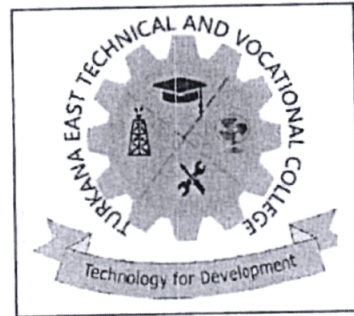

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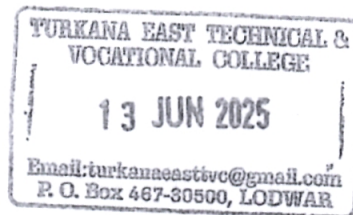

**(a) Background information**

Turkana East TVC is a public TVET institution that was registered under the TVET Act, 2013 Section 20(1) on 14/01/2019 (Registration Number: TVETA/PUBLIC/TVC/0010/2019). The entity is domiciled in Turkana East sub county, Turkana County in Kenya under the Ministry of Education. Turkana East Technical and Vocational College (TETVC) is one of the Technical and Vocational Colleges (TVCs) that the Government of Kenya constructed in order to meet the ever increasing demand for Technical, Vocational and Entrepreneurial training in Kenya and the world at large. It is located in the ASAL Turkana East Sub-county

This is a concerted effort by the Government of Kenya to ensure that each Constituency has at least one technical training institute by the year 2022. The construction of TETVC commenced in the year 2015 by Nakims merchants and Construction Company Ltd with a cost of Ksh. 50,000,000, the project was completed and was officially handed over to Turkana East Technical and Vocational College in May, 2019, by the mentoring institute.

In preparation for its take off, the College went through the following outlined steps:

- Inspection by public works.
- Inspection by the Ministry of Education.
- Registration/ accreditation to offer training.
- Posting of trainers.

The college received a consignment of Equipment in Refrigeration and air conditioning from the Ministry of Education through the Eldoret National Polytechnic (Mentor). With this infrastructure in place and official commissioning, the college opened its doors for training on September, 2019.

The institution currently has four Departments namely engineering department, ICT Department, Business and liberal studies department and Applied Science Department.

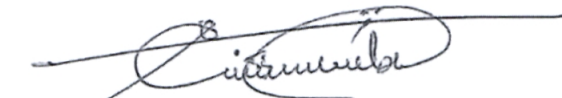
Among the notable achievements of this year include:

Challenges faced during the year include:

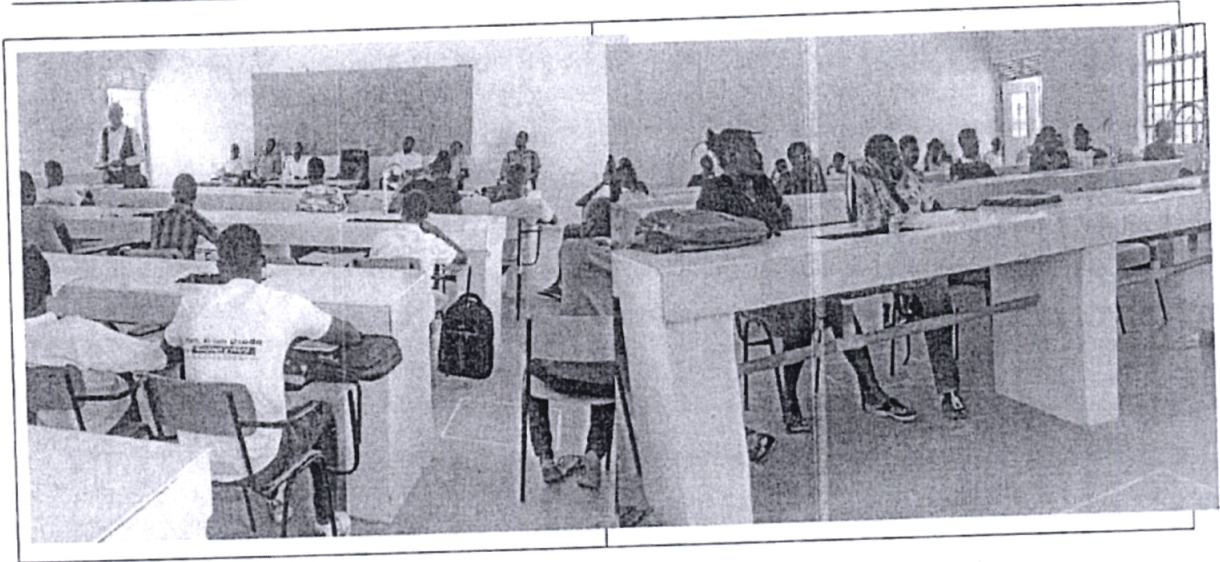
- The water project has faced challenges when it comes to reliability with water supply and vandalism of the water pipeline resulting in high costs of repair and maintenance.

