CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

This report contains proceedings of the Departmental Committee on Health during the approval hearings of Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS, nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Medical Services and Dr. Josephine Njeri Mburu-Wahogo, nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management as requested by H.E. the President and communicated to the House by the Speaker on Thursday, 3rd November 2022.

Pursuant to Article 155(3)(b) of the Constitution, Section 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) and Standing Order 45(1), H.E. the President notified the National Assembly of the nomination of fifty-one principal secretaries to various State Departments vide a letter dated Wednesday, 2nd November 2022. The Hon Speaker vide a communication made on Thursday, 3rd November 2022 conveyed to the House the Message from H.E. the President and subsequently referred names of the nominees, their curricula vitae, and the Public Service Commission report on their recruitment to the Departmental Committee on Health for approval hearings. While referring the matter to the Committee, the Speaker directed that the Committee undertakes the vetting exercise within twenty-eight (28) days pursuant to Section 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Speaker further directed the Clerk of the National Assembly to notify the nominees and the general public by placing adverts in two newspapers of nationwide circulation and the Parliamentary Website of the time and place of holding the approval hearings by Friday, 4th November 2022.

In compliance with Article 118 (b) of the Constitution and section 6 (4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday, 4th November 2022 informing the public of the nomination, date, time and place of the approval hearing. He also invited the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (*affidavit*) on the suitability of the nominees in conformity with section 6 (9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The memoranda were to be received on or before Friday, 11th November 2022 at 5.00 p.m. (East African Time). At the close of the submission deadline, the Committee had not received any memorandum for or against the nominees' suitability.

The Clerk of the National Assembly also wrote to Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) seeking references and background checks relating to the suitability of the nominee.

The nominees appeared before the Committee on Monday, 14th November 2022 for vetting. The Committee examined their suitability based on the criteria set out in Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). In addition, the Committee examined their academic credentials, relevant experience, knowledge of sector issues and matters of leadership and integrity. The Committee paid due regard to the procedure used to arrive at the nominees; the constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question and suitability of the nominees for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominees' abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the respective State Departments.

Committee Observation and Recommendation

The Committee having held approval hearings of the nominees regarding their suitability, observed that due process was followed in the recruitment process as provided for under Article 155(3) (a) of the Constitution and the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval Act) (No. 33 of 2011). The Committee therefore recommends that the National Assembly **APPROVES** the nomination of Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS, nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Medical Services and Dr. Josephine Njeri Mburu-Wahogo, nominee for appointment as Principal Secretary, State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management.

The Committee registers its appreciation to the Office of the Speaker, the Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly, the Office of the Director, Departmental Committees and the Committee Secretariat for the logistical support extended during the vetting process.

In addition, the Committee thanks the nominees for their cooperation during the vetting process. Finally, the Committee appreciates KRA, EACC, DCI, HELB and ORPP for providing references and background checks relating to the suitability of the nominees.

CHAPTER ONE

1 PREFACE

1.1 Establishment and Mandate of the Committee

- 1) The Departmental Committee on Health is one of the twenty Departmental Committees of the National Assembly established under **Standing Order 216(5)** whose function pursuant to the **Standing Order 216 (5)** are as follows:
 - a) *To investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;*
 - b) *To study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;*
 - ba) *on a quarterly basis, monitor and report on the implementation of the national budget in respect of its mandate;*
 - c) *To study and review all legislation referred to it;*
 - d) *To study, assess and analyse the relative success of the ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;*
 - e) *To investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;*
 - f) *Vet and report on all appointments where the constitution or any other law requires the national Assembly to approve, except those understanding Order 204 (Committee on appointments);*
 - g) *To examine treaties, agreements and conventions;*
 - h) *To make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;*
 - i) *To consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and*
 - j) *To examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.*

1.2 Subjects under the Committee

- 2) In accordance with the Second Schedule of the Standing Orders, the Committee is mandated to consider matters of Health, Medical care and health insurance including universal health coverage.
- 3) In executing its mandate, the Committee oversees the Ministry of Health.

CHAPTER TWO

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2.1 Legal Framework

6) Article 155 of the Constitution provides that:

155. (1) There is established the office of Principal Secretary, which is an office in the public service.

(2) Each State department shall be under the administration of a Principal Secretary.

(3) The President shall—

(a) nominate a person for appointment as Principal Secretary from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission; and

(b) with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries.

(4) The President may re-assign a Principal Secretary.

(5) A Principal Secretary may resign from office by giving notice, in writing, to the President.

7) In light of this, H.E. the President nominated fifty-one (51) persons for appointment as Principal Secretaries to various State Departments. The President nominated the following persons for appointment as Principal Secretaries for State Departments of Medical Services and Health Standards and Professional Management:

(i) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS: Nominee for Principal Secretary, Medical Services; and

(ii) Dr. Josephine Njeri Mburu-Wahogo: Nominee for Principal Secretary, Health Standards and Professional Management

8) The Departmental Committee on Health has been assigned the role of conducting the vetting of the aforesaid nominees.

9) The following Articles of the Constitution and statues were paramount to the Committee as it executed this mandate:

(i) Article 10 of the Constitution on the national values and principles of governance;

(ii) Article 77 of the Constitution on membership to political parties;

(iii) Article 78 of the Constitution on dual citizenship;

(iv) Article 232 of the Constitution on values and principles of public service;

(v) Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;

(vi) The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011);

(vii) The Leadership and Integrity Act (No. 19 of 2012);

(viii) The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act (No. 1A of 2015); and

(ix) The Public Officer Ethics Act (No. 4 of 2003).

The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011)

10) Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), provides for issues which the relevant House of Parliament (in this case, the National Assembly) is supposed to consider in relation to any nomination. The issues are:

(i) *the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;*

(ii) *any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and*

(iii) the suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which nomination is being made.

- 11) Although the Constitution does not specifically provide for the qualifications for appointment (or nomination) of a Principal Secretary, the schedule to the PAPAA provides for the criteria to guide the Committee. The criteria includes:
- (i) Education, employment record;
 - (ii) Public office, political activities and affiliations;
 - (iii) Deferred income or future benefits;
 - (iv) Sources of income, tax status, statement of net worth;
 - (v) Potential conflicts of interest;
 - (vi) Pro bono or charity work;
 - (vii) Whether the nominee has been charged in a court of law or convicted;
 - (viii) Adverse mention in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission.
- 12) During the approval hearing, section 6 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) provides important points, viz:
- (i) An approval hearing shall focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and background (section 6(7), PAPAA);
 - (ii) The criteria specified in the Schedule shall be used by a Committee during an approval hearing for the purposes of vetting a candidate (section 6(8), PAPAA);
 - (iii) Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated (section 6(9), PAPAA); and
 - (iv) A candidate may, at any time, by notice in writing addressed to the Clerk, withdraw from the approval process and the candidate's nomination shall end (section 6(10), PAPAA).

Chapter 6 of the Constitution (Leadership and Integrity)

- 13) There are important provisions in Chapter 6 of the Constitution worth pointing out. Article 73 of the Constitution provides that the authority assigned to a State officer (a Principal Secretary being a state officer under Article 260 of the Constitution) is a public trust to be exercised in accordance to the Constitution; and in a manner that demonstrates respect for the people, brings honour to the nation and dignity to the office and promotes public confidence in the integrity of the office. A State officer shall also have the responsibility to serve the people, rather than the power to rule them.
- 14) The guiding principles of leadership and integrity are listed as: selection based on personal integrity, competence and suitability; objectivity and impartiality in decision making; selfless service based solely on public interest; accountability to the public for decisions and actions; and discipline and commitment in service to the people.

The Leadership and Integrity Act (No. 19 of 2012);

- 15) The Leadership and Integrity Act provides a number of obligations for State officers. These include: to respect and abide by the Constitution and the law, public trust, performance of duties in an honest and accountable manner, professionalism, financial integrity, not to engage in activities that amount to abuse of office, not to misuse public resources, not accepting gifts

that may compromise the officer's duties, wrongful or unlawful acquisition of property, conflict of interest etc.

Article 232 of the Constitution on Values and Principles of Public Service

16) Article 232 of the Constitution provides for the values and principles of public service which include high standards of professional ethics; efficient, effective and economic use of resources; responsive, prompt, effective, impartial and equitable provision of services; involvement of the people in the process of policy making; accountability for administrative acts; transparency and provision to the public of timely, accurate information; fair competition and merit as the basis of appointments and promotions; representation of Kenya's diverse communities; and affording adequate and equal opportunities for appointment, training and advancement, at all levels of the public service of men and women, the members of all ethnic groups and persons with disabilities.

Article 10(2) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance

17) Article 10(2) of the Constitution provides for the national values and principles of governance which include patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people; human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalised; good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and sustainable development.

The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act (No. 1A of 2015)

18) Section 5 of the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act provides that a public officer shall maintain high standards of professional ethics, including, being honest; displaying high standards of integrity, transparency, accountability, respect to others, objectivity, patriotism, observance of rule of law. (Applies in future upon appointment)

The Public Officer Ethics Act (No. 4 of 2003).

