EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report is prepared in compliance with Article 154 (b) of the Constitution and details the Ministry's activities during the Financial Year 2017/2018.

Although the primary purpose of the report is to provide members of the National Assembly with an accurate description of the activities of the Department during 2017/2018, we recognise that the report is also an invaluable source of information for the general public. In preparing the report, therefore, we have endeavoured to take into consideration the requirements of such a diverse audience and provide readers with a useful and informative picture of the Ministry's performance during the period under review.

The size and complexity of the ministry does not give room for the inclusion of all achievements registered nor the challenges encountered. For this reason, this section discusses the main activities, including major departmental achievements closely aligned to the strategic direction of the country. This includes the acquisition of 1700 assorted motor vehicles and over 4900 motorcycles for chiefs and assistant chiefs, recruitment of 10,000 officers, a wide range of legislative, policy and institutional reforms aimed at improving service delivery to the citizenry among others.

STRUCTURE OF THE MINISTRY

The Ministry executes its mandate through the following Departments, Directorates, Authorities, Boards and Independent Commissions:

1. STATE DEPARTMENT FOR INTERIOR

i) Directorates

a) National Government Administration and Field Services

The National Government Administration is mandated to coordinate National Government business at the County, Sub-County, Division, Location and Sub-Location levels. It is responsible for; coordinating security at the counties, Development coordination, Peace building and conflict management and resolution, Enforcement of Government policies and laws and promotion of National Cohesion and Value.

b) Directorate of Internal Security

The mandate of the Internal Security Directorate includes; Coordination of Security and Intelligence Committees at the Counties, Internal Security, Oversight over Internal Security, and other aspects of national security.

c) National Police Service

The National Police Service mandate includes: Protection of life and property; Provision of assistance to the public when in need; Maintenance of law and order; Preservation of peace; Prevention and detection of crime; Apprehension of offenders; Investigation of crimes; Collection of criminal intelligence; Conduct forensic analysis; Maintenance of criminal records; Receiving and investigating complaints; Provision of border patrol and border security; Provision of specialized stock theft prevention services; Protection of Government property, vital installations and strategic points; Coordinating with complementing Government agencies in conflict management and peace building; Rendering of support to Government agencies in the enforcement of administrative functions and exercise of lawful duties; Fostering relationships with international police agencies and Enforcement of all laws and regulations with which it is charged.

The service is made up of the Kenya Police Service and Administration Police Service and the Semi-Autonomous Directorate of Criminal Investigations.

d) Civil Registration Department (CRD)

The registration of births and deaths in Kenya is governed by the Births and Deaths Registration Act CAP149 enacted in 1928 [GOK, 1928]. Civil Registration Services is the only institution mandated under the Act to register all births and deaths that occur in Kenya and those of Kenyans occurring abroad; preserve, secure, maintain and update births and deaths records; process vital statistics annually for socio-economic planning; issue birth and death certificates to members of the public; carry out recognition and re-registration upon legitimization.

e) National Registration Bureau (NRB)

The National Registration Bureau is mandated by Cap 107 Laws of Kenya to; Identify, register and issue ID cards to all Kenyans who have attained the age of 18 years and above, maintain a comprehensive reliable register of all registered citizens for use by stakeholders and detect and prevent illegal registration.

f) Integrated Population Registration Services (IPRS)

The Integrated Population Registration Service is mandated to implement and manage the Integrated Population Registration System (IPRS). This is a government endeavour to create a National population register as a single source of truth of population information of all Kenyan citizens and registered foreigners resident in Kenya.

g) Peace Building and Conflict Management Directorate

The Peace Building and Conflict Management Directorate serves as the Secretariat for the National Steering Committee on Peace building and Conflict Management (NSCPBCM). Its mandate is to consolidate and coordinate peace building and conflict management initiatives in the country and at the cross border levels.

h) Kenya National Focal Point on Small Arms and Light Weapons

The Kenya National Focal Point (KNFP) on Small Arms and Light Weapons (SALW) was established to ensure stringent control and management of the SALW in the country. Its mandate is to develop a policy on Small Arms and Light Weapons, establish a database on all state owned fire arms, provide civic education on the SALW and coordinate the implementation of National and international conventions on SALW.

i) Kenya School of Adventure and Leadership (KESAL)

KESAL is a public outdoor training center which offers unique and high impact experiential-based training solutions aimed at enhancing leadership skills and team spirit in both government and private sector personnel.

j) Government Press

The Government Press is charged with the responsibility of printing and publishing official Government documents as and when required at affordable costs. It also prints all documents required for revenue collection in the Government. It also does minimal commercial printing.

k) National Disaster Operation Centre (NDOC)

NDOC is mandated to monitor hazards, emergencies, and disasters, co-ordinate and mobilize resources for response, and carry out Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR).

l) National Government Communication Centre (NGCC)

The National Government Communication Centre (NGCC) is a strategic communication unit within the Ministry responsible for coordinating central government communication programs through expert application of communication resources, leveraging of synergy between state agencies and implementation of special public communication projects relevant to identified contexts. The Center ensures constant, consistent and cohesive messaging across all public engagement platforms.

NGCC is the sole government entity handling crises communication interventions encompassing disaster, risk and security related communication among others.

m) Government Chemist Department (GCD)

GCD's mandate includes: Provision of quantitative and qualitative forensic science and analytical laboratory services; Provision of scientific crime scene support services; Provision of technical reports and certificates based on scientific analytical findings; Provision of expert evidence in the administration of justice; Undertake research, surveys and field tests in forensic science and Chemical matters of national importance; Participate in technical committees on standards, scientific boards, curriculum development, formulation and reviews of scientific policies; Coordination in the implementation of the Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC) as the National Focal Point; Coordination of the Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) initiative and provision of capacity building to stakeholders in scientific matters.

ii) SAGAS and Agencies

a) Betting Control and Licensing Board (BCLB)

Betting Control and Licensing Board is mandated to regulate the Gaming industry in Kenya through licensing and controlling both gaming and betting premises and the activities carried therein, facilitate generation and collection of both casino and betting taxes, authorize public lotteries and prize competitions, and eradicate illegal gambling.