The presence of students within the institution has made the college lively and thus acting as marketing strategy by encouraging more to join.

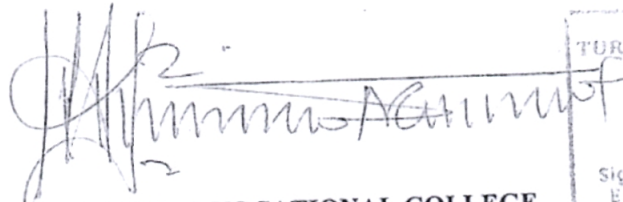

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## **8. Corporate Governance Statement**

The Board will put in place a succession plan for both the Board and Management and review the same regularly.

### **Existence of the Board Charter**

This Board of Governors Charter exists and it defines the Board's roles and responsibilities as well as functions and structures in a way that supports the members in carrying out their strategic oversight function. It provides the Board members with an opportunity to think creatively and critically about how their strategic and operational plans align with the organization's strategic direction and expectations, with respect to governance. The Charter will help the Board in directing Turkana East Technical and Vocational College to maximize the long term value of services provided for all stakeholders.

The Charter has been adopted by the Institute, acting in accordance with Mwongozo, Code of Governance for State Corporations ('the Code'), and is complementary to the requirements regarding the Board and Board members contained in applicable Kenyan laws and regulations.

The Board of Governors will review this Charter at least annually and, if appropriate, revise this Charter from time to time. This Charter is available to all members of the Board for application and is posted on the Institute's website for the information of stakeholders.

### **Process of Appointment and removal of Board Members**

i. The relevant appointing authority shall select and appoint Board members. Every appointment shall

be by name and by notice in the Kenya Gazette but shall cease if the Board member:

- a) Serves the appointing authority with a written notice of resignation; or
- b) Is absent, without the permission of the Chairperson, from three consecutive meetings; or
- c) Is convicted of an offence and sentenced to imprisonment for a term exceeding six months or to a fine exceeding twenty thousand shillings; or
- d) Is incapacitated by prolonged physical or mental illness from performing his duties as a member of the Board; or
- e) Conducts himself in a manner deemed by the appointing authority to be inconsistent with membership of the Board.

i. Any removal of a Board member under (i) above, shall be through formal revocation.

ii. The record of the appointment letter, gazette notice and written acceptance by the Board member shall kept in the personal file of the Board member.

Evaluations are conducted to review the Board's role, Board processes and committees to support that role and the performance of the Board and each governor. This is undertaken using a variety of techniques including external consultants, and Board discussion. The last full Board performance review, was conducted in February, 2019 vide the retreat whose main agenda was review of the performance for the year 2018.

### **Resignation from the Board**

A Board member may resign at any time by giving notice, in writing, to the appointing authority, copied to the Chairperson of the Board and the CEO/Principal of the Institute.

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The resignation shall take effect upon receipt of notice by the appointing authority or at any later time specified therein; and unless otherwise specified in the notice, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

#### **Board Responsibilities**

- h) Owe the Institute the duty to hold in confidence all information available to them by virtue of their position as a Board member.

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In order to provide directions for the effective governance and oversight of the Institution, the Ministry of Education conducts induction and Training of the new board. The inductions program runs for three days for and covers a variety of areas including; Rationale & Status of On-going Reforms, An Overview of Mwongozo. The Role of Boards & Its Organs, Legal & Institutional framework for governance of TVET Institutions, Obligations, Accountability & Internal Controls in TVETs, Highlight on Key Policy Issues Governing Board Operations, The Role of Board in Organizational Competency Development, Board Dynamics & Evaluation (including Board tools), Statutory & Legal compliance, Risk Management in State Corporations, Institutionalizing Anti-Corruption Mechanism in TVETs, Ethical Leadership on Boards, Public Procurement and Disposal in TVETs.