19) The Public Officer Ethics Act provides for certain obligations to be observed by a public officer. These include professionalism, carrying out duties in accordance with the law, prohibition from unjust enrichment, avoiding conflict of interest, not using the public office as a venue for soliciting or collecting harambees; not acting for foreigners; care of property; political neutrality, not practicing nepotism or favouritism, giving impartial advice, conducting private affairs in a way that maintains public confidence, prohibition from sexual harassment, submission of declaration of income, assets and liabilities once every two years (section 26). (This applies in future after appointment)

2.2 Qualifications for appointment as Principal Secretary

20) In conducting the Approval hearing, the Committee was guided by Article 155 (3) (b) of the Constitution, section 47 of the Public Service Commission Act (No. 10 of 2017) and Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011).

2.3 Message from H.E. the President

21) H.E. the President on **2nd November 2022** communicated the names of the nominees for appointment to the positions of Principal Secretaries, Medical Services and Health Standards and Professional Management to the Speaker for approval by the National Assembly pursuant to Article 155 (3). The Speaker in his communication from the Chair issued on **Tuesday, 3rd November 2022** and pursuant to Standing Order 42 referred the names to the Departmental Committee on Health to conduct approval hearings and report within twenty-eight (28) days.

2.4 Speaker's Communication and Committal to the Committee

- 22) Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 42, the Speaker of the National Assembly on **Tuesday, 3rd November 2022** communicated to the House the message from H.E. the President regarding the nominees for appointment as Principal Secretaries for various State Departments. The Speaker informed the House that H.E. the President was seeking approval of the National Assembly on the said nominations before the nominees' appointment.
- 23) In accordance with Standing Order 45(1), the Speaker read the Message from H.E. the President and referred the names of the nominees, their curricula vitae and report of the Selection Panel on the recruitment process to the Departmental Committee on Health to conduct approval hearings.
- 24) While referring the matter to the Committee, the Speaker directed that the Committee undertakes the vetting exercise within twenty-eight (28) days pursuant to Section 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Speaker further directed the Clerk of the National Assembly to notify the nominees and the general public by placing adverts in two newspapers of nationwide circulation and the Parliamentary Website of the time and place of holding the approval hearings by Friday, 4th November 2022.
- 25) In addition, the Speaker directed that approval hearings should commence on Monday, 14th November 2022 and end on Friday, 18th November 2022. Thereafter, the reports should be tabled in the House not later than Tuesday, 22nd November 2022 so as to enable the House to consider the reports within the statutory timelines.

2.5 Notification to the Public

- 26) Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), provides that *"any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated"*.
- 27) The Clerk of the National Assembly on **Friday, 4th November 2022** placed a notification in the print media informing the general public of the intention of the Committee to conduct approval hearings, as provided for by Article 118 (1) and (2) of the Constitution and Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), which allows public participation in committee proceedings. The notification gave provision for the submission of memoranda, by way of written statements on oath (*affidavit*) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominees, by **Friday, 11th November 2022 at 5.00 pm (East African Time)**. At the close of the submission deadline, the Committee had not received any memorandum for or against the suitability of the nominees.

2.6 Notification to the Nominee

- 28) The Clerk of the National Assembly vide an advert placed in the print media on Friday, 4th November 2022 and letters Ref. NA/DDC/DC-H/VETT/2022/001 and Ref. NA/DDC/A&L/VETT/2022/002 informed the nominees of the nomination by H.E. the President and requested them to appear for vetting by the Departmental Committee on Health on **Monday, 14th November 2022** in Committee Room 9, Main Parliament Buildings. The Clerk of the National Assembly further requested the nominees to come with their clearance certificates from the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board

(HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP).

2.7 Clearance Requirements

- 29) The Clerk of the National Assembly wrote to the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) requesting for tax, education loans, integrity, affiliation to political parties and criminal record status of the nominees. The following institutions wrote back to the National Assembly clearing the nominees, KRA (letter Ref. KRA/5/1002/5(8179) dated 14th November, 2022); DCI (letter Ref. DCI/CRO/SEC/6/7/2/A/VOL.XI/208 dated 10th November 2022); EACC (Letter Ref: EACC.7/10/5 VOL XXI (70) dated 11th November, 2022); ORPP (Letter Ref: RPP/ORG/34 VOL.VI (41) dated 10th November, 2022 and HELB (letter Ref. HELB/RR/112009/190 dated 10th November, 2022).

2.8 Report of the Selection Panel on the Nomination of Principal Secretaries

- 30) Pursuant to Article 155 (3) (a) of the Constitution, the Public Service Commission invited applications from suitably qualified persons for the position of Principal Secretary. The advertisement was published in the print media, Kenya Gazette No. 10536 and on the Public Service Commission's Website on 7th September 2022 with a closing date of 20th September 2022.
- 31) On 20th September 2022, the Commission extended the advertisement period by seven (7) days. The advertisement period lapsed on 27th September 2022 with a total of nine thousand one hundred and fifty-four (9,154) persons submitting applications for consideration.
- 32) Four hundred and seventy-seven (477) candidates were shortlisted from 3rd to 6th October 2022 and a further review done on 7th October 2022 to bring the shortlist to five hundred and eighty-five (585) candidates so as to cater for gender, marginalised/minority groups and PWDs pursuant to Article 232 (1) (h) of the Constitution. Interviews for the shortlisted persons were conducted from 12th to 22nd October 2022.
- 33) The Public Service Commission adhered to all the provisions of the Constitution in the process of advertising, shortlisting and interviewing the candidates including, merit, gender, ethnic and regional balance.

2.9 Committee proceedings

- 34) The Committee having received the names of the nominees was obligated to conduct approval hearings and make determination of the nominees' suitability or otherwise within twenty-eight (28) days as provided for in section 8 (1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011).
- 35) The Committee held seven (7) sittings during which it examined and reviewed the nominees' certificates, testimonials as well as conducted approval hearings.
- 36) The Committee set out to prepare its report after the approval hearing, but the same was stopped via a communication from the Speaker dated 6th November 2022 following a Constitutional Petition No. E186 of 2022 (Dr. Magare Gikenyi versus the President of the

Republic of Kenya and 55 others) and in Constitutional petition No. E 192 of 2022 (Law Society of Kenya versus the National Assembly and 4 others) where conservatory orders temporarily staying the vetting process pending inter-parte hearings were granted.

- 37) The court on 29th November, 2022 dismissed the consolidated petitions for being prematurely before the Court. The court upheld the argument by the respondent in their preliminary objection that there was need for the petitioners to exhaust all statutory mechanisms and that the doctrine of separation of powers should have been considered.
- 38) The Speaker in a communication directed the Committees to revert to the vetting process from Wednesday, 22nd November 2022, and conclude the process as soon as possible.

CHAPTER THREE

APPROVAL HEARINGS

- 39) The Committee held its first meeting to consider this subject matter on 8th November, 2022 at 10:00 am, where it considered its rules of procedure during the exercise and agreed on a framework for the approval hearing. The Committee was in this process guided by the relevant provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act and the National Assembly Standing Orders. In the same meeting, the Committee invited both nominees to appear before it on 14th November, 2022 as scheduled and communicated. The Committee held a subsequent meeting on Wednesday, 16th November, 2022 to draft, and consider its Report. The Report of the Committee contains its recommendation based on the information gathered during the course of the vetting and approval hearing of the Nominees.
- 40) The Committee conducted approval hearings for the nominees on **Monday, 14th November 2022**. In conducting the vetting exercise, the Committee was guided by, among other documents, the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Public Service Commission Act and the National Assembly Standing Orders. Thereafter the Committee proceeded to consider the submissions of the nominees and analyzed documents received from the Nominees, Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum and Dr. Josephine Njeri Mburu-Wahogo, the Nominees for the position of Principal Secretaries for Medical Services and Health Standards and Professional Management in the Ministry of Health respectively.
- 41) The Committee examined the nominees using the guidelines provided in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Committee also considered the following in vetting the nominees:
- (i) Academic qualifications
 - (ii) Employment record and work experience
 - (iii) Professional association
 - (iv) Public office, political activities and affiliations
 - (v) Potential conflict of interest
 - (vi) Suitability to the position
 - (vii) Tax compliance
 - (viii) Vision and leadership
 - (ix) Integrity
 - (x) Expectations and key priorities.

3.1 ENG. PETER KIPLAGAT TUM, CBS

42) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS was orally interviewed by the Committee and responded to questions on various issues during vetting as follows:

3.1.1 Personal Background

43) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 3276913 and was born in Nandi County in 1962.

3.1.2 Educational Background

44) Eng. Tum, holds a Master of Science in Energy Management from the University of Nairobi (2009-2013), a Degree in Industrial Technology from Egerton University (2004-2006), a Post-Graduate Diploma in Medical Electronics and Medical Equipment Management from the University of London (1996-1997), a Higher Diploma with full technological certificates in Electrical Installation from Kenya Polytechnic (now Technical University of Kenya) (1985-1987) and several professional certifications gained locally and abroad. He received his Advanced Certificate of Education, (A' Level) from Chavakali High School and Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education (KCSE) from Kameloi Secondary School (1981-1982).