b) NGO Coordination Board

The NGOs Coordination Board is mandated to; facilitate, co-ordinate and regulate the work of all National and International NGOs operating in Kenya and advise the National Government on the activities of NGOs and their role in development in Kenya.

c) Firearms Licensing Board

The Board is mandated to: certify the suitability of applicants and periodically assess proficiency of firearms holders; issue, cancel, terminate or vary any license or permit issued; register civilians firearm holders, dealers and manufacturers of firearms; register, supervise and control all shooting ranges and establish and manage a centralized record management system.

d) National Crime Research Centre (NCRC)

NCRC is mandated to; carry out research into crime, causes of crime and its prevention and to disseminate the research findings and recommendations to the Government agencies concerned with the administration of criminal justice and other stakeholders.

e) Private Security Regulatory Authority Board

The Authority is mandated to ensure the effective administration, supervision regulation and control of the private security services industry in the country, formulate and enforce standards for the conduct of the industry.

f) National Authority for the Campaign Against Drug Abuse

NACADA was established by the NACADA Act of 2012 (CAP 121 b) Laws of Kenya, to coordinate a multi-sectoral effort aimed at preventing, controlling and mitigating alcohol and drug abuse in Kenya. The agency is also tasked with developing and enforcing national standards for establishment of treatment and rehabilitation programmes and Coordination of research on alcohol and drugs abuse to inform policy and programs.

iii) Constitutional Commissions

a) National Cohesion and Integration Commission (NCIC)

The NCIC has a broad mandate of handling issues of national cohesion and integration, tackling inequality and consolidating cohesion and unity. It contributes to the sector in achieving the objective of national cohesion and reconciliation. During the period under review, the Commission engaged in various communities as stakeholders, received and processed complaints regarding discrimination and hate speech.

b) Independent Policing Oversight Authority (IPOA)

The Independent Policing Oversight Authority is established to provide civilian oversight over the work of the National Police Service. The Authority is one of the critical police reform institutions that came into existence after the promulgation of the new Constitution in August 2010. The Authority exists as a civilian accountability mechanism to promote public trust and confidence in the National Police Service.

c) National Police Service Commission (NPSC)

The National Police Service Commission is a body corporate with the broad mandate of overseeing the management of the Human Resource function of the National Police Service in recruitment, appointments, promotions and transfers as well as exercise disciplinary control over officers in the NPS.

2. STATE DEPARTMENT FOR CORRECTIONAL SERVICES

i) Kenya Prisons Service

Kenya Prison Service is established under the Prisons Act Cap 90 and Borstal Institutions Act Cap 92 Laws of Kenya. The mandate of Kenya Prison Service is to contain and keep offenders in safe custody, facilitate administration of justice through production of offenders to courts, rehabilitation of offenders through training, counselling, educational and professional programmes, control and training of youthful offenders in Borstal Institutions and Youth Corrective Training Center.

ii) Probation and Aftercare Services

Probation and Aftercare Service is a correctional service established under the Probation of Offenders Act CAP 64, and Community Service Orders Act CAP 93, laws of Kenya to Promote and enhance the administration of justice, community safety and public protection through provision of social inquiry reports, supervision and reintegration of non-custodial offenders, victim support and social crime prevention.

3. STATE DEPARTMENT FOR IMMIGRATION, BORDER CONTROL AND CITIZEN SERVICES

i) Directorate of Immigration

The Department of Immigration is mandated to; Control and regulate entry and exit of all persons at our airports, seaports and land borders posts, Control and regulate residency through issuance and renewal of work permits, residence permits and other passes, consider and grant Kenyan citizenship to qualified foreigners, Issuance of entry visas, register all non-citizens residents in Kenya, Declare and remove prohibited immigrants, provide consular services Kenya nationals and foreigners at all missions abroad, offer quasi-consular functions of a number of commonwealth countries who are not represented in Kenya and who have requested the Kenyan government to do so and investigate and prosecute persons who contravene the Immigration laws and regulations.

ii) Refugees Affairs Secretariat

The Refugees Affairs Secretariat is mandated to: Coordinate and promote the welfare and protection of refugees in Kenya; Formulate policies on refugee matters in accordance with the International Conventions and Refugee Act 2006; Ensure in liaison with UN agencies and other institutions, the provision of adequate facilities and services for protection, reception and care of refugees within Kenya; Register all asylum seekers and refugees in Kenya and maintain a register for reference; Issue identity cards and travel documents to refugees; Manage refugee camps and other related facilities. Promote the welfare of refugees host communities; In collaboration with development partners, initiate projects that promote peaceful and harmonious co-existence between refugees and the host communities.