**Board Performance**

The Board will conduct an annual evaluation to appraise its performance. This evaluation will be carried out in accordance with the Board Evaluation Tool.

The Board evaluation provides an opportunity for Board members to identify strengths, collective skill gaps and individual areas of improvement. The Board will also review the performance of each committee against the agreed Terms of Reference.

The Board will also evaluate the performance of the CEO/Principal/Secretary to the Board.

**Conflict of Interest**

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**9. Management Discussion and Analysis**

Turkana East TVC managed to admit a total of 194 students who qualified for various courses as per the requirements of KNQA framework. This admitted number is higher than what we managed to admit in last year and it is as a result of aggressive marketing carried out throughout the year which involved moving from market to another market advertising TVET courses.

Training of students has been smooth in this year though with some few challenges faced during the year including insecurity and drought experiences in the Turkana County. These challenges have really affected student enrolment and class attendance by students. The college offered 22 TVETA approved courses of which ... are set courses. There were a total of 17 female students in SET courses which was 15.04% of total population of 113 students.

The college currently has a total of 12 classrooms which are shared by all the departments as per the developed time table.

By the end of this year the college had a total of 20 employees 10 being trainers employed by Public Service Commission, 3 being trainers employed by the Board and 7 being non-teaching staff employed by the Board. This staffs were trained through capacity building organised by KATTI the Treasury and other organizations.

The college attended athletic and field events sporting activities held in Tambach Teachers training College for the first time which provided exposure for our students to perform better in future events.

- c) Abuse of a dominant position or monopoly power -when a business that has market power to affect prices or output unilaterally takes anti-competitive actions without sufficient business justification.
- d) Tying – when a company with market power forces customers to take products or services that they do not want or need. This can occur when a company with market power requires a client to purchase one product in order to get another product that the client wants.
- e) Improper exclusive dealing – when a company with a requisite level of market power agrees with others to do business/not do business with another party or parties or refuses to deal with another party or parties.

## **REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON TURKANA EAST TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2024**

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### **PREAMBLE**

I draw your attention to the contents of my report which is in three parts:

- A. Report on Financial Statements that considers whether the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework, accounting standards and the relevant laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the financial statements;
- B. Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources which considers compliance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, gazette notices, circulars, guidelines and manuals and whether public resources are applied in a prudent, efficient, economic, transparent and accountable manner to ensure the Government achieves value for money and that such funds are applied for the intended purpose; and,
- C. Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance which considers how the entity has instituted checks and balances to guide internal operations. This responds to the effectiveness of the governance structure, risk management environment and internal controls, developed and implemented by those charged with governance for orderly, efficient and effective operations of the entity.

A Qualified Opinion is issued when the Auditor-General concludes that, except for material misstatements noted, the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. The Report on Financial Statements should be read together with the Report on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources, and the Report on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance.

The three parts of the report are aimed at addressing the statutory roles and responsibilities of the Auditor-General as provided by Article 229 of the Constitution, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, and the Public Audit Act, 2015. The three parts of the report when read together constitute the report of the Auditor-General.

### **REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

#### **Qualified Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Turkana East Technical and Vocational College set out on pages 1 to 55, which comprises of the statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2024 and the statement of financial performance, statement of

changes in net assets, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Turkana East Technical and Vocational College as at 30 June, 2024 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and comply with the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Act, 2013 and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

#### **1. Unsupported Trade and Other payables**

The statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2024 reflects trade and other payables of Kshs.64,000 as disclosed in Note 35 to the financial statements. However, the College did not provide purchase orders, invoices or supplier statements in respect of trade payables. In addition, the trade payables ageing analysis was not provided for verification.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and completeness of trade payables balance of Kshs.64,000 could not be confirmed.

#### **2. Long Outstanding Receivables from Exchange Transactions**

The statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2024 reflects receivables from exchange transactions of Kshs.2,978,024 as disclosed in Note 26(a) to the financial statements relating to student debtors. However, the balance has been long outstanding over a period of one (1) year. No evidence has been provided on steps taken to collect the debts. In addition, ageing analysis, fee management policy, and reconciled student ledgers were not provided for review.

In the circumstances, the accuracy, completeness and recoverability of receivables from exchange transactions amount of Kshs.2,978,024 could not be confirmed.