45) In addition he presented several professional certifications gained locally and abroad. He stated that he undertook a Strategic Leadership Development Programme (SLDP) at the Kenya School of Government, Performance Appraisal Course offered by the Directorate of Personnel Management, Leadership and Development Programme facilitated by MSH USAID, Implementation of Quality Management Systems (ISO 9001-2000) offered by THE Kenya Bureau of Standards, Training of Trainers (T.O.T) course on Anti-Corruption by the Kenya Anti-Corruption Commission and Application of Informatics in Health Care Technology at the Medical Research Council in Cape Town South Africa among others. Copies of all academic and professional certifications that Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum presented to the Committee are herein annexed as **(Annex)**

3.1.3 Work Experience/Career Progression

46) Eng. Tum indicated that he was a member of several committees in his professional capacity, among them the Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) College Quality Assurance committee, the Disciplinary Committee, the Examination Board, the Anti-Corruption Committee, the Tender Committee where he served as Vice-Chairperson and; Vice-Chairperson of the Association of Medical Engineering of Kenya.

47) In relation to his experience, Mr. Tum submitted that, he was a long-serving public servant with more than 15 years' of experience in leadership and management within the Public Service. He indicated that he joined the public service in 1990 as a Medical Engineering Technologist and meticulously rose through the ranks in the same ministry to his current position as the Principal Secretary, Ministry of Labour. He also served as the Principal Secretary, Ministry of Health from 2nd March 2018 to 4th March 2019, the Chief Executive Officer of the KMTC from November 2015 to March 2018. He also worked as the Principal of the Nauru KMTC from 2010 to April 2015, Head of Department (Medical Engineering) from 2000 to 2011 and Head of Maintenance Unit at the Mbagathi Hospital in 1992 to 1997. Eng. Tum exuded confidence that this steady experience and being an informed insider positions him as the right person with the grasp and understanding of the operations and management of the Ministry of Health and the health sector in general.

3.1.4 Professional Associations and Affiliations

- 48) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum chaired and is a member of several Committees in his professional capacity. He is a registered Engineer with a good grasp of how government works and understands the functions of government.
- 49) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS, is professionally affiliated with the Association of Medical Engineering of Kenya (AMEK) from November, 2002 where he became the Vice-Chairperson from 2002 to 2004.

3.1.5 Honors and Awards

- 50) Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum has received two state commendations namely the Chief of the Order of the Burning Spear (CBS) on 12th December, 2021 and Order of the Grand Warrior (OGW) on 12th December, 2016.

3.1.6 Clearance Requirements

- 51) The Committee confirmed that the nominee had been cleared by KRA, ORPP, DCI, EACC and HELB, having obtained clearance certificates to that effect.
- 52) The nominee submitted to the Committee all the documents required as per the letter sent by the Clerk of the National Assembly (*annex*) and a duly filled vetting questionnaire. The Committee was satisfied that the Nominee had complied with and acquired the clearances required from Kenya Revenue Authority, the Directorate of Criminal Investigations, the Higher Education Loans Board, the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties. The Nominee further submitted, and was also evident from the documents he submitted that he had not been charged in a court of law nor convicted, neither was he adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission. The Nominee further submitted originals of his national identity card and his passport to proof his Kenyan citizenship. He further indicated that held no other citizenship.

Potential Conflict of Interest

- 53) Eng. Tum indicated that, he had no family members or other persons, parties, categories obligations or financial arrangements that are likely to present potential conflicts of interest if he assumed the position of Principal Secretary. He added that he will avoid entering into situations where his actions might create a conflict, whether actual, potential or perceived, without disclosing such information. He added that in situations where there may be a reasonably perceived conflict of interest he would appoint an independent third party to oversee the integrity of the process.

3.1.7 Other Issues under Consideration

- 54) To examine suitability or otherwise of the Nominee, the Committee posed several questions to the Nominee on his knowledge in the health sector. The Nominee answered as follows-

Public trust and why he accepted the nomination

- 55) The Nominee indicated that, he was a person of integrity and he abhors corruption. He further stated that he has held the position of Principal Secretary before and no allegations of improprieties have been levelled against him.

On how the nominee was going to reduce the gap between the services provided in private health facilities and services provided in public facilities

56) The Nominee admitted that the system of provision of health care services in public facilities was deplorable. He further stated that the county was yet to meet the WHO Standards. He indicated that he would commence by getting the right personnel, ensuring that the health information and technology was working and responsive to the needs of the citizens and also leverage on the financing from NHIF in accordance with the manifesto of Kenya Kwanza.

On how he was going to restore public confidence in the health sector especially after the apparent failure of certain initiatives after billions of public money were invested in some ventures such as the purchase of the Managed Equipment Services

57) The Nominee stated that the Managed Equipment Services was a good idea. He further indicated that before the signing of any new contract, he will review the existing contract and seek legal advice from the Office of the Attorney General on the same.

On the specific skills, experience and attributes he was bringing to the docket

58) In response, the Nominee stated that he had over 30 years' experience in public service, and has encountered challenges that have strengthened him to tirelessly serve the nation. He also stated that, he had the tenacity and mind to see things and put teams together that would deliver on public services.

On responsiveness to oversight institutions and on the doctrine of separation of powers, the nominee was asked how he was going to deal with oversight institutions.

59) In his response, the Nominee stated that, he had a clear understanding of the doctrine of separation of powers and each distinct arm of government had its functions and roles which to a certain extent were complimentary. He also indicated that he would honour parliamentary summons at all times as he understood the parliamentary oversight role over his Ministry.

On handling human resource in the health sector, and on devolution which has turned the medical practice into tribal cocoons.

60) He confirmed this problem exists and was an operational problem that he was going to work with all stakeholders including the county governments to address the same.

On his role in improving health care in remote areas.

61) In his response, the Nominee noted that health care financing was discriminatory in nature and indigents are not able to afford medical care. He stated that he was going to ensure that money ring-fenced to healthcare services will reach the intended areas and further ensure that funds should be used to carry out the relevant function that it had been allocated to.

On manufacturing of medicines and medical equipment

62) The Nominee indicated that he will promote the manufacturing of medical equipment and other healthcare products within the country by providing the enabling environment for investors for instance by offering tax rebates and the necessary infrastructure. He will also ensure cost effectiveness of the products so that the industry will create jobs and contribute to the achievement of the Big Four Agenda.

On Universal Health Coverage (UHC)

63) He expressed confidence that he will provide the leadership, managerial and technical stewardship to deliver 100% coverage for all households. He stated that for UHC to be successfully implemented, three important components namely human resource, accessibility

and financing must be decisively and comprehensively addressed. He will strive to achieve the same by doing the following:

- (i) Assembling a competent and passionate team that will work closely under him to coordinate, guide and implement all the identified projects and programmes necessary to meet the objective
- (ii) Deliberately seeking to broaden the engagement and collaboration between the Ministry, Parliament and the County Governments to move faster and together
- (iii) Carrying out comprehensive skills audit especially of medical doctors so as to identify the existing skills gaps and optimize the existing pool of skills through an elaborate and equitable distribution mechanism aimed at improving the current 0.9 doctors to 1000 patients ratio
- (iv) Initiating and accelerating the necessary reforms in NHIF so as to provide a strong foundation for the implementation of UHC by delivering a minimum package especially for the vulnerable, poor, the elderly and the young.
- (v) Enhancing the efficiency of commodity supplies by reforming and improving the capacity of the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency (KEMSA)
- (vi) Seeking to enhance resource allocation to critical institutions like Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) so that it has both the human and financial capacity to deliver cutting-edge research on emerging diseases. He added that there was need for KEMRI to be physically present in all the 47 counties.
- (vii) Working closely with development partners to maximize their support
- (viii) Leveraging on Information Communication Technology (ICT) to ensure that the service delivery and disease surveillance are synchronized throughout the country.

On Human Resources within the Health Sector

64) The Nominee indicated that having been at the helm of the Kenya Medical Training College, he understood this issue well and responded as follows-

- (i) The health function is majorly a devolved function. This invites the National and County governments to develop a mechanism of ensuring that there is structured communication between the two levels
- (ii) Human Resources for Health (HRH) should be a national government function, this is necessitated by the fact that training, skills matching, equitable distribution of personnel and emerging health issues will be better handled and managed from a centralized and coordinated point. In addition, commodity movement and health financing should be an exclusive function of the national government
- (iii) It is clear that industrial action in the sector has become a national government problem although county governments exclusively employ doctors and nurses. Honest conversations should be held with County Governments and mitigating mechanisms developed to assuage their fears about re-assigning some of the health functions to the national government.
- (iv) There is need to train and employ more community health workers. Experience has shown that these community health workers fit very well within the communities they come from especially in the rural areas.
- (v) More incentives should be given to nurses so as to motivate them.

On Vision and Leadership

- 65) The Nominee indicated that his main goals and vision which he wishes to be remembered for is to deliver Universal Health Coverage within the next five years by closely working with Ministry officials, the Departmental Committee on Health and the County Governments to ensure the delivered UHC packages are accessible at the lowest units of administration in the country. He further intends to provide managerial and technical leadership at Afya House and get rid of the cartels alleged to be existing at Afya House.

3.2 DR. JOSAPHINE NJERI MBURU-WAHOGO

66) Dr. Josephine was orally interviewed by the Committee and responded to questions during vetting as follows:

3.2.1 Personal Background

67) Dr. Josephine Mburu is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 8473145 and was born in Thika in Kiambu County in 1967.

3.2.2 Educational Background

68) Dr. Josephine Mburu is a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in Public Health from Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT) (2010-2020). She holds a Master of Public Health (MPH) from Kenyatta University College with a Major in Epidemiology and a Minor in Health Services Management (Project Management) (2003-2009). She also has a Higher National Diploma in Microbiology from Kenya Medical Training College-Nairobi obtained in 2002, a Diploma in Medical Lab Sciences from Kenya Medical Training college-Nairobi obtained in 1996-1999 and a Certificate in Medical Lab Sciences from Kenya Medical Training College-Kakamega obtained in 1986-1988. she sat for her 'A' level examinations at Mary hill High School in 1985 and 'O' level examinations at St. Francis Primary School in 1981.