iii) Refugee Appeals Board

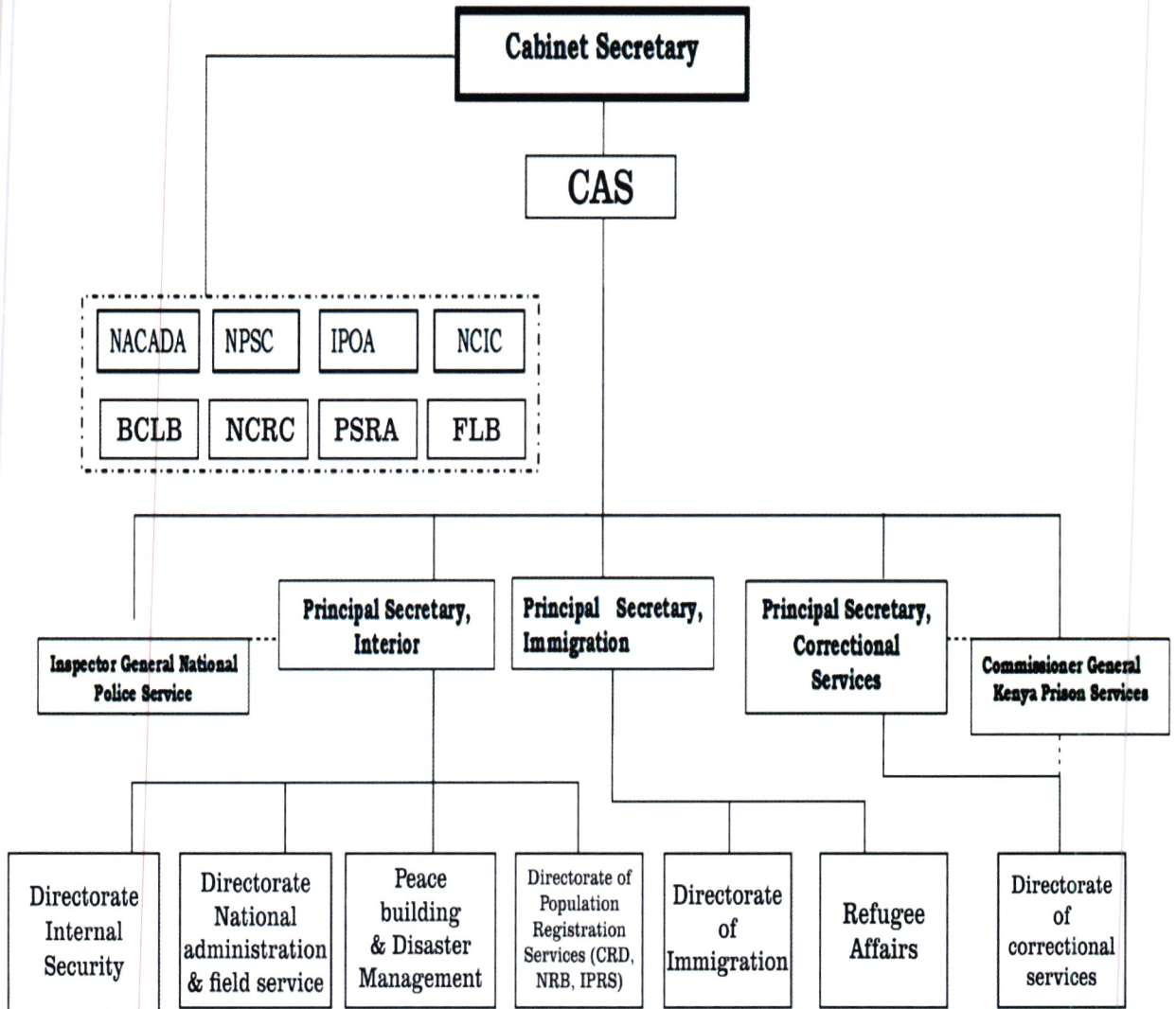
The Refugee Appeals Board is a quasi-judicial institution that is established under section 9 of the Refugees Act 2006. However, it was until April 2015 that the Cabinet Secretary, in line with section 9(2) appointed the board chair and members. Ideally, the Cabinet Secretary, as provided for under Clause 4 of the First Schedule, is to appoint persons who will be members of the staff of the Appeal board and the said persons are to be public servants. The mandate of the Board is to consider and decide appeals under the Act. Specifically, the board is mandated to hear appeals arising from any decision of the commissioner with regard to management of refugee affairs in Kenya.

iv) Border Management Secretariat

The Border Management Secretariat is established to improve operation and for coordination of border agencies to enhance information sharing and best practices among the different agencies stationed at the border points.

CHAPTER TWO

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS 2017/18 FINANCIAL YEAR

This Chapter highlights the Ministry's major achievements by the three State Departments for the period under review. During the FY 2017/18 the Ministry was allocated a total of Ksh. 154,330.32 million both for recurrent and development as shown in the summary below;

The prudent and effective Departmental utilization of the allocated resources resulted into the achievements listed below.

STATE DEPARTMENT FOR INTERIOR

1. National Police Service (NPS)

a) Enhanced Mobility

Police mobility was improved through acquisition of Armoured automobiles (30 APCs, 25 MRAPs), 1,200 vehicles. Air transport was equally expanded to provide aerial support and transportation of troops as well as enhance reconnaissance missions. The National Police Air wing increased its fleet to eleven (11) aircrafts through the purchase of both fixed wing and helicopters. The ministry will continue to strengthen the NPS Air wing for improved and faster service delivery.

b) Forensic Laboratory

The NPS completed the construction of the Forensic Laboratory at the DCI headquarters and commenced the equipping of the same.

c) Integrated Communication, Command and Control Centres (IC3)

The Integrated Communication, Command and Control Centres (IC3) were established and 1,850 cameras installed in Nairobi and Mombasa to offer real time 24hr security surveillance. Furthermore, an expansion of this project is on-going to cover Nairobi metropolis including the Southern Bypass and informal settlements.

d) NPS Basic Training Curriculum

The NPS developed and implemented a new ‘Basic Training Curriculum’, Service Standing Orders and the Scheme of Service for Officers. A review of the supervisory, managerial and strategic training curricula is currently on-going.

e) Nyumba Kumi

The Service collaborated and supported 387,000 area-based Nyumba Kumi clusters. These committees have enhanced security and reduced crime especially in the informal settlements.