#### **3. Lack of Land Ownership and Valuation Documents**

The statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2024 reflects a balance of Kshs.137,138,131 which relates to property, plant, and equipment as disclosed in Note 31 to the financial statements. Included in property, plant, and equipment balance is land valued at Kshs.48,720,000. However, the Management did not provide the title deed and valuation reports for the parcel of land for review.

In the circumstances, the accuracy and ownership of the land balance of Kshs.48,720,000 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of the Turkana East Technical and Vocational College Management in accordance with ISSAI 130 on the Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my adverse opinion.

### **Emphasis of Matter**

#### **Budgetary Control and Performance**

The statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts reflects the final revenue budget of Kshs.25,045,960 against actual revenue of Kshs.9,374,353 resulting in an underfunding of Kshs.15,671,606 or 37% of the budget. Similarly, the actual receipts were Kshs.9,374,353 against the actual expenditure of Kshs.8,517,428, resulting in an under-expenditure of Kshs.856,925. or 9%.

The College did not provide a supplementary budget to rationalize expenditure objectives with the available revenues.

Under-funding of the budget and under-utilization of the funds affected the planned activities and may have impacted negatively on service delivery to the public.

My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

#### **Key Audit Matters**

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section, I have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in my report.

#### **Other Information**

The Management is responsible for the other information set out on page iii to xxviii which comprise of Key Entity Information and Management, summary report of performance of the College and statement of the College management responsibility. The Other Information does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon.

In connection with my audit on the College's financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the Other Information and accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

# REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN THE USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES

## **Conclusion**

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in the Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

## **Basis for Conclusion**

### **1. Non-compliance with the TVETA Quality Management and Assurance Requirements**

During the year under review, the College did not fully adhere to the requirements of the quality assurance manual as detailed below: -

#### **1.1 Programme Accreditation**

Analysis of the documentation provided reveal that out of the fifty-seven (57) programmes offered by the College, only three (3) were approved by the Authority as per Registration Number: TVETA/PUBLIC/TVC/0010/2019. This was contrary to the provision of Section 17(3) of the TVET Act, 2013 that programmes and courses of training must be approved by the Authority before being mounted in the training institution.

In addition, evidence of approval of new or revised TVET Programmes and register of approved programmes maintained by the Board was also not provided for verification.

#### **1.2 Accreditation of Trainers**

Analysis of personnel files of the seventeen (17) trainers in the College revealed that none had been accredited by the Authority. This was contrary to Section 23 of TVET Act, 2013 that states that any person intending to become a trainer is required to apply to the Board for licensing as per Section 23 of the TVET Act, 2013. The trainer should also renew their license every three years, subject to evidence of continuous professional development. A trainer must possess relevant academic (trade area) and professional (pedagogy) qualifications.

#### **1.3 Innovation, Research and Co-operation**

The College did not establish an innovations committee to coordinate and lead innovations, initiate partnerships and collaborations with other institutions and industries, utilize labor market and industry information to enhance the instructional process, improve participation in production units for self-sufficiency, and support training.

It was also noted that no policy or budget was in place to ensure that the results of any research projects are pursued for patenting, commercialization, or subsequent

partnerships that benefit both the researchers and the Institute in achieving its broad objectives.

#### **1.4 Internal Quality Assurance**

Analysis of documents provided revealed that the College had not put in place any internal systems to ensure maintenance of standards, quality and relevance of training programme as required by Section 33(2), of the TVET Act, 2013.

Further, the College has not established its own internal quality assurance policy as required by Regulation 18(2) of the TVET Regulations, 2015 that states that each Institution shall establish its own internal quality assurance policy, systems, and mechanisms in line with the Authority's prescribed guidelines.

In addition, evidence of self-assessment and submission of annual returns to TVETA as required by Regulation 22 of the TVET Regulations, 2015, which requires institutions to conduct self-assessment and submit annual returns to TVETA was not provided.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

#### **2. Unexplained Variance in Student Enrollment Data**

The student ledger provided listed a total of three hundred and four (304) students. However, the validated list of students submitted to the state department for Vocational and Technical Training included three hundred and ninety-nine (399) students. This discrepancy resulted in an unexplained variance of student count by ninety-five (95), leading to potential excess disbursement of funding to the College for capitation, scholarship and recurrent grants for non-existent students.

Further, the Institution did not maintain an updated and validated list of students' ledgers for the respective courses offered.