3.2.3 Work experience/career progression

69) Dr. Josephine Mburu is currently a lecturer at Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC), Nairobi and serves as a practical instructor in the clinical area during rotation and also conducts and assesses students' areas in research. She has also worked in the following capacities. As the Acting Head of National Public Health Labs (MOH) from April 2021 to August 2021, the Head of Microbiology Unit (National TB Lab, Public Health Bacteriology and Oncology) from December 2016 to February 2021, the Head of the National Tuberculosis Reference Laboratory Unit from October 2013 to November 2016, the Acting Chief Medical Laboratory Technologists from 2012 to 2013, the Deputy Chief Medical Laboratory Technologist from 2011 to 2012, the Head/Manager at the Central Reference TB Laboratory (National Public Health Labs) from 2006 to 2011, the Deputy Lab in charge-Quality Control Bacteriology (National Public Health Labs) from 2000 to 2005. She has also worked at the Microbiology Department (National Public Health Labs) from 1994 to 1999, the Kiambu District Hospital Integrated Laboratory from 1992 to 1994 and the Gatundu District Hospital Integrated Laboratory from 1988 to 1992.

3.2.4 Professional Associations & Affiliations

70) Dr. Josephine Mburu is affiliated to the Association of Kenya Medical Laboratory Scientific Officers.

3.2.5 Honors and Awards

71) Dr. Josephine Mburu has not received any awards.

3.2.6 Clearance Requirements

72) The Committee confirmed that the Nominee had been cleared by KRA, ORPP, DCI, EACC and HELB, having obtained clearance certificates to that effect.

The Nominee submitted to the Committee all the documents required as per the letter sent by the Clerk of the National Assembly (*annex*) and a duly filled vetting questionnaire. The Committee was satisfied that the Nominee had complied with and acquired the clearances

required from Kenya Revenue Authority, Directorate of Criminal Investigations, Higher Education Loans Board, Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission and the Office of the Registrar of political parties. The Nominee further submitted, and was also evident from the document she submitted, that she had not been charged in a court of law nor convicted, neither was she adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission. The Nominee further submitted originals of her national identity card to prove her Kenyan citizenship and indicated that she holds no other citizenship.

3.2.7 Other issues under consideration

73) To determine her suitability, the Committee asked the Nominee the following oral questions in the following thematic areas:

Potential Conflict of Interest

74) The Nominee stated that she has no immediate associations that are likely to present potential conflict of interest should she assume the position of the Principal Secretary in the State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management.

Integrity

75) The Nominee has neither been charged in a court of law nor mentioned in any investigatory reports of Parliament. She has also never been dismissed or otherwise removed from office.

Suitability to the position

76) The Nominee was asked what made her accept the nomination as Principal Secretary in the State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management to which she stated that, it is her greatest honour to serve her country in this capacity and that she has the necessary qualification and experience which will enable her to serve the country.

On leveraging on her experience or training in running the State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management

77) The Nominee explained that her training and experience in the health sector for 34 years since 1988 will enable her identify the challenges and gaps in health system and enable her to find solutions to these gaps. She also added that her training will enable her to perform her duties effectively with the support of the technical officers at the State Department.

On adherence to the Hippocratic Oath by medical practitioners/ Restoration of public confidence in doctors and nurses serving in public hospitals in light of the many cases of medical negligence and the fact that unprofessional doctors and nurses are never held accountable

78) The Nominee indicated that there is need to examine all the processes and structures in the health system. She further mentioned that she will ensure good referral systems and conduct public participation in all decisions that the State Department will make.

She added that she will work closely with her counterpart in the State Department of Medical Services in dealing with issues of medical negligence.

On patient complaints over high hospital bills owing to the taxation of hospital equipment some of which had been exempted from taxation by the Finance Bill, 2021

79) On issues of taxation of medical equipment, the Nominee said that she will have to consult with the higher levels of the government on this matter

On regulation of all practitioners in the health sector

- 80) The Nominee stated that there are forty-two (42) Cadres of practitioners and professionals in the health sector out of which only ten (10) are regulated. She will ensure that everyone working in these health cadres will be registered by the relevant regulatory bodies. She will also ensure that cadres with similar functions are merged to prevent duplicity of roles.

On effect of trends in technology on the provision of health services as the use of technology is largely unregulated e.g. the operation of eye machines in establishments selling eye glasses The Nominee stated that such issues have been rife in the public domain and that Regulations should be developed to regulate such establishments. She emphasized that it is important to regulate all practitioners in the health sector through policy guidelines and standard operating procedures which must then be implemented.

On mitigation of strikes by health workers which have a severe effect in developing nations such as Kenya

- 81) The Nominee explained that strikes are mainly as a result of salaries dispute which she will address in collaboration with the Salaries and Remuneration Commission (SRC). She also noted that strikes are also caused by poor work environments, nepotism and delayed promotions that causes conflicts and lowers the morale of healthcare workers. She will further ensure harmonization of the functions of different health workers across the Board which will address some of the root causes of the strikes.

On implementation of policies and standards set by the Ministry of Health at the grass roots

- 82) She acknowledged that the issue of implementation of standards and policies has been bothering her since she was nominated as the Principal Secretary in the State Department of Health Standards and Professional Management. She stated that health functions were devolved but the services were not and hence she will conduct extensive stakeholder consultation so as to come up with an acceptable formula that will enable the effective implementation of health policies and standards to the lowest levels in the country. She also acknowledged that the National Assembly Departmental Committee on Health will be of great importance to help her in the formulation and implementation of the necessary legislation.

On understanding of the role of knowledge management in the health sector

- 83) The Nominee explained that knowledge management in the health sector entailed the sharing of knowledge with different teams through interaction and exchange of knowledge and best practices.

On understandings of the provisions of the Health Act, 2017

- 84) The Nominee stated that the Health Act provides for a governance structure that is assigned clear roles and responsibilities. She explained that there are several regulations which are under consideration to holistically operationalize the Health Act. The Health Act also allows for the merging of all the regulatory bodies into one so as to consolidate the numerous pieces of legislations that exist in the sector.

On improving interaction between the State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management and Parliamentary Committees in the execution of Parliament's constitutional role of representation, oversight and legislation on behalf of the people of Kenya

- 85) The Nominee indicated that she intends to improve her interactions with Parliamentary Committees by having a seamless working relationship with them and will be engaging

Parliament at every level of policy formulation and in any other area where she will require parliamentary intervention.

On ownership of private facilities by health workers employed in the public sector; Referral of patients seen at public hospitals to the doctor's private facilities

86) The Nominee stated that she will discourage health workers from setting up facilities near the public premises where they are working.

On vision and leadership

87) The Nominee stated that she will implement the Kenya Kwanza vision on health care and ensure that, there is integrity and honesty in the State Department and that her main goals and vision which she wishes to be remembered for is to deliver Universal Health Coverage within the next five years by closely working with the Ministry officials, the Departmental Committee on Health and County Governments so as to ensure that the delivered UHC is felt at the lowest units of administration in the country.

CHAPTER FOUR

COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS

- 88) The Committee observations were guided by Article 155 of the Constitution, section 47 of the Public Service Commission Act and section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) in terms of issues for consideration as follows:
- (i) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
 - (ii) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
 - (iii) suitability of the nominees for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominees' abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is made.

COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS ON ENG. PETER KIPLAGAT TUM, CBS

- 89) In making these observations on the suitability of Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS for appointment to the Position of Principal Secretary State Department of Medical Services in the Ministry of Health, the Committee took into account the following-
- (i) The provisions of the Constitution and the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act with regard to the process of appointment of the Principal Secretary in the Republic of Kenya;
 - (ii) The views received from the public;
 - (iii) The vetting questionnaire filled and returned by the Nominee;
 - (iv) The academic and professional certificates submitted to the Committee; and
 - (v) The oral submissions made by the Nominee before the Committee during the approval hearing;
- 90) The Committee observed as follows-
- (i) That the Nominee has complied with and submitted all the clearance certificates and letters from all the relevant institutions as required;
 - (ii) That No affidavit was received from the public against Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum; and
 - (iii) That the Nominee has methodically progressed to achieve enviable academic qualifications.
- 91) The Nominee has worked in the public service since 1990 to date as he now serves as the Principal Secretary in the Ministry of labour. This long fete in the public service has given him vast knowledge and understanding of the public sector.
- 92) The Nominee's knowledge and understanding on the subject matter of health was exemplary, the Nominee is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship and hence meets the requirements to hold the office of Principal Secretary. Cumulatively, the nominee's academic qualification, professional training and hands on experience met the threshold required for the position of Principal Secretary.
- 93) The Nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity. He has been issued compliance and clearance letters by all the relevant institutions namely the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), the Higher Education Loans Board

(HELB), the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission and the Office of the Registrar of Political parties (ORPP).







