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CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

The Public Petition regarding the discrimination in accessing National Identity Cards by the Nubian Community, dated 9th June 2021 was presented in the National Assembly on 10th June 2021 by Hon. Bernard Imran Okoth, MP on behalf of residents of Kibra Constituency. The Petition was subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security for consideration and reporting to the House pursuant to the provision of Standing Order 227(1).

The Petitioners averred that despite being bonafide citizens of this Republic, they have continuously faced discrimination regarding the legitimacy of their citizenry; which commenced when the British Colonial Government failed to legitimize their existence as a community, despite granting this recognition to railway construction labourers who hailed from India

The Petitioner prayed the National Assembly through the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security inquires into the matter with a view to-

- a) Securing the recognition of the Nubian Community as marginalized and minority community in Kenya.
- b) Secure the granting of citizenship status to members of the Nubian Community in a transparent and non-discriminatory processes.
- c) Securing inclusion of Nubians in all government portals; and
- d) Make any other recommendations that it deems fit in the circumstances of the Petition.

The Committee was required to respond to the Petitioner by way of a report addressed to the Petitioner and laid on the Table of the National Assembly not more than sixty (60) calendar days from the time of presentation of the Petition to the House.

While considering the Petition, the Committee heard submissions from the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government, the Petitioners and Hon. Bernard Imran Okoth, MP. Their submissions were key

in determination of various issues raised in the Petition and ultimately making recommendations.

The Committee recommends that the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and Co-ordination of National Government should initiate the process of listing the Nubian people as a tribe residing in the Republic of Kenya. The Cabinet Secretary should further submit to the House a status report on the matter within three (3) months of tabling of this report.

The Committee is grateful to the Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical and technical support accorded to it during the consideration of the Petition. Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the Honourable Members of the Committee, the secretariat staff and all those who made useful contributions towards the preparation and production of this report.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 227(2), it is my pleasant privilege and honor to present to this House the report of the Committee on its consideration of the Public Petition regarding discrimination in accessing National Identity Cards by the Nubian Community.

PART 1

1.0 ESTABLISHMENT AND MANDATE OF THE COMMITTEE

1.1 Mandate of the Committee

1. The Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security is established in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order 216 of the National Assembly. Its mandate as provided for in S.O. 216(5) is –
 - (a) *investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments;*
 - (b) *study the programme and policy objectives of Ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;*
 - (c) *study and review all legislation referred to it;*

 - (e) *investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;*
 - (f) *to vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments);*
 - (g) *examine treaties, agreements and conventions;*
 - (h) *make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;*
 - (i) *consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House, pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and*
 - (j) *examine any questions raised by Members on matters within its mandate.*
2. The subjects under the Committee's jurisdiction are; National security, Police Services, Home Affairs, Public Administration, Public Service, Prisons, Management of Natural Disasters and Community Service Orders.

PART 2

2.0 INTRODUCTION

2.1 **Right to Petition Parliament**

5. The right to Petition Parliament is provided for under Article 119 of the Constitution, which provides as follows: -

“Every person has a right to Petition Parliament to consider any matter within its authority, including enacting, amending or repealing any legislation. Parliament shall make provision for the procedure for the exercise of this right.”

6. The Petition therefore, falls under the Committee's mandate under National Assembly Standing Order 227(1). In addition, Standing Order 227(2) outlines the procedure for committal of a Petition to a Committee and transmission of its decision to the Petitioner. Further, the Petitions to Parliament (Procedure) Act, 2012 provides for the procedure to be followed in the submission, processing and consideration of a Petition.
7. Article 12 of the constitution envisages that every citizen is entitled to the rights, privileges and benefits of citizenship, subject to the limits provided or permitted by the Constitution; and a Kenyan passport and any document of registration or identification issued by the State to citizens.
8. Article 14 of the Constitution envisages that a person is a citizen by birth if on the day of the person's birth, whether or not the person is born in Kenya, either the mother or father of the person is a citizen.
9. Articles 15 of the Constitution envisages that a person who has been married to a citizen for a period of at least seven years is entitled on application to be registered as a citizen. A person who has been lawfully resident in Kenya for a continuous period of at least seven years, and who satisfies the conditions prescribed by an Act of Parliament, may apply to be registered as a citizen. A child who is not

a citizen but is adopted by a citizen is entitled on application to be registered as a citizen.

10. Article 26 of the Constitution of Kenya guarantees every Kenyan the inalienable right to life, by providing that a person shall not be deprived of life intentionally while Article 29 of the constitution safeguards every person's right to freedom and security, which includes the right not to be subjected to any form of violence from either public or private sources.
11. Article 94 as read together with Article 95 of the Constitution further provides for the mandate of Parliament and the National Assembly respectively. Generally, the Houses of Parliament exercise the legislative mandate of the people, deliberate on matters of national interest and oversight the exercise of power by other arms of government.
12. Public participation is now a guaranteed process in Kenya. The Constitution in various Articles requires that public participation be undertaken at all levels of government before government officials make decision affecting the public.
13. Public participation is having an open, accountable and structured process where citizens or people, or a segment of a community can interact, exchange views and influence decision making. Public participation is part of a democratic process.

2.2 Public Petition No. 023 of 2021

14. Standing Order 227(2) provides for the committal of public petitions to the House whereby every Petition presented or reported to the House shall be committed to the relevant Departmental Committee for consideration and report to the House and Petitioner within sixty (60) days. Further, the Petition to Parliament (Procedure) Act, 2012 provides for the procedure to be followed in the submission, processing and consideration of Petitions.

15. The Public Petition No. 023 of 2021 regarding accessing National identity cards by the Nubian Community is dated 9th June 2021 and was presented to the National Assembly on Thursday 10th June 2021 by Hon. Bernard Okoth on behalf of the Nubian community in Kenya. The Petition was subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security for consideration and reporting to the House and Petitioners pursuant to the provision of Standing Order 227(1).
16. The Petitioners testified before the Committee that failure by the Government of Kenya to recognize the Nubian Community as citizens continue to cause great anguish and inconvenience to the them since they were unable to register their children at birth, they miss out on education, health and other social services, were excluded from employment, were unable to register businesses or to open bank accounts or even register a phone sim cards, had unrecognized marriages, were compelled to register assets for failing to carry out identity cards and for allegedly being in Kenya illegally.
17. Specifically, the Petitioner prayed that the National Assembly through the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security, intervenes with a view to-
 - a) Securing the recognition of the Nubian Community as marginalized and minority community in Kenya.
 - b) Secure the granting of citizenship status to members of the Nubian Community in a transparent and non-discriminatory processes.
 - c) Securing the inclusion of Nubians in all government portals; and
 - d) Make any other recommendations that it deems fit in the circumstances of the Petition.