f) Recruitment

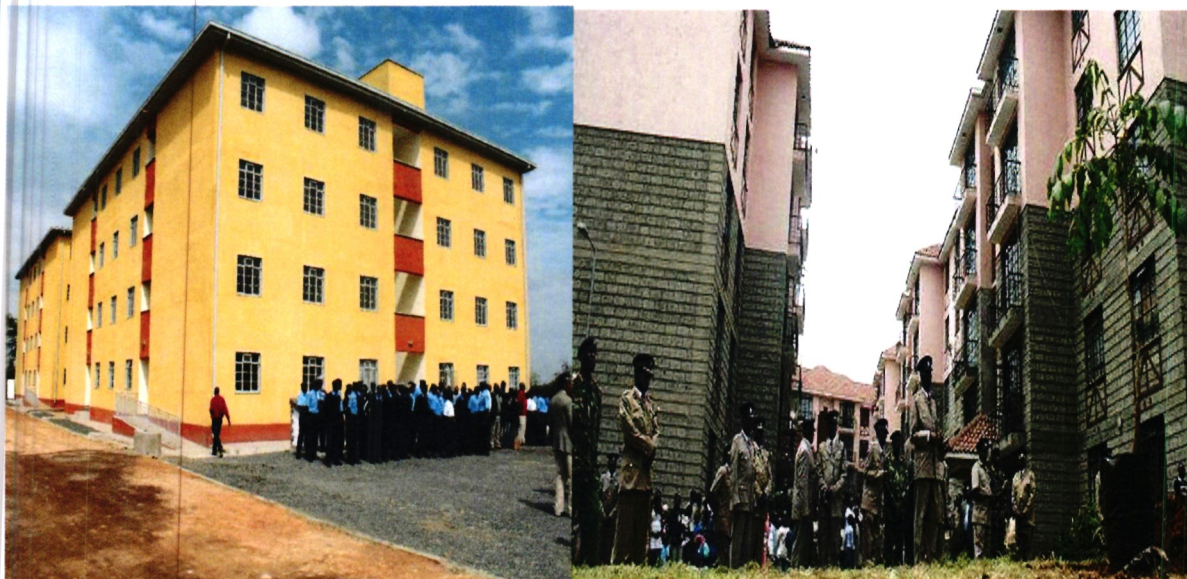
The NPS successfully recruited, trained and deployed 10,000 police constables, bringing the police to citizen ratio to 1:444 and surpassing the UN recommended ratio of 1:450. Additionally, 2,500 police reservists were recruited.

g) Housing

Completed the construction and refurbishment of 800 police housing units and several police stations.

2. National Government Administration Services

a) Creation of new administrative units

During the period under review, the Cabinet Secretary, with the approval of H.E the President and in exercise of Powers conferred on him by Section 14(1) and (3) of the National Government Coordination Act, 2013; established vide several gazette notices new administrative units. This move increased the number of Sub Counties to three hundred and twenty three (323), nine hundred and seventy two (972) Divisions, five thousand eight hundred and seventy (5,870) Locations and ten thousand seven hundred and eighty six (10,786) Sub locations. Besides bringing services closer to Wananchi, the new units have created thousands of job opportunities for our citizens and opened up hitherto remote and under developed areas.

b) Enhanced mobility

To ensure that the National Government administrators who chair the security committees at each level of the Administrative structure are able to effectively coordinate security issues, the Government through the leasing programme provided a total of four hundred and thirty (430) vehicles.

Chiefs across the Country were provided with Four thousand nine hundred and seventy (4,970) motorcycles. This has boosted the morale of officers, work output, efficiency and promptness in dissemination of government initiatives, policies, conflict management and all security related matters in their areas of jurisdiction.

c) Public Awareness

The Ministry continued to execute its public awareness campaign programme through the National Government Administrators. Emphasis was put on educating Kenyans on the services being offered as enumerated in the service delivery charter. This has been through display of the service charters on notice boards in government offices, public barazas and in many forums where members of the public have unlimited access.

d) Crackdown on illicit brews and drugs

During the same period, the fight against alcohol and substance abuse was enhanced. A total of 8,714 premises were inspected and 2,655 premises did not meet the minimum public health standards while 3,129 were operating without valid liquor licenses. 1,554 outlets were closed and 4,161 persons were arrested for failure to comply with the requisite alcohol standards and legislation. 273,443 products were seized for lack of KEBS standardization marks and KRA stamps. The Government is strengthening collaboration with multi-agency teams and county governments to fast track the harmonization and enforcement of existing legal and policy frameworks to suppress production, sale, distribution and consumption of illicit alcohol; and curb underage drinking. The Ministry will continue with these initiatives to ensure a safer and healthier Nation.

Further, the Ministry held joint peace campaigns with Youth Enterprise Development Fund dubbed “Sauti 47” in 28 Counties with over 30,500 youth leaders focusing on embracing peaceful elections, desisting from alcohol and drug abuse during the election period and engaging sustainable entrepreneur activities.

e) Establishment of Complaint Communication Channels

The Ministry reactivated its complaints handling mechanisms at all levels and was able to address and resolve 86% of the complaints received.

3. Population Registration Services

- a) Digitized of over 2.5 million births and death records.
- b) Rolled out the CRVSS system in Nairobi, National Registry, Thika, Kiambu, Ruiru, Kajiado and Machakos sub counties. The system is used to process births and deaths certificates, generate vital statistics and share data with other agencies, so far about 35,000 births certificate have been issued using the system.
- c) Registered of 60.9% and 41.2% birth and death coverage respectively.
- d) Implemented the MCH strategy in the counties of Homabay, Nakuru, Bungoma, Kilifi, Migori, Kwale, Kirinyaga, Siaya , Nairobi, Isiolo, Lamu, Mandera, Marsabit and Wajir through the support of partners (WHO, UNFPA, CDC, MEASURE Evaluation, PLAN). The MCH is a strategy that allows for the use of the mother and child clinic service points (post-natal clinic) as registration of births points. It works by allowing children who were born at home but whose births were not registered by the Assistant Chief to have them registered at the hospital when they are taken for immunization.
- e) Issued 3.5 million new identity cards to persons who attained eighteen years to facilitate them to register as voters prior to the 2017 General elections.

- f) Operationalized 39 more registration offices.
- g) Issued one thousand, one hundred seventy six (1176) identity cards members of the Makonde community as citizens to all those who were eligible.

- h) Operationalized Huduma Centres across the country through the installation of 101 live capture units in 43 centers to assist in the application of duplicate Identity Cards by the NRB.
- i) Connected 20 agencies to the IPRS.

4. Government Press

- a) Installed 9 printing machines, improving its capacity to a tune of printing 48.5 million documents annually.
- b) Published the *Kenya Gazette* and its Supplements, i.e. Legislative Supplements, Bills and Acts of Parliament including those of the County Governments.