In the circumstances, the total number of students registered in the College could not be confirmed.

#### **3. Lack of a Staggered Board**

Verification of the board of directors' formation and expenditure for the financial year ended 30 June, 2024 revealed the following: -

- i. The appointment of the board of directors was not staggered to avoid disruption of activities when their term came to an end. All the board members were appointed on 15 March, 2023 for a term of three (3) years, while the previous board term of service lapsed on 13 January, 2023 resulting in a leadership gap and lack of succession for two (2) months.
- ii. Scrutiny of the board minutes provided revealed the board did not have a board charter and board work plan. Hence, there was no evidence of a quality assurance process, risk management strategies, and board members' competency development in the governance objective of the board members.

- iii. In addition, the board held only two (2) full board meetings within the financial year, contrary to the provisions of Section 1 of the first schedule of the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Act, 2013 which states that the board shall meet as often as necessary to transact business, but not more than four months shall elapse between the date of one meeting and that of the next.

In the circumstances, Management was in breach of the law.

#### **4. Lack of Approved Staff Establishment**

Review of the payroll records for the year ended 30 June, 2024 revealed that the College did not have an approved staff establishment to guide on the number of staff and the cadres the College is authorized to have. This was contrary to State Corporations Advisory Committee Circular Ref: OP/SCAC.9/21/1/1 dated 15 May, 2017, that required all state corporations to develop and submit for approval by 31 August, 2017 their Organizational Structure; Staff Grading and Establishment; Career Guidelines; and, the Human Resource Policies and Procedures Manual.

Further, based on human resource plans, the College is required to prepare and develop annual recruitment plans which will be forwarded to the Public Service Commission at the beginning of each financial year to enable it plan to fill the vacancies as per Section B.2 (1) of the Human Resource Policies and Procedures Manual for the Public Service of May, 2016.

In the circumstances, the Management was in breach of the law.

#### **5. Non-Compliance with Affirmative Action on Gender Balance, Ethnic and Regional Distribution**

Analysis of the staff biodata and other human resource records provided for audit verification for the year under review revealed that the College had eleven (11) board of Management employees, out of whom eight (8) or 73% were from the dominant community. This was contrary to the requirements of National Cohesion and Integration Act, 2008.

In the circumstances, the Management was in breach of the law

#### **6. Payment of Wages Below the set Minimum Wage**

The statement of financial performance for the year ended 30 June, 2024, disclosed an expenditure on employee costs amounting to Kshs.1,746,196, disclosed in Note 15 to the financial statements. Included in the payments are salaries and wages amounting to Kshs.1,154,882. However, review of the payroll provided indicated that the entity had eleven (11) employees out of whom four (4) employees were receiving a monthly salary below Kshs.8,109.90 contrary to the Regulation of Wages Order of 2022.

In the circumstances, the College was in breach of Government regulations.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 3000 and ISSAI 4000. The standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements comply in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

## REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

### **Conclusion**

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance section of my report, I confirm that nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and governance were not effective.

### **Basis for Conclusion**

#### **1. Lack of Internal Audit Function and Audit Committee**

Review of the entity's internal controls for the year ended 30 June, 2024 revealed that the Management had not established an internal audit department to carry out internal audit functions. It was also noted that the College did not have an Audit Committee of the Board.

In the circumstances, the existence and effectiveness of the internal controls and oversight services in the Institution could not be confirmed.

#### **2. Lack of Disaster Recovery Plan**

A disaster recovery plan/ business continuity plan was not in place to ensure that the Institution recovers its functionality in case of an unplanned incident or disaster.

In the circumstances, the College may not recover from the effects of unforeseen disasters.

#### **3. Weak Information Technology Environment**

Examination of the College's operations revealed that the Management lacked an efficient computer-based system for gathering, storing, and processing information for management decision-making. Moreover, the College lacked an IT steering committee, which is vital in performing oversight functions, formulating policies, and ensuring that the IT department functions properly. In addition, the College lacked an approved IT strategic plan, which is intended to align the organization's goals and mission to technologies and priorities.

In the circumstances, the College may not benefit from advantages of using information technology.

