on. Subsequent revisions or additional appropriations were made to the approved budget in accordance with specific approvals from the appropriate authorities. The additional appropriations are added to the original budget by the entity upon receiving the respective approvals in order to conclude the final budget. Accordingly, Mautuma Sub County Hospital recorded additional appropriations of *Ksh.* on the FY 2024/2025 budget following the Board's approval. The *entity's* budget is prepared on a different basis to the actual income and expenditure disclosed in the financial statements. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on a cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the accrual basis to the cash basis and reclassified by presentation to be on the same basis as the approved budget.

A comparison of budget and actual amounts, prepared on a comparable basis to the approved budget, is then presented in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts. In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget.

A statement to reconcile the actual amounts on a comparable basis included in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts, and the actuals as per the statement of cash flows.

c. Taxes

Sales tax/ Value Added Tax

Expenses and assets are recognized net of the amount of sales tax, except:

- When the sales tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the sales tax is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of sales tax included. The net amount of sales tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

d. Investment property

Investment properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. The carrying amount includes the replacement cost of components of an existing investment property at the time that cost is incurred if the recognition criteria are met and excludes the costs of day-to-day maintenance of an investment property.

Investment property acquired through a non-exchange transaction is measured at its fair value at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured using the cost model and are depreciated over a period of 1 years. Investment properties are derecognized either when they have been disposed of or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit or service potential is expected from its disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognized in the surplus or deficit in the period of de-recognition. Transfers are made to or from investment property only when there is a change in use.

e. Property, plant and equipment

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the entity recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)

f. Leases

Finance leases are leases that transfer substantially the entire risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Assets held under a finance lease are capitalized at the commencement of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the future minimum lease payments. The Entity also recognizes the associated lease liability at the inception of the lease. The liability recognized is measured as the present value of the future minimum lease payments at initial recognition.

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognized as finance costs in surplus or deficit.

An asset held under a finance lease is depreciated over the useful life of the asset. However, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Entity will obtain ownership of the asset by the end of the lease term, the asset is depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term.

Operating leases are leases that do not transfer substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Operating lease payments are recognized as an operating expense in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

g. Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognized at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Internally generated intangible assets, excluding capitalized development costs, are not capitalized and expenditure is reflected in surplus or deficit in the period in which the expenditure is incurred. The useful life of the intangible assets is assessed as either finite or indefinite.

h. Biological Assets

The entity recognizes biological assets when it controls the assets due to past events, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the asset will flow to the entity, and when the fair value or cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Biological assets are initially and subsequently measured at fair value less costs to sell, except where fair value cannot be reliably determined. In such cases, the asset is measured at its cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Changes in fair value less costs to sell are recognized in surplus/deficit in the period in which they occur.

i. Research and development costs

The Entity expenses research costs as incurred. Development costs on an individual project are recognized as intangible assets when the Entity can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset
- The asset will generate future economic benefits or service potential
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

Following initial recognition of an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortization of the asset begins when development is complete and the asset is available for use. It is amortized over the period of expected future benefit. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually with any impairment losses recognized immediately in surplus or deficit.

j. Financial instruments

IPSAS 41 addresses the classification, measurement and de-recognition of financial assets and financial liabilities, introduces new rules for hedge accounting and a new impairment model for financial assets. *The entity does not have any hedge relationships and therefore the new hedge accounting rules have no impact on the hospital's financial statements. (amend as appropriate).*

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. At initial recognition, the entity measures a financial asset or financial liability at its fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial asset or financial liability not at fair value through surplus or deficit, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability.

Financial assets

Classification of financial assets

The entity classifies its financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through net assets/ equity or fair value through surplus and deficit on the basis of both the entity's management model for financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset. A financial asset is measured at amortized cost when the financial asset is held within a management model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding. A financial asset is measured at fair value through net assets/ equity if it is held within the management model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cashflows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. A financial asset shall be measured at fair value through surplus or deficit unless it is measured at amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity unless an entity has made irrevocable election at initial recognition for particular investments in equity instruments.

Subsequent measurement

Based on the business model and the cash flow characteristics, the entity classifies its financial assets into amortized cost or fair value categories for financial instruments. Movements in fair value are presented in either surplus or deficit or through net assets/ equity subject to certain criteria being met.

Amortized cost

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, and that are not designated at fair value

through surplus or deficit, are measured at amortized cost. A gain or loss on an instrument that is subsequently measured at amortized cost and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognized in profit or loss when the asset is de-recognized or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

Fair value through net assets/ equity

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at fair value through net assets/ equity. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through net assets, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in surplus/deficit. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

Fair value through surplus or deficit

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity are measured at fair value through surplus or deficit. A business model where the entity manages financial assets with the objective of realizing cash flows through solely the sale of the assets would result in a fair value through surplus or deficit model.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognized at fair values less allowances for any uncollectible amounts. Trade and other receivables are assessed for impairment on a continuing basis. An estimate is made of doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the year end.

Impairment

The entity assesses, on a forward-looking basis, the expected credit loss ('ECL') associated with its financial assets carried at amortized cost and fair value through net assets/equity. The entity recognizes a loss allowance for such losses at each reporting date. Critical estimates and significant judgments made by management in determining the expected credit loss (ECL) are set out in *Note*.

Financial liabilities

Classification

The entity classifies its liabilities as subsequently measured at amortized cost except for financial liabilities measured through profit or loss.

k. Inventories

Inventory is measured at cost upon initial recognition. To the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions (for no cost or for a nominal cost), the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition.

Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for as follows:

- Raw materials: purchase cost using the weighted average cost method.
- Finished goods and work in progress: cost of direct materials and labour, and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity but excluding borrowing costs.

After initial recognition, inventory is measured at the lower cost and net realizable value. However, to the extent that a class of inventory is distributed or deployed at no charge or for a nominal charge, that class of inventory is measured at the lower cost and the current replacement cost. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of operations, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange, or distribution. Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption in the ordinary course of operations of the Entity.

l. Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the Entity expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

Notes to the Financial Statements (Continued)

m. Social Benefits

Social benefits are cash transfers provided to i) specific individuals and / or households that meet the eligibility criteria, ii) mitigate the effects of social risks and iii) Address the need of society as a whole. The entity recognises a social benefit as an expense for the social benefit scheme at the same time that it recognises a liability. The liability for the social benefit scheme is measured at the best estimate of the cost (the social benefit payments) that the entity will incur in fulfilling the present obligations represented by the liability.

n. Contingent liabilities

The Entity does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

o. Contingent assets

The Entity does not recognize a contingent asset but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Entity in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

p. Nature and purpose of reserves

The entity creates and maintains reserves in terms of specific requirements.

q. Changes in accounting policies and estimates

The Entity recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

r. Employee benefits

Retirement benefit plans

The Entity provides retirement benefits for its employees and directors. Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity (a fund) and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The contributions to fund obligations for the payment of retirement benefits are charged against income in the year in which they become payable. Defined benefit plans are post-employment benefit plans other than defined-contribution plans. The defined benefit funds are actuarially valued tri-annually on the projected unit credit method basis. Deficits identified are recovered through lump-sum payments or increased future contributions on a proportional basis to all participating employers. The contributions and lump sum payments reduce the post-employment benefit obligation

s. Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially accounted for at the ruling rate of exchange on the date of the transaction. At each reporting date, foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. Non-monetary items measured in historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction, and those measured at fair value are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. Exchange differences arising from the settlement of monetary items or translation of monetary/non-monetary items at rates different from those at which they were initially reported are recognized in surplus or deficit in the period.

t. Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are capitalized against qualifying assets as part of property, plant and equipment. Such borrowing costs are capitalized over the period during which the asset is being acquired or constructed and borrowings have been incurred. Capitalization ceases when construction of the asset is complete. Further borrowing costs are charged to the statement of financial performance.

u. Related parties

The Entity regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the *Entity*, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the directors, the CEO/principal and senior managers.

v. Service concession arrangements

The Entity analyses all aspects of service concession arrangements that it enters into in determining the appropriate accounting treatment and disclosure requirements. In particular, where a private party contributes an asset to the arrangement, the *Entity* recognizes that asset when, and only when, it controls or regulates the services. The operator must provide together with the asset, to whom it must provide them, and at what price. In the case of assets other than 'whole-of-life' assets, it controls, through ownership, beneficial entitlement or otherwise – any significant residual interest in the asset at the end of the arrangement. Any assets so recognized are measured at their fair value. To the extent that an asset has been recognized, the *Entity* also recognizes a corresponding liability, adjusted by a cash consideration paid or received.

w. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year. For the purposes of these financial statements, cash and cash equivalents also include short term cash imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year.

x. Comparative figures

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.

y. Subsequent events

There have been no events subsequent to the financial year end with a significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2025.

5. Significant Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of the Entity's financial statements in conformity with IPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

Estimates and assumptions.

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Entity based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the consolidated financial statements were prepared. However, existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Entity. Useful lives and residual values

25. Financial Risk Management

The entity's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks including credit and liquidity risks and effects of changes in foreign currency. The hospital's overall risk management programme focuses on the unpredictability of changes in the business environment and seeks to minimise the potential adverse effect of such risks on its performance by setting acceptable levels of risk. The hospital does not hedge any risks and has in place policies to ensure that credit is only extended to customers with an established credit history.

The entity's financial risk management objectives and policies are detailed below:

(i) Credit risk

The entity has exposure to credit risk, which is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay amounts in full when due. Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalents, and deposits with banks, as well as trade and other receivables and available-for-sale financial investments. Management assesses the credit quality of each customer, taking into account its financial position, past experience and other factors. Individual risk limits are set based on internal or external assessment in accordance with limits set by the directors. The amounts presented in the statement of financial position are net of allowances for doubtful receivables, estimated by the hospital's management based on prior experience and their assessment of the current economic environment. Ultimate responsibility for liquidity risk management rests with the hospital's board of management who have built an appropriate liquidity risk management framework for the management of the entity's short, medium and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The entity manages liquidity risk through continuous monitoring of forecasts and actual cash flows.

(iii) Market risk

The hospital has put in place an internal audit function to assist it in assessing the risk faced by the entity on an ongoing basis, evaluate and test the design and effectiveness of its internal accounting and operational controls. The hospital's Finance Department is responsible for the development of detailed risk management policies (subject to review and approval by Audit and Risk Management Committee) and for the day-to-day implementation of those policies. There has been no change to the entity's exposure to market risks or the way it manages and measures the risk.

a) Foreign currency risk

The entity has transactional currency exposures. Such exposure arises through purchases of goods and services that are done in currencies other than the local currency. Invoices denominated in foreign currencies are paid after 30 days from the date of the invoice and conversion at the time of payment is done using the prevailing exchange rate. 