5. National Government Communication Centre

- a) Developed and distributed to relevant government MDAs, the crisis communication red handbook which is a collection of standard communication operating procedures in times of crises.
- b) Introduced a strategic communications function in state authorities including Statehouse, Ministry of Interior and Office of the National Government Spokesperson.
- c) Developed an events planning checklist to facilitate effective planning of media in events.
- d) Established a consistent message framework for addressing key issues that involve a cycle of analysis, planning, production and evaluation.
- e) Improved response time by public entities to media inquiries from seven down to the same day. Government officials particularly from the Executive and security agencies regularly communicate with the media on topics that concern society.

6. NACADA

- a) Established and refurbished 10 county-based treatment and rehabilitation facilities
- b) Inspected and accredited 92 treatment and rehabilitation facilities in compliance with the National Standards for Treatment and Rehabilitation of Persons with Substance Use Disorder.

- c) Carried out national, regional and thematic research studies to inform evidence-based interventions on alcohol and drug abuse.
- d) NACADA in collaboration with KANCO conducted a stakeholder mapping exercise and developed a National Directory for Organizations Offering Services on Prevention, Treatment, Harm Reduction, Rehabilitation and Aftercare on Alcohol and Drug Abuse in Kenya.

7. The Kenya National Focal Point on Small Arms and Light Weapons

The proliferation of small arms and light weapons is one of the biggest security threats currently facing Kenya. During the period under review, the directorate registered the following achievements:-

- a) Developed the National Policy on Small Arms and Light Weapons.
- b) Signed and ratified the Arms Trade Treaty.
- c) The directorate in compliance with the Nairobi Protocol and the International Tracing Instrument has marked over 98% of Government held stocks of small arms and light weapons. Coordinated the destruction of 5,250 assorted weapons which were recovered through security operations by law enforcement agencies and voluntary surrender.

8. Peace Building and Disaster Response Management (PDRM)

- a) Developed the National Policy on Peacebuilding and Conflict Management in Kenya.
- b) Developed Guidelines for Mediators and Mediation.
- c) Developed and operationalized Standard Guidelines for Peace Structures in Kenya.
- d) Rebranded and strengthened the UWIANO Platform for Peace thus tapping on the comparative advantage of all the partners such as NCIC, IEBC, MCK, IRCK, UNDP, UN Women, ORPP among others.
- e) Enhanced visibility of Uwiano SMS 108, integration of Early Warning Early Response (EWER) platforms such as Ushahidi, the National Police Service alert service, Humanitarian cluster helplines, GBV Hotline 1195; and social media presence contributed to information sharing, analysis and mapping, and coordination of rapid response during the electioneering period
- f) Established and strengthened Peace Committees in all the Counties at the Sub-County, Ward/Division, Location and Sub-Location levels.
- g) Trained over 500 community level mediators countrywide. These were mainly engaged during the 2017 general elections.
- h) Trained over 10,000 stakeholders in conflict prevention and management country wide.

9. National Disaster Operations Centre

- a) The Directorate in collaboration with other stakeholders coordinated the rescue operations in major disaster occurrences such as; Sultan Hamud fire accident, Gikomba fire tragedy, Moi Girls' fire tragedy, Syosambu Gilgil accident, Solai dam tragedy, Naivasha Karai incident and Kijiji village Langata amongst others.

10. Betting and Licensing Board

- a) Strengthened and revitalized licensing and the enforcement procedures so as to restore and uphold the image and integrity of the Industry.
- b) Intensified the crackdown of illegal machines and premises which led to destruction of 986 machines in Nakuru and 693 in Dagoretti.

11. Firearms and Licensing Board

- a) The Firearms and Licensing Board was reconstituted and reorganized. The Board embarked on streamlining their operations and introduced a new firearm certificate as well as digitizing sixty percent (60%) of their records.

STATE DEPARTMENT FOR CORRECTIONAL SERVICES

1. Kenya Prisons Service

Offender rehabilitation through:

a) Vocational Training

A total of 9,003 received vocational training in carpentry, metal work, tailoring, fashion & design, fiber decoration, crocheting, masonry, farming, baking among others.

b) Tertiary Education (Diploma level/professional courses)

Inmates had an opportunity to pursue Degrees in Law, Commerce and Theology all from London through distant learning. Other professional courses undertaken by inmates include CPA, CPS, KATC, ACCA, Marketing, and diploma in common Law, Diploma in Counseling, theology and business skills training for those nearing release.

c) Formal Learning (class one to form four)

Ten (10) classrooms were constructed in ten institutions for the secondary section. Over 8,100 inmates were enrolled for primary level education while 300 inmates were enrolled for secondary school education.

d) Psycho-social counselling

During the period under review 15,821 inmates were provided with guidance and psychological/spiritual counselling services.

e) Security in Penal Facilities

During 2017/18 the department acquired prisons security equipment (CCTVs & Mobile jammer) at Manyani maximum prison as well as constructed horse stables, dog kennels and infrastructure in Manyani, Ngeria, Kitale, Kakamega, Eldoret, Shimo and Kamiti prisons.

The department enhanced security in prisons through construction of perimeter walls and fences in 8 stations: Shimo La Tewa Maximum, Eldoret Women, Machakos Women, Shimo Borstal, Busia, Maranjau, Kamiti Main, Marsabit and Kiambu Prisons.

f) Prison Infrastructure Development

The department commissioned 18 new Prisons projects that are at different levels of completion. This initiative aims at decongesting high risk security prisons. During the period under review, various components in the six (6) prisons under the Vision 2030 flagship projects were completed in Mwingi, Kaloleni, Vihiga, Kwale, Rachuonyo and Nyamira.

Seventeen (17) Prisons for women were gazetted to reduce the congestion in the existing facilities.