#### **4. Lack of an Imprest Register and Memorandum Cash Book**

The statement of financial position and as disclosed in Note 14 to the financial statements reflects use of goods and services amount of Kshs.5,444,977 that includes an amount of Kshs.2,184,470 in respect of travelling and accommodation expenses. Review of supporting documents revealed that Management did not maintain an approved memorandum cash book or imprest register to support the imprests issued as required by Regulation 93(4) of the Public Finance Management (National Government) Regulations, 2015 which requires the accounting officer to ensure that the applicant for imprest is recorded in the imprest register including the amount applied for, before temporary imprest is issued. Further, there were no surrender vouchers to confirm whether the imprests were applied for, approved and surrendered as required.

In the circumstances, the effectiveness of internal controls in imprest management could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 2315 and ISSAI 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal controls, risk Management and overall governance were operating effectively in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

#### **Responsibilities of the Management and the Board of Management**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and for maintaining effective internal controls as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management, and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the College's ability to continue to sustain services, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to sustainability of services and using the applicable basis of accounting unless Management is aware of the intention to cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions, and information reflected in the financial statements comply with the authorities which govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

The Board of Management is responsible for overseeing the College's financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how Management monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and

systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

### **Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit**

My responsibility is to conduct an audit of the financial statements in accordance with Article 229(4) of the Constitution, Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and the International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). The standards require that, in conducting the audit, I obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with IFPP will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting the audit, Article 229(6) of the Constitution also requires that I express a conclusion on whether or not in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way. In addition, I consider the entity's control environment in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Further, I am required to submit the audit report in accordance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

**19. Notes to the Financial Statements**

**1. General Information**

Turkana East TVC entity is established by and derives its authority and accountability from TVET Act, 2013. The entity is wholly owned by the Government of Kenya and is domiciled in Kenya. The entity's principal activity is providing technical education.

**2. Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis except for the measurement at re-valued amounts of certain items of property, plant and equipment, marketable securities and financial instruments at fair value, impaired assets at their estimated recoverable amounts and actuarially determined liabilities at their present value. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) allows the use of estimates and assumptions. It also requires management to exercise judgement in the process of applying the *entity's* accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in Note 5.

The financial statements have been prepared and presented in Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the *entity*.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the PFM Act, the TVET Act, and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

**4. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

- a) **Revenue recognition**
  - i) **Revenue from non-exchange transactions**

**Transfers from other government entities**

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the entity and can be measured reliably. To the extent that there is a related condition attached that would give rise to a liability to repay the amount, the amount is recorded in the statement of financial position and realised in the statement of financial performance over the useful life of the assets that have been acquired using such funds.

- ii) **Revenue from exchange transactions**

**Rendering of services**

The entity recognizes revenue from rendering of services by reference to the stage of completion when the outcome of the transaction can be estimated reliably. The stage of completion is measured by reference to labour hours incurred to date as a percentage of total estimated labour hours. Where the contract outcome cannot be measured reliably, revenue is recognized only to the extent that the expenses incurred are recoverable.

**Sale of goods**

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods and when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential associated with the transaction will flow to the entity.

**Interest income**

Interest income is accrued using the effective yield method. The effective yield discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this yield to the principal outstanding to determine interest income each period.

**Rental income**

Rental income arising from operating leases on investment properties is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease terms and included in revenue.

**b) Budget information**

The original budget for FY 2022/2023 was approved by the Board in May 2023. Subsequent revisions or additional appropriations were made to the approved budget in accordance with specific approvals from the appropriate authorities. The additional appropriations are added to the original budget by the entity upon receiving the respective approvals in order to conclude the final budget. Accordingly, the entity recorded additional appropriations of 0.00 on the FY 2022/2023 budget following the Board's approval.

The entity's budget is prepared on a different basis to the actual income and expenditure disclosed in the financial statements. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on a cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the accrual basis to the cash basis and reclassified by presentation to be on the same basis as the approved budget. A comparison of budget and actual amounts, prepared on a comparable basis to the approved budget, is then presented in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts.

In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget.

A statement to reconcile the actual amounts on a comparable basis included in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts and the actuals as per the statement of financial performance has been presented under section *XVII* of these financial statements.

**c) Taxes**

***Current income tax***

The entity is exempt from paying taxes as per schedule the *Income Tax Act*.

***Sales tax/ Value Added Tax***

Expenses and assets are recognized net of the amount of sales tax, except:

- When the sales tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the sales tax is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of sales tax included.