He further stated that it was important for the people of Kenya to have faith with KEMSA and the board should ensure seamless relationship between them and employees and where necessary to amend laws in order to offer better supply of medicines to its members which the Committee was ready to support the Fund.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/44: PRESENTATION BY MS. TERRY RAMADHAN KEMSA CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER (C.E.O)

Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) is a state corporation under the Ministry of Health whose mandate is to **Procure, Warehouse and Distribute** Health Products & Technologies (HPTs) for prescribed public health programs, the national strategic stock reserve, prescribed essential health packages and national referral hospitals. Its functions per the KEMSA Act are:

- a) Procure, warehouse and distribute drugs and medical supplies for prescribed public health programmes,
- b) The national strategic stock reserve,
- c) Prescribed essential health packages and National referral hospitals establish a network of storage,
- d) Packaging and distribution facilities for the provision of drugs and medical supplies to health institutions;
- e) Enter into partnership with or establish frameworks with county Governments for purposes of providing services in procurement, warehousing,
- f) Distribution of drugs and medical supplies Collect information and provide regular reports to the national and county governments on the status and cost-effectiveness of procurement, the distribution and value of prescribed essential medical supplies delivered to health facilities,

- g) Stock status and on any other aspects of supply system status and performance which may be required by stakeholders Support county governments to establish and maintain appropriate supply chains systems for drugs and medical supplies.

3. **PROCUREMENT** – under this there Persistent stock-outs for EMMS are mainly attributable to tender non-responsiveness, Poor supplier performance on meeting delivery timelines and long procurement turnaround time and Delay in HPTs deliveries occasioned by COVID-19 Pandemic
4. **REFORMS**- the following are the reforms so far -Litigations: Eight (8) cases in the Employment Court and High Court, Unqualified Staff, Poor Performance, People Capture and General Resistance to change.
5. **DEBT OWED**- Currently Counties owe KEMSA more than 3.5B with 55% of these being older than 3 months. This affects our ability to pay our suppliers which in turn drives cost up while lowering our Order Fill Rate

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/42: PRELIMINARIES/INTRODUCTION

The meeting was called to order at ten minutes to ten o'clock with a word of prayer by the Hon. Dr. Pukose Robert, M.P.-Chairperson.

Members of Parliament introduced themselves, the Secretariat and lastly by the NHIF management.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/43: BRIEF BY NHIF BOARD CHAIRMAN

Chairman of the board welcomed the Members and informed them that, they came at a time when the organization needed support from them as it is conducting some reforms. He further stated that the National Hospital Insurance Fund is a Kenya government state corporation with a mandate to provide health insurance to Kenyans. The core mandate for NHIF is to provide accessible, affordable, sustainable and quality health insurance for all Kenyans.

The Main objective is to enable a one stop center interface for health care services delivery in a transparent, easy and cost effective manner from various accredited Health Facilities for the benefit of its beneficiaries. NHIF beneficiaries can access health services through a wide network of accredited health facilities in the Fund's accredited health facilities among others which includes Public health facilities, Private health facilities and Faith Based Organization and to achieve all these there was need for improvement of the structure by doing some reforms.

He also added that, there was need for Digital transformation in order to cut on leakages from manual claim systems, where false claims will be reduced. Linda mama cover transformation to ensure funds to Linda mama is done at speed and Edu-AFYA comprehensive medical scheme which has enabled all students to access benefits in any of the health care providers contracted by NHIF.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/44: BRIEF BY CHAIRPERSON OF HEALTH COMMITTEE HON. DR ROBERT PUKOSE

The chairperson briefed the board Members of NHIF that pursuant to National Assembly standing order 216 (5) (b) "*to study the programmes and policy objectives of Ministries and departments and effectiveness of the implementation*" it was important to understand the working of the organizations before they embark on their work as a Committee and added that, NHIF has played a major role in delivering Universal Health Care (UHC), and that NHIF is very critical area, and a lot of reforms should be done. He said the Committee is committed to do necessary oversight, and they will deliver their mandate and that every support will be provided.

He further stated that it was important for the people of Kenya to have faith with NHIF and the board should ensure seamless relationship between them and employees and where necessary to amend laws in order to offer better health services to its members which the Committee was ready to support the Fund.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/45: NHIF CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER C.E.O PRESENTATION DR. PETER KAMUNYO

The CEO did a presentation on the structure of NHIF, Mission, Vission, core values, services, membership categorization and their branches.

CEO stated the need for structuring NHIF programmes so as to promote wider coverage through increased membership by vulnerable groups while conferring better range of benefits. The need to also raise the level of awareness on NHIF to the target group through aggressive marketing and stakeholder engagements and promoting greater participation of women, small traders and domestic women workers among other vulnerable groups.

He also added that there was need for organizational transformation; where more doctors, more nurses and also quality assurance officers be employed.

The Committee Members asked the following clarifications on different topical areas which the board chairman, C.E.O and the other board members replied as follows

a) Need for Proper Reforms to NHIF

In efforts to enhance the NHIF's capacity to deliver the promise of UHC to Kenyans, the Kenyan government has introduced several reforms. NHIF have analyzed the implications of these reforms for Kenya's quest to achieve UHC.

They also focus on the entire range of recent reforms given that, they are linked and aimed at the same objective: increasing population coverage with the NHIF to increase access to quality health care services while offering protection from the adverse effects of out-of-pocket payments. Some of the reforms include; digital transformation for self-care platforms, Linda-Mama cover, Edu-Afya scheme.

b) On Public Hospital Consistency in Providing Services

The chairman of the board stated since health facilities are too many for them to visit, they did a sample of the health facilities and grouped them into four groups, and they were able to do four visitations to health facilities this year to do inspections and for successful inspections and frequent visits to health facilities there was need to employ more quality assurance team.

The Committee informed the board that, NHIF is meant to carry out regular monitoring of health care facilities and conduct clinical audits to check on quality of healthcare and this should be done frequently.

c) On How They Deal with Duplication Schemes

NHIF board informed the members that, they will prioritize standardizing their services across and making its membership aware of the range of services offered.

d) Human Resource Management

Due to inadequate personnel, there was need to employ more competitive personnel; the chair stated that under-staffing has affected their operations. Promotions was also important to give employees high morale in the work place.

e) On Council of County Governance

The Council of County Governors (COG) is a non-partisan organization established under Section 19 of the Intergovernmental Relations Act. The Council of Governors comprises of the Governors of the forty-seven Counties. The main functions include the promotion of visionary leadership, sharing of best practices and offer a collective voice on policy issues, promote inter-county

consultations, encourage and initiate information sharing on the performance of County Governments with regard to the execution of their functions, collective consultation on matters of interest to County Governments. There was need for partnership with Council of governors in ensuring successful health delivery in counties like Nakuru Hospital has been successful.

f) On Need for Partnership to Increase Membership

NHIF informed the Members that, they will re-think the role of youth in both creating awareness and leading in recruitment process in rural areas and given their reach, penetration and innovative programmes which they run in these areas. After all, the youths are both potential and future members of the NHIF scheme Recommendation: Invest strategically in not only mobilizing women but also investing for increased share of beneficiaries in the future.

g) On Ambulances Used For Referrals

They informed the Members that, Transportation and transfer of a sick member or dependent by road for treatment to the nearest NHIF accredited health facility was available. NHIF members get emergency ambulance evacuation services in a deal that was signed between the Red Cross Society and the State insurer. The ambulances will be available to members who need emergency medical treatment from their homes or in road accidents.

Therefore, no need to getting on a Boda Boda or Probox to rush to hospital in time of an emergency all you need now is to call the Red Cross toll free helpline. The Committee advised them to consider rural areas hospitals for the same.

h) Maternal Health Care

NHIF should take into account the greater need for women control over their health and their children who naturally are quite proximate to them. The fund should allow access to benefits in separation, continuation of payment from either of the spouse and eliminate bottlenecks to accessing the services. Linda mama cover has helped in reducing maternal and child mortality, the challenge is only in terms of funds disbursement is slow.

i) Accreditation of Hospitals

NHIF strives to accredit as many hospitals as possible so as to ensure all members access NHIF benefits whenever they are across the Country. The Fund has an objective accreditation criteria and guidelines that aim to encourage hospitals towards quality improvement. Accredited organizations are those recognized by the Fund and allowed to offer services to NHIF members and claim reimbursements thereof. Accreditation of a health provider takes into account the services, personnel, infrastructure and equipment among other issues that the institutions have. The level of rebate, therefore, corresponds to the grade after scoring the various aspects. The Fund, further contracts the health facilities to ensure they provide services comprehensively.

This means that NHIF members can walk in and walk out of the facilities fully treated at the cost of NHIF without making additional payments.

j) Education and Awareness

When there is weak communication there is low awareness among beneficiaries of their entitlement and how to access services; and awareness provides knowledge and life skills that

allow better-educated persons to gain more ready access to information and resources to promote health thus awareness had a positive influence on the uptake of national hospital insurance fund among informal sector workers.

NHIF is taking initiatives of organizing programmers/campaigns to sensitize informal sector workers on the health benefits of being a member of NHIF. There is need to ensure accessibility of NHIF offices by opening more regional offices within the County, this will help to ensure that employees in informal sector can have immediate access to NHIF services whenever they required.

K) On Mental health.

The Chairman of the Board stated that there was additional benefits package, the mental and Behavioral Health benefits package, has been enhanced due to the population-based survey on the increasing need for specialized mental and behavioral health services. There was also need to increase mental health personnel in health facilities.

m) Dealing with leakages

The C.E.O stated that, NHIF has been hit by fraudulent claims of people using fake identities to seek medical care and hospitals processing false claims. The insurance scheme continues to do biometric registration as it migrates from the use of NHIF card and national identity card as the mode of identification— which have loopholes and are an avenue for fraudulent claims.