PART 3

3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

18. The Committee undertook public participation in compliance with the provisions of Art. 118 of the Constitution and Standing Order 127(3).
19. In this regard, the Committee carried out the following activities-
 - a) Invited the Cabinet Secretary Dr. Fred Matiang'i 16th August, 2021 and later met with Hon. Bernard Okoth, MP on 25th August 2021; and
 - b) The Committee undertook a fact finding to Kibra Constituency on 16th September, 2021. During the visit, the Committee met with affected residents, area Member of Parliament and National Government administrative leaders

3.1 SUBMISSION BY HON BERNARD OKOTH, MP

20. Hon. Bernard Okoth, Member of Parliament, Kibra Constituency appeared before the Committee on 25th August 2021 and 16th September, 2021 during public hearing in Kibra Constituency and submitted as follows: -
 - (i) That despite being bona-fide citizens of this Republic, members of the Nubian Community have continuously faced discrimination regarding the legitimacy of their citizenry that commenced when the British Colonial Government failed to legitimize their existence as a community despite granting this recognition to railway labourers' shipped from India;
 - (ii) The successive government since independence have adopted the same policy of denying the Nubians citizenship status and treating them as aliens thereby hampering access by most Nubians to National Identity Cards and passports that subsequently restrict their access to public services, employment, education, business and involvement in political processes.

- (iii) The 2019 National Population Census revealed a total Nubian population of twenty-one thousand, three hundred and nineteen (21,319) persons countrywide, which further complicates their ability to elect representatives even at the county government level in a bid to secure their welfare at the grassroots.
- (iv) The Nubian students are unable to join institutions of higher learning and to access Government funding through the of Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and other platforms due to restrictions and delays in accessing and issuance of National Identity Cards on account of the cumbersome and discriminatory vetting process, which has had the multiplier effect of hindering the community's economic progress.
- (v) That despite the Nubian Community being marginalized and minority community, the Government has failed to implement any affirmative action or policy to ensure active participation of Nubians in employment under the Public Service Commission, access to water, health, education and infrastructure, as well as their public participation in social, economic and political matters.
- (vi) No member of the Nubian Community has ever been listed in any Government portal with regard to application, shortlisting or recruitment into Civil Service.
- (vii) The Nubians are discriminated against along ethnic and religious lines with regard to accessing identification documentation as exemplified by the fact that they are required to provide additional documents in support of their claims to Kenyan nationality such as religious certificates and grandparents identity cards, are required to face a Vetting Committee and have to swear an Affidavit unlike other Kenyans.
- (viii) Nubians right to Kenyan nationality has been acknowledged by the African Committee of Experts on the Rights of the Child as well as the African Commission on Human and People's Rights, and hence the Kenyan Government needs to likewise acknowledge the right particularly in view of the fact that Kenya has already

ratified several international and regional instruments addressing rights to nationality.

- (ix) The efforts by the Nubian Community to have the matter addressed by the relevant government authorities have been futile.
- (x) That the matters raised in this Petition are not pending in any court of Law in Kenya.

21. The Petitioner asked the National Assembly through the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security, to intervene with a view to-

- a) Securing the recognition of the Nubian Community as marginalized and minority community in Kenya.
- b) Secure the granting of citizenship status to members of the Nubian Community in a transparent and non-discriminatory processes.
- c) Securing inclusion of Nubians in all government portals; and
- d) Make any other recommendations that it deems fit in the circumstances of the Petition.

3.2 SUBMISSION BY THE CABINET SECRETARY FOR INTERIOR AND CO-ORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

22. The Cabinet Secretary for Interior and Co-ordination of National Government, Dr. Fred Matiang'i appeared before the Committee on 16th August 2021 and submitted as follows:-

- (i) That the Government of Kenya recognizes Nubians as citizens of the Republic of Kenya and has continuously issued national identity cards to those who apply and are eligible. A total of five thousand six hundred and forty-two (5642) members of the Nubian Community had been issued with national identity cards.

- (ii) The Registration of Persons Act, Cap 107 Laws of Kenya requires that one must be identified as a Kenyan Citizen before being issued with a national identity card. The vetting process is anchored in the Registration Act as one of the ways of identifying applicants' eligibility for those in the border Counties and cosmopolitan areas. In the case of Nubians, there is vetting committee. The vetting committee comprises the Deputy County Commissioner (Chairperson), Civil Registration Officer, Registration Officer, three elders nominated by the Nubian Community and Chiefs/Assistant Chiefs.
- (iii) Members of the Nubian Community are not discriminated against along ethnic and religious lines.
- (iv) The Registration of Persons Act, Cap 107, and Laws of Kenya stipulates that the onus of proving one's citizenship lies with the applicant. It is not only the Nubians who are vetted for positive identification. Where one is an orphan, his or her grandparent's national identity card is to be produced in the course of vetting.
- (v) No affidavits are required as stated in the petition.

3.3 PUBLIC HEARING IN KIBRA CONSTITUENCY

During the Public hearings held at Moi Nairobi Girls High School on 16th September 2021, the Committee received submissions from the affected residents as follows:-

21. Mr. Ibrahim Yunis Ali

Mr. Ali appeared before the Committee on 16th September 2021 during public hearing in Kibra Constituency and testified as follows-

- (i) He was a member of the Kenyan Nubian Council
- (ii) Despite Nubians settling and living in Kenya for over hundred years (100), they did not qualify to be citizens of Kenya under the law.

- (iii) Nubians have had to go through a long and complex process of vetting in order to obtain Identity cards. Many have faced substantial delays in obtaining the proof of citizenship while some have never succeeded in getting hence left with no proof of citizenship.
- (iv) That the Statelessness has had a devastating social, political, and economic impact on the Nubian Community, and that some of the consequences include, poor employment prospects, refusal to issue passports, failure to recognize property rights, lack of income from property ownership, poor educational prospects, poor sanitation and health care.

That after decades of activism against citizenship deprivation locally without any tangible success, the Nubian Council of Elders, on behalf of the Nubian Community filed cases with the African Human and people's rights court and African Committee of experts on the rights and welfare of the child, in 2003 and 2010, respectively.

- i. That in 2006 (vide communication No.317/2006) the African Commission on Human and People's rights found that the Kenyan Government had violated several articles of the African Charter on Human and People's right touching on Citizenship rights, land right and inhumane evictions of Kenyan Nubians and requested the Kenyan government to implement.
- ii. The African Committee of Experts (Case No. 02/2020) on the rights and welfare of the child found the Kenya Government to have violated various articles of the African Charter on the rights and welfare of the
- iii. Nubian child and requested the government to take urgent and remedial measures.
- iv. He pleaded with the committee to facilitate implementation of the decisions of the African Commission on Human and People's rights on Nubian citizenship and other rights, review vetting as a requirement for identity issuing process, and also recognize Nubia as a tribe in Kenya.

- v. A letter dated 24th April 2009 from the then Minister of Planning to the Nubian Council of elders confirms that the Minister had promised that the Nubian Community shall be encoded as the 43rd tribe which never materialised.

22. Presentation Shafi Ali Hussein

- i. He is the Director of the Nubian Human Rights Forum.
- ii. He said that they have nothing tangible to show that they are citizens.
- iii. That they would like to enjoy the benefits of being citizens as stipulated in Chapter three of the Constitution of Kenya.
- iv. He gave incidences where he has had to swear an affidavit for other Nubians to get Identity Cards. (*See Attached ANNEX*)

23. Aisha Kagai

- i. An activist who was representing the Nubian Rights Forum.
- ii. She insisted that access to documentation was an access to Human right.
- iii. She said that the vetting process in issuing the Nubians with identity cards was causing delays in the whole process and some have waited for the identity cards for up to six months, and this has led to some having to get their identity cards at twenty-three years (23). She said that the two days only slotted for a week for the Nubians to book for vetting was not sufficient.
- iv. In instances where the father had been vetted, she said that there was no need to vet the child.
- v. The Nubian Right Forum has had a case in court and was being represented by Maruja and Amunga Advocates to

- undertake a legal suit against the Principal Registrar at the National Registration Bureau for not issuing identity cards to three individuals.
- vi. She said that since Kenya is moving towards the digital system, it is feared that the Nubian will be left out.
 - vii. She pleaded that the Nubian be considered citizens by birth and not registration.