The net amount of sales tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

**d) Investment property**

Investment properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. The carrying amount includes the replacement cost of components of an existing investment property at the time that cost is incurred if the recognition criteria are met and excludes the costs of day-to-day maintenance of an investment property.

Investment property acquired through a non-exchange transaction is measured at its fair value at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured using the cost model and are depreciated over a period of 40 years.

Investment properties are derecognized either when they have been disposed of or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit or service potential is expected from its disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognized in the surplus or deficit in the period of de-recognition.

Transfers are made to or from investment property only when there is a change in use.

**e) Property, plant and equipment**

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the item of property appropriately according to the acronyms you use in your financial statements plant and equipment. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the entity recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus, or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

**f) Leases**

Finance leases are leases that transfer substantially the entire risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Assets held under a finance lease are capitalized at the commencement of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the future minimum lease payments. The Entity also recognizes the associated lease liability at the inception of the lease. The liability recognized is measured as the present value of the future minimum lease payments at initial recognition. Subsequent to initial recognition, lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease liability to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognized as finance costs in surplus or deficit. An asset held under a finance lease is depreciated over the useful life of the asset. However, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Entity will obtain ownership of the asset by the end of the lease term, the asset is depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term. Operating leases are leases that do not transfer substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the Entity. Operating lease payments are recognized as an operating expense in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

**g) Intangible assets**

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognized at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Internally generated intangible assets, excluding capitalized development costs, are not capitalized and expenditure is reflected in surplus or deficit in the period in which the expenditure is incurred. The useful life of the intangible assets is assessed as either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with an indefinite useful life are assessed for impairment at each reporting date.

**h) Research and development costs**

The Entity expenses research costs as incurred. Development costs on an individual project are recognized as intangible assets when the Entity can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale.
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset.
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits or service potential
- The availability of resources to complete the asset.
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

Following initial recognition of an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortization of the asset begins when development is complete, and the asset is available for use. It is amortized over the period of expected future benefit. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually with any impairment losses recognized immediately in surplus or deficit.

**i) Financial instruments**

IPSAS 41 addresses the classification, measurement and de-recognition of financial assets and financial liabilities, introduces new rules for hedge accounting and a new impairment model for financial assets. *The entity does not have any hedge relationships and therefore the new hedge accounting rules have no impact on the Company's financial statements. (amend as appropriate).* A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. At initial recognition, the entity measures a financial asset or financial liability at its fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial asset or financial liability not at fair value through surplus or deficit, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability.

*Financial assets*

**Classification**

The entity classifies its financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through net assets/ equity, or fair value through surplus and deficit on the basis of both the entity's management model for financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset. A financial asset is measured at amortized cost when the financial asset is held within a management model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding. A financial asset is measured at fair value through net assets/ equity if it is held within the management model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cashflows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. A financial asset shall be measured at fair value through surplus or deficit unless it is measured at amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity unless an entity has made an irrevocable election at initial recognition for particular investments in equity instruments.

**Subsequent measurement**

Based on the business model and the cash flow characteristics, the entity classifies its financial assets into amortized cost or fair value categories for financial instruments. Movements in fair value are presented in either surplus or deficit or through net assets/ equity subject to certain criteria being met.

**Amortized cost**

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, and that are not designated at fair value through surplus or deficit, are measured at amortized cost. A gain or loss on an instrument that is subsequently measured at amortized cost and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognized in profit or loss when the asset is de-recognized or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

**Fair value through net assets/ equity**

Financial assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at fair value through net assets/ equity. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through net assets, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in surplus/deficit. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.

**Fair value through surplus or deficit**

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or fair value through net assets/ equity are measured at fair value through surplus or deficit. A business model where the entity manages financial assets with the objective of realizing cash flows through solely the sale of the assets would result in a fair value through surplus or deficit model.

**Trade and other receivables**

Trade and other receivables are recognized at fair values less allowances for any uncollectible amounts. Trade and other receivables are assessed for impairment on a continuing basis. An estimate is made of doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the year-end.

**Impairment**

The entity assesses, on a forward-looking basis, the expected credit loss ('ECL') associated with its financial assets carried at amortized cost and fair value through net assets/equity. The entity recognizes a loss allowance for such losses at each reporting date. Critical estimates and significant judgments made by management in determining the expected credit loss (ECL) are set out in *Note xx*.

