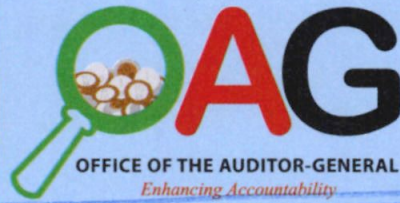

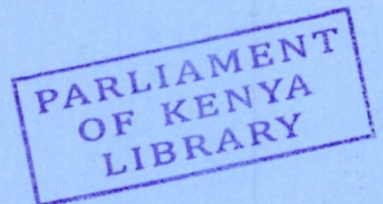

Background information

The school is domiciled in Kenya and its operations are governed under the Basic Education Act, 2013. It is located in **Nyandarua County, Mirangine Sub-County**.

The school was registered in **03/03/2017** under registration number **18-S-0030-0451** and is currently categorized as a **Boarding Extra County Girls public school** established and operated by the Government.

The school is a boarding school with a population of **701** of students as at **30th June 2024**. It has 5 streams and 39 teachers of which 8 teachers are employed by the School Board of Management

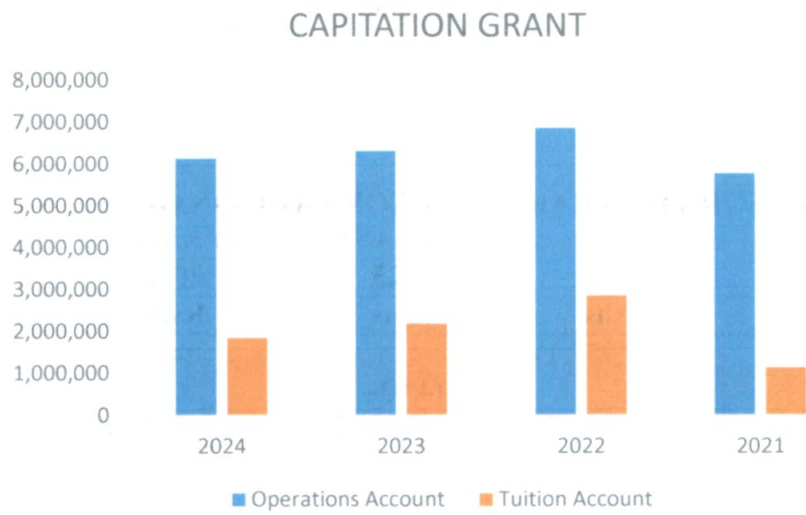

Trend over the Last Three Years



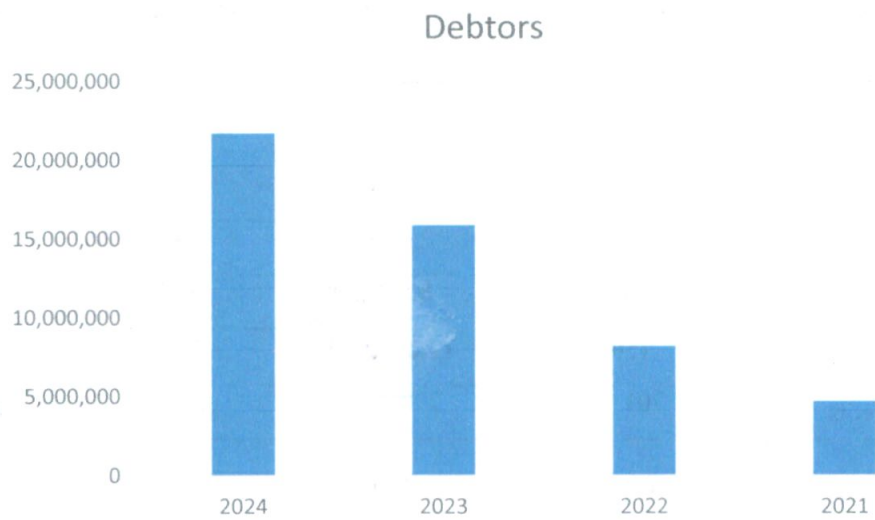

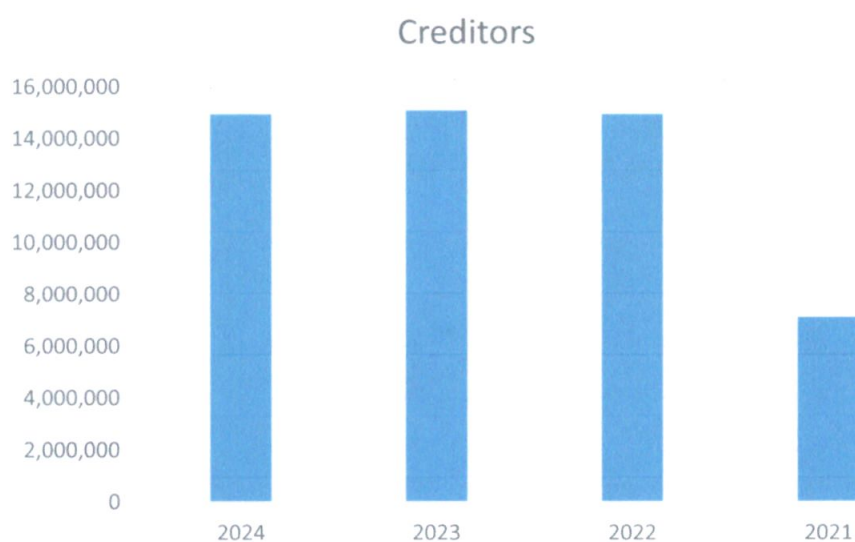
Trend over the Last Three Years

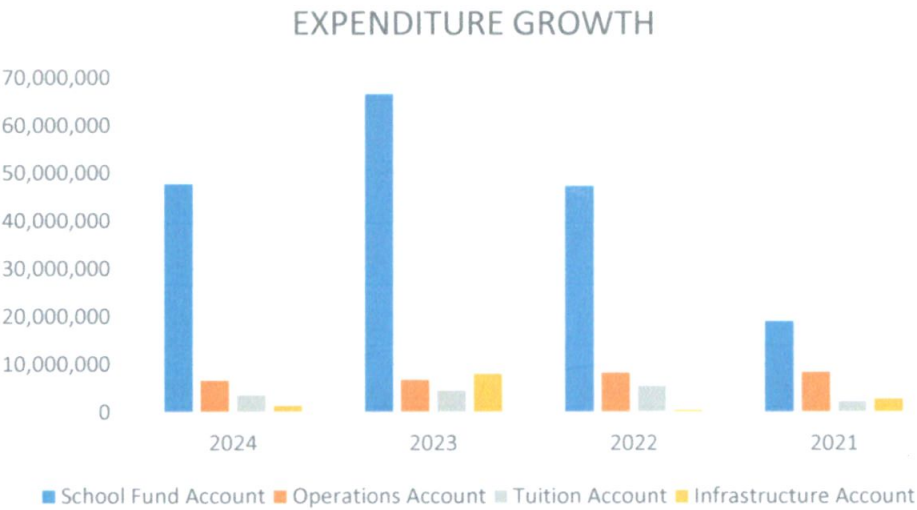
Trend over the Last Three Years

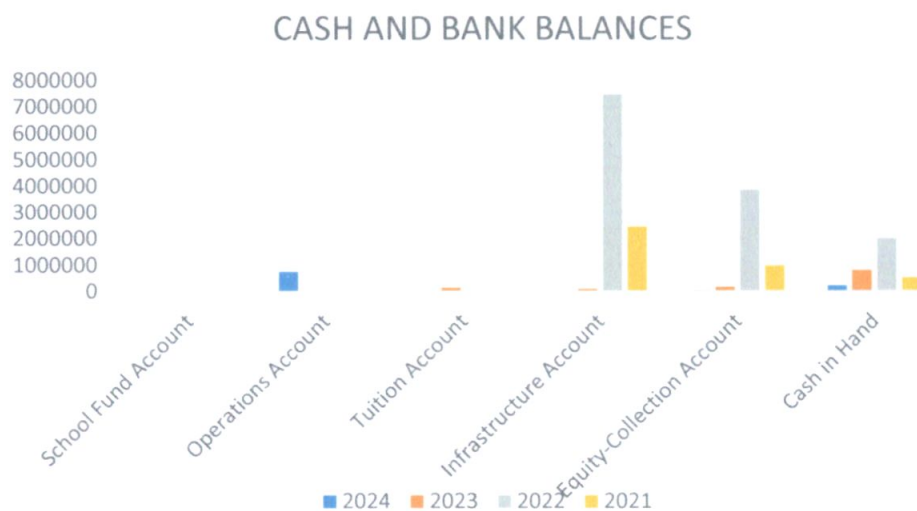
Trend over the Last Three Years

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON NYAKIAMBI GIRLS SECONDARY SCHOOL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2024 - NYANDARUA COUNTY