24. Jamal din Yahya

- i. He confirmed that his father, and grandfather too were in the Kenyan Army, and that his father was a teacher at Starehe Boys Centre.
- ii. That according to the 2019 census, there is an average of twenty-one (21,000) Nubians in Kenya, and most of them live in towns, though they are still marginalized and are a minority community.
- iii. He noted that they have suffered discrimination and social injustice. He went ahead and gave an example of how Nubian land has been taken away and now left with two hundred and eighty-eight (288) acres only.
- iv. He prayed that the Nubians be registered as a community in Kenya.

25. Ali Noor Ibrahim

- i. He said that the Nubian community has had many challenges due to marginalization.
- ii. He insinuated that during recruitment for disciplined forces, the Nubians are locked out completely.
- iii. He said that there is need for affirmative action to enable them to vie for the political seats, that some political seats be also reserved for the Nubian only; and

- iv. He noted that Nubians were not represented in decision making offices, assemblies, as ambassadors, and head of parastatals.

26. Malesen Hamida

- i. As a politician, she said that it has been very hard to engage in politics as most Nubians have no identity cards.
- ii. She also added that the Nubians had no representation in school Boards, and this has made them miss important opportunities.
- iii. That the Nubians are not allocated resources even in NGOs.
- iv. She said that the Nubians are facing stiff competition in Government jobs, and since they are not registered in the service portals, employability is almost impossible.
- v. She pleaded with the government to register Nubians under the Land Act.
- vi. She also noted that there is active interference of the local administration; and
- vii. She requested that the Nubians be considered and be included in the Huduma exercise.

27. Hussein Mohamed

He noted that most students like him from the Nubian Community had been denied documentation and this made them miss out on Scholarships outside Kenya, and government jobs too.

28. Zahra Khalid

- i) She insisted that they had gotten citizenship through acquiring identity cards, and that they be given citizenship by birth so as to end the vetting process that they have to undergo.
- ii) She noted that the Makonde people had a population of three thousand people and had been recognized as a tribe in Kenya yet the Nubians in Kenya are over twenty thousand people yet they are not recognized as a tribe in Kenya.

29. Deputy County Commissioner, Gideon Ombongi

- i. He said that there is a committee that is tasked with the vetting process in registration of Identity Cards.
- ii. He said that they follow the laid down procedure.
- iii. According to him no pending cases have been brought to his attention.
- iv. He noted that in some instances the people who have registered to be vetted leave numbers that could not be reached and has come across underage cases that had applied for an identity card.
- v. He also said that some Nubians register as Aliens and hence get Alien identity cards, which makes it difficult to get the other identity card.

30. Ann Odeny-Sub-County Registrar of Persons

- i. The Registrar at Kibra illustrated the registration process, she said that the Vetting Committee comprises of the following.
 - a) Chairman- DCC
 - b) Secretary-Registrar of Persons
 - c) NIS Officer
 - d) Civil Registrar (Birth)
 - e) Registrars from Nairobi
 - f) Nubian elders
 - g) Chiefs

- ii. She pointed out the vetting requirements as:-
 - a) Parents' ID cards
 - b) Birth certificate or clinic immunizations card
 - c) School documents-KCPE/KCSE or any other school national examinations documents
 - d) Chief's introduction letter
 - e) Elder's introduction letter for Nubians
- iii. She noted that those children whose parents are public servants do not undergo vetting.
- iv. That applicants who have attained the age of eighteen years (18) and are Nubian appear before the Nubian elders on Tuesdays or Thursdays, to be identified and are issued with an introduction letter also known as elders' affidavit. And that these two days were chosen by the elders as it was convenient for them. This takes place at the DCC's compound in Kibra. Some visit the elders in their homes, and they can visit the chief's office for a letter on the same day.
- v. Applicants thereafter present their documents to the registrar and then a date is given to the applicant to appear before the vetting committee. Kibra vetting committee caters for Nubians who reside in Nairobi. Those residing outside Nairobi get registered where they have settled. On the vetting day, an applicant comes before the committee with one of his parents carrying all the original documents required.
- vi. That vetting in Nairobi is scheduled once a month, sometimes even more than one depending on the number of applicants.
- vii. She stated that they had a request for mass registration in March 2017, where they had a five-day mobile registration, and eighty-four (84) Nubian were vetted during that exercise.
- viii. Covid-19 had affected the process since meeting were prohibited in line with the Ministry of Health Guidelines.

- ix. She said that applicants who seek identity cards and follow the procedures receive services without any problems.
- x. She also said that vetting is a legal process and not discrimination.

5.0 ISSUES FOR DETERMINATION AS PER PRAYERS SOUGHT IN THE PETITION

5.1 Recognition of the Nubian Community as a marginalized and minority community in Kenya

31. Article 12 of the constitution envisages that every citizen is entitled to the rights, privileges and benefits of citizenship, subject to the limits provided or permitted by the Constitution; and a Kenyan passport and any document of registration or identification issued by the State to citizens.

31. Article 15 of the Constitution envisages that a person who has been married to a citizen for a period of at least seven years is entitled on application to be registered as a citizen; a person who has been lawfully resident in Kenya for a continuous period of at least seven years, and who satisfies the conditions prescribed by an Act of Parliament, may apply to be registered as a citizen; and child who is not a citizen, but is adopted by a citizen, is entitled on application to be registered as a citizen.

32. Evidence on record indicates that in accordance with the aforementioned provisions, the government recognizes the Nubians as citizens of Kenya and has continuously issued national identity cards to those who apply and are eligible. Further evidence adduced show that a total of five thousand six hundred and forty-two (5642) members of the Nubian Community have been issued with National Identity cards. However, in terms of classification, they are categorized as 'other' Kenyans as opposed to a substantive ethnic group.

33. Evidence on record by way of a letter dated April 24th, 2009, by the then Minister for Planning to the Nubian Council of Elders confirmed that the Minister made a promise that the Nubians were to be listed as a tribe but this never materialized.

34. Further evidence on record show that the 2019 National Population Census reported that the total Nubian population countrywide was 21,319 persons which further complicates their ability to elect representatives even at the county government level in a bid to secure their welfare at the grassroots. This lack of representation is a testimony to their marginalization.

35. In view of the foregoing, the Committee was persuaded that the Nubian Community should be granted full citizenship status and recognition as a tribe in Kenya.

5.2 The granting of citizenship status to members of the Nubian Community in a transparent and non-discriminatory processes

36. Citizenship status in Kenya is determined pursuant to the Provisions of the registration of persons Act, cap 107 laws of Kenya requires that one must be identified as a Kenyan Citizen before being issued with national identity cards. The vetting process is anchored in the registration Act as one of the ways of identifying applicants' eligibility for those in the border Counties and cosmopolitan areas. Therefore, it is not exclusive to the members of the Nubian community.