***Financial liabilities***

***Classification***

The entity classifies its liabilities as subsequently measured at amortized cost except for financial liabilities measured through profit or loss.

**j) Inventories**

Inventory is measured at cost upon initial recognition. To the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions (for no cost or for a nominal cost), the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition.

Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for, as follows:

- Raw materials: purchase cost using the weighted average cost method.
- Finished goods and work in progress: cost of direct materials and labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity but excluding borrowing costs.

After initial recognition, inventory is measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. However, to the extent that a class of inventory is distributed or deployed at no charge or for a nominal charge, that class of inventory is measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost.

### **Inventories (Continued)**

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of operations, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange, or distribution. Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption in the ordinary course of operations of the *Entity*.

### **k) Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when the *Entity* has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Where the *Entity* expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

### ***Contingent liabilities***

The *Entity* does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

### ***Contingent assets***

The *Entity* does not recognize a contingent asset but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the *Entity* in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

### **l) Social Benefits**

Social benefits are cash transfers provided to i) specific individuals and/or households that meet the eligibility criteria, ii) mitigate the effects of social risks and iii) Address the need of society as a whole. The entity recognises a social benefit as an expense for the social benefits scheme at the same time that it recognises a liability. The liability for the social benefit scheme is measured at the best estimate of the cost (the social benefit payments) that the entity will incur in fulfilling the present obligations represented by the liability.

**m) Nature and purpose of reserves**

The *Entity* creates and maintains reserves in terms of specific requirements. (*Entity to state the reserves maintained and appropriate policies adopted*).

**n) Changes in accounting policies and estimates**

The *Entity* recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

**o) Employee benefits**

**Retirement benefit plans**

The *Entity* provides retirement benefits for its employees and directors. Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity (a fund) and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The contributions to fund obligations for the payment of retirement benefits are charged against income in the year in which they become payable. Defined benefit plans are post-employment benefit plans other than defined-contribution plans. The defined benefit funds are actuarially valued tri-annually on the projected unit credit method basis. Deficits identified are recovered through lump sum payments or increased future contributions on proportional basis to all participating employers. The contributions and lump sum payments reduce the post-employment benefit obligation.

**p) Foreign currency transactions**

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially accounted for at the ruling rate of exchange on the date of the transaction. Trade creditors or debtors denominated in foreign currency are reported at the statement of financial position reporting date by applying the exchange rate on that date. Exchange differences arising from the settlement of creditors, or from the reporting of creditors at rates different from those at which they were initially recorded during the period, are recognized as income or expenses in the period in which they arise.

**q) Borrowing costs**

Borrowing costs are capitalized against qualifying assets as part of property, plant and equipment. Such borrowing costs are capitalized over the period during which the asset is being acquired or constructed and borrowings have been incurred. Capitalization ceases when construction of the asset is complete. Further borrowing costs are charged to the statement of financial performance.

**r) Related parties**

The *Entity* regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly or to exercise significant influence over the Entity, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the directors, the Principal and senior managers.

**s) Service concession arrangements**

The *Entity* analyses all aspects of service concession arrangements that it enters into in determining the appropriate accounting treatment and disclosure requirements. In particular, where a private party contributes an asset to the arrangement, the *Entity* recognizes that asset when, and only when, it controls or regulates the services. The operator must provide together with the asset, to whom it must provide them, and at what price. In the case of assets other than 'whole-of-life' assets, it controls, through ownership, beneficial entitlement or otherwise – any significant residual interest in the asset at the end of the arrangement. Any assets so recognized are measured at their fair value. To the extent that an asset has been recognized, the *Entity* also recognizes a corresponding liability, adjusted by a cash consideration paid or received.

**t) Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year. For the purposes of these financial statements, cash and cash equivalents also include short-term cash imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year.

**u) Comparative figures**

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.

**v) Subsequent events**

There have been no events subsequent to the financial year end with a significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2024

## **5. Significant Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty**

The preparation of the *Entity's* financial statements in conformity with IPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

### **Estimates and assumptions.**

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Entity based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the consolidated financial statements were prepared. However, existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Entity. ### **Useful lives and residual values**

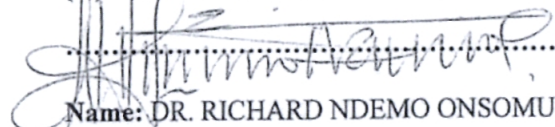