PREAMBLE

I draw your attention to the contents of my report which is in three parts:

- A. Report on Financial Statements that considers whether the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework, accounting standards and the relevant laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the financial statements;
- B. Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources which considers compliance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, gazette notices, circulars, guidelines and manuals and whether public resources are applied in a prudent, efficient, economic, transparent and accountable manner to ensure the Government achieves value for money and that such funds are applied for the intended purpose; and,
- C. Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance which considers how the entity has instituted checks and balances to guide internal operations. This responds to the effectiveness of the governance structure, risk management environment and internal controls, developed and implemented by those charged with governance for orderly, efficient and effective operations of the entity.

A Qualified Opinion is issued when the Auditor-General concludes that, except for material misstatements noted, the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. The Report on Financial Statements should be read together with the Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources, and the Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance.

The three parts of the report are aimed at addressing the statutory roles and responsibilities of the Auditor-General as provided by Article 229 of the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, and the Public Audit Act, 2015. The three parts of the report when read together constitute the report of the Auditor-General.

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Nyakiambi Girls Secondary School set out on pages 1 to 15, which comprise of the statement of assets and liabilities

as at 30 June, 2024, and the statement of receipts and payments, statement of cash flows and statement of budgeted versus actual amounts for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Nyakiambi Girls Secondary School at 30 June, 2024 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Cash Basis) and comply with the Basic Education Act, 2013 and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Unsupported Accounts Receivable

The statement of financial assets and financial liabilities reflects accounts receivable balance of Kshs.21,729,137 in respect of fees arrears as disclosed in Note 13 to the financial statements. However, supporting schedule and ageing analysis for the receivables were not provided for audit. In addition, the School Management did not disclose measures it has put in place to reduce further accumulation of student debtors and ensure prompt recovery of outstanding student debtors. Further, there was no debtor's policy on the long outstanding fees arrears and no provision for bad and doubtful debts has been made.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of the accounts receivable balance of Kshs.21,729,137 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of the Nyakiambi Girls Secondary School Management in accordance with ISSAI 130 on the Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Emphasis of Matter

Budgetary Control and Performance

The statement of budgeted versus actual amounts reflects final receipts budget and actual on a comparable basis of Kshs.55,924,791 and Kshs.64,383,214 respectively, resulting in an over collection of Kshs.8,458,423 or 15% of the budget. However, the School spent an amount of Kshs.59,605,490 against actual receipts amounting to Kshs.64,383,214, resulting in an underutilisation of Kshs.4,777,724 or 7% of actual receipts.

The over collection and underutilization of receipts indicates that the School's budgetary process may not have been realistic and may have impacted negatively on service delivery to the public

My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section, I have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in my report.

Other Information

The Management is responsible for the Other Information set out on page iii to xiv which comprise of Key Entity Information and Management, Summary Report of Performance of the School, and Statement of School Management Responsibilities. The Other Information does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon.

In connection with my audit on the schools' financial statements, my responsibility is to read the Other Information and in doing so, consider whether the Other Information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the Other Information and accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN THE USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES

Conclusion

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

Basis for Conclusion

1. Overdrawn Bank Account

The statement of financial assets and financial liabilities reflects a bank balance of Kshs.801,009. However, the schools' boarding bank accounts was overdrawn by a total of Kshs.2,878,119 as disclosed in Note 10 to the financial statements. This was contrary

to Regulation 7 of the Public Finance Management (National Government) Regulations, 2015 which states that no official government bank account shall be overdrawn, nor shall any advance or loan be obtained from a bank account for official purposes beyond the limit, authorized by The National Treasury.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

2. Unbalanced Budget

The statement of budgeted versus actual amounts reflects final revenue budget of Kshs.55,924,791 and final expenditure budget of Kshs.44,312,962 resulting in budget surplus of Kshs.11,611,829. This was contrary to Regulation 33(c) of the Public Finance Management (National Government) Regulations, 2015 which provides that budget revenue and expenditure appropriations shall be balanced.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of law.