- a) In this regards evidence on record show that the vetting committee members at Kibra County, in relation to Nubians, comprise of the Deputy County Commissioner (Chair), Civil Registration Officer, Registration Officer, three elders from the Nubian Community and Chiefs/assistant chiefs. The Nubian Community is represented by three elders nominated by the community in the vetting committee.
- b) An analysis of the vetting register revealed that the process takes inordinately long period, with a number of applicants from the Nubian Community who applied as early as 2017 still waiting for an opportunity to appear before the vetting panel.
- c) Based on this evidence, while acknowledging that the vetting process is anchored in law and not exclusive to the Nubians, the Committee is of the view that the State Department for Interior and Citizen Services need to streamline the process with a view
- d) to making it transparent and non-discriminatory.

5.3 Inclusion of Nubians in all Government portals

- a) Evidence on record shows that despite the Nubian Community being marginalized and minority community, the Government has failed to implement any affirmative action or policy to ensure active participation of Nubians in employment under the Public Service Commission, access to water, health, education and infrastructure, as well as their public participation in social, economic and political matters.
- b) Further evidence adduced before the Committee show that in 2006 (vide communication No.317/2006) the African Commission on Human and People's rights found that the Kenyan Government had violated several articles of the African Charter on Human and People's right touching on Citizenship rights, land right and inhumane evictions of Kenyan Nubians and requested the Kenyan government to implement.
- c) Additional evidence tabled before the Committee reveal that the African Committee of Experts (Case No. 02/2020) on the rights and welfare of the child found the Kenya Government to have violated various articles of the African Charter on the rights and welfare of the Nubian child and requested the government to take urgent and remedial measures.
- d) Based on this evidence, the Committee is of the view that the Government should make deliberate efforts to initiate affirmative action aimed at ensuring that the Nubians are fully involved in national economic and social life.


6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

36. Based on the above observations, evidence adduced on record and conclusions made on each of the prayers, the Committee makes the following recommendations-

- i) **The Cabinet Secretary for Interior and Co-ordination of National Government should initiate the process of recognizing the Nubian people as a tribe in the Republic of Kenya. In this regard, the Cabinet Secretary should submit to the House a progress report within three (3) months after the Tabling of this report.**

- ii) **The Cabinet Secretary for Interior and Co-ordination of National Government should issue guidelines to ensure that the vetting process for the purposes of acquisition of National Identification documents is transparent and non-discriminatory. Towards this end, the Cabinet Secretary should submit to the House a progress report within three (3) months of Tabling this report.**

The Committee considered the report and came up with the following observations and recommendations:-

Observations

- i) That Kitui County is not among the designated hardship areas in Kenya for Civil Servants as communicated vide a circular dated 7th December 2015(OP/CAB/1/31A).
- ii) That Kitui County meets the criteria set out by the Government Task Force constituted in 2007 for the determination of areas to be declared as Hardship Areas. This is supported by the high levels of poverty, poor infrastructure with only 2.4 per cent of roads paved, low access to clean water with 42.3 per cent of the population relying on water from streams and rivers, low connectivity to power with only 18 per cent of households connected against the national average of 41 per cent. In addition the county has only 256 health facilities serving over one million residents. Only 6 of these facilities are accredited by insurance companies
- iii) That the County experiences persistent harsh climatic conditions such as drought and famine resulting in food insecurity. The situation is further aggravated by cases of insecurity along the Kitui -Tana River, Kitui -

Garissa and Kitui- Isiolo borders, coupled with human wildlife conflict in areas that border the Tsavo West Park.

- iv) That, due to these challenges, public servants encounters numerous setbacks in the discharge of their duties thus occasioning a high turnover of officers and poor delivery of essential government services.
- v) Prior to 1997, the Civil Service and Teaching Services had similar eleven (11) areas designated Hardship which included whole Districts of Wajir, Mandera, Garissa, Samburu, Isiolo, Lamu, Marsabit, Tana River, West Pokot, Turkana and Northern area of Baringo.
- vi) In 1997, the Minister for Education through a legal Notice No. 534 of 11th November, 1997 gazetted an additional twenty five(25) Hardship areas for the Teaching Service following the negotiations and signing of a Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Kenya National Union of Teachers (KNUT). These created disparities in the Civil Service designated hardship areas were those under TSC.
- vii) That currently several counties that border Kitui including Makueni, Tana River, Isiolo and Garissa have been gazetted as designated Hardship Areas.
- viii) On 21st March, 2019 an Inter-agency Technical Committee comprises of senior officers drawn from the Ministries of Public Service and Gender, Interior an Co-ordination of National Government, Education, the National Treasury, and Planning, Public Service Commission, Teachers Service Commission, Commission on Revenue Allocation (CRA) the Judiciary, Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) and the Council of Governors (COG) was constituted and tasked to collect data, review and harmonize the hardship allowance paid across the Public Service so as to accommodate the cost implication within the budgetary allocation for 2020/2021 FY.
- ix) The State Department of Public Service does not have adequate budgetary allocation for carrying out the harmonization exercise as envisage through the Inter- Agency Technical Committee.

Recommendations

- a) On the review of the existing hardship areas to reflect the true position of the reality faced by public servants in Kitui County, the Committee recommends that:**

The Inter-agency Technical Committee constituted on 21st March, 2019 comprising of senior officers drawn from the Ministries of Public Service and Gender, Interior and Co-ordination of National Government, Education, the National Treasury, and Planning, Public Service Commission, Teachers Service Commission, Commission on Revenue Allocation (CRA) the Judiciary, Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) and the Council of Governors (COG) tasked to collect data, review and harmonize the hardship allowance paid across the Public Service should expedite the exercise and report to Parliament within six months of tabling this report.

- b) On the inclusion of Kitui County as a hardship area so as to give civil servants incentives to serve in the said areas despite challenges, the Committee recommends that:**

The State Department for Public Service, in consultation with other relevant Government agencies, should prioritize the gazettment of parts of Kitui County and other areas in the Country that meet the criteria for categorization as a hardship area and report to Parliament within six months of tabling this report.

- c) Any other order or direction that it deems fit in the circumstances of the petition, the Committee recommends that:**

Registration of Persons Act, Cap 107 laws of Kenya stipulates that the onus of proving ones citizenship lies with the applicant. It is therefore, not only Nubians who are vetted but also other border ethnic groups living in Kibra for positive identification. It is worth noting that grandparent's ID are asked for only when the applicant is an orphan. Secondly, no affidavits are required as stated in the petition.

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

DEPARTMENTAL COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION AND NATIONAL SECURITY

Kibra Sub County Vetting Committee was constituted in September 2013.
Members of this committee are as follows:-

Chairman- DCC
Secretary - Registrar of Persons
NIS officer
Civil Registrar (Births)
Registrars from Nairobi regions
Nubian elders
Chiefs

The Kibra Sub County vetting is quite unique compared to other Nairobi sub county vetting committees, in that the vetting committee has the presence of Nubian elders representing the community. This vetting committee not only vets Nubians but also other Kenyan communities found at the borders but residing in Kibra Sub County.

The community is vetted because they are also found in Uganda, Sudan and Tanzania.