The department constructed and completed Kamae Girls Borstal institution for Girls for custody of youthful offenders and also constructed Prisoners Ward in 6 station: Kilgoris, Yatta, Athi River, Tambach, Kaloleni and Makueni prisons. Other infrastructure constructed and completed include; Main Gate/Gate Lodge/Duty Office/Documentation /Armory in 5 stations i.e. Garissa Medium, Rumuruti, Kehancha, Kerugoya, Kamae BI, YCTC and Nyeri Medium Prisons; Completion of a kitchen and ablution block in Ngeria Prison; and Construction of dining hall in Kitale Main and Kisumu Main Prisons.

g) Capacity Development Programme

During the period under review 3,200 prison officers were recruited, trained and deployed to enhance the capacity of state Department to deliver on its mandate.

h) Housing

A total of 590 permanent staff housing units were constructed in various stations across the country and is in the process of delivering one hundred and fifty (170) decent staff houses which are expected to be occupied soon at Shimo la Tewa maximum security Prison (100 units) and Ruiru Prison (50 units) through Private Public Partnership (PPP)/Police/Prisons housing scheme.

i) Modernization of Number Plates

The Department has been the manufacturer and supplier of motorized vehicle number plates since 1972. The production is currently being modernized in a process that commenced in 2001. During the period under review, procurement of machines and equipment for the manufacture of new generation number plates was finalized.

j) Food self-sufficiency

There are 83 farms prisons spread across the country ranging from large, medium and small farms that are moderately developed and equipped. The estimated prison land is 12,000 acres out of which 8,418 acres are arable and 4,750 acres are under cultivation. The section has a staff establishment of 453 officers and technicians of which 130 are qualified agricultural professionals in various fields.

The Department has sunk boreholes which are at different levels of completion at Kajiado, Taveta, Hola, Nyahururu and Manyani prisons among others. This is to alleviate water shortage in Prisons, encourage irrigation, cost reduction on water bills, provide a sustainable source of clean water and reduce water borne diseases. All this efforts are geared towards achieving self-sufficiency in food production.

k) Establishment of Kenya Prison Enterprise Corporation

The Kenya Prisons Service during the period under review made the initial steps towards establishment of the envisaged Kenya Prison Enterprise Corporation. The corporation will operate as a state corporation under the state corporation Act Cap 446 Laws of Kenya, wholly owned by the Government and mainstreamed the Prison Act Cap 90, Borstal Institution Act Cap 92 and Persons Deprived of Liberty Act 2014. The corporation will be managed by a Board of Directors with professional knowledge and in the following fields: Industry and manufacturing, Building and construction, Agriculture, Innovation, Technology and Entrepreneurship.

Achievements towards establishment of the corporation during 2017/18 the Kenya Prisons Enterprise Corporation bill was drafted and submitted to the Attorney General.

2. Probation and Aftercare Service

a) Probation Orders Programme

Through this programme offenders have increased access to justice. FY 2017/18 saw 47,100 pre-sentence reports being provided to courts, 5,205 post sentence reports to high court, 595 reports submitted to review boards and 6,500 bail information reports

b) Community Service Orders (CSO) Programme

The department enforced court orders by supervising various categories of offenders in 2017/18: 35,200 probation orders, 35,413 Community Service Orders (CSOs) and 235 reports to the advisory committee on the Power of Mercy on cases under review. Through the Community Service Order (CSOs), the government released 2,850 inmates and thus easing congestion considerably.

c) Aftercare Programme

This programme enhanced rehabilitation and reintegration of non-custodial offenders 2017/18 by providing; 158 Offenders with workshop tools, 1,419 offenders with Vocational trainings and formal educational support. It also provided temporary accommodation to 215 needy and deserving offenders as well as provided guidance and counselling to 40,800 offenders on non-custodial rehabilitation

d) Policy, administrative services and work environment

The department increased its staff strength by recruiting three hundred (300) Probation officers; enhancing the capacity of State Department to deliver on its mandate.

It also improved infrastructure through refurbishment of 18 probation offices and expanded two (2) girls hostel including Siaya Girls Probation Hostel.

STATE DEPARTMENT OF IMMIGRATION & CITIZEN SERVICES

1. Directorate of Immigration

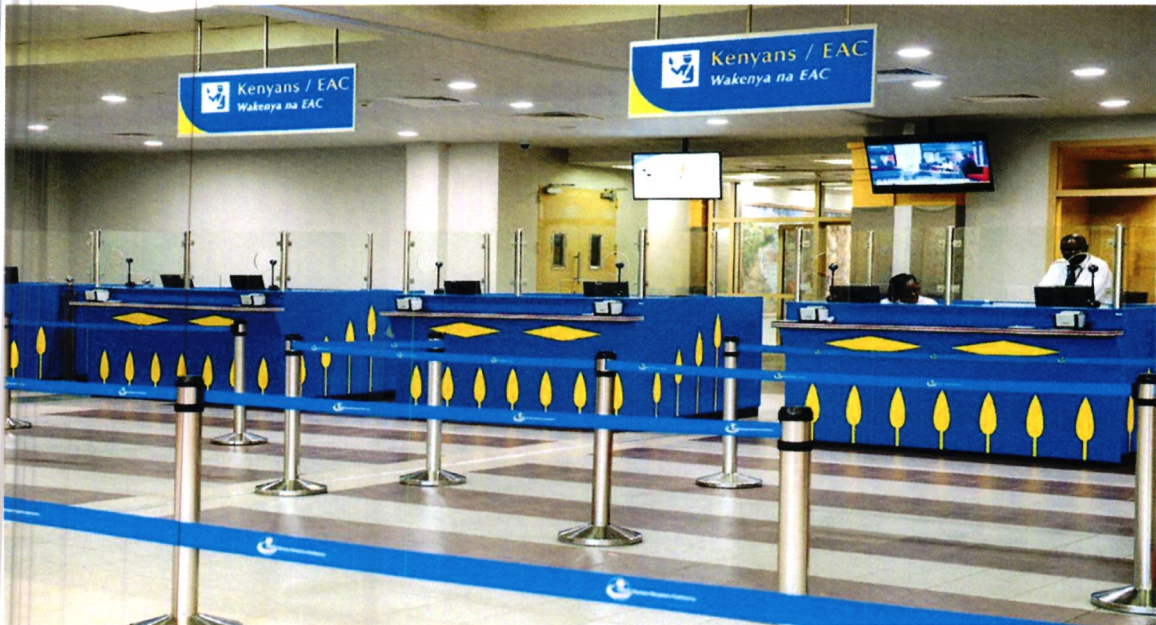
i) Border Management

- a) Established a One Stop Border Posts (OSBPs) in Busia, Lungalunga, Malaba, Moyale, Namanga and Taveta has greatly enhanced IBM.