The biometric registration will run together with the installation of an electronic claims system as NHIF moves to eliminate manual processing of hospital bills. E-claim processing system and NHIF members will need to be registered under biometrics to access their cover, the biometric exercise will help tame these individuals and deal with fraudulent cases for once. There is a department that deals with compliance and enforcement to ensure that they pay for what is valued.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/46: CHALLENGES FACED BY NHIF

1. Fraud- medical expense fraud claim has been ongoing at some facilities leading to NHIF paying healthcare excess cash due to false claims.
2. The National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF) is incurring losses as most member's accounts are dormant, most of contributors are those who only contribute when they have a need the dormant accounts are a big issue as they are falling short of funds.
3. Inadequate personnel which slows their operations.
4. The capacity to carry out poverty index to identify beneficiaries.
5. Slow contracting of health care facilities by the NHIF.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/47: TOUR TO THE CUSTOMER EXPERIENCE CENTRE

The call center management stated that, besides hospitals, there is NHIF payment channels where members conveniently pay their contributions by M-pesa and call the NHIF call center which the call center are able to confirm their membership status.

Members were also taken through the NHIF customer care process at call center room and members found out that there was need for more personnel, in order to serve thirteen thousand calls per day.

WAY FORWARD

1. Ensure adequacy of benefits under NHIF and other medical schemes and their accessibility by geography and demographic groups by working with County Government to increase the scope of coverage of healthcare.
2. Need for employment of new personnel as soon as possible by the board by following the right recruitment procedure.
3. NHIF should do more training on the use of USSD payments.
4. NHIF to do a lot of partnership with banks, Safaricom, with Emulation of Kakuru hospital on partnership with county government council.
5. There was also need to improve public health facilities to ease pressure on claims from private hospitals-where majority of the patients under the NHIF seek treatment services.
6. The NHIF needs to do, more on preventive and promotive medicine.
7. There is also need to look at many ways of collecting revenue and not only depending on contribution from registered members.
8. In terms of regulations that should be done by NHIF, public participation needs to be done.
9. NHIF to do away with penalties for defaulters of contributions which led to delays in service delivery.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/38 BRIEFING BY FISCAL ANALYST ON FARMILIARIZATION TOUR TO THE NATIONAL HOSPITAL INSURANCE FUND (NHIF)

The Committee was taken through the brief on NHIF by the Fiscal Analyst. The key Highlights of the presentation were as follows:

1. The National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF) is a state corporation established under the National Insurance Fund Act, number 9 of 1998 and is an institution under the State Department for Medical Services. The Fund's mandate is to make access to high-quality healthcare easier by strategically pooling resources and healthcare purchasing in partnership with other stakeholders. The institution manages contributions emanating from its members from both the formal and informal sectors of the economy. NHIF ensures that registered members access healthcare via secure financial risk protection against the cost of healthcare services. It is estimated that NHIF contributes over 10% of all health expenditures in the Country.
2. NHIF as a Social Health Insurance is one of the pillars for Kenya to achieve Universal Health Coverage and its role in this has been underscored in the Kenya Vision 2030. In order to achieve universal health coverage, the government has been pushing for a raft of reforms in the National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF).
3. To align the Fund's goals with Vision 2030 and the Kenya Health Policy 2014-2030 Blue Prints, the NHIF has developed a five-phase roadmap to achieve universal health coverage. The goal is to ensure that all Kenyans are covered, taking into account the lessons learned during the pilot phase in the selected four counties. Some of the key objectives anchored on NHIF Mandate include;
 - I. Increase number of principal members from 7 million to 19 million by 2022.
 - II. Enhance revenue inflow and its utilization
 - III. Enhance compliance to good governance
 - IV. Enhance synergies in information and resource sharing with stakeholders and partners.

4. In terms of NHIF coverage in the country, 4.5 million Kenyans in the formal sector and 5 million in the informal sector have registered with NHIF as principal members. This means that the Fund has only been able to achieve 50% of its target for year 2022. Low levels of health insurance coverage (which is about 17% coverage) mean that a significant proportion of Kenya's population does not contribute towards the insurance fund.
5. NHIF is also playing a major role in Social Health Protection through the implementation of the insurance subsidy programme among the poor and vulnerable groups. Towards this end, 688,768 indigents and 795,320 elderly and persons with severe disabilities access healthcare through the Health Insurance subsidy programme.
6. The Fund spends over Kshs.33 billion on health related expenditures and this is projected to reach a record of Kshs. 100 billion by the end of Medium Term III (2018-2022). The revenue inflows for the fund will further increase with the ongoing reforms that require all Kenyans to register and make contributions to the NHIF.
7. The proposed new premium in the formal sector is a shift from the present model where employees earning Kshs. 100,000 pay a fixed monthly contribution of Kshs. 1700 to NHIF. Formal sector workers earning more than Kshs. 100,000 will be required to pay 1.7 percent of their gross salary to NHIF. Contributions of workers earning Kshs. 200,000 will have to double their contribution to Kshs. 3,400 if the regulations are approved while those earning Kshs. 500,000 will increase five times to Kshs. 8,500. Further the amendments require employers in private sector to match their employees to NHIF (this regulation has since been contested in court by Federation of Kenya Employers).



The nominee appeared before the committee on 14th November 2022 at 5:00 pm took and an oath was administered and after issuing an opening statement responded to questions by the committee as follow;

A) Personal Background

B) Education background

She holds a PhD in Public Health from Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT) from 2010 to 2020, Masters of Public Health (MPH) (Major- Epidemiology, Minor-Health Services Management (project management) from Kenyatta University (KU) from 2003 to 2009, Higher National Diploma in Microbiology from Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) from September 2001 to November 2002, Diploma in Laboratory Sciences from Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) from 1996 to 1999 and Certificate in Medical Lab Sciences at Kenya Medical Training College, Kakamega from 1986 to 1988.

C) Employment History and Work Experience

The nominee has a doctor of Philosophy (PHD) In Public Health Jomo Kenyatta University, masters of Public Health Kenyatta University, Higher National Diploma In Microbiology –Kenya Medical Training College, Nairobi, Diploma In Medical Lab Science –Kenya Medical Training College, Nairobi, Certificate In Medical Lab Science –Kenya Medical Training College Kakamega, Kenya Certificate Of Education-Mary Hill School, Thika, Kenya Certificate Of Education –St Francis Primary School.

D) Work Experience

She started her carrier at Gatundu District Hospital Integrated Laboratory in July 1988 to June 1992 then in 1992 June to 1994 she joined Kiambu District Hospital Integrated Laboratory, then in July 1994 to 1999 she worked at Microbiology Department (NPHLS) in 2000 to 2005 she worked as Deputy Lab in Charge-Quality Control Bacteriology (NPHLS), 2006 to 2011 she was promoted to be the Head/Manager- central Reference TB Laboratory (NPHLS). Later in 2011 to 2012 she became Deputy Chief Medical Laboratory

Technologist, and then in 2012 to 2013 she was the Ag. Chief Medical Laboratory Technologist. The nominee stated that, her training and experience in working through the healthcare system for 34 years since 1998 has help her identify the Challenges and gaps in healthcare system and will

try to solve them with her training which she will use to enable her to tackle everything brought in her desk in consultation with the other technical team in the Ministry.

Knowledge on health sector

a) The nominee was informed by the committee that her appointment as a Principal Secretary is coming at a time when Kenyans have lost faith in services provided by doctors and nurses in public hospitals due to the many cases of medical negligence for which the unprofessional doctors and nurses are never held accountable, she was asked to enumerate to the Committee how she will ensure that medical practitioners live up to their Hippocratic oath?

She responded that, all process should be considered in the health system, and looking at every step in the system was of importance and ensure good referral systems that involves public participation. She will analyse in consultation with her counterpart in the state department of medical services the issues to determine whether it's about negligence.

b) The nominee was informed by the committee about Complain of high hospital bills by patients, however the main reason for high bills is because of taxation of the hospital equipment and yet the finance bill 2021 exempted taxation of some medical equipment. She was asked how she will fast track the issue of taxation.

Complain of high hospital Bills by patients, however the main reason for high Bills is because of taxation and yet the Finance Bill, 2021 exempted taxation of some medical equipment. On issues of taxation the nominee responded that she will have to consult with the higher authority on this matter.

c) The nominee was asked on how she will ensure that all practitioners in the health sector are regulated by a Regulatory Body

Nominee stated that, there are 42 Cadres and only 10 are regulated which she was going to ensure that everyone working in the health cadres should be registered by regulatory bodies and added that matching cadres with similar functions are merged.

d) The nominee was informed about the current trend in technology and how it is upsetting provision of services, it is largely unregulated e.g. when a patient walks in to an optical clinic with gargets on table the patient is given lenses, in whose hand is the technology entrusted in terms of training, competence? She was asked what her take about such issues was

The nominee said such issues have been seen in the public domain and stated that regulations are mandatory to such facilities and it is important to regulate all practitioners and set policy guidelines and standards of operations need to be operationalized.

e) Health worker strikes are experienced globally, but for developing nations such as Kenya, their effect can be severe. How will she mitigate this and restore public confidence?