VETTING REQUIREMENTS

Requirements are similar across the board with other communities that are vetted. Documents required for vetting are as follows:-

1. Parents' ID cards
2. Birth certificate or clinic immunizations card
3. School documents- KCPE/KCSE or any other school national examinations documents.
4. Chief's introduction letter
5. Elder's introduction letter for Nubians and Nyumba Kumi form for other communities.

Please take note those whose parents are civil servants or public servants do not undergo vetting.

VETTING PROCEDURES

Applicants who have attained the age of 18years and are Nubian appear before the Nubian elders on Tuesdays or

Thursdays to be identified and issued with an introduction letter also known as elders' affidavit. Please take note that these days were chosen by the elders as it was convenient for them. This takes place at the DCC's compound in Kibra. Some visit the elders in their homes and they can visit the chief's office for a letter on the same day.

Applicants thereafter present their documents to the registrar and then a date is given to the applicant to appear before the vetting committee. Kibra vetting committee caters for Nubians who reside in Nairobi. Those residing outside Nairobi get registered where they have settled. On the vetting day an applicant comes before the committee with one of his parents carrying all the original documents required.

Vetting as per Nairobi sub county schedule is held once a month. Kibra vetting committee sits more than once in a month if possible. Due to the large number of applicants and Covid-19 upsurge together with Ministry of Health guidelines, the committee has more than one vetting meeting whenever possible.

COMPLAINTS

This committee received a request in March 2017 through Mr. Gekonde (Regional Coordinator for Nairobi Region) from a Nubian rights forum to have Nubians registered in large numbers. It was an outcry that there is a large number of Nubians that are not registered. The committee organized 5 days for mobile registration to cater for the large number of Nubians that had been mobilized. The exercise was a success as we vetted 84 Nubians (see attached letters). The committee received an appreciation letter from the Nubian community. The registration office has not received any other complaint or request from the Nubian forum or community apart from a complaint letter to the Cabinet Secretary's office of an applicant called Mariam whom we tracked down through the elders and now has an ID card.

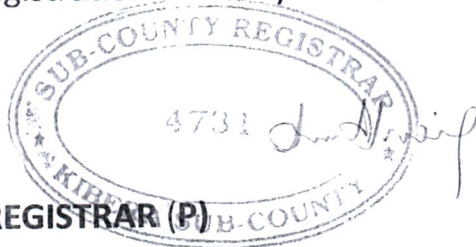
In the same letter they complained of being discriminated in that no vetting meetings were going on. This was when Covid-19 had set in, and no meetings were allowed to take place as per Ministry of Health guidelines. The office at this time had scaled down its services and which resumed 3 months later. In the same letter they complained about there being no DSIC vetting meetings. The meeting takes place and is on schedule. Applicants presenting themselves before the vetting committee get a detailed report from NIS. Usually these are over-age cases lacking key documents. Kindly note that no other complaints have been received from the Nubian community. Applicants seeking ID cards follow procedures and receive services without any problem.

A total of 1,450 Nubians have been registered since vetting was devolved to sub county level from the national level (Nyayo House) where applicants from border areas appeared before a provincial vetting committee. Please find attached:-

- (i) Lists of all vetting meetings in Kibra with dates and number of Nubians vetted and approved.
- (ii) Letter from the Nubian forum requesting for a mobile registration for the community.
- (iii) Letter of reply from Mr. Gekonde and me on complaints made against the registration office by the Nubian forum.

JUDGMENT OF THE COURT

1. By a plaint filed in the High Court, the respondents herein, suing on their own behalf, as well as on behalf of other 484 persons, sought Kshs. 100,000,000/= plus interest thereon as compensation for their eviction from Mbondoni Sub-Location, Makina Location in Mbeere District (suit land) by the Government which eviction was aimed to pave way for the construction of the Masinga dam.

2. Sometime in 1976, the Government compulsorily acquired the suit land which was a trust land for the ongoing hydro dam construction project by the appellant. Some of the 484 inhabitants represented by the respondents were resettled on other parcels of land. The appellant resolved to compensate all the inhabitants for the developments that had been carried on the suit land prior to the construction of the dam. To this end the District Agricultural Officers from the Ministry of Agriculture conducted assessments to establish the value of developments undertaken by each inhabitant. After the said assessment they compiled a report and forwarded the same to the appellant to be used as the basis for compensation. However, according to the appellant, the said assessment was not accurate because firstly, some developments on the suit land were undervalued or overvalued and secondly, it included assessment of developments on portions of the suit land that were not affected by the construction of the dam. Consequently, the appellant commissioned John Kuti, an independent surveyor who prepared another assessment report which formed the basis of compensation made by the appellant.

3. On 17th November, 1980 the appellant in liaison with the Provincial Administration paid out an estimated amount of Kshs. 2,000,000/= to some of the inhabitants. Disputes arose as some of the inhabitants claimed they were not compensated or that the developments that they had carried out on their respective plots had been undervalued. Subsequently, the appellant

formed a committee to handle the above mentioned complaints which according to the appellant led to the successful complainants being paid.

4. The respondents claimed that they were not fully compensated and that the estimated cost of developments undertaken on the suit land was Kshs. 200,000/= per person making a total of Kshs. 100,000,000/= being the compensation payable to the 484 inhabitants. Subsequently, after being granted leave to file suit out of time the respondents filed the above mentioned suit in the High Court in December, 2001.
5. The appellant in its defence averred that it had compensated all the inhabitants of the suit land that had been affected by the construction of the dam. It was the appellant's case that compensation was only for the developments that had been undertaken on the suit land. That the figure claimed by the respondents as compensation was unrealistic because the inhabitants had not carried out similar developments on the suit land. The appellant argued that the respondents had not proved that they were entitled to the amount they claimed as compensation. The appellant further averred that the respondents' suit was time barred, the cause of action having arisen in 1976; and that the trial court had the obligation to consider whether the *ex-parte* leave to file the suit out of time granted to the respondents was valid.
6. After hearing the matter, the High Court (Khaminwa, J.) on 1st October, 2009 entered judgment in favour of the respondents in the sum of Kshs.

96,800,000/= plus interest at the rate of 14% from the date of filing the suit until payment in full. It is against the said judgment that the appellant has filed this appeal based on the following grounds:-

- i. *The learned Judge erred in fact and in law in her judgment in awarding the plaintiffs' (respondent's herein) the amount of Kshs. 96,800,000/= when it was clear that the said amount was not supported by evidence.*
- ii. *The learned Judge misapprehended the law and erred in failing to consider the defendant's (appellant herein) arguments that the plaintiffs' special damages were not specifically pleaded nor were they strictly proved by evidence.*
- iii. *The learned Judge misdirected herself in holding that the plaintiffs' ex-parte application to file suit out of time was allowed and could not therefore be challenged at the trial despite the defendant having pleaded the defence of limitation of action and amply submitted on the same.*
- iv. *The learned Judge erred in law in failing to consider the defendant's submissions and authorities cited therein on the issue of whether the plaintiffs' suit was time barred as pleaded in the defence and other proceedings on the court record and as such came to a wrong conclusion in the judgment.*
- v. *The learned Judge erred in fact and in law, by totally disregarding and shutting out the defendant's evidence and as such occasioned injustice to the defendant.*
- vi. *The learned Judge erred in fact and misapprehended the law in holding that the defendant had a duty of producing documents in support of the plaintiffs' case and hence shifting the burden of proof.*