- b) Established Coordinated Border Management (CBM) for the purpose of ensuring effective and efficient facilitation of international travel.
- c) Established the Border Control and Operations Coordination Committee (BCOCC) through the amendment of the Kenya Citizenship and Immigration Act aimed at achieving coordinated border management in Kenya
- d) Training and equipping of 12 Fraud Detection Unit (FDU) core officers on Document Examination and Forgery Detection by the National Airline Liaison (NAIL) Team
- e) Expansion of JKIA immigration office to accommodate the increase in staff for Airlines operating at the airport and opening of Isiolo Airport and initial staffing of the Airport.

- f) Piloted the Facial Recognition System at the JKIA and Muhuru Bay
- g) Adopted an Integrated Border Management (IBM) Strategy incorporating broad based national and international coordination and cooperation among all the relevant state border security agencies and civilian actors involved in migration

ii) Missions Abroad

The Department opened new Consular services in Kenyan Missions abroad including Dar es Salaam, Lusaka, Doha and Tel Aviv.

iii) Passports

The Department issues various types of travel documents as stipulated in the relevant laws. These include Ordinary Passports; Diplomatic Passports; Emergency travel documents; Temporary Permits; Certificate of Identity and Nationality (CIN) and the Refugee Travel Document in collaboration with refugee secretariat and UNHCR. This was achieved through the:

- a) Adopting e-Services: online applications for passports and cashless payment through e-Citizen.
- b) Procurement of e-passport system and passport booklets.
- c) Construction of Centralized Passport Production Centre.
- d) Launch of the e-Passport in September, 2017 with 286,405 booklets issued under the review period.

iv) Visas

During the period under review, these processes were enhanced by:

- a) Adopting e-Services for online applications and issuance of visas
- b) Reviewing the visa regime in line with the Presidential Decree of November, 2017 requiring African countries to be moved from category 3 to category 2. Countries from the mentioned categories including Mali, Cameroon and Senegal formally in the referred visa category were moved to category 2. This was aimed at strengthening regional integration, trade facilitation and international cooperation.

v) Permits and Passes

The Department has enhanced processing and issuance of Work/Entry Permits and Passes through:

- a) Procurement of the Kenya Foreign Nationals Management System.
- b) Adopting e-Services for online applications for work permits, foreigner certificates, and other foreign nationals management services.
- c) During the period under review, 20,219 work permits were issued.

vi) Foreign Nationals Management

- a) The Department installed equipment to link the capture of biometrics of foreign nationals and transmit to the production center at the National Registration Bureau (NRB) in real time.
- b) Verification and registration of work permits exercise was carried out between 21st May and 22nd July, 2018 that saw 26,829 permits verified.

- c) A total 1,303 foreigners were deported and repatriated as a result of the exercise.
- d) The verification process also resulted in administrative and policy changes on the issuance of work permits. Including; Revised guidelines for issuance of work permits; Severe penalties for illegal workers; Deterrent penalties for companies employing illegal workers; Establishment of a digital database for foreign Nationals; Foreigners seeking work permits to apply for them from their countries and come to Kenya once approved and; Dedicated telephone line for reporting aliens working without permits - **0745660151**

vii) Citizenship and Permanent Residence (PR)

Citizenship and PR are issued to lawful residents who qualify as guided by the constitution. The Department consider residency and citizenship for immigrants with long term goals through either possession of a Dependant pass, Permanent residence certificate or Citizenship.

- a) To improve service delivery, the department adopted online applications for work permits, foreigner certificates, permanent residence, citizenship and other foreign nationals management services.
- b) The department, in line with the African Migration Policy Framework contributed to reducing incidences of statelessness by granting citizenship, in 2017, to 1,495 people who had remained stateless for a long period of time.

2. Refugee Affairs Secretariat (RAS)

To manage the uncontrolled entry of persons into the country, the Secretariat instituted a broad range of measures including:

- a) Voluntary repatriation of refugees. Cumulatively, as at 30th June 2018, a total of 45,177 refugees were assisted to voluntarily return to their home countries, majority to Somalia. This resulted in a decrease in the number of refugees in Dadaab refugee complex leading to closure of two refugee camps namely Kambioos and Ifo 2.
- b) Additionally, the Secretariat has facilitated the resettlement of refugees to third countries with a total of 7,615 refugees resettled to USA, Canada, the United Kingdom, and Sweden among others within the period under review.

CHAPTER THREE

PARLIAMENTARY ENGAGEMENTS

We at the Ministry of interior are strongly of the view that we are entitled to a greater degree of co-operation from Parliament

II. Our work with parliament

1. ACCOUNTABILITY TO PARLIAMENT

As a Government Ministry spending taxpayers' money, we are accountable to Parliament. Our annual report is laid out before Parliament and our work is scrutinised by various parliamentary committees. The cabinet Secretary is regularly called before the Committee to give oral evidence about our activities.

2. ENGAGING PARLIAMENTARIANS WITH OUR WORK

The purpose of the Ministry's engagement with parliamentarians is for Parliamentarians to learn more about, and better understand the work of the ministry, and to support the ministry, offering advice and encouragement in both its every day and long term work.