The nominee said the strikes are as a result of higher salaries demands by workers which she will address this issue together with Salaries and Remuneration Commission (SRC) and delayed

promotions, work environment and nepotism are also issues that result strikes of healthcare workers and will ensure harmonization of functions of different healthcare workers across all cadres.

f) The nominee was asked how she will ensure that the policies and standards set at her level are implemented at the grass root.

She acknowledged policy and standards implementation has been bothering her since she was nominated to be the Principal Secretary State Department for Health Standards and professional management and said that, healthcare functions were devolved but not the service and that she will bring all stake holders so that they can all agree on the best way forward.

g) Noting the citizens' keen interest in the Health sector, how do you intend to improve interactions between your office and Parliamentary Committees as we execute our mandate of representation, oversight and legislation on behalf of the people of Kenya on matters that fall under your domain?

The nominee said she will improve her interactions with Parliamentary Committees by having a seamless working relationship and will be engaging Parliament in every level of policy formulation and in any other area that she will require their collaboration.

h) How she will deal with the issues of health workers in the public sectors practicing in the private sector and some have their own facilities hence at times referring patients to their facilities

The nominee said she will discourage health workers to set healthcare facilities near the premises where they are working as public health workers.

i) The nominee was asked what Knowledge Management is.

The nominee responded that understanding of knowledge management in health was issues like sharing knowledge with different teams through interaction and exchange of knowledge.

j) The nominee was asked about her understanding of the health Act



The chairperson welcomed the members to the meeting at 2.30pm with a word of prayers and Members and the secretariat introduced themselves.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/30: VETTING OF ENG. PETER TUM, CBS FOR APPROVAL FOR APPOINTMENT AS PRINCIPAL SECRETARY, STATE DEPARTMENT FOR MEDICAL SERVICE

The nominee appeared before the Committee on 14th November 2022 at 2.30 pm and took an oath and which issued an opening statement responded to questions by the Committee as follows;

A) Personal Background

Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 3276913 and was born in Nandi County in 1962.

B) Introduction and Education Background

Mr. Tum, holds a Master of Science in Energy Management from the University of Nairobi, a Degree in Industrial Technology from Egerton University, a post-graduate Diploma in Medical Electronics & Medical Equipment Management from the University of London, a Higher Diploma with full technological certificates in Electrical Installation from the Kenya Polytechnic (now Technical University of Kenya) and several professional certifications gained locally and abroad. He got his Advanced Certificate of Education, (A' Level) at Chavakali High School and Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education (KCSE), Kameloi Secondary School.

In addition, he presented several professional certifications gained locally and abroad. He stated that he undertook a Strategic Leadership Development Programme (SLDP) at the Kenya School of Government, Performance Appraisal course offered by Directorate of Personnel Management, Leadership and Development programme facilitated by MSH USAID, Implementation of Quality Management Systems (ISO 9001-2000) offered by Kenya Bureau of Standards, T.O.T on Anti-Corruption by the Kenya Anti-Corruption Commission and application of informatics in Health Care Technology at the Medical Research Council in Cape Town South Africa among others. The copies of all the academic and professional certifications Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum presented to the Committee.

C) Employment History and Work Experience

He also indicated he was a member of several committees in his professional capacity, among them the College quality Assurance committee, Disciplinary Committee, examination board, tender and also vice chairman of Tender committee Anti-Corruption committee and; vice chairman of the Association of Medical Engineering of Kenya.

In relation to his experience, Mr. Tum presented that he was a long-serving public servant with more than 15 years' of experience in leadership and management within the Public Service. He indicated that he joined the public service in 1990 as Medical Engineering Technologist and meticulous rose through the ranks in the same ministry to his current position as the Principal Secretary Ministry of labour to date, Chief Executive Officer of the Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) in between holding positions such as Principal at the Nauru KMTC, Head of Department (medical engineering) and Head of Maintenance Unit at the Mbagathi Hospital. Mr. Tum exuded confidence that this steady experience as an informed insider positions him as the right person with the grasp and understanding of the operations and management of the Ministry of Health and the health sector in general.

Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum chaired and is a member of several Committees in his professional capacity. He is a registered Engineer with a good grasp of how government works and understand the functions of government which I have worked well within.

Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum, CBS, is professionally affiliated with the Association of Medical Engineering of Kenya (AMEK) November, 2002 which he became vice-chairperson from 2002 to 2004.

E) Honors and Awards

Eng. Peter Kiplagat Tum has received two awards which are Chief of the Order of the Burning Spear (CBS), 12th December, 2021 and Order of the Grand Warrior (OGW) on 12th December, 2016 state commendation.

F) Clearance Requirements

The Committee confirmed that the nominee had been cleared by KRA, ORPP, DCI, EACC and HELB, having obtained clearance certificates to that effect.

The nominee submitted to the committee all the documents required as per the letter sent by the Clerk of the National Assembly and a duly filled vetting questionnaire. The Committee was satisfied that nominee had complied with and acquired the clearance required from Kenya Revenue authority, Directorate of Criminal Investigation, Higher education Loans Board, Ethics and anti-corruption Commission and the Registrar of political parties. The Nominee further submitted and was also evident from the document he submitted that he had not been charged in a court of law nor convicted, neither was he adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission. The Nominee further submitted originals of his national identity card and his passport to proof his Kenyan citizenship. He further indicated that held no other citizenship.

G) Potential conflict of interest

Eng. Tum indicated that, he had no family members or other persons, parties, categories obligation or financial arrangements that are likely to present potential conflicts-of-interest if he assumed the position of Principal Secretary. He added that he will avoid entering into situations where his actions might create a conflict, whether it's actual, potential or perceived, without disclosing the information.

H) Public trust and why he accepted the nomination

The Nominee indicated that he was a person of integrity and he abhors corruption, he further stated that he has held the position of Principle Secretary before and no allegations of improprieties have been levelled against him.

Knowledge On Health Sector

A) On how was the nominee going to reduce the gap between the services given in private health facilities and those given in public facilities?

The nominee admitted that the system of provision of health care services in public facilities was deplorable, he further stated that the county was yet to meet the WHO Standards. He indicated that he would commence by getting the right personnel, ensure the health information and technology was working and responsive to the needs of the citizens and also leverage on the financing from NHIF in accordance with the manifesto of Kenya Kwanza.

B) On how he was going to restore public confidence in the health sector especially after the apparent failure of certain sectors after billions of money were invested in some ventures like the purchase of the Managed equipment services.

The nominee stated that the managed equipment services was a good idea, he indicated that he would before signing of any new contract, review the existing contract and seek legal advice from the Office of the Attorney general on the same.

C) On the specific skills, experience and attributes he was bringing to the docket.

In response the nominee stated that he had over 30 years' experience in public service, and has encountered challenges that have strengthened him to tirelessly serve the nation. He also stated that he had the tenacity and mind to see things and put teams together that would deliver on public services.

D) On responsiveness to oversight institution and on doctrine of separation of powers, the nominee was asked how he was going to deal with oversight institutions.

In his response the nominee stated that he had a clear understanding of the doctrine of separation of powers and each distinct arm of government had its function and roles which to a certain extent were complimentary. He also indicated that he would honor parliamentary summons at all times as he understood the parliamentary oversight role over his Ministry.

E) On human resource for health, and devolution has turned medical practice into tribal cocoons. How was he going to handle this issue?

He stated that the problem did exist and was an operational problem that he was going to work with all stakeholders including the county governments to address this matter that has bedeviled the sector.

F) On his role in improving health care in remote areas.

In his response the nominee noted that health care financing was discriminatory in nature and indigents are not able to afford medical care. He stated that he was going to ensure that money ring-fenced to healthcare service will reach its proper areas and ensure that funds should be used to carry out the relevant function that it had been allocated to.

G) Manufacturing of Medicines and health

That he will promote the manufacturing of medical equipment and other healthcare products within the country by providing the enabling environment for investors such as offering tax rebates and the necessary infrastructure and in addition to cost effectiveness of the products, the industry will also create jobs and contribute to the achievement of the agenda four items.

H) Universal Health Coverage (UHC)

He expressed confidence that he will provide the leadership, managerial and technical stewardship to deliver 100% coverage for all households. He stated that for UHC to be successfully

implemented, three important components must be decisively and comprehensively addressed: Human resource, accessibility and financing. He will strive to achieve by doing the following-

- (i) Assemble a competent and passionate team that will work closely under him to coordinate, guide and implement all the identified projects and programmes necessary to meet the objective.
- (ii) Deliberately seek to broaden the engagement and collaboration between the Ministry, Parliament and the County Governments to move forward faster and together.
- (iii) Carry out comprehensive skills audit especially of medical doctor so as to identify the existing skills gaps and optimize the existing pool of skills through an elaborate and equitable distribution mechanisms to improve the current 0.9 doctors to 1000 patients ratio
- (iv) Initiate and accelerate the necessary reforms in NHIF so as to provide a strong foundation for the implementation of UHC by delivering a minimum package especially for the vulnerable, poor, the elderly and the young.
- (v) Enhance the efficiency of commodity supplies by reforming and improving the capacity of the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency(KEMSA)
- (vi) Seek to enhance resource allocation to critical institutions like Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) so that it has both the human and financial capacity to deliver cut-edge research on emerging diseases. He added that there was need for KEMRI to be physically present in all the 47 counties.
- (vii) Work closely with donor organizations to maximize their support
- (viii) Leverage on Information Communication Technology (ICT) to ensure that the services delivery and disease surveillance are synchronized throughout the country. To do this, he stated that he will not reinvent the wheel but will borrow good practices from India, UK and Egypt that already have a working models

I) Human Resources for Health

1) He responded that having being at the helm of the Kenya Medical Training College, he understood this item. He responded as follows-

- (i) The health function is majorly a devolved function. This invites the National and County governments to develop a mechanism of ensuring that there is structured communication
- (ii) The Human Resources(HRH) should be a national government function, this is necessitated by the fact that training, skills matching, equitable distribution of personnel and emerging health issues will be better handled and managed at a centralized and coordinated point. In addition commodity

movement and health financing should be an exclusive function of the national government

- (iii) It has become clear that industrial action in the sector has become a national government problem although county governments exclusively employ doctors and nurses
- (iv) There must be honest conversation with county governments and come up with mitigating mechanisms to assuage their fears about re-assigning some of the health functions to the national government.
- (v) The need to train and employ more community health worker. Experience has shown they fit very well within the communities they come, especially in rural areas.
- (vi) We need to give more incentive to nurses and motivate them.