7. Mr. Okeyo, learned counsel for the appellant, submitted that the appellant pleaded in its defence that the respondents' suit which was filed in 2001 was time barred because the cause of action arose in 1976. In relying on this Court's decision in Divecon Limited –vs- Shirinkhanu Sadrudin Samnani – Civil Appeal No. 142 of 1997, he argued that notwithstanding the fact that the respondents were granted *ex parte* leave to file the suit out of time, the trial court had an obligation to consider if such leave was valid taking into account the provisions of the **Limitation of Actions Act**, Chapter 22, Laws of Kenya. He submitted that the reason given by the respondents for the delay in filing the suit as the ongoing negotiations with successive governments which did not fall under the ambit of granting leave to file suit out of time.
8. Mr. Okeyo argued that the figure pleaded in the Plaint of Kshs. 200,000/= being the alleged amount of loss suffered by each of the 484 inhabitants was not supported by any evidence. He submitted that respondents' evidence in respect of the value of the assessed developments in respect of PW1, Eliud Nthiwa, PW2, Musau Kambo, and PW3, David Munyao, was Kshs. 57,000/=, Kshs. 90,000/= and Kshs. 77,000/= respectively. He further argued that the total amount being claimed was in the nature of special damages which had not been strictly proved by the respondents. He also argued that the value of developments carried out by the inhabitants of the suit property could not have been uniform to justify the claim of Kshs.

200,000/= for each of them. He submitted the assessment report that the respondents' wished to rely on was rejected by the trial court because the same was not signed.

9. Mr. Okeyo submitted that not all the inhabitants of the suit land authorized the respondents to file the representative suit, arguing that nearly 70 people had not signed the authority filed in the High Court.

10. Mr. Mukunya, who appeared with Mr. Mutunga and Mr. Mutiso for the respondents, submitted that the appellant ignored all the procedures of compensation. He conceded that the figures tabled before the High Court as the assessed value of developments were estimates. In respect of the issue of the suit being time barred, Mr. Mukunya argued that the appellant's witness, Shenum Haran Njoroge, testified that the appellant made further compensation to the inhabitants and sent the report thereof to the District Commissioner in 1989. He argued negotiations in respect of compensation continued until 2000 and therefore the cause of action arose in the year 2000. He urged us to dismiss the appeal.

11. Being a first appeal, this Court has the duty of re-evaluating the evidence, assessing it and making its own conclusions without overlooking the conclusions of the trial court and also bearing in mind that unlike the trial court we neither saw nor heard the witnesses. See Selle -vs- Associated Motor Boat Company Ltd. [1968] EA 123. We have considered the record, the grounds of appeal, submissions by counsel and the law.

12. On the issue of whether the *ex parte* leave granted to the respondents to file the suit out of time, the learned Judge (Khaminwa, J.) held that since the said order was not challenged on appeal that the suit should proceed for hearing. By virtue of **Section 4(1)** of the **Limitation of Actions Act** the period within which the respondents' claim for compensation of the developments they had done on the suit land could be filed/commenced in court was limited to six years from the date that the cause of action arose. Therefore, based on the above set of circumstances when did the respondents' cause of action arise? We are of the considered view that the cause of action arose in 1976 when the inhabitants of the suit land were evicted to pave way for the construction of the dam. Therefore, we disagree with Mr. Mukunya's submissions that the cause of action arose when the negotiations failed in 2000.

13. The respondents' were granted leave to file the suit out of time under **Section 28(2)** of the **Limitation of Actions Act** which provides as follows:-

'28(2) where such an application is made before the commencement of a relevant action, the court shall grant leave in respect of any cause of action to which the application relates if, but only if, on evidence adduced by or on behalf of the plaintiff, it appears to the court that, if such an action were brought forthwith and the like evidence were adduced in that action, that evidence would be in the absence of any evidence to the contrary, be sufficient-

- (a) To establish that cause of action, apart from any defence under section 4(2); and*
- (b) To fulfill the requirements of section 27(2) in relation to that cause of action.'*

Section 27(2) of the **Limitation of Actions Act** provides,

' 27(2) The requirements of this subsection are fulfilled in relation to a cause of action if it is proved that material facts relating to that cause of action were or included facts of a decisive character which were at all times outside the knowledge (actual or constructive) of the plaintiff...' (Emphasis added).'

From the foregoing provisions it is clear that before the court granted the *ex parte* leave to the respondents to file the suit out of time it had to be satisfied that the material facts relating to the cause of action were not within their knowledge until after time limited for filing the suit had expired. In the instant case, the respondents' argued that the reason for the delay was due to the ongoing negotiations' between the parties. We agree with Mr. Okeyo that the aforesaid reason does not constitute material facts which were not within the knowledge of the respondents as envisaged under **Section 27(2)** of the **Limitation of Actions Act**.

14. Having expressed ourselves as above the next issue that falls for our consideration is whether the trial Judge had an obligation to consider whether the leave granted was valid and if so what was the extent of her jurisdiction over the same. In *Divecon Limited -vs- Shirinkhanu Sadrudin Samnani (supra)*, this Court held,

*' ..it would be convenient to now deal with the issue which had seemed settled, that a Judge can in a trial consider and accept or reject the *ex parte* order granted by any other Judge for extension of time under the Act. This Court in the case of *Yunes Oruta & another -vs-**

Samuel Nyamato Civil Appeal No. 96 of 1984 unanimously followed the English Court of Appeal decision in Cozens -vs- North Devon Hospital Management Committee & another(1966) 2 ALL E.R 799 where it was held by the majority, Lord Denning, M.R. and Dankwerts, L.J (Salmon, L.J dissenting) that:

“Although it was a general principle in regard to *ex parte* orders that the party affected by the order could apply for it to be discharged, yet it would be contrary to the intention of the Limitation Act of 1963 to allow a defendant to apply, before the trial of the action, to set aside an *ex parte* order obtained under section 2(1) giving leave for the purpose of section 1(1)(a).”

In *Oruta*, it was held that the issue of challenge to the granting of leave to file suit out of time, can only arise at the trial. Gachuhi, J.A in the leading judgment of this Court in *Oruta*, stated as follows:

“It will be up to the Judge presiding at the trial to decide the issue of limitation as one of the issues but not as a preliminary point. The raising of the preliminary issue that would cause the suit for the plaintiff to be struck out is not encouraged by the Limitation of Actions Act particularly where leave to file an action against the defendant has been granted *ex parte*”

We find that the learned Judge should have considered at the trial whether the *ex parte* order granting extension of time was valid or not.

15. We cannot help but note that the respondents' claim was in the nature of special damages which are required under the law to be specifically pleaded and strictly proved. In *Siree Limited -vs- Lake Turkana El Molo Lodges* (2002) 2E.A. 521 this Court stated that:-

“As regards the special damages awarded, this Court has said time and again that when damages can be calculated to a cent, then they cease to be general damages and must be claimed as special damages”.