3. Non-Compliance with the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board Reporting Requirements

The financial statements presented for audit did not include all information provided in the format prescribed and published by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board (PSASB). The statement of assets and liabilities has been referred to as the statements of financial assets and financial liabilities contrary to the prescribed format. Further, Annex 11 to the financial statements on summary of fixed assets register is incomplete and does not indicate the details of the assets and their values as required by the prescribed format. Lack of the relevant information may affect users' reliance on the financial statements for decision making.

In the circumstances, Management did not comply with the PSASB guidelines.

4. Underfunding of Capitation Grants

The statement of receipts and payments reflects capitation grants for tuition, operations and infrastructure grants of Kshs.1,855,239, Kshs.6,146,068 and Kshs.2,949,800 respectively as disclosed in Notes 1, 2 and 3 to the financial statements. During the year under review, the Ministry of Education allocated to the School tuition and capitation grants of Kshs.10,951,107 with each learner allocated Kshs.14,423. However, the Ministry did not meet approved capitation of Kshs.22,244 per student resulting to an under funding of Kshs.5,756,219 for the year. This was contrary to Ministry of Education circular Ref: MOE/CONF/G5 dated 26 November, 2019 – Guidelines on implementation of Free day Secondary Education 2020 which provided for Government of Kenya annual capitation of Kshs.22,244 per learner in boarding schools category B.

In the circumstances, the underfunding of the School may have affected service delivery to the public.

5. Irregular Transfer of Funds to Kenya Secondary Schools Heads Association

The statement of receipts and payments reflects boarding and school fund payments amount of Kshs.47,796,154 as disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements. The payments include a transfer of Kshs.1,271,600 to Kenya Secondary School Heads Association (KESSHA). However, KESSHA is a welfare organization that draws its membership from School Principals only. The organization is not defined in Government Funding system and there is no assurance that it has implemented effective, efficient, and transparent financial management and internal control systems to manage the funds transferred by schools.

In the circumstances, value for money transferred to KESSHA amounting to Kshs.1,271,600 could not be confirmed.

6. Delayed Transfer of Infrastructure Funds from Operations Bank

The statement of receipts and payments reflects infrastructure grants amounts of Kshs.2,949,800 as disclosed in Note 3 to the financial statements from the Ministry of Education credited in the operations bank account which were to be transferred to infrastructure bank account for maintenance and improvement of the school's facilities. However, only an amount of Kshs.500,000 was transferred to infrastructure account, leaving a balance of Kshs.2,449,800 as at 30 June, 2024. This was contrary to the Ministry of Education Circular Ref. No: HQS/3/13/3 dated 16 June, 2021 which directed that infrastructure grants as well as maintenance and improvement funds should be transferred to the school infrastructure account fifteen (15) days upon receipt of the funds in the operations account.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the Ministry guidelines.

7. Stalled School Boundary Wall and Chain Link Fencing

As reported in the previous year, a local contractor was awarded labour contract for the construction of 585 meters boundary wall and 820 meters chain link at contract sum of Kshs.2,800,358. The contract was awarded on 19 December, 2022 with contract inception and completion dates of 1 January, 2023 and 28 February, 2023 respectively. Further, the same contractor was awarded tender for supply and delivery of construction materials. During the year under review, the contractor was paid a total of Kshs.5,571,000 for labour and materials. However, the contracts were not provided for audit.

Further, physical project verification conducted in March 2026 revealed that boundary wall works was partially complete while chain link works was not done.

In addition, completion certificate had not been issued. The project was past expected completion date and the contractor was not on site. The School Management did not provided measures put in place to ensure the project was revived and completed. This was contrary to Section 72(I) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 which states that the Accounting Officer for a national government entity shall (a) be responsible for

the management of the entity's assets and liabilities; and (b) manage those assets in a way which ensures that the national government entity achieves value for money in acquiring, using and disposing of those assets.

In the circumstances, value for value for money for the payment of Kshs.5,571,000 on the stalled works could not be confirmed and the school management was in breach of the law.

