**NOW THEREFORE**, in accordance with the provisions of Rule 9 of the Houses of Parliament (Joint Sittings) Rules, I hereby convey the said decision of the National Assembly to the Senate".

**Honourable Senators,**

You may recall that the Senate passed a similar Motion last evening. Earlier today, I communicated the resolution of the Senate to the Speaker of the National Assembly. The effect of this now is that the Houses of Parliament have resolved to establish a Joint Select Committee to look into matters relating to the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission, the electoral laws and processes, as per the terms of the Motion.

The Joint Committee needs to move with speed to conclude on its mandate and report to Parliament within 30 days.

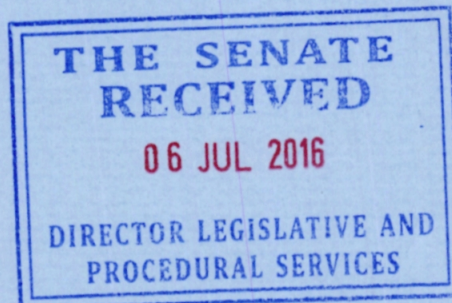



8\*. MOTION - ESTABLISHMENT OF A JOINT PARLIAMENTARY SELECT COMMITTEE ON MATTERS RELATING TO THE INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL AND BOUNDARIES COMMISSION

(The Leader of the Majority Party)

**THAT**, acknowledging that the sovereign power of the People of Kenya may be exercised directly or indirectly through their democratically elected representatives and that the People's sovereign power shall be exercised only in accordance with the Constitution; recognizing that through pronouncements, sections of the Kenyan society have raised issues on the credibility, impartiality, integrity and independence of the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission, the electoral processes and the electoral law; appreciating the need to have the August 2017 general elections conducted by a body enjoying the broad confidence of most Kenyans; now therefore in accordance with the provisions of Article 1(1) and (2) of the Constitution of Kenya and Rule 9 of the Houses of Parliament (Joint Sittings) Rules, the National Assembly **resolves** that:-

- (i) The two Houses of Parliament establish a joint select committee consisting of fourteen (14) members, seven (7) each from the two Coalitions in Parliament.
- (ii) The mandate of the said joint select committee shall be to:-

- (a) Inquire into the allegations against the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC) Commissioners and the Secretariat;
- (b) On the findings of (a) above may recommend legal mechanisms for the vacation from office of the current Commissioners of the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission and Secretariat in accordance with the Constitution;
- (c) Recommend legal, policy and institutional reforms to strengthen the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission and improve the electoral system and processes so as to ensure the August, 2017 elections are free and fair and are administered in an impartial, efficient, simple, accurate, verifiable, secure, accountable and transparent manner; and
- (d) On the basis of the findings and recommendations in (a), (b) & (c) prepare a report and a draft Bill or draft Bills.

**THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY FURTHER RESOLVES THAT:-**

- (iii) The Joint Select Committee shall report to Parliament within 30 days;
- (iv) The leaders of the two coalitions agree to issue statements separately to support the final report and Draft Bill or Bills;
- (v) The Majority and Minority leaders in Parliament will signify the approval of the final report and draft Bill or Bills by affixing their signatures thereon prior to presentation to Parliament;
- (vi) The joint select committee shall have two Co-chairs each appointed by the respective Coalitions;
- (vii) The Coalitions shall provide joint rapporteurs to the Joint Select Committee, but the official record will be the parliamentary hansard;
- (viii) The joint select committee and each coalition may engage experts, professionals and such other technical resource persons as they may deem necessary;
- (ix) The parliamentary Clerk's office shall provide secretarial services in accordance with the Standing Orders;
- (x) The Committee shall receive views from experts, members of the public, the business community, civil society, religious groups, political parties, county governments and any other persons on matters relating to the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission and the electoral process;
- (xi) Each member of the joint select committee shall have one vote. Decisions in the select Committee shall be made by two-thirds majority vote;
- (xii) The Committee shall formulate its own rules of procedure; and

**THAT**, aware that Kenya's high seas and inland fresh water bodies are a key resource for diversification of the country's economy through fishing; noting that most fishermen and women use traditional methods of fish harvesting, preservation and processing; conscious that there are few training institutions that offer studies in fisheries, oceanography and maritime technology in Kenya; further noting that huge losses are incurred due to lack of proper post-harvest management and inadequate fish processing plants in the country; concerned that this lacuna has contributed to relegation of the otherwise lucrative fishing industry to a *jua kali* sector; deeply worried that lack of training and inadequate fish processing facilities have resulted in meagre earnings for many Kenyans, including women who depend on fishing; this House **urges** the Government to establish both inland and coastal training institutions and processing plants with a view of building capacity for fishing communities to maximize their returns from the lucrative fishing sector.

11\*. **MOTION – PROVISION OF HONORARIUM FOR VILLAGE ELDERS**  
(The Hon. Malulu Injendi, M.P.)

**THAT**, aware that Village Elders play a critical role in facilitating the work undertaken by Chiefs and Assistant Chiefs namely in solving disputes, addressing petty crimes, handling security issues and generally promoting development initiatives; concerned that the Government is yet to adequately recognize their vital roles by way of facilitating their work; further noting that these hardworking citizens are crucial in the dissemination of government policies and plans to the grassroots, this House **urges** the National Government to consider giving a monthly or annual Honorarium to Village Elders as a means of appreciating their services and encouraging them to uphold their dedication to the community.

12\*. **MOTION – PROVISION OF WATER TO PUBLIC FACILITIES**  
(The Hon. Andrew Mwadime, M.P.)

**THAT**, aware that water is one of the most basic human needs; concerned about children in primary schools, especially, those that do not have access to clean tapped water; also aware that the Government is already providing electricity and food to these schools; deeply concerned that lack of water leads to a host of hygiene-related problems including jigger infestation, cholera and others, this House **resolves** that the Government formulates a financial framework for and provides tapped water to all public facilities, especially primary schools, as water is life.

13\*. **MOTION – DEPLOYMENT OF CHAPLAINS TO LEARNING INSTITUTIONS**  
(The Hon. Geoffrey Odanga, MP)

**THAT**, aware that cases of unbecoming conduct among young people has been on the rise as exemplified by runaway drug abuse and addiction, drunkenness, sexual orgies and general irresponsibility; and deeply concerned that these incidents of loose morals have been worsened in the recent past by emerging radicalization of the youth leading to inclination towards terrorism and lawlessness, this House **urges** the National Government to consider deploying chaplains to all secondary schools and tertiary institutions in order to instill desired morals, social virtues, national values and a sense of responsibility, to address and root out moral decadence at an early age, and to supplement the work of guidance and counselling departments operating in these institutions.

Considering that Section 18 of the Wildlife Management and Conservation Act 2013 provides for the establishment of a County Wildlife Conservation and Compensation Committee in every county mandated with, among others, the responsibility of bringing together all relevant stakeholders within the county to actively harness their participation in the planning and implementation of projects and programmes related to the protection, conservation and management of wildlife resources in the county, as well as review and recommend claims resulting from loss or damage caused by wildlife for purposes of compensation, could the Cabinet Secretary inform the committee whether the Ministry has appointed Chairpersons of these Committees across the country, and particularly in Nakuru County, who are to convene the Committee sittings in order to roll out the aforementioned tasks and responsibilities?

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