See also the cases of Hahn-vs- Singh (1985) KLR 716 & James Mwangi -vs-Alex Njunguna & 2 Others- Civil Appeal No. 41 of 2007. In this case the respondents pleaded in the Plaint that all the 484 inhabitants were entitled to Kshs 200,000/= being compensation for the developments they did on the suit land. The respondents also particularized the losses suffered. However, there is no documentary evidence to support the respondents' claim that each inhabitant was entitled to Kshs. 200,000/=. The assessment reports that the respondents mentioned were also not produced in court. Furthermore, the four respondents only gave viva voce evidence as to what each was entitled to in terms of compensation and no documents in support of their claim were tendered. They also did not tender any evidence or documents as to what the rest of the inhabitants were entitled to. Therefore, we find that there was no evidence upon which the learned Judge could have arrived at Kshs. 96,800,000/= as being the amount of compensation the respondents were entitled to. We also find that the learned Judge misdirected herself in faulting the appellant for not producing the assessment reports which would have shed light to the actual entitlement of each inhabitant. In doing so the learned Judge shifted the burden of proof from the respondents who were the plaintiffs in the trial court to the appellant who was the defendant. In Central Bank of Kenya -vs-Martin King'ori-Civil Appeal No. 334 of 2002, this Court held,

'Surprisingly, the learned Judge then shifted the burden of proof on that claim to the bank which offered no evidence at the trial. With respect the bank had no onus of proof of the respondent's claim and the finding was therefore misdirection.'

16. The upshot of the foregoing is that we find that the respondents failed to prove their claim of Kshs. 100,000,000/= as being the compensation they were entitled to; and that the leave granted to the respondents' to file the suit out of time was not in accordance with **Section 27(2) of the Limitation of Actions Act**. Accordingly, we find that the appeal herein has merit and it is hereby allowed with costs to the appellant. The judgment of the High Court is hereby set aside.

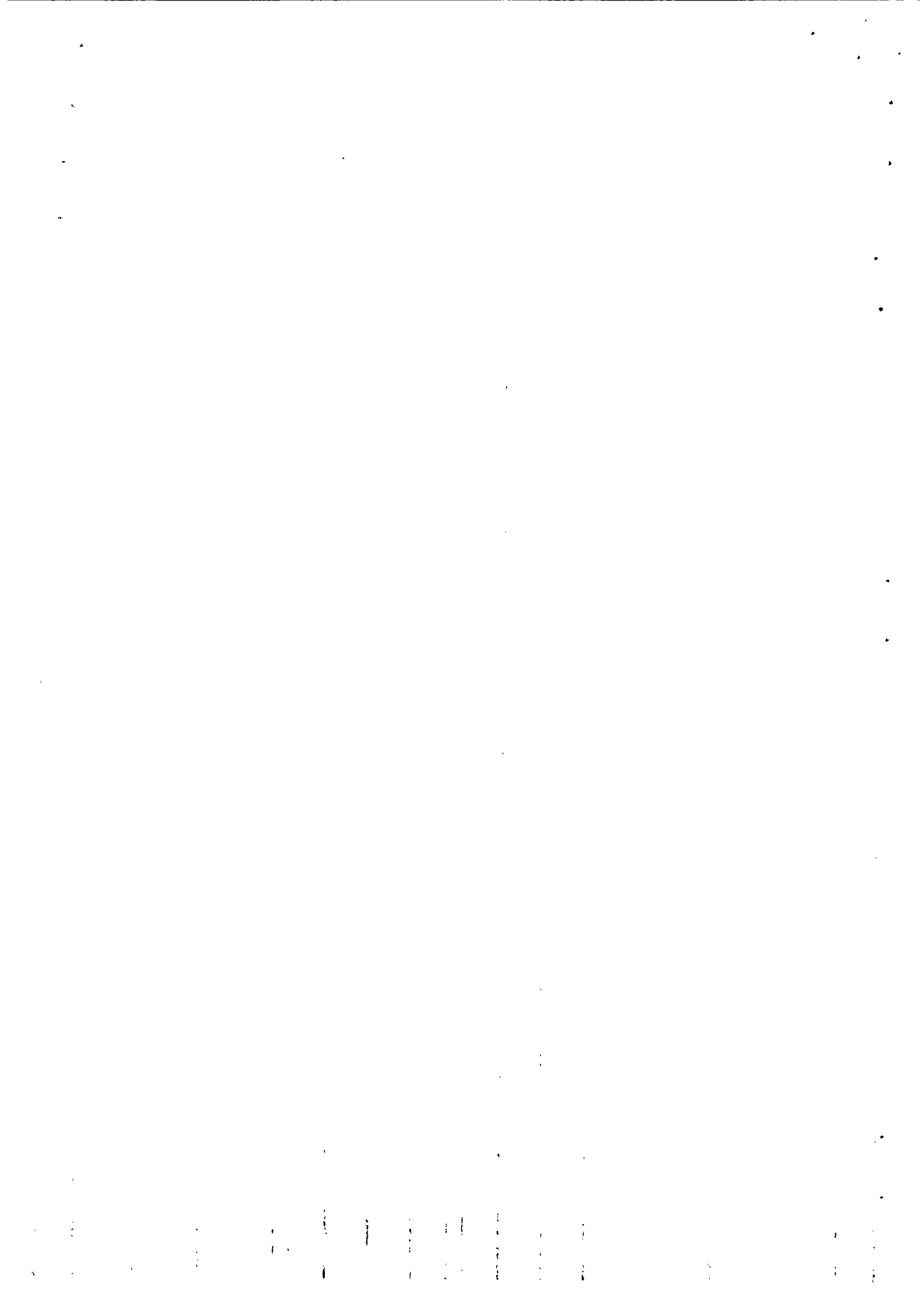



R U L I N G

The Judgment in this matter was rendered by Lady Justice Joyce Khaminwa on 1st day of October 2009. She found in favour of the plaintiffs and awarded them KShs.96,800,000/= plus interest at the rate of 14% from the date of filing suit until payment in full. As would be expected where such amounts of money is concerned, the defendant immediately moved to the Court of Appeal on appeal vide the Notice of Appeal dated 12th October, 2009.

Counsel for the defendant also moved to this court seeking orders of stay of execution pending the hearing and determination of the Appeal. I granted the said orders on condition that the defendant deposited KShs.10,000,000/= as security for the due performance of the decree as may ultimately be binding on it within twenty one (21) days of the date of the Ruling. The money was deposited late but the court with the consent of both counsel herein regularized the position by extending the twenty one (21) days period granted earlier on. Those stay orders are still in force to-date.

The plaintiffs were nonetheless not happy with the speed at which the defendant was pursuing the Appeal and so their counsel filed the Application dated 29th October 2010 under certificate of urgency. The Application was served on the Respondents and the same was heard *inter-partes* before me on 1st November, 2010. This now is the ruling in respect of the said application. The Ruling was scheduled for delivery on 16th February, 2010 but due to unforeseen circumstances, the same could not be delivered then.

Part of the delay was occasioned by the fact that I was assigned other duties outside this court's jurisdiction and to-date I have not gone back to my station. I do therefore, tender my apologies to the parties herein for the delay in preparing this Ruling.

The applicant is asking the court to lift the stay orders mentioned earlier; that the decree holder be allowed to proceed with the execution of the decree; and that the KShs.10,000,000/= deposited in court as security be released to the Decree Holder forthwith.

According to counsel for the Applicants, the "purported Notice of Appeal" which was served on him was incurably defective and failed to comply with the format provided for in Form D of the first schedule of Rule 74 of the Court of Appeal Rules. He has highlighted the "defects" in the said Notice of Appeal in paragraph 7 of his supporting affidavit.