8. Lack of a Functional Procurement Unit

The School did not have an established procurement function managed by qualified procurement professional as required under Section 47(2) of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act, 2015 and Regulation 33 of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Regulations, 2020. Procurement activities were undertaken by individuals lacking the requisite qualifications.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

9. Lack of a Procurement Plan

The statement of receipts and payments reflects amounts of Kshs.64,383,214 and Kshs.59,606,104 in respect of total receipts and payments respectively. However, during the year under review, Management did not prepare an Annual Procurement Plan as part of the annual budget preparation process. This was contrary to Regulation 40 of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Regulations, 2020 which states that 'a procuring entity prepare a Procurement Plan for each financial year as part of the annual budget preparation process'.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

10.Excess Supply of Books

As reported in the previous year, the Ministry of Education distributed textbooks to public secondary schools through Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development (KICD). Examination of records revealed that the Institute distributed 5,441 books to the school. However, the 5,441 were not issued to the students and are still in store, resulting in excess text book delivery of 5,441 books.

In the circumstances, value for money on the excess text books could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 3000 and ISSAI 4000. The standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

Conclusion

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Conclusion on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and governance were not effective.

Basis for Conclusion

Lack of Internal Audit Function and Audit Committee

During the year under review, the School had not constituted an audit committee and an internal audit unit as required by Regulation 166(1) and (2) of the Public Finance Management (National Government), 2015 which states that, the internal audit unit of a National Government entity to assess effectiveness of the school through an internal performance appraisal commenting on its effectiveness in the annual report to The National Treasury.

In the circumstances, the existence of an effective oversight mechanisms could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 2315 and ISSAI 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal controls, risk Management and overall governance were operating effectively in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

Responsibilities of the Management and those Charged with Governance

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Cash Basis) and for maintaining effective internal controls as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the School's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless Management is aware of the intention to cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply with the authorities which govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the School's financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how Management monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit

My responsibility is to conduct an audit of the financial statements in accordance with Article 229(4) of the Constitution, Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and the International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). The standards require that, in conducting the audit, I obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting the audit, Article 229(6) of the Constitution also requires that I express a conclusion on whether or not in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way. In addition, I consider the entity's control environment in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7 (1) (a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Further, I am required to submit the audit report in accordance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

IX. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

1. Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) with particular emphasis on Cash Basis Financial Reporting under the Cash Basis of Accounting and applicable government legislations and regulations. The financial statements comply with and conform to the form of presentation prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board of Kenya.

This cash basis of accounting has been supplemented with accounting for; a) receivables that include imprest, salary advances and other receivables and b) payables that include deposits and retentions and payables from operations.

The financial statements are presented in Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the school and all values are rounded to the nearest Kenya Shilling (Kshs). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

2. Recognition of receipts and payments

The school recognises all receipts from the various sources when the event occurs and the related cash has actually been received by the school. In addition, the school recognises all expenses when the event occurs and the related cash has actually been paid out by the school.

3. In-kind contributions

In-kind contributions are donations that are made to the school in the form of actual goods and/or services rather than in money or cash terms. These donations may include vehicles, equipment or personnel services. Where the financial value received for in-kind contributions can be reliably determined, the school includes such value in the statement of receipts and payments both as a receipt and as a payment in equal and opposite amounts; otherwise, the contribution is not recorded.

4. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at various financial institutions at the end of the financial year.

5. Accounts Receivable

For the purposes of these financial statements, imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year are treated as receivables. This is in recognition of the government practice where the imprest payments are recognized as expenditure when fully accounted for by the imprest or AIE holders. This is an enhancement to the cash accounting policy. Other

accounts receivables are disclosed in the financial statements.

6. Accounts Payable

For the purposes of these financial statements, deposits and retentions held on behalf of third parties have been recognized as accounts payables. This is in recognition of the government practice of retaining a portion of contracted services and works pending fulfilment of obligations by the contractor and to hold deposits on behalf of third parties. This is an enhancement to the cash accounting policy adopted by National Government Ministries and agencies. Other liabilities including pending bills are disclosed in the financial statements. Pending bills consist of unpaid liabilities at the end of the financial year arising from contracted goods or services during the year or in past years.

7. Non-current assets

Non-current assets are expensed at the time of acquisition while disposal proceeds are recognized as receipts at the time of disposal. However, the acquisitions and disposals are reflected in the school fixed asset register a summary of which is provided as a memorandum to these financial statements.

8. Budget

The budget is developed on the same accounting basis (cash basis), the same accounts classification basis, and for the same period as the financial statements. The school's budget was approved by the School Board of Management. A comparison of the actual performance against the comparable budget for the financial year under review has been included in the financial statements.

9. Comparative figures

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.

10. Subsequent events

There have been no events subsequent to the financial year end with a significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended 30th June 2024