In addition attendance to our formal engagements, we also:

- Inform Parliamentarians of the activity taking place in their constituencies, for example our work on security matters.
- Hold briefings and meetings for Parliamentarians on aspects of our work and our operations in specific counties.
- Submit factual written evidence to Government, Parliamentary Select Committees, political parties and individual Parliamentarians, for example in response to a Select Committee inquiry or a Parliamentary Question.
- Welcome delegations of Parliamentarians to our offices and operations around the country,

The Ministry also works regularly with Parliamentarians to deliver our strategic objectives in providing security to people and property, Road Safety, the arts, education and society. For example, we invite Parliamentarians to speak at conferences such as periodic security stakeholder meetings. We work with and provide opportunities for parliamentarians both in Government and Opposition. We approach parliamentarians based on their potential interest in the ministry's work, rather than their political affiliation

The Cabinet Secretary appreciates his constitutional obligations to be accountable to the People of Kenya through Parliament and accordingly, honored various invitations by parliamentary committees.

During the period under review, the cabinet secretary and or his representatives appeared before the committees to address matters of national importance. Besides the invitations, the Ministry has addressed petitions, statements, motions and questions that Members of Parliament have brought

to the floor of the house. Of great concern to both senators and members of the national assembly is the current security threats to Kenyans and their properties, their implications to our national security and measures employed to contain the threats.

Further, the Ministry coordinated the preparation of His Excellency the President's annual report to Parliament, year 2018.

The Ministry is committed to ensure the flourishing of the good working relationship with both Houses to enhance the joint realization of the National objectives (See Annex 3)

CHAPTER FOUR

CHALLENGES

The above notwithstanding, the Ministry recognizes that threats to Kenya's stability are varied and ever evolving. During the year under review the Ministry had to contend with global, regional, and local challenges in its endeavor to provide peace and security to the general citizenry. The key challenges the ministry had to contend with included:

Emerging crime such as cyber-crime, piracy and international terrorism that poses a danger to the security situation in the country. Climatic change leading to food insecurity as well as internal conflicts amongst the community over meager resources.

Drug trafficking which has contributed to drug and substance abuse among the youth and ultimately economy's poor performance and increased criminal activities in the Country.

Civil strife and breakdown in governance structures in neighboring countries, including the larger Great Lakes region that have had adverse implications for Kenya and functions of this Ministry in particular. This has led to an increase in crimes including piracy resulting in offences that require special security attention and rehabilitation programs. The consequential effects of this regional instability include the following;

Proliferation of illicit small arms and Light weapons into the country contributing to the increase in the rate of criminal activities such as terrorism, poaching and cattle rustling among others

The 2008 experience revealed to Kenyans the fact that a general election is a very emotive event that requires all security and intelligence apparatus to be on high alert to ensure a peaceful process. It is on this basis that in 2017 (being an electioneering year), the Ministry was confronted with complex security challenges that completely overstretched the available resources forcing the Ministry to make adjustments to cope even as we simultaneously dealt with other internal and external security threats.

Political intolerance which had a big impact investor confidence and the general public especially during the just concluded electioneering period slowing on the economic growth thus endangering the economic livelihoods of millions of Kenyans.

There was an increase in the number of refugees seeking social and economic opportunities in Kenya, at the expense of Kenyans.

Threat to security and congestion of correctional facilities, necessitated the huge investments into security sector at the expense of other infrastructural development.

Increasing anti-social behavior, as exemplified in widespread drug and substances abuse, presented a new and growing challenge particularly among the youth. The ease with which illicit drugs and alcohol are now available presented a major problem to security. Further compounding the problem was the increasing use of Kenya as corridor for drug trafficking with an international dimension.

The fast growing population, widespread unemployment especially among the youth and poverty in the country led to the emergence of organized criminal gangs that posed a significant threat to peace for most Kenyans during the period under review

The terrorism threat from the Al-Shabaab cells operating within the country continued to be a very costly affairs forcing our internal security apparatus to remain in a perpetual state of high alert. Our porous borders did not help as well in creating breaches that have made the work of our security forces even more complicated.

Other factors with huge demands on the Ministry's capacity during the period under review include rampant corruption, both natural and human caused disasters, unrest in educational institutions and a catalogue of immigration issues.

The Ministry relied heavily on the regular budgetary allocation from the National Treasury with minimal donor funding. The Ministry therefore had to compete with other government ministries and agencies for the perennial inadequate resources at the Exchequer. The quota allocated to the Ministry is usually inadequate to finance the priority security needs. This adversely affected the achievement of the objectives set out during the period under review.

As a Ministry, we found ourselves torn between a rock and a hard place, trying our best to remain impartial in enforcement of the law, while at the same time making sure that we did not imperil the governance institutions of the day. While we know that we did our best given the circumstances, we are open to further counsel from the house on how we can continually improve.

WAY FORWARD

In the financial year 2018/2019 the ministry will continue to discharge its mandate and actively contribute to the development agenda through enhancement of security.

The Ministry will continue to grapple with various challenges and constraints in its pursuit of providing security for people. New and emerging threats such as terrorism and cyber security will remain high on the agenda and the Ministry shall seek the indulgence of the legislative houses to help enact enabling legislation and offer the requisite support to the security apparatus to deal with the same.

Our Year Vision is to strengthen our civil and community policing. Public engagement is an integral part of how we serve Kenyans. The Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government will keep the public informed about safety and security issues, inform them about the Ministry's activities, and listen to what they have to say.

Continued public engagement will help us to further strengthen our police service, improve our efforts at the MoICNG, and work cooperatively with all Kenyans to build a stable, strong and peaceful Kenya. Kenya and the Kenyan people have chosen the right path forward, and we are determined in our resolve to progress our country's security and prosperity.

As we move into the future, we shall endeavor to work in collaboration with all stakeholders mitigating the factors that contribute to insecurity and together route ourselves towards the path of helping the promotion of the Big Four development agenda.

Further, the Ministry will continue deepening the reforms in all its directorates, divisions, section and units. These reforms will be guided by the National values and principles of good governance (Constitution of Kenya, Article 10 (c and d)) which bind all public officers to observe the tenets of *good governance, integrity, transparency, accountability, and sustainable development*.

Lastly but more importantly, the ministry will embrace best of international practices in re-engineering operations in order to remain relevant and responsive to the growing public demand for better services. It is envisaged that this will ultimately translate to better resource management, value for money in service delivery and improve public perception of the Government.