J) National Referral Hospitals






MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/010: PRE-VETTING BRIEFING BY LEGAL COUNSEL ON THE VETTING FOR THE NOMINEES TO THE POSITIONS OF PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES STATE DEPARTMENTS FOR MEDICAL SERVICES AND HEALTH STANDARDS AND PROFESSIONAL MANAGEMET

The legal counsel briefed as follows: that,

Pursuant to Standing Order 42(1), the Honourable Speaker, in a Message delivered to the House on Thursday, 3rd November 2022 *informed* the House that he had received a Message from His Excellency the President on 3rd November 2022. The Message was on nomination of appointments to the offices of Principal Secretaries.

These nominations as communicated in the letter *Ref. OP/CAB.26/4A Vol.1/ (49)* dated 2nd November 2022 were done in exercise of the power conferred upon His Excellency the President by Article 155(3)(a) of the Constitution.

Pursuant to Standing Order 45(1) and Standing Order 216 (5) (f) of the National Assembly Standing Orders (the 6th edition), the nominees for the State Department for Medical Services and State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management were committed to the Departmental Committee on Health on 3rd November 2022 for consideration and vetting as follows:

- a) Eng. Peter Tum to the position of Principal Secretary, State Department for Medical Services
- b) Dr. Josephine Mburu to the position of Principal Secretary, State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management

As conveyed by the Honourable Speaker in the aforementioned message, the vetting exercise by the Departmental Committees is to be undertaken within Twenty-eight days from the date of notification of the nomination as stipulated under Section 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, *No. 33 of 2011*. In this regard, the Clerk of the National Assembly has designated **Monday, 14th November 2022 at 2:30pm-6:30pm** for vetting by the Departmental Committee on Health after which the Committee Report on this vetting exercise shall be tabled by **Tuesday, 22nd November 2022**.

LEGAL BASIS

Article 132(2) (d) of the Constitution provides that the President shall nominate and, with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint, and may dismiss Principal Secretaries in accordance with Article 155.

Article 155 of the Constitution provides as follows—

Principal Secretaries.

155. (1) There is established the office of Principal Secretary, which is an office in the public service.

(2) Each State department shall be under the administration of a Principal Secretary.

(3) The President shall—

- a) nominate a person for appointment as Principal Secretary from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission; and*

- b) with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries.*
(4) The President may re-assign a Principal Secretary.
(5) A Principal Secretary may resign from office by giving notice, in writing, to the President.

The recommendation of nominees by the Public Service Commission referred to in Article 155 (3) (a) of the Constitution is to be done as contemplated in Section 47 of the Public Service Commission Act, No.10 of 2017.

The legal Counsel briefed the Committee on the public appointment and Parliamentary approval vetting on the nominees for appointment as Principal Secretaries.

The legal Counsel advised that in conducting the Parliamentary approval of the nominees, the Committee will be guided majorly by the public appointments (Parliamentary approval act, 2011 and other relevant laws including the Constitution.

And after the approval the Committee will prepare its report on the suitability of the nominee. The committee may approve or reject the nominee, as provided by section 8(2) the public appointments (Parliamentary approval) Act 2011.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/11: PRE-VETTING BRIEFING BY RESEARCHER ON THE VETTING FOR THE NOMINEES TO THE POSITION OF PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES STATE DEPARTMENTS FOR MEDICAL SERVICES AND HEALTH STANDARDS AND PROFESSIONAL MANAGEMET

The researcher briefed as follows: that,

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 155(3) (a) of the Constitution, H.E. the President and Commander in Chief of the Defence Forces of the Republic of Kenya is empowered to nominate and with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint Principal Secretaries to State Departments. In exercise of the said powers, H.E. the President nominated fifty-one (51) persons for appointment as Principal Secretaries.

Further, pursuant to the provisions of Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution and Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), adverts were placed in the print media on **04/11/2022** notifying the general public that the Departmental Committees would conduct Approval Hearings (Vetting) of the nominees for appointment to the position of Principal Secretaries from Monday, 14th November, 2022 to Friday, 18th November, 2022.

In addition, the nominees were requested to bring originals of their identity cards, academic and professional certificates and other relevant testimonials. They were also required to obtain letters/certificates of compliance from the following institutions:

- a) Ethics and Anti- Corruption Commission;
- b) Kenya Revenue Authority;
- c) Higher Education Loans Board;
- d) Directorate of Criminal Investigations: and,
- e) Office of the Registrar of Political Parties

In the execution of its mandate, the Committee on Health will conduct approval hearings for the Principal Secretary nominees in the following State Departments in the Ministry of Health-

- (a) State Department for Medical Services- Eng. Peter Tum
- (b) State Department for Health Standards and Professional Management- Dr. Josephine Mburu

Members agreed to utilize available time to tour the agencies in Nairobi to do visitation to the agencies.

Members also proposed that retreat for the members will be done in February, 2023 due to tight schedule and the main agenda to be discussed will be the exit report of the 12th Parliament.

MIN. NO. NA/DC-H/2022/13: ANY OTHER BUSINESS: INTRODUCTORY BRIEF ON HEALTH SECTOR ECONOMIC, EXPENDITURE ALLOCATION AND PERFORMANCE.

Fiscal analyst of the Committee took the Members through the last financial year allocation and spending and the overview of the 2022/2023 financial year estimates for the health sector (Ministry of Health).

Consolidation of social health interventions. As the country gets ready to roll out UHC, resources are still being allocated separately to fragmented state-sponsored insurance schemes (HISP programme, Linda Mama programme, Edu Afya etc). The Budget and Appropriation Committee report recommended consolidation of these schemes into one pool of resources to implement UHC. The table 4 below shows allocation to the programmes and respective targets.

Leasing of Medical Equipment Services (MES) - this project's contract expires in 2022. The expiration of contractual agreements under the MES project is unclear because the contracts with various county governments end on different dates. A joint committee comprising of the council of governors and the Ministry of Health has since been formed to investigate the matter and prepare a report. The report will outline the next steps in implementing the MES project in the fiscal year 2022/23 and in the medium term. Towards this end, the Ministry has not offered a detailed implementation plan for after the project's contract period expires or instructions on how to handle other contractual obligations, such as unpaid bills. To ensure a smooth transition, it is imperative that the new issues surrounding this project are addressed.

Access of Kenyatta University medical students to KUTRRH. The university medical students currently depend on Kiambu Level 4 Hospital, Thika Level 5 hospital, Mathare National Teaching and Referral Hospital and Mama Lucy to train health professionals, a situation that is unreliable and unsustainable. This is against the MoH and Ministry of Education vision to have a hospital for this purpose so as to address teaching, research and medical services provision. Notably, the recent inspection by the East Africa Medical Board where the university was poorly rated and admission of medical students suspended.

National Referral Hospitals Registrars. The health registrars continue to draw their salaries from the counties despite working for National referral hospitals in their respective counties. There is lack of a policy framework on how to maintain the registrars in terms of remuneration for these registrars.

The rollout of UHC. Universal Health Coverage (UHC) envisaged accessibility of quality affordable healthcare by all Kenyans. It is on this account that affordable healthcare was identified as one of the government's 'big four agenda' and National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF) was identified as the best platform to implement UHC. However, four years since the unveiling of UHC, Kenyans continue to encounter high costs when accessing healthcare services. High costs are in regard to pharmaceuticals. For instance, **for every Ksh.100 spent in healthcare in Kenya, Ksh.30 is out of pocket.** NHIF (Amendment) ACT 2022 requires that all Kenyans to be registered with a health insurance. Towards this far only 50% of both formal and informal sector members are covered with NHIF.

Health projects under the sports fund- The budget allocated to the ministry of health does not provide details of the health projects which have been proposed to be funded under the sports fund in 2022/23. In 2022/23 the Fund has been allocated **Ksh.15.8 billion** and according to the fund regulations, 60% is meant to support health projects (UHC).

Pending bills. The Ministry of Health has a total of **41.8 billion** as pending bills. This amount comprises of Ksh.41.7 billion and Ksh.10million as development and recurrent pending bills respectively. Further, a total of **Ksh.41.7 billion** are pending bills carried forward from prior He also highlighted key issues in the health sector including;