He has also deposed that counsel for the Respondent had not facilitated the court to process the Appeal as he had not paid the requisite deposit for the typing of the superior court's proceedings. He maintained that there was

inordinate delay in prosecuting the Appeal on the part of counsel for the Respondent and the said delay had hindered the Decree Holders from enjoying the fruits of their judgment.

On its part, the Respondent through its Corporation Secretary denies any inordinate delay in the matter saying that they were waiting for the court proceedings to be typed before they could prosecute the intended Appeal. He also deposed that the averment that the Notice of Appeal was incurably defective could only be taken up before the Court of Appeal where the Appeal lies. He therefore, urged the court to dismiss the application.

Both counsel reiterated these averments in their oral submissions in court. Indeed counsel for the Respondents informed the court that he did not know that a deposit was necessary before the typing of the proceedings could commence. I must say that I am not sure what to make of this submission given that it is a standard and long standing practice in our courts that any party who applies for proceedings must pay a deposit before the typing of the proceedings can start. This in my view is meant to dissuade or discourage parties from requesting for proceedings and thereafter abandoning their quest leaving the court stuck with copies of proceedings that nobody will use or pay for. It is meant to gauge the seriousness of the party requesting for the same and also to avoid waste. It fosters expediency and good resource management of the limited resources in our registries and typing pools. It is not law but it is a good custom and practice. I do not understand how Mr. Okeyo could be unaware of such a settled practice. Be that as it may however, upon hearing Mr. Okeyo on that issue, I am satisfied that the non-payment of the said deposit was not meant to delay the processing of the Appeal. He appears to have acted in good faith albeit in ignorance. The depositing of the 10 million shillings in court did in my view show some

seriousness on their part. I have also noted and appreciated the contents of Annexure to the replying affidavit marked "J00/2" which is a reminder to the Deputy Registrar asking for proceedings and which has made reference to three (3) other reminders sent to the Deputy Registrar between 12th October, 2009 and 6th October, 2010. Maybe the Deputy Registrar should have responded to the first letter promptly and enlightened counsel on the fact that the typing of the proceedings could not commence without the requisite deposit. Had she done so, this issue of "inordinate delay" could not have arisen. The delay in processing the appeal has in my considered view been sufficiently explained and the same cannot singularly justify the lifting of the orders of stay in question.

Having said so, has this court been given any other convincing reasons as to why the said orders of stay should be vacated?

The only other reason advanced for the said prayers is that there is no competent Appeal before the Court of Appeal.

The format of the Notice of Appeal has been challenged. Do I have jurisdiction to make a determination as to whether the Notice of Appeal before the Court of Appeal is competent or not? I am convinced that I do not have such jurisdiction. Holding otherwise would mean that I have jurisdiction to strike out an Appeal that is before the Court of Appeal. The form and substance or lack of it in respect of a Notice of Appeal can only be challenged before the court that is seised of jurisdiction to hear and determine the substantive Appeal. I therefore find myself in agreement with counsel for the Respondent when he says that this court has no jurisdiction to determine issues of conformity with Rule 74 of the Court of Appeal Rules. The Applicant is definitely at liberty to challenge the said Notice of Appeal before the Court of Appeal.

As stated in my Ruling when granting the orders of stay herein, if execution is carried out and the money paid to the 484 applicants, it would be extremely difficult for the Respondent to reclaim that money in the event the Appeal succeeds. The Appeal would doubtlessly be rendered nugatory and this would amount to a travesty of justice for the Respondent. In sum, the scales of justice tilt in favour of the Defendant/Respondent herein. I decline to grant orders that seek the lifting the orders of stay granted earlier. I nonetheless entreat counsel for the Plaintiffs/Applicants to proceed with dispatch to process the Appeal in order to avoid any further unwarranted delay in this matter.

This Application is therefore dismissed with orders that costs herein do abide the outcome of the Appeal.

ADMINISTRATION: KENYAN NUBIAN CITIZENSHIP
RIGHTS**

1. INTRODUCTION

- The Nubian Community first came to Kenya at the turn of the 19th Century as Soldiers of the British colonizing army. These Soldiers served the British in both the first and second World War.
- Kibra was established as a military reserve in 1902 and later became a settlement for the Nubian Community in Nairobi.
- There are other minor Nubian settlement all over the country; these are **Mazeras in Kilifi county, Kibos, Kibigori in Kisumu, Eldama Ravine, Kisii and Mumias**. Others still smaller settlement are to be found in **Meru, Nanyuki, Bungoma and Isiolo**.

2. DEPRIVATION OF CITIZENSHIP

Despite having settled in Kibera more than 100 years and qualifying as Citizens under Kenyan Law, historically, **Kenyan Nubians throughout the country have not been recognized as citizens and treated as aliens, as a result of which** the citizenship status of many remain tenuous.

Nubian treatment as 'aliens' by the colonial authorities has been perpetuated since independence.

Nubians are discriminated against, in that they are required to go through a long and **complex vetting procedure to obtain ID card that is necessary for recognition of their citizenship and essential everyday left. Many face substantial delays in obtaining proof of their citizenship, or will never succeed in doing so, and are left essentially stateless.**

3. CONSEQUENCES OF DEPRIVATION OF CITIZENSHIP

The statelessness highlighted has had devastating social, economic and political impact on the Nubian Community in Kenya. The consequences includes but not limited to the following: Poor employment prospects, refusal to issue passports, failure to recognize, property rights, lack of income from property ownership, poor educational prospects, poor sanitation and health care amongst others.

4. MEASURES TAKEN BY THE COMMUNITY TO ADDRESS CITIZENSHIP DEPRIVATION

After decades of activism against citizenship deprivation locally without any tangible success, the Kenyan Nubian Council of Elders, on behalf of the Nubian community filed cases with the African Human and peoples rights court and African Committee of experts on the rights and welfare of the child. The cases were filed in 2003 and 2010 respectively.

5. DECISION OF THE AFRICAN COMMISSION ON HUMAN AND PEOPLE'S RIGHTS: COMMUNICATION NO. 317/2006

The Nubian Community in Kenya VS The Republic of Kenya.

- The African Commission on Human and People's rights found that the Kenya government had violated several articles of the African Charter on Human and People's rights touching on Citizenship rights, land rights and inhumane evictions of Kenyan Nubians and requested the Kenya government take appropriate remedial measures.
- The decision on citizenship is yet to be implemented by the government.

6. DECISION OF THE AFRICAN COMMITTEE OF EXPERTS ON THE RIGHTS AND WELFARE OF THE NUBIAN CHILD (Case No. 02/2020)

- The African Committee of Experts on the rights and welfare of the child found the Kenya government to have violated various articles of the African Charter on the rights and welfare of the Nubian child and requested the government to take urgent and remedial measures.
- The Government is yet to implement this decision.

7. THE ROLE OF THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY IN SECURING CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS OF THE NUBIAN COMMUNITY

The National Assembly is requested to take the following measures;

- Facilitate implementation of the decisions of the African Commission on Human and People's rights on Nubian citizenship and other rights.
- Review and amend various laws, policies and regulation impeding citizenship rights of the Nubians and in particular remove the requirement of VETTING OF COMMUNITY MEMBER.
- Champion the recognition of Nubians as one of the tribes of Kenya.
